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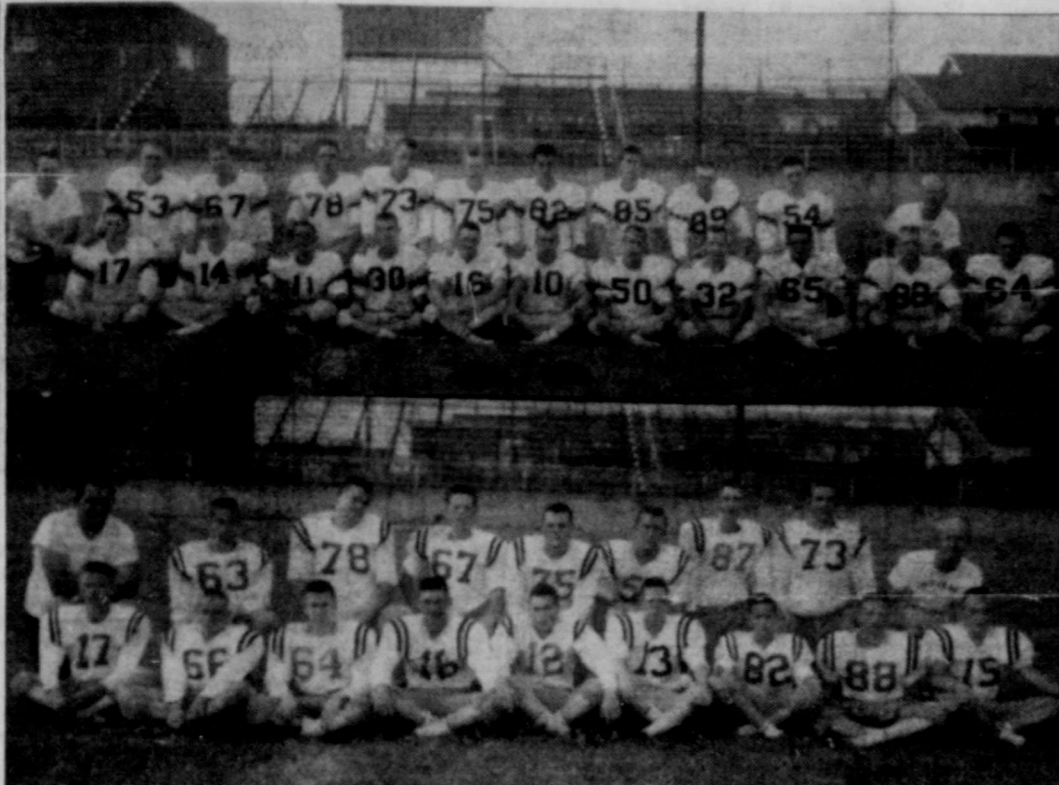

Council Authorizes Re-Survey Of Possible City Water Source

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night authorized the Water District Board of Directors, to get a re-survey, or bring up to date the survey made by engineers two years ago, to try to solve the city's critical water supply problem.

This action was taken by the council after lengthy and thorough discussion of the problem facing the city—and the water

district—with reference to getting an adequate water supply.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, gave to the council a brief history of the water department dating back to 1945.

He told how new wells were added one at a time to increase the supply and how these wells were financed.

The last well was added in 1956 and it was found to be effecting other wells in their production. Engineers at that time advised city officials that more wells would not solve the problem.

No additional supply has been developed since 1956, and the water level in the wells has dropped. Since that time how-

ever the demand has increased at a tremendous rate not only in summer but during the winter months as well.

The consumption has been going up to the point where during last winter months all of the city's wells were kept in operation to supply the demand. This summer it turned hot and dry and the situation became critical.

City officials feel that some city council, or water board, will one of these days have to go to where the water is and pump it to Goldthwaite, whether that is the Colorado River, Lake Brownwood, the Bayou, Browns Creek, or what have you.

The City has a permit for taking water from the Colorado River. This permit has been renewed the past two years.

City officials feel further that it is necessary to provide an adequate water supply for the city. Not necessarily for growth or boom, but to hold the city together and to save the town and the value of property.

They feel that it will be a vast problem to educate citizens to the needs facing them. That they owe it to the people of the city to provide information for those who are interested and for those who are willing to pay the price for an adequate water supply they need to make a move toward solving the problem.

The re-survey is expected to provide the City Council and Water Board with details on up to date cost figures and also information on the financial picture with up to date interest rates.

It will take a complete new look at the whole situation and every citizen will be given an opportunity to express himself, or herself. All suggestions and ideas offered will be thoroughly explored and investigated.

In 1941 the city had 300 water users and today it has 650, and water customers today use several times as much water as they did 20 years ago.

DOLLARS INTO DOLLARETTES—Columnist Henry J. Taylor recently devoted an article to the cost of the Peace Corps. This runs to about \$9,000 a year for each of the corpsmen. By way of contrast, many of the church-supported missionary groups operate for as little as \$2,000 a year for each man and woman they send abroad.

The comparison, Mr. Taylor learned, is not absolute. But even if the private cost figure were doubled, it would still be less than half of the Peace Corps figure.

Mr. Taylor is not critical of the work or the objective of the Corps. Nor does he blame it for the relatively high cost of fielding its people. But he does say this: "Regardless of the merit in any service, the government machine itself contains an invisible ax that automatically chops the taxpayers' dollars into dollarettes. The government's currency rotating process passes the people's tax money through a sieve of government overhead that drains off more of its value all the time . . . This is why, in terms of human welfare, it's important to debunk political propaganda claiming 'the government can do it better' whenever men and women can do what needs to be done by their own associations. When politicians so often (and profitably) insist 'the government' should do something—where is the money coming from? We pay every penny."

And this is why, Mr. Taylor could have added, the welfare state is at best a snare and delusion, and at worst a plain fraud. It represents a system of gradual impoverishment of the people, to the ultimate weakening of the welfare of all.

Coaches and players in high school and college football have been offered a word of caution by the American Medical Association concerning the dangers of vigorous physical exercise in hot weather. With the start of practice, it warns, it is essential to provide for gradual adjustment to hot weather activity. Equally important is the need to adjust salt and water intakes to weather conditions. It adds that the old idea that water should be withheld from athletes during workouts has absolutely no scientific foundation.

HOLES WILL BE LEFT—Congressman Walter Norblad of Oregon asked the House Committee of Interior and Insular Affairs to reject the Administration's proposal to federally tax pleasure boats.

"Although the proposed annual \$5.00 tax is limited now to boats 14 feet long or over," said Mr. Norblad, "we can be sure from past experience that it would only be a short time until boats 12 feet long, then 10 feet, etc. would be federally taxed. Many states . . . already tax pleasure boats and I think it would be wrong for the Federal Government to impose double taxation."

If the current mania to tax practically anything and everything isn't curbed, about all we'll have left in our pockets will be holes.

MANEUVERS?

PLEASE CHECK THESE FACTS!

In the interest of national security and defense, the Department of the Army is asking Central Texas land owners' cooperation:

FOR WHAT?

Permission to maneuver over land during training exercises for a period not to exceed 20 days in any one year. A contract calling for a five-year agreement is being asked but is cancellable after one year.

WHAT TYPE MANEUVER?

A maneuver of the 1st Armored and 2nd Armored Divisions of Fort Hood, Texas, in which troops will be "on the move" constantly - never in one spot for more than 24 to 48 hours.

WHY MANEUVER?

Fifty per cent of these troops are draftees and vitally need the maneuver training in order to be combat-ready soldiers. Both armored divisions are priority type units and would be the first called for combat. Shouldn't we help them get ready?

WHY MANEUVER HERE?

The Central Texas land between Fort Hood and Brownwood is similar in most respects to the "hot spots" where armored divisions would be placed in combat.

WHY THIS TYPE OF AGREEMENT?

Before Army officials planned the maneuver here, use of more than 2,000,000 acres of land in North and South Carolina was obtained in 1961 and more than 3,000,000 acres were obtained in 1962. Also in 1962, nearly 1,000,000 acres of land were secured in Louisiana for maneuvers there. This land was secured under the same maneuver agreement as proposed here. We are not being asked to do something other landowners have not done. This contract may be cancelled after one year upon 30 days notice.

LET'S ASK OURSELVES THESE QUESTIONS

In light of the world situation, can we say this training is not necessary?

Can we say to these young draftees who are devoting two years of their lives to the defense of their country: "You do your part, but we'll wait until we're actually at war"?

Can we say to the Texans in the 49th Armored Division who gave a year of their lives during a national emergency: "You did your part, but we'll wait"?

If we answer these questions honestly, then we will sign the maneuver agreement.

What will be the state of our preparedness if all the landowners in the United States withhold the use of their land for Army essential training?

What if we all should say "stop the maneuvers" and "we don't want the Army here."?

Do we distrust the Army in keeping its word in this maneuver agreement?

Do we trust them with our lives and not our land?

REMEMBER— A cut fence can be mended— an untrained soldier's life can not be reclaimed!

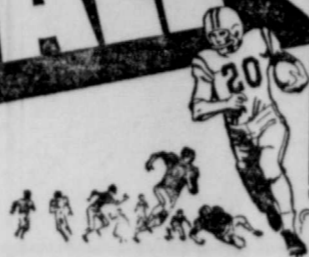

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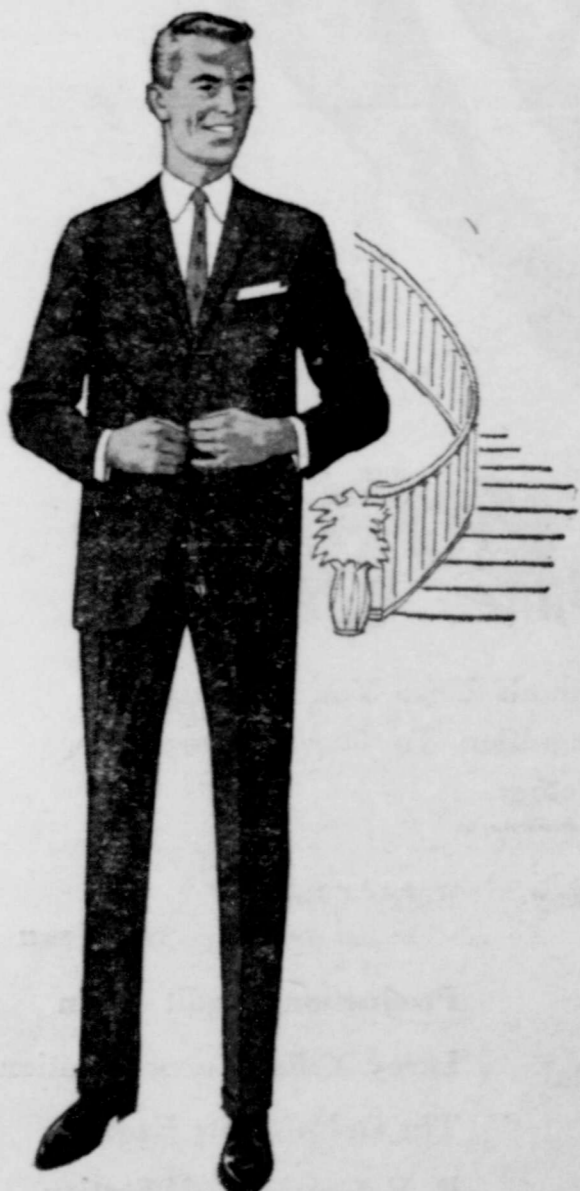
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
