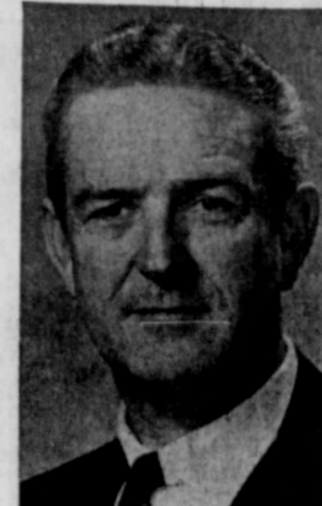

## Mills County Commission Company Has Active Roll In Area Economy

Mills County Commission  
Company is in the public spot-  
light this week—first annual  
"Livestock Market Week" in  
Texas.

The special observance—May  
7-12—is a new statewide public  
relations project of Texas Live-  
stock Auction Assn., an inde-  
pendent, non-profit trade or-  
ganization.

The local market was pur-  
chased in late 1948 by present  
owners S. D. (Sig) and Malcolm  
Jernigan. It is a TLAA affiliate  
and one of Mills County's major  
livestock industry service in-  
stitutions and ranks as a leading  
area business firm. S. D. Jernigan  
is currently serving as a  
member of the board of direc-  
tors of Texas Livestock Assn.  
Nearly 77 per cent of the cat-  
tle and calves, hogs, sheep,  
lambs, and goats consigned to  
market by Texas farmers and  
ranchmen are sold by chanting  
livestock auctioneers. Last year,  
according to official figures,  
Mills County Commission Co.,  
and other high-bid markets of  
Texas handled a combined to-  
tal of 4,492,000 cattle and calves,  
437,000 hogs, 1,844,000 sheep,  
lambs and goats.

The local market's salable re-  
ceipts for a single year have  
run as high as 461,877 head of  
sheep and goats. Volume of  
sales for a single year have  
reached the total of \$4,395,859-  
49. A fair share of those dollars,  
according to the owners, re-

marketing service, including  
experienced, expert counsel and  
friendly, sound advice for the  
benefit and profit of livestock  
producers in this area.  
Handling the important  
"chanting" chores every busy  
sale day is Malcolm Jernigan,  
well known livestock auctioneer  
who is also "starter" for the firm.  
Mills County Commission  
Company's stockyard facilities  
have handled a peak capacity of  
15,640 head of sheep and goats  
in a single sales day.  
Another important and key  
responsibility every sale day is  
that of Bill Sherwood, the mar-  
ket's bonded weighmaster whose  
duty is to painstakingly oper-  
ate the market's scales to  
assure the firm's consignors and  
buyers correct weights.  
Prompt settlement of trans-  
actions every sale day is ex-  
pected by an efficient office  
crew supervised by Mrs. S. D.  
(Sig) Jernigan, head bookkeeper  
and office manager. Other  
members of the accounting  
crew are Mr. and Mrs. Dude Lee  
and Mrs. John Soules.  
The firm is registered and  
bonded under the Packers &  
Stockyards Act, U. S. Depart-  
ment of Agriculture.  
Another valued advantage of-  
fered to customers is brand in-  
spection which is handled by  
Texas & Southwestern Cattle  
Raisers Assn. TSCRA's local in-  
spector is Joe Davis.

## Mills Voters Favor Connally In Primary Election Saturday

### Incumbents Walter A. Bryant And Cecil Egger Re-Nominated

Mills County voters in the  
first democratic primary elec-  
tion here last Saturday cast a  
majority vote for John Connally  
in the contest for Governor.  
Connally got 436 votes and Ed-  
win A. Walker received 302 for  
second place in the county.  
Incumbents Walter A. "Toby"  
Bryant and Cecil Egger were  
re-nominated for the offices of  
County-District Clerk and  
County Judge and Ex-Officio  
School Superintendent, respec-  
tively.  
Bryant received 826 votes  
while his opponent, Charles R.  
Head got 716. Egger polled 1,113  
votes and his opponent L. B.  
Porter got 448.  
Terry Townsend got a favor-  
able majority in the county  
with 1,043 votes over his op-  
ponent Frank W. Lohn who  
polled 346 for State Representa-  
tive.  
In the race for State Board  
of Education Penrose Metcalfe

had 845 and Mrs. David Koth-  
mann 523.  
Jarrard Secrest polled 424 for  
first place in the county for  
Lieutenant Governor.  
Waggoner Carr was the top  
man in the county with 529  
votes for Attorney General.  
W. A. Morrison got 953 for  
Judge, Court of Criminal Ap-  
peals while his opponent Otis  
T. Dunagan received 278.  
Ben Ramsey received 789 for  
Railroad Commissioner, un-ex-  
pired term, and Keith Wheatley  
got 519.  
Meade F. Griffin polled 747  
for Supreme Court, place 1,  
and Jesse Owens got 505.  
Manley Head and Joe Pool  
were the two top runners for  
Congressman-At-Large. Head  
got 242 and Pool 226.  
Zollie Steakley received 670  
for Associate Justice, place 3,  
and Willard G. Street got 560.  
Thos. C. Ferguson was the top  
man in a field of three for  
Associate Justice, 3rd district.  
Ferguson received 646 votes,  
John C. Phillips 416 and Walter  
R. Koch 217.  
Mills County voters favored  
Evetts Haley, Jr., for Commis-  
sioner of Agriculture with 717  
votes to John C. White 625.

All three propositions were  
turned down by county voters.  
There were several token  
write-in votes for some offices.  
Chief of these were 10 votes for  
Mrs. John Elliott for County  
Treasurer and two votes for  
Love Gatlin for U. S. Representa-  
tive.

## Commerce Department Announces Housing Survey For Mills County

The 1960 Census of Housing  
counted 1,988 housing units in  
Mills County.  
Of these 1,099 were in sound  
condition with all plumbing and  
1,633 were occupied, with 1,261  
occupied by owners.  
The median value of owner-  
occupied places was less than  
\$5,000, according to the report.  
Places occupied by renters to-  
taled 372. Median gross rent of  
rented places was not computed  
for the county.  
The report shows 1,312 had  
hot and cold running water,  
1,524 had flush toilet and 1,539  
bathtub or shower.  
Twenty-seven had basement,  
24 were trailer homes, 141  
households had air conditioning.

A total of 1,078 had TV, 1,608  
radio, 1,049 telephone, 1,099 had  
washing machine and none  
were listed with clothes dryer.  
Five hundred and fifty-five  
had one or more home food  
freezers, 993 had one automob-  
ile, 185 had two automobiles  
and 45 had three or more auto-  
mobiles.

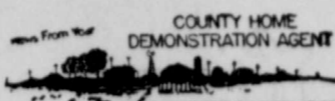

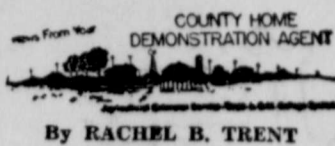

**No Parallel To Sabine Pass**

A state is only as good as are its inhabitants. Considering the status and accomplishments of the state of Texas, this is a compliment to all Texans. Perhaps that's why Texans take such pride in the historical events that have occurred on Texas soil.

To quote Jefferson Davis of one such Texas event: "There is no parallel in ancient or modern warfare to the victory of Dowling and his men at Sabine Pass, considering the great odds against which they had to contend."

What happened at Sabine Pass?

Lt. Richard Dowling and 47 men in the Texas heavy artillery, Confederate States of America, fighting from a mud fort, repulsed an attack of four warships and twelve hundred men of the Federal Army.

They not only repulsed them, they captured approximately three hundred and fifty prisoners and two gunboats mounting thirteen guns of the heaviest caliber.

**Indian Springs At The Crossing**

In 1824 the Huaco Indians made a treaty with Stephen F. Austin. But in 1837 the Comanche Indians drove the Huacos out.

A city then grew up near the site of the Indian village and took the name Waco. Now Waco is one of the leading cities in Central Texas.

Site of the Indian village also was the site of the first crossing of the Brazos River. In 1917 the Daughters of the American Revolution reclaimed the Indian Spring at the village site and memorialized it.

This spring still flows, near the west end of the old and renowned Suspension Bridge over the Brazos River, in Waco.

**He Did His Full Duty**

In East Texas, within the city of Palestine, stands a monument for John H. Reagan.

Thereon, you will find a most appropriate quotation: "The old Roman's highest ambition was to do his full duty; Conscious-

ness of having done it was his ample reward."

It is a large monument. It had to be in order to list the accomplishments of Reagan.

Inscribed on it is a list of the positions held by Reagan from 1845 to 1905. They include Probate Judge, Texas Legislator, District Judge, U. S. Congressman, Confederate Congressman, Postmaster of the Confederate States of America, Secretary of the Treasury of the Confederate States, Delegate to the Texas Constitutional Convention, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, and author of "Memoirs of Secession and Civil War."

It can truly be said that this man did his "full duty."

**In Tribute To Ben Ficklin**

Ben Ficklin is the name. It's the name of a man... the man who was instrumental in establishing the Pony Express.

It was Ben Ficklin who also personally carried the first message from the first Governor of California to the Governor of Missouri. Ben Ficklin, the man, died in 1870.

Ben Ficklin also is the name of a stage stand, so named in his honor.

It's also the name of the first County seat of Tom Green County in West Texas. Location: 4 miles south of the present town of San Angelo. Ben Ficklin, the town, was destroyed by flood in 1882.

**Helena Duel Added To Color**

"Possessed of a colorful history" would be perhaps the most broad description of Helena, Texas.

Colorful is right, but the color is red. Red with the lifeblood of many men who saw the last of Texas at Helena.

A major contribution to this colorful history was made by the "Helena Duel."

Duelists' left hands were bound together. Then the two combatants were left to settle their differences with knives held in their free hands.

Hardly a game for cowards or weaklings, this duel! Yet it became the most popular sporting

event for local entertainment. Audiences and betting reached such large proportions that the recurrent winners were looked upon as local celebrities.

One of the stone buildings of the early town still stands—the old two story courthouse. It is referred to as "the place where they talked things over before they lynched a man."

You can guess how out-of-court settlements were made back in the early days. By the "Helena Duel," of course.

**Tribute To The Cavalry**

There is no need to tell the people of Texas of the bravery shown by the Cavalry in the days of the old west. Movies have portrayed this part of our history.

However, there is a marker far out in northwest Texas that so well conveys the perils faced by the Cavalry, that it bears repeating.

This marker honors the soldiers who died under the command of General R. S. McKenzie in the Fourth U. S. Cavalry during the 1870's.

It reads: "With no hope of honor if victorious, no dream of mercy if they fell, and the certainty of death by torture if taken alive, they fought the savage Comanche and cleared the plains for the white men."

This marker is in the cemetery at Spur, Texas, in Dickens County.

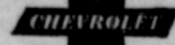

The tour, which included District 8 Judges, District Officials, County Officials, Goldthwaite business men, visitors from other communities and Mullin residents, began at 9 a. m. and ended at 11:30. Mills County Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield led approximately 35 cars through the community.

The first stop was at Phillips Grocery to see the complete

service that the store gives and also the addition made with dry goods line this year.

The home of Maxwell Kirkpatrick was the second stop. Visitors saw here how this family had completely modernized the former home and using an original plan had enlarged the home to twice its size. They were shown many lovely things they had brought from other lands, many old and beautiful pieces of china, also the new electric heating and cooling system.

At the M. L. Ethridge farm they noted his good farm management program. Controlled mesquite, constructed livestock water dam and deferred pasture. He practices rotation and proper food diet for livestock. Has wheat allotment and good grain sorghum base; also controlled 200 acres of prickly pear; bought a new diesel tractor and huge breaking plow.

At the Cecil Starnes place they saw how a man with only one arm can completely operate a farm and care for his livestock, also how he operates his well organized feeding program. This could be well adapted for use by all. Mr. Starnes' sheep were also shown.

From there the tour came back into town down the old highway where most every home had done some type of improving, making a stop at Mrs. Maxine Ghist's new home and the Bert Lockett home showing how this place, built in 1906 had been completely restored and made into a modern home, with the addition of running water, modern bath, kitchen cabinets, and clothes closets. The fireplace having been restored with granite.

After leaving the Lockett place they paused for a moment to view the school, then traveled East to see and point out improvements at most every home along the way. Saw the Registered Angus cattle on the G. W. Chancellor place. Made a stop at the Roger Sanders home to see a place that had been vacant for some ten years. This young couple bought this place, completely remodeled and modernized, built new barns and corrals, planted fruit and nut trees, made strawberry bed and rebuilt yard fence. Planted and fertilized winter Legumes.

Smiths outstanding 4-H Leaders and 4-H prize winners. The Community Center was the last stop.
