## First Primary Election Is Saturday

### Republican Primary To Be Held In Goldthwaite Precinct One

The Republican Party will hold a primary election in Mills County this Saturday, it has been announced by Mrs. James L. Aldridge, chairman of the Mills County Republican Committee.

Plans call for the Republican primary to be held in Goldthwaite precinct one, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jake Saylor. Voting will open at 8 a. m. and the poll will remain open until 7 p. m.

Official Republican Primary ballots have been printed with candidates for five state offices and for the office of Congressman-At-Large and of U. S. Representative from district 21. No candidates are listed for county offices.

Jack Cox and Roy Whittenburg are candidates for governor. Kellis Dibrell and O. W. "Bill" Hayes are candidates for Lieutenant Governor.

For Congressman - At - Large there are three candidates. They are Desmond A. Barry, Giles Miller and Joe B. Phillips.

Harry J. Hubbard is candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture; Bernold M. Hanson is candidate for Railroad Commissioner, unexpired term, and Albert B. Fay is candidate for Commissioner of General Land Office.

E. S. Mayer, Jr., is candidate for Representative of 21st district.

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### Plenty Candidates For Top State Offices; Two Contests In County

The First Democratic Primary election of 1962 will be held this Saturday, May 5.

Democratic Executive Committee Chairman, Mrs. Raymond Cockrum, has announced that the polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

There are 18 voting boxes in Mills County.

Absentee voting has been active although not as heavy as it has been in other years. Absentee voting closed Tuesday, May 1, with 89 votes cast.

Only two offices are being contested in the county this year while there is a large field of candidates for most of the state offices.

There are six candidates in the field for the governor's office. They are Price Daniel, Don Yarborough, Will Wilson, Marshall Formby, John Connally and Edwin A. Walker.

Candidates for the office of Lieutenant Governor are: Crawford Martin, James A. Turman, Preston Smith, Jarrard Secrest and Robert Baker.

Six candidates are in the field for Attorney General. They are Tom Reveley, Tom James, Bob Looney, Les Procter, Waggoner Carr and W. T. McDonald.

The office of Congressman-At-Large has seven candidates making their bid. They are Russell T. Van Keuren, Manley Head, Phil Willis, Charles H. Stevenson, Jr., Woodrow Wilson Bean, Warren G. Moore and Joe Pool.

Meade F. Griffin and Jesse Owens are candidates for Associate Justice of Supreme Court, place 1.

Zollie Steakley and Willard G. Street are making their bid for Associate Justice of Supreme Court, place 3.

W. A. Morrison and Otis T. Dunagan are candidates for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

Candidates for Railroad Commissioner, unexpired term, are Keith Wheatley and Ben Ramsey.

Evetts Haley, Jr., and John C. White are candidates for Commissioner of Agriculture.

John C. Phillips, Thos. C. Ferguson and Walter R. Koch are candidates for Associate Justice, 3rd Supreme Judicial District.

Other state offices are not being contested this year.

Penrose B. Metcalfe and Mrs. David Kothmann are in the race for member of State Board of Education.

**COUNTY**

Two offices are in contest in Mills County. They are County-District Clerk and County Judge.

Walter A. "Toby" Bryant and Charles R. Head are in the race for County-District Clerk and L. B. Porter and Cecil Egger are in the contest for County Judge.

**PROPOSITIONS**

Voters will also have an opportunity to express themselves on three propositions.

Proposition one is for the legislature to submit a Constitutional Amendment to legalize parimutuel wagering on horse racing.

Proposition two covers enacting a law legalizing parimutuel wagering on horse racing with the state, the track and the home county sharing in the tax receipts.

Proposition three refers to a Constitutional Amendment to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting.

The Executive Committee Chairman, Mrs. Cockrum, has announced that any voter who is physically unable to enter the polling place may have an official ballot delivered to the curb of the courthouse, permitting the voter to make out his, or her, ballot and have same cast for them.

Democratic precinct conventions will be held this Saturday evening immediately following closing of polls and tabulations of returns.

The county convention will be held the following Saturday, May 12, in the Commissioner's Courtroom in Mills County Courthouse, starting at 10 a. m.

Two residents from McCulloch County are in the race for State Representative. They are Terry Townsend and Frank W. Lohn.

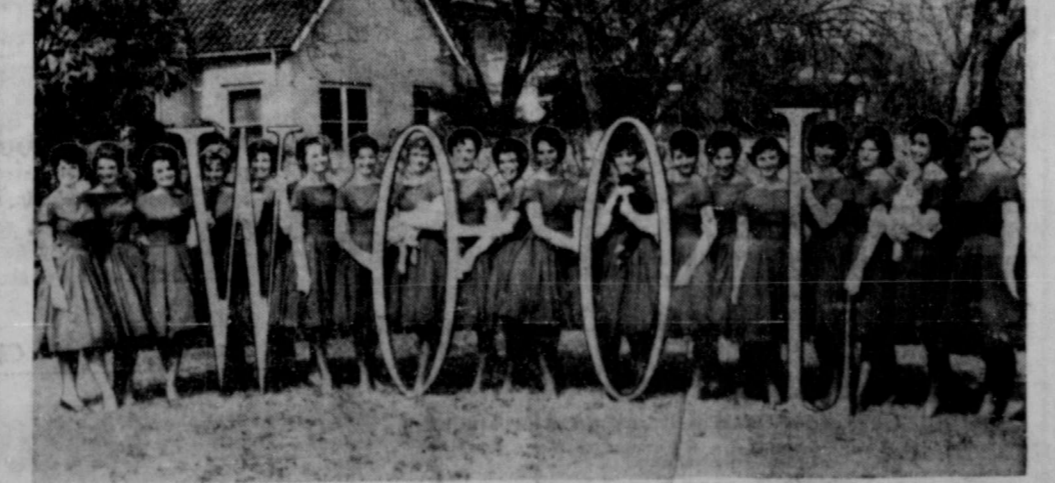
**Goldthwaite Seniors To Present Play This Friday And Saturday**

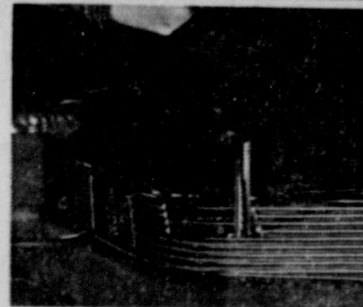

A message from Mercury prompts this story. Not the planet Mercury—for this isn't a space-age story.

We mean the Mercury outboard people. They remind us that down Texas way, the time is nigh when the "bow-hunting" fishermen can have a ball.

There is a group of sportsmen (and women) in this world who think nothing is more fun than to combine hunting and fishing, using the weapons of ancient times to harvest one of the most ancient of fishes.

In states where it is legal (and it is in most counties in Texas), they take a bow and arrow and go fishing (or hunting) for carp, impaling the fish with an arrow when the fish come into the shallows of rivers or lakes to spawn. It's one of the most exciting sports of all, since it is an apt combination of fishing and hunting.

If you've ever tried it, you know it takes a real hunter to sneak up on carp. It's certainly no casual process.

Those big-scaled vacuum cleaners are a spooky, jittery lot. They are quick to spot a potential danger and react immediately... submerging in a split second.

About the only time you can slip up on them is when they are spawning.

This occurs when the water warms to their liking in the spring. Then they proceed into shallow water and roll in the spawning process.

Sometimes you can see half of the fish's back sticking out of the water.

Carp hunters usually use a lightweight outboard motor to get them to the shallow water six to eight inches deep, ever alert for the scaly back of a lunker carp.

This type of fishing-hunting works best when one person does the poling and another the shooting. In fact, it may not work at all unless the hunter is all set to shoot. He must have an arrow at the nock, with the line running from arrow to bow

Carp do not wait for the shot. They come up like a surfacing whale, stay on the surface for an instant or two and down they go again. It is during this brief time they are on the surface that the arrow must be released.

Sounds interesting, doesn't it? It is too — and very much so. Get a team of carp-archers into a "hot" spot and an afternoon of thrills is in store for them!

It's a thrill even when you miss—for carp are the watersplashing critters you ever saw, when spooked.

#### Carp A Native of Asia

In 1877 the carp, a native of Asia that had been transplanted to Europe, was further transplanted to the United States. This started one of the greatest arguments of all time.

Proponents of carp fishing, by the hook and line method... and there are some... say that they provide great sport, good eating and require a fair amount of skill to catch. But they say this in the face of the almost overwhelming feeling of others that a carp is a "junk" or "trash" fish, good for nothing but fertilizer and cat food.

Perhaps the truth lies somewhere in between, with the carp neither a complete villain nor a perfect hero. After all, hardly anyone is perfect.

It is hard for Texans to realize, but in many parts of the country, it is carp, and carp alone, that provide all the readily available fish for a great many people.

For example — a number of lakes in eastern Nebraska are stocked annually with thousands of pounds of carp. Purpose is to provide fishing for those who are far removed from gamefish waters.

Other states provide the same service for metropolitan areas where people are starved for recreation.

What many fishermen fail to realize is that it takes real strategy to catch a carp.

These soft-mouthed critters are as nervous as a henpecked husband at a stag party. They are quick to drop a bait if it does not suit them in every way.

To be a success at carp fishing, use light lines, small hooks and dough balls for bait. Or string a few grains of whole kernel canned corn on a hook and drop it into carp infested waters.

Do not use heavy weights! Carp swallow the bait slowly. If they feel the pull of a sinker they will drop the hook.

Anxious to try your luck at carp fishing—or bow and arrow hunting for carp?

It's a good way to test your skill — and have some fun.

Austin, Texas—The hundreds of candidates who are running for places in the Texas House of Representatives and the Texas Senate have plenty of problems. But when the victors get to Austin they'll have a new one. Big question will be "where to park their cars?"

Lack of parking facilities on the Capitol grounds causes a maddening game of musical chairs — or musical cars — at each legislative session. Speaker of the House James A. Turman says the problem is "growing more acute each day."

So, Turman appointed a committee which may have the longest title in the history of the statehouse: The Interim Committee To Study State Owned Lands Around the Capitol Concerning the Possibility of Converting Such Into Parking Lots.

Rep. Obie Jones of Austin was named chairman. Two other Austin members, Reps. Wilson Foreman and Charles Sandahl, will serve on the interim study committee.

#### Cut The Property Tax?

For three years now a legislator-citizen study committee — the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy — has been mulling the possibility of state abandonment of the property tax. Texas Research League has helped with the study.

The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.

Under the current system, schools get 42 per cent of the property tax dollars; cities take 29 per cent; counties, 18 per cent; and the state government and special districts only get five per cent each.

Texas Municipal League has urged the state to abandon the ad valorem tax and let the cities increase their property taxes.

Hale-Alken committee asked the state to abandon the tax and let the schools levy it.

Tax experts often have declared that county assessors might place higher values on property, if they felt more of the ad valorem tax dollar would

stay in the county.

#### College Funds Short

Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-support colleges and universities were stunned this week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested to meet increased enrollment in 1963.

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But the Legislature only appropriated \$1,500,000 to supplement teaching salaries for enrollment increases. So the commission's staff prorated the fund among the 19 schools.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons why we are never able to raise salaries," he protested. He said the colleges are never allotted enough money, and "have to dig it up."

While the 19 presidents are trying to balance their budgets,

Commission on Higher Education will be studying recommendations from three more colleges who want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and... do junior colleges.

Recommendations will be made when the 58th Legislature convenes.
