Council Restricts Water Use To Necessary Household, Commercial

The City Council meeting in emergency session over the weekend issued an order restricting the use of water to necessary household and commercial use only, until such time as the situation is improved.

This action was taken by the council due to the critical condition arising from the continued drought and excessive use of water, and the fact that production from wells has fallen to the extent that sand is being drawn into the pumps, by virtue of lowering production from the water bearing formation.

The council said it is imperative that water use be restricted and distributed a water notice to residents of the city Monday informing them of the situation.

Water notice that was distributed to water customers stated further: "We are doing the very best we can, with around the clock vigil on wells and equipment. We hope you will bear with us and lend your support by cooperating in water use, and being doubly cautious in avoiding hazardous conditions that might result in a fire."

WORK CONTINUES ON PETITION

In the meantime work is progressing on a petition that will be presented to the City Council and the Board of Directors of the Water District to take action toward solving the water problem.

Interested citizens started the petition last week Tuesday and support is coming in with more signatures each day.

No active drive or house to house canvass has been undertaken at this point.

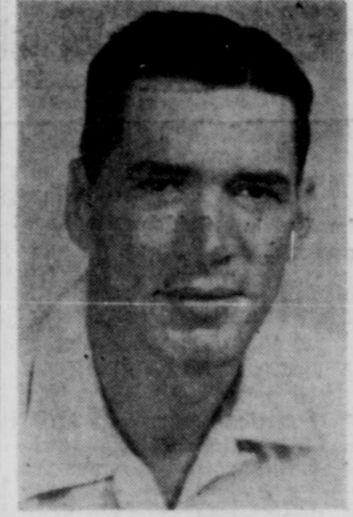
Events will include Bareback Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Bull Dogging, Calf Roping and Girls Barrel Races.

Traveling Through Turkey

(Editor's Note: The following article is part two of a letter from Mrs. Flourney M. Phillips, the former Theresa Venable, to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Venable of Goldthwaite, telling about their travel through Turkey. The Phillips family will be in Turkey for two years. They moved there when Mr. Phillips, known as "Flip" to his friends, was sent to Turkey last September as one of several scientists from this country by the State Department under the Aid program. Phillips was reared in Florida and is a graduate of the University of Florida.)

"Dear Mamma and Daddy:

"The drive back to Izmir was uneventful. We went out to a seaside Lokanta wanting some good sea food. Our sea food was either beef or mutton. We had 'sis kebap' charcoaled mutton on a skewer. This of course is an original Turkish food, but can be eaten in most parts of the world.

"On Monday we drove 50 miles south to the ancient city of Ephesus. There is a small town called, Seleuk just before reaching Ephesus. On a hill at the edge of the city is the tomb of St. John, Christ's Disciple. He came to Asia Minor with Mary, Mother of Jesus, and lived the remainder of his life in Ephesus and died there. A chapel was built over his tomb in the 4th century. Much of the chapel remains today. There is a painting of Mary, Jesus and St. John still in fair condition. There are many crosses carved into the columns. In recent years a marble slab has been laid over his tomb. However, a guard unlocked a cover over a tunnel and led us down dark narrow steps where his tomb is. Near this site there is a mosque built in the 14th century still in fair condition. After leaving here we passed the few remaining ruins of the Temple of Artemis, the false god worshipped here for centuries before and during the Christian era. At one time this temple was considered one of the seven wonders of the world.

"Ephesus was a large and very important city during ancient times. It was a harbor city during the time of the Roman

Empire, but now it is eight miles from the sea. The ruins are spread over a large area and there are still years of excavating to be done. Much buried treasure is yet to be found. The first thing you see is a large theatre that has three stages, seating 24,500 people, with underground tunnels going I do not know where. The next thing you see is the harbor baths with huge tile pipes, a concert hall, temples built to many gods, a library, market place and most beautiful of all, a long street made of marble with many columns standing along both sides, old wells, lovely carvings in marble statues, mostly without heads, as most of them were broken off during past ages. St. Paul spent three years here and organized the first Christian community.

VOTERS — ATTENTION

In this issue of the Eagle there appears the full text of the 14 Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election on November 6.

So that you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your ballot.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 25)—Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 25)—Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 32)—Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

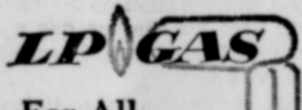
50 YEARS AGO—

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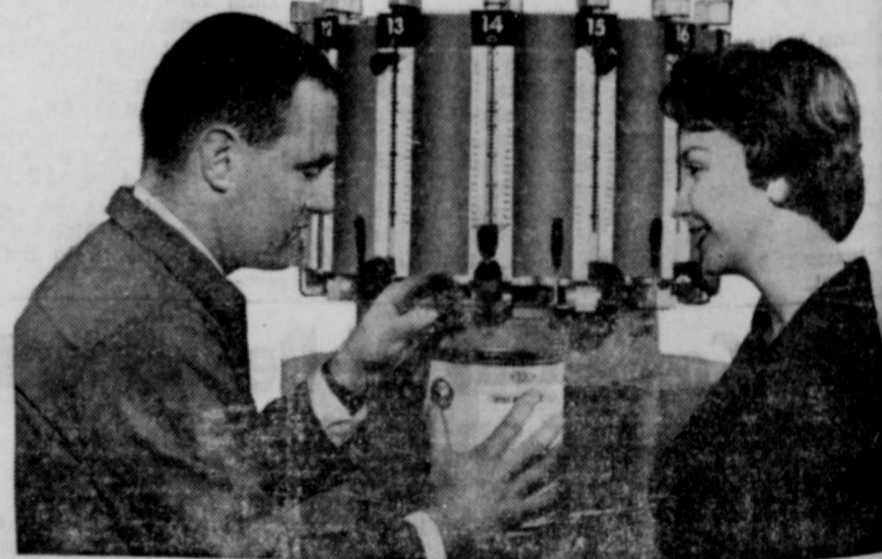

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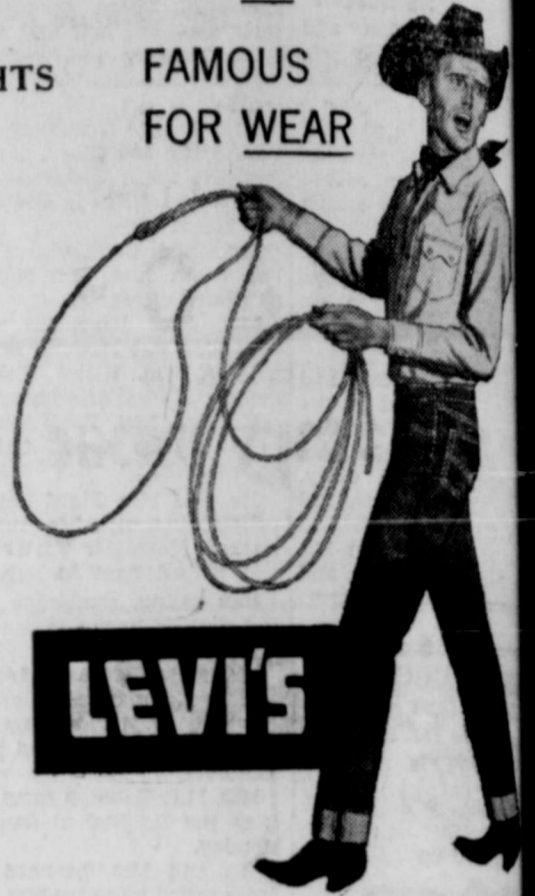

(Continued from Page One)

There is a place in the Byzantine Wall surrounding the area where he was a prisoner. Ephesus must have been a very beautiful city before it was destroyed by an earthquake.

"We drove from Ephesus about five miles to the top of a mountain 1,377 feet high where a little chapel was built in the 4th century A. D., over the spot that is believed to be the final resting place of the Virgin Mary. What a lovely place to spend her last days on earth. High and cool and a beautiful view looking out across the hills and into the blue Aegean. There is a spring of water coming out of the mountain just below the Chapel. This is believed to have been her last home. The water from the spring is believed to have healing properties. A French Father stays there and was in the Chapel while we were there. He told us the history of the Chapel. We spent five hours living in this world of the past. It was a great and moving experience.

"On Tuesday and Wednesday Filip worked and the children and I spent the time amusing ourselves. We took an hour's boatride in a passenger ferry boat across the bay. We walked through a beautiful park where an international fair is held each year. We saw the animals in the zoo and had Turkish Cay (tea) in a place by the sea. We saw their archaeological museum housing precious relics starting from the dawn of history through the Greco-Roman era down to the Seljun and Ottoman civilizations. We met some old friends we lived next door to in San Antonio and who are now living in Izmir.

"We left Izmir on Thursday, April 26th, en route to Ankara. We took a route to the south back home. The first two or three hours we passed many camel caravans. There were twenty or more camels in each caravan and all sizes, their backs loaded with all the possessions of the people. The people in these caravans are like Gypsies. Usually they were spread out for a quarter of a

mile with flocks of sheep, cattle, goats, dogs, donkeys and children. After we passed through Aydin we did not see many more camel caravans. We drove for miles near Denizle with high snow covered mountains to the south. At Denizle we took a narrow road north for 17 kilometers to a village called Pamukkale. We went to see a mountain called "Snow Castle" that is all calcium carbonate with water washing down the sides in many places. The formations look much like the inside of some caverns. Imagine our surprise to find a treasure of old Roman ruins here. The ruins were quite extensive, but due to our time schedule we visited the theatre. It would have seated several thousand people and was in much better shape than the others we had visited. The Roman part of the ruins were much less artistic than the Greek. The Romans did not polish and fit the stones as the Greeks did. There is a fine new motel here, something new for Turkey. We left Pamukkale promising ourselves to come back.

"The road had been in fair condition until the pavement ended and then it was like a scrub board. We got to the small village of Isparta about 3:30 p. m. We hoped to find a place to spend the night. We looked at the two best hotels but they were undesirable and would only be accepted as a last resort. So we drove on. The country was gorgeous with snow covered mountains all around. Soon however we left the beautiful pines and green valleys and the mountains became mostly barren. There were no pavement for many miles. The dust was very bad and you can't imagine what it is like driving in Turkey. Inside an hour we were driving through a large herd of sheep. There were three shepherds but they made no attempt to clear the road. After getting by the flock of sheep we overtook a band of Gypsies traveling the same direction as ourselves. They were as difficult to move out of the road as the sheep had been. The women are sights to see. They wear baggy pants, bright colored

blouses and head scarfs they can cover their faces with. The materials their clothes are made of are usually many bright colors.

"We drove for 25 miles along the shores of a large lake, Egridir. The mountains rise up almost from the waters' edge. We were sure we could find a nice place to stay here, but there were no places of any kind. In the U. S. A. this would be an ideal resort area, but here only quaint villages all around. We drove to Konya and found a hotel. Due to the mountains and winding roads it was 8 p. m. when we arrived. We got fair accommodations for which we were thankful. By this time we would have taken most anything as we were exhausted after driving on these roads for 12 hours. We had dinner in the hotel dining room, had showers and were really happy with our hard couch like beds.

"Konya is a very ancient city and has a present population of 126,000. It was founded by the Hittites and passed to the Phrygians, Persians and the King of Pargamum. Konya grew during the Roman Period and by the 2nd century A. D., it became a religious center. There are many mosques dating back to the 15th century. The next morning we had a typical Turkish breakfast of Turkish bread, cheese, jam and hot tea. We spent a short time walking through the Bazzars. Then we drove to see a couple of interesting mosques, then headed for Ankara. During the time in Izmir the weather was about perfect. We needed no coats or sweaters except at night. Back here we were nearly freezing. I had forgotten we would be going back to winter and pack-

ed summer clothes to wear. We had sweaters. We were by 2 p. m. We were glad back home, but never eagerly looking forward to other areas of this land where so much has been made.
