SATURDAY, JANUARY 4, 1800-Volume 11, No. 88, Saturday, January 4, 1800, is the date recorded on a copy of a newspaper that is in possession of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Cockrum.

It is a copy of the Ulster County Gazette, Published at Kingston (Ulster County) By Samuel Greer and Son, way back when. It is marked: Price 25¢.

Mrs. Cockrum was looking through some papers the other day in a desk that was used by the late J. V. Cockrum in the Cockrum home west of Goldthwaite and found this paper.

On the first page of the paper Mr. Cockrum had written the following: "This paper records the death of George Washington."

How long this issue of the Gazette had been in their possession is not known. Its state of condition is far better than copies of the Eagle that are in old files and less than one-third the age.

January, 1800, would take this back 162 years. If this is an original copy it certainly would be a rare possession and could be a priceless museum piece. If it is a reprint from the old and original copy it doesn't state when it was

At any rate it is an interesting paper with items about the tin before returning to their American Congress, message from the Senate to President John homes. Adams and his reply. Also news from other parts of the world and the story of General Washington being entombed.

There are also some official, or legal notices and sheriff's sale notices and advertisements from merchants.

Advertising placed by merchants in those days was quite different from present day advertising and promotion. There was no display or art work. Just plain type and type was small-but it told the story. Some examples of the ads:

"Samuel Freer has just received an assortment of Goods adapted to the season, which he will dispose of for CASH OR COUN-TRY PRODUCE only, upon very moderate terms. Ashes taken in

"Abraham I. Hasbrouck returns his cordial thanks to his friends and the public in general, for the past favors, and respectfully informs them that he continues in the Mercantile and Boating business and has on hand a General Assortment of Dry Goods and Groceries, which he will dispose of upon the most reasonable terms, for CASH OR COUNTRY PRODUCE."

"Second notice, of my wife HANNAH is hereby given, forbidding all persons whatever from harboring or keeping her, and from trusting her on my account, as I am determined to pay no debts of her contracting." Nov. 18, 1799, by Matys Van Steenbergh, Kay Day and Billie Gail Soules. of Saugertiesi, Kingston precinct.

John Tremper announced his mercantile line that he was willing to dispose of very cheap for cash or produce only. He also Sunday. offered CASH for Wheat and Fur.

There were also some lost and found ads. Lost watch, gun stolen from store for which reward of \$2 was offered and lost or strayed heifer and a strayed bull.

One interesting ad was noted by this writer the tone of which sounds pretty much like it does today, it stated:

"Cash given at the Printing office for Rags." To top off the list of interesting ads here is one that gets the prize. It was dated Dec. 24, 1799.

"Luther Andres & Company have this day Been opening GOODS both fresh and gay. He has received near every kind, That you in any Store can find.

And as I purchase by the Bale, I am determined to retail For READY PAY a little lower Than ever have had before.

I with my brethren mean to live, But as for credit shall not give. I would not live to rouse your passions, For credit here is out of fashion.

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


