The council conducted routine business before returns were

certified and Mayor Y. B. Johnson retired and turned the gavel over to the newly elected mayor.

Departmental reports of receipts and disbursements were presented by City Manager W. C. Barnett. Also quarterly treasurer's report which was approved.

Barnett reported that well number five pump went out and a new pump bowl has been purchased and the old one is being repaired.

He also announced that the Swimming Pool bond issue has been called and paid off by the city. The council had voted at an earlier meeting to call the bonds and retire the issue. The City Electric fund held a block of these bonds.

Announcement was made that the power loader is being overhauled at a cost of \$500 and the old dump truck has been overhauled at a cost of \$150.

Council members were paid for their services during the past year as the last official act before the new council took over.

## Additional Funds Are Needed To Carry Out Screwworm Eradication

The screwworm eradication program is a reality and is going along well. Approximately 10 million sterile flies are being released each week now in the area of South Texas. All the flies are presently being produced at the Kerrville facility of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Production of 20 million flies per week from Kerrville will be reached soon.

Construction of the large plant at Mission is on schedule and the completion date of July seems entirely attainable. The plant will have the capacity to produce 50-75 million sterile flies a week and the eradication forces are anxious to get into operation in order that all the gains against screwworms can be held.

The Texas Animal Health Commission and the USDA have established a Transport Control Line generally on a line from Austin across to San Antonio along Highway 90 to Del Rio.

The Transport control line was set up in order that no infested animals would be taken out of the south of this line and spread screwworms to the north.

As of March 31, no screwworm cases have been reported north of this line. There have been outbreaks of screwworms in a total number of cases at this time has not been high—in the counties immediately bordering the Rio Grande River. Eradication forces have aggressively moved up to try to stamp out these cases.

The states of Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico are now officially allied with the Texas program. Producers in these states are beginning to organize county and parish animal health committees and have been soliciting funds. These funds will be sent from these states to the Foundation office which will be used as part of the southwest producers contributions in the matching fund responsibility with the USDA.

Some receipts have slowed down in some counties. Every stock producer in Mills County is urgently requested to contact the county chairman.

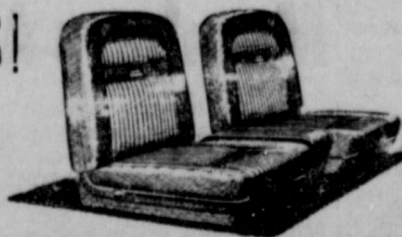

Mrs. Trent called a work day to be held at the Barn, April 6, at 2 p. m., to finish the drapes which were not all finished at a previous work day.

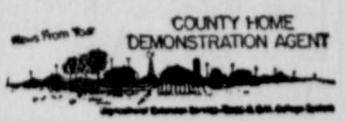

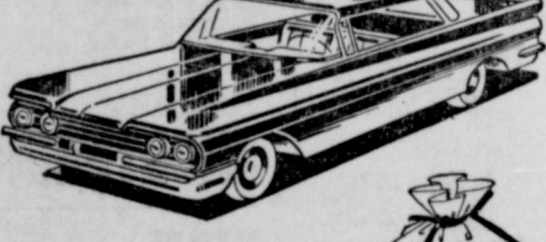
