Work was started on Tuesday morning of this week on a new shed for breeders' cattle at the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association "Barn" or Agriculture Building in Goldthwaite.

Twenty members of the Star Chapter of the Future Farmers of America and adult farmers went to Fort Worth on Tuesday of last week to visit the stockyards and packing plant and, according to Charles E. Davis, Star teacher of vocational agriculture, well worthwhile and highly instructive.

Lieut. John M. Oglesby, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Oglesby of Goldthwaite, recently had the pleasure of seeing graduation certificates presented to a quartermaster class that he had instructed at Slatburg, Austria. Lieut. Oglesby's recent duties have also included service as an assistant in an Army general court martial that tried an erring soldier.

With this week's issue the Goldthwaite Eagle started its 59th year of publication. The Eagle was founded in 1904. The only celebration was by Mechanical Superintendent Roy Lee Hill, who set the type for the date line on page one to make it read: "Vol. 59 No. 1."

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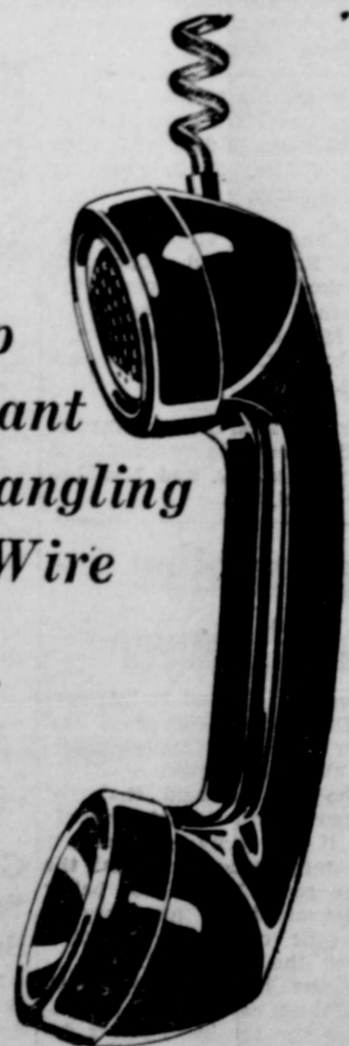

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## 1963 Wheat Allotments In Mail; Growers To Vote On Referendum

Official notices of individual farm allotments for the 1963 wheat crop were mailed to farmers on August 17th according to E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All growers should receive their notices of the Aug. 30 referendum on 1963-crop wheat marketing quotas.

The Chairman points out that the growers who vote in the wheat-quota referendum will be the ones who make the decision about the kind of program to be in effect for the 1963 wheat crop. He therefore urges all eligible voters to cast their ballots and thus "make their voices heard." "Eligible" voters in the referendum are all those growers who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1963 on a farm but not those who took part in the 1962 "feed-wheat" program.

In general, Mr. Burkett explains, the issues wheat growers will vote on will be (1) quotas (including marketing pen-

alties on "excess" wheat of growers with more than 15 acres of wheat who do not comply with their allotments) with a relatively higher price support available to those who comply with their farm allotments, or (2) no quotas (and no penalties) and a lower support to growers who comply with their allotments.

Whether or not quotas are approved, acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support. The alternative levels of support are a national average of at least \$1.82 per bushel (75 per cent of parity) under a quota program, or a national average of about \$1.21 per bushel (50 per cent of parity) without quotas.

Wheat growers eligible to vote in the Aug. 30 referendum will be all those who would be affected by the quotas if they are approved—that is, all growers who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain, but not growers who took part in the 1962 feed-wheat program. Chairman Burkett urges all eligible voters to cast their wheat ballots, and thus make their wishes known.

Marketing quotas have been approved in similar referendums for the last nine wheat crops. In the previous two ballots, wheat quotas were approved by 79.4 per cent of the growers voting on the 1962-crop program, and by 87.4 per cent of the voters on the 1961-crop program.

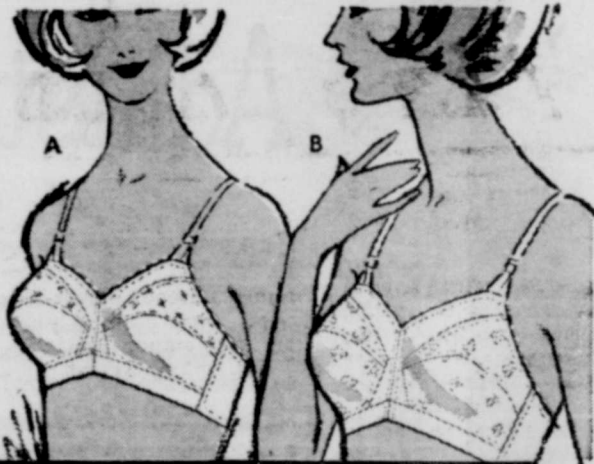

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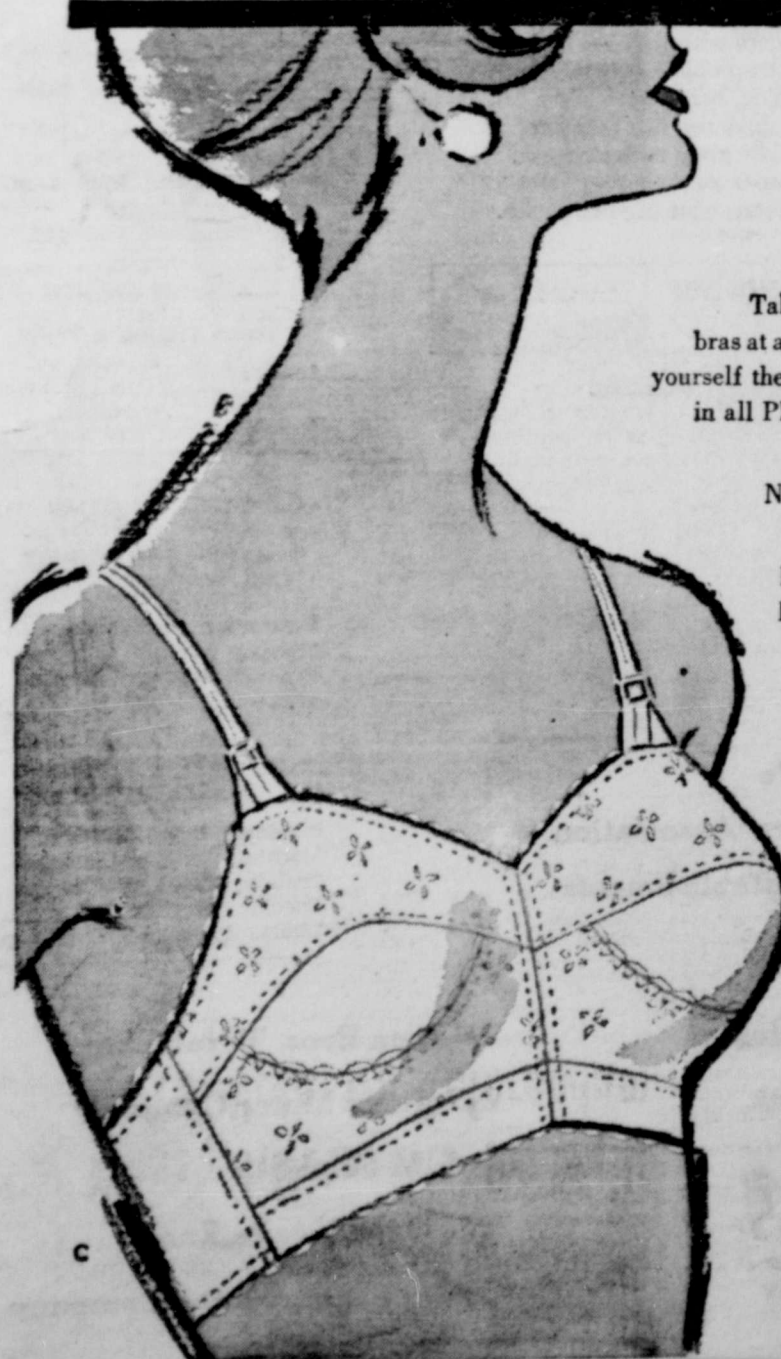
