Grazing Deadline Past For Wheat And Feed Grain

Farmers were reminded today that acreage diverted under either the 1962 wheat or feed grain program may no longer be pastured.

Edgar L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Mills County Committee, said today that May 1 was the deadline for pasturing such acreage. Acreage to be diverted under the programs is so designed by the program participant at the time a check is made of compliance. In this county, this check should be substantially completed by June 30, 1962.

Under the wheat and feed grain programs, farmers are seeking to bring production into line with needs through diverting to a conserving use acreage formerly planted to either wheat or corn, grain sorghum, or barley. Program payments are made under the programs to offset the loss of income which otherwise might have been returned from such crop production.

CALENDAR OF FACT AND OPINION

Sylvia F. Porter writes, in Life Magazine: "To stay competitive, we will have to restrain increases in prices and wages and will have to invest increasing billions in modernizing our factories and equipment. To stay ahead in this trade race, we must step up our research to develop new, cheaper, more appealing products and get back to hard-selling practices in order to bring our quality products to customers at attractive prices. None of this is going to be easy. We've had a long period of comparatively soft living in the markets of the world, and getting back to any job always is tough. But Americans always have thrived on competition. There is no justification for believing we won't continue to thrive on it."

According to Henry J. Taylor, columnist: "Our gold on hand has fallen to \$16.6 billion. The law requires \$11.6 billion behind our dollar. This leaves only \$5.1 billion to meet foreign demands. European central banks and other foreigners now own \$18 billion (net) of short-term claims, payable in gold on demand. All gold legally behind the U. S. dollar has been mortgaged and \$6.5 billion more besides. The gold claims against us are \$1.4 billion more than even the total stored here."

Tax Foundation tells us what federal budget cuts would mean to American families. A \$1 billion reduction, it says, would allow each family of four to keep \$18 and spend it the way it wishes, instead of paying it out on taxes.

Representative Walter H. Judd, who is also a physician, says: "We in the healing profession concentrate on improving the quality of medical care. Those who don't understand the essentials of good care take high quality for granted and concentrate their attention on trying to get more equitable distribution. They don't realize that a main result of the supposedly better distribution under government management is deterioration of the quality of the care, until it becomes hardly worth distributing more equitably."

Newsweek prints a line a disgruntled taxpayer wrote to the tax collector: "Now I know what the president meant when he said: 'Ask not what America will do for you—ask what you can do for America.'"

The federal government has controlled just about every phase of commercial transportation for 80 years. According to President Kennedy's transportation message to Congress, the result has been that, "A chaotic patchwork of inconsistent and often obsolete legislation and regulation has evolved from a history of specific actions addressed to specific problems of specific industries at specific times . . . The regulatory commissions are required to make thousands of detailed decisions based on out-of-date standards. The management of the various modes of transportation is subjected to cumbersome and time-consuming regulatory supervision that shackles and distorts managerial initiative . . ."

In the view of the United States Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, the competitive position of American firms operating abroad will be seriously hampered if new legislation aimed at eliminating tax deferral on the earnings of foreign-based, U. S.-owned subsidiaries is enacted. It points out that the existing system of deferral permits these subsidiaries to operate under conditions more nearly equal to their rivals in the Western European countries by permitting them to finance a larger part of their investments out of retained earnings, without a corresponding drain on the balance-of-payments.
