1963-Crop Wheat Proclamations Again Postponed

Acreage allotment and marketing quota proclamations for 1963 crop of wheat have been postponed for another 30 days under a special resolution passed by the U. S. Congress.

E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said June 13, that the new resolutions permit the Secretary of Agriculture to defer until July 15 any proclamations which otherwise would be required on acreage allotments and marketing quotas for the 1963 crop of wheat.

The resolution also permits any referendum on marketing quotas for 1963-crop wheat to be held as late as August 25, 1962.

The permanent legislation which authorizes the quota-allotment programs directs that the required proclamations be made by May 15, and that any wheat quota referendum be held not later than July 25. A previous 30-day deferment of the proclamation was authorized in mid-June.

Two Killed In Two Car Collision On Highway 84

More Rainfall Recorded Here

More rainfall was recorded in Mills County during the past week.

Goldthwaite received 1.22 inches while some sections of the county reported from one to three inches.

Total recorded in Goldthwaite so far this month is 5.10 inches.

Two persons were killed and five were hospitalized as a result of a two car collision on U. S. Highway 84 at 2 p. m. Tuesday about three miles northwest of Goldthwaite.

Emzy O. McLean, 74, Goldthwaite, was pronounced dead

when physician arrived on the scene of the accident and Paul Charles Geurts, 6 months, was dead on arrival at Childress Clinic and Hospital.

The injured were brought to Childress Clinic & Hospital by Wilkins ambulance.

Admitted to the hospital were: Charles Arthur Geurts, 26, his wife, Mrs. Phyllis Geurts, 27, their son, Bryan Arthur, 2, their daughter, Kathryn Rae, 5, and Jerry Ray Odekirk, 25, who was a passenger in the car with the Geurts family.

The condition of Mr. and Mrs. Geurts was described as fair, their son Bryan Arthur was in good condition, their daughter was in fair condition and she was being kept under observation for possible head injuries.

Mr. Odekirk received a fractured shoulder blade, four fractured ribs and some head lacerations.

Geurts and Odekirk were members of the National Guard and were stationed at Fort Hood, Texas. They had been on leave visiting at their home in Salt Lake City, Utah, and were on their return trip to Fort Hood.

Mr. McLean was driving alone.

According to reports the Geurts car went out of control and started sliding on the wet pavement. It had been raining.

The body of Paul Charles Geurts will be shipped to Salt Lake City by Roy Wilkins Funeral Home who had charge here. Funeral services and burial will be in that city.

CATFISH BOOK—The Game and Fish Commission of Texas recently sent out this little news item:

"It's catfishing time in Texas, and some big ones are now being hauled in on trot lines, and even with rods and reels. But a great many fishermen don't know their catfishes. Every day letters come into the office of the Game and Fish Commission seeking information about these fresh water species found in the lakes and streams of Texas, according to T. D. Carroll, coordinator of information and education.

"To answer these questions, the Commission has reissued its bulletin No. 39, entitled 'The Fresh Water Catfishes of Texas, and How to Know Them.' The bulletin lists the fresh water catfishes, with a chart making identification easy.

"Also, it covers the feeding habits and habitat, enabling fishermen to have greater creel success. This bulletin is sent free to interested persons."

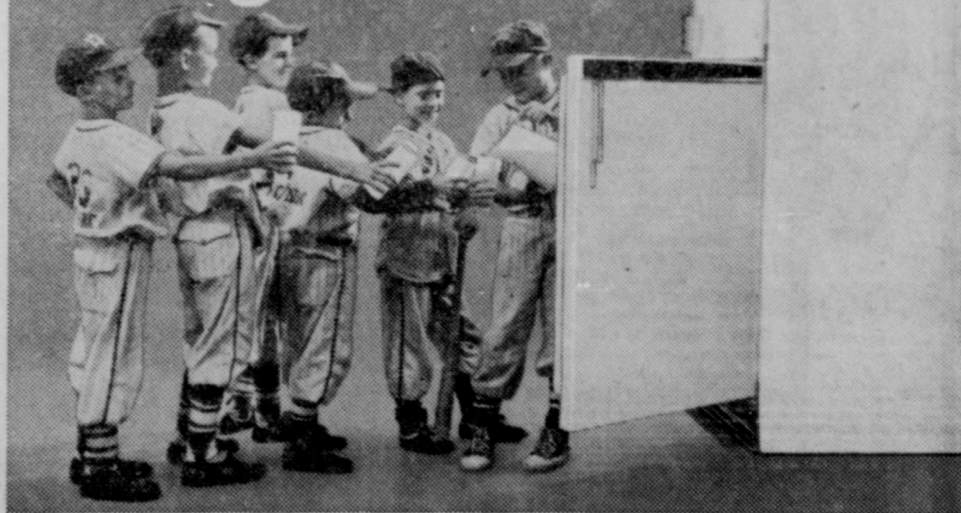

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEX. — Texas has something to brag about: The best traffic safety record in Texas history.

The National Safety Council "grades" all states on traffic safety. Of a possible 100 points, Texas got 84 for its efforts to solve traffic deaths and injury during 1961. A big share came from the second lowest traffic death toll since 1949—"only" 2,314 killed on the highways in 1961.

California had the best score with 86. Michigan was second with 85. Texas tied with Illinois and Ohio for third place among the "big traffic" states.

Gov. Price Daniel said that holding down the death rate despite steadily-increasing traffic made a real record—fewer deaths per 100,000 miles traveled than ever before.

NEW INDUSTRY

Every Texas city is looking for new industry. But they aren't alone. Every state has some sort of industry-attracting program.

In May, Texas tied with Illinois for fourth place in the number of new industries opened for business. Each had 30. New York's 49, California's 35, and Pennsylvania's 32 led Texas.

Some states allow public-supported bond issues to finance plant buildings. The Texas Industrial Commission thinks this should be done by private finance, but it asked the Texas Research League to make a study to see which approach is best.

Texas Industrial Commission is running ads this month in Business Week, Wall Street Journal, Dun's Review and American Banker magazines and newspapers, inviting industry to look at Texas for new plant sites.

CARLA'S COST

Hurricane Carla, which hit

Texas last September, struck a delayed blow this week.

After insurance companies paid more than \$110,000,000 in insurance claims, the State Board of Insurance ran up the statistics in setting new rates for extended coverage insurance—which includes windstorm damage.

The result—a 27 per cent increase in dwelling rates in the "seacoast territory" and a 53 per cent increase in the two inland territories.

"Seacoast territory" comprises all counties on the Gulf of Mexico, plus a tier of counties adjoining them.

In those counties, where \$100 worth of extended coverage insurance cost 35 cents this year—it will cost 44 cents after July 1.

This is just the dwelling rate. There are dozens of other variations in the complicated business of setting insurance rates.

But it's all based on statistics. When insurance companies have the biggest losses in history in 1961, it raises rates for a number of years to even things out.

HERE TO STAY

From the way Texas Democratic nominees for the state Senate are thinking now—the new sales tax is here to stay.

There likely will be some modifications—but no chance of repeal, and little chance of making it one per cent on everything instead of two per cent on most things.

That is the result of a newspaper survey of Democratic nominees for the Senate.

A clear majority—17 of the 31—felt that the sales tax would not be repealed. Only one among the 17 said he would vote to repeal it.

But several feel there should be some changes made. Major item suggested was to do something to ease the strain on small vendors.

Interpretations of the law are that the merchant can't collect the tax on sales of less than 25 cents, but must pay the tax to the state on those sales as a part of his gross sales.

Theory was that collecting more than two per cent on sales of 25 cents and more would even things out. But it hasn't worked that way, particularly among people like restaurants where they sell a lot of coffee, vending machines, newsboys and others.

There may well be some changes made in this.

Blanco County for a state park. But the condition was that the state spend \$500,000 to make a sure enough park out of it.

Parks Board members divided. Harry Hornby, Uvalde publisher, said yes. He was joined by two members, but three opposed. So it was a 3-3 tie.

Ed Kilman, Houston editor who voted not to take it, hoped that the Legislature will see its way clear to provide the money in 1963, and that the offer by the Wheatleys will be renewed.

The Wheatley ranch lies along the Pedernales River. It abounds in wild game and scenic country for 10 miles along that stream.

Parks Board, fighting a hard fight with a short stick on money, just couldn't see how it could promise to spend \$500,000.

It has a fund of \$700,000 to be used next year on parks improvement. Meanwhile, however, Texas Tech is to draft a master plan for park development, showing where the start should be made in improving the long-neglected park system.

MORE OIL SUITS

Eight more operators in the East Texas Field were enjoined from interfering with tests on their leases to see if their oil wells run straight up and down.

And the Railroad Commission extended to the Hawkins Field of Wood County its prohibition against plugging wells.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson got word that some wells in that field may have been slanted over to someone else's property, so he asked that the no-plugging ban include the big Wood County field.

When the investigation opened, several operators immediately plugged their wells with cement, thus preventing check into the variation from the straight and narrow path.

Of 27 wells checked so far, only one has been found to be slanted.

Lawsuits continue to pile up on the docket of East Texas courts, as neighbors sue neighbors they think have drained oil from under their leases.

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Reels
Fishers have found that the solution for cleaning fish-reels is a mixture of two parts alcohol to one part light gun oil.

When the alcohol evaporates, a light, protective film which keeps reel parts from rusting, or corroding.

Depredation In Camp
Animals are a constant source of depredation in camp. The gnaw equipment because of the sweat salt they leave on such items as axe handles. They break open bags and cans in search of food.

This occurs during the night, or when the camp is unattended.

To prevent this aggravation, spray your equipment and stores with nicotine. It is a chemical insecticide.

To Keep Fish Tasty
Stringers are handy. So are ice chests. But both have shortcomings when it comes to keeping fish fresh for the pan.

Better ways are: Remove hooks and place live catch in a live bait well. Then keep the fish cool on the way home in a wet burlap bag.

Before cooking, soak filets in salt and soda for at least an hour.

A Sound Fishing Tip.
Don't let muddy water discourage you from fishing.

Murky water often is better than clear water, because when a fish's vision is obscured it feeds by sound — carried to it

either by radar-like nerve endings, or its hollow bones that act as sound chambers.

Fish pin-point the location of your lure by its vibrations. So, in murky water, or any water after dark, use a good noisy lure which gives off heavy vibrations that a fish can hear.

Reel from slow to faster, until you feel the lure's strongest pulsations, then maintain that speed throughout retrieve.

Dress Up Your Jigging Bait
Don't bother mixing your own dough for carp bait.

Just open a can of biscuit dough and mix with cotton balls. Easiest bait you ever made — and it will catch catfish too.

Vacuum Your Dog
When your dog comes in from the field his coat is apt to be a mess of leaves and trash.

Don't bother to comb these out. Run your vacuum cleaner over him a time or two and he'll be clean and glossy once more.

Keep Guns Rust-free
Wherever your hot water heater is located is where your guns should be stored.

The low constant heat of the gas burner is just enough to keep guns free of moisture and rust.

Landing Nets Tangle Easily
While you're walking to and from a fishing spot, landing nets seem to have an irritating habit of tangling on every bush you pass.

Avoid this irritation by thrusting the net inside a burlap sack or plastic bag before starting out.

Real Feathers To Train A Pup
Bird-dog pups train more quickly when real bird feathers are used to train them to fetch and carry.

Skin a quail from your next bag, salt and dry skin, then roll skin around a small rag ball.

Have pup retrieve this feather covered ball to give him the feel and smell of bird feathers.

Better Than A Stringer
Here's a good tip on what to do to replace that worn stringer. Old-time fishermen say it's even better than a stringer.

Take a loose-woven potato sack, weave 4-feet of 1/8-inch plastic cord to form a drawstring, then tie the sack to the gunwale and drop it over the side the same as you would a stringer or wire basket.

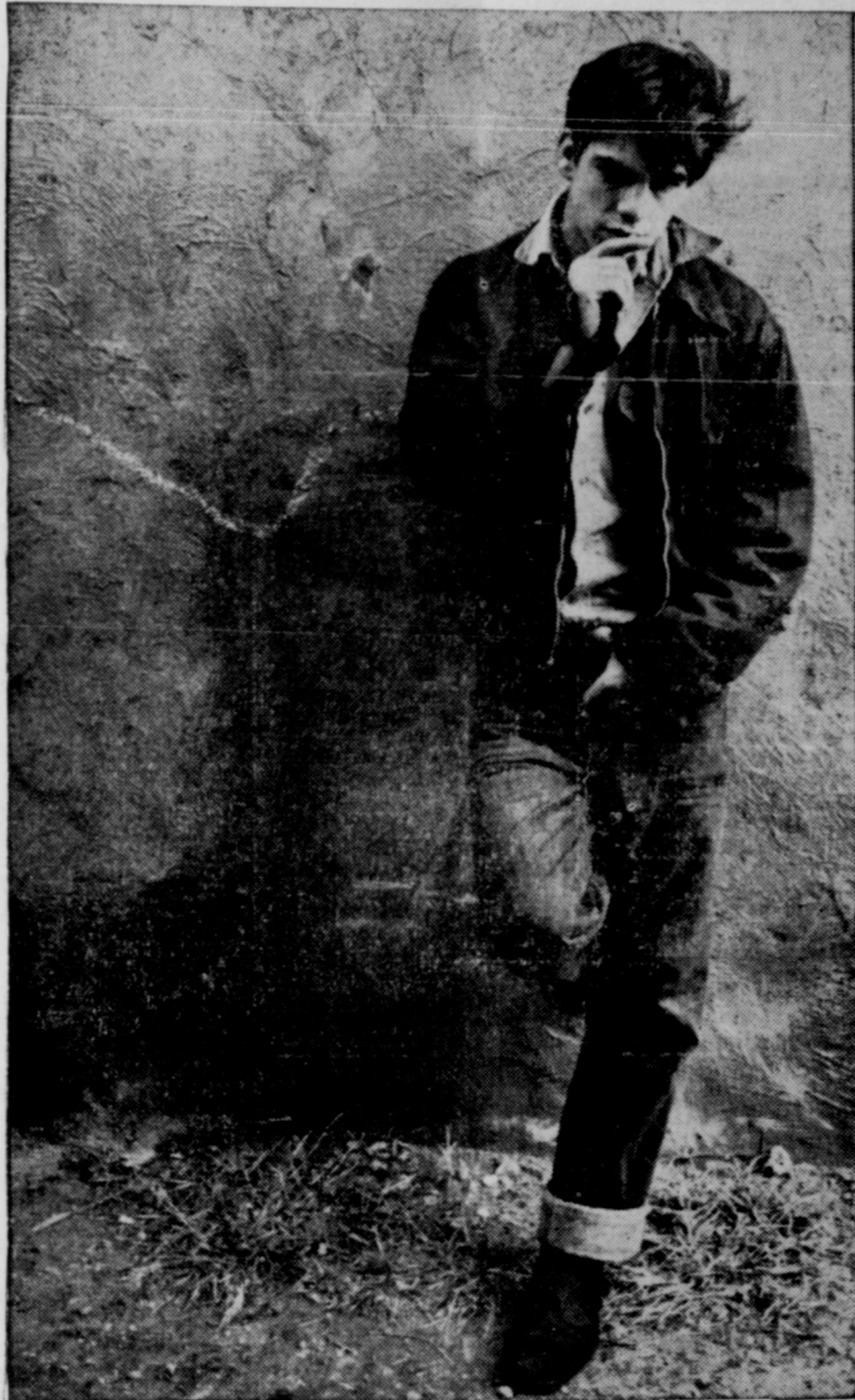

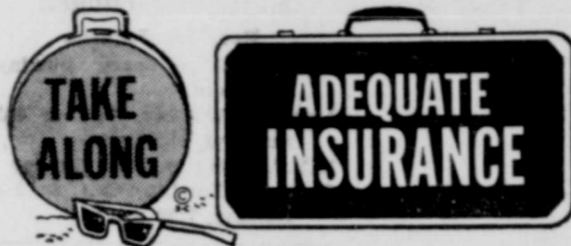

Selective Service System Reminds All Young Men Of 18 To Register

Texas Local Board No. 84 and the Selective Service System reminds all young men who will reach their 18th birthday during the summer months that they may register with Selective Service at any local board office which is convenient to them.

The "Place of Residence" given at the time of registration will determine which local board of the system will be required to accept jurisdiction over their records and classification, etc.

Young men are required by law to register with Selective Service within five days upon reaching their 18th birthday regardless of where they may be temporarily working or living at the time. By presenting themselves to the local board nearest to them for registration and by giving their permanent home address (legal residence) as their "Place of Residence" will assure the prompt forwarding of the Registration Card to the boy's "Home Board" which will assume jurisdiction over his Selective Service Records. No

purely temporary residence or mailing address should be given if a permanent residence has been established.

Any person, subject to registration who because of circumstances over which he has no control, is prevented from presenting himself for and submitting to registration on the day or any of the days and in the manner required by the Proclamation of the President, shall present himself for and submit to registration immediately upon its becoming possible for him to do so.

Failure to register, like failure to comply with other provisions of the law, may subject men to prosecution, or to induction out of turn and ahead of other men. After he registers, each man is required by law to keep his local Board informed of any change in his address, or any change in his personal situation which might affect his liability to serve.

It should be kept in mind that most Selective Service Board offices are closed on Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays and it therefore becomes important for young men to register promptly upon reaching 18 years of age. Sen. Louis Crump Guest Speaker For Texas Research League Board

Senator Louis Crump, of San Saba, Chairman of the Senate Cost of Government Study Committee, was the principal speaker at the Board of Directors meeting of the Texas Research League on Thursday, June 21. In his speech Senator Crump praised the directors and staff of the Texas Research League for their significant contributions to the economy and efficiency of Texas State Government.

In the main text of his speech Senator Crump mentioned several areas of state government in which the Com-

mittee thought significant economies could be made. He pointed out that these economies might well mean the expenditure of less money, as well as the providing of more and superior services for the expenditure of the same amount of money.

Senator Crump explained in some detail how the Committee hoped to secure improved services in the fields of tuberculosis control, a juvenile probation system, an improved administrative procedure for the construction of state buildings, improved care for the senile geriatric patients currently in state hospitals, and the expanded utilization of prison industries.

Crump pointed out that one of the most difficult things to achieve in state government is an attitude on the part of department and agency executive officers that will encourage them to develop procedures and practices which will mean economical but meaningful state services.
