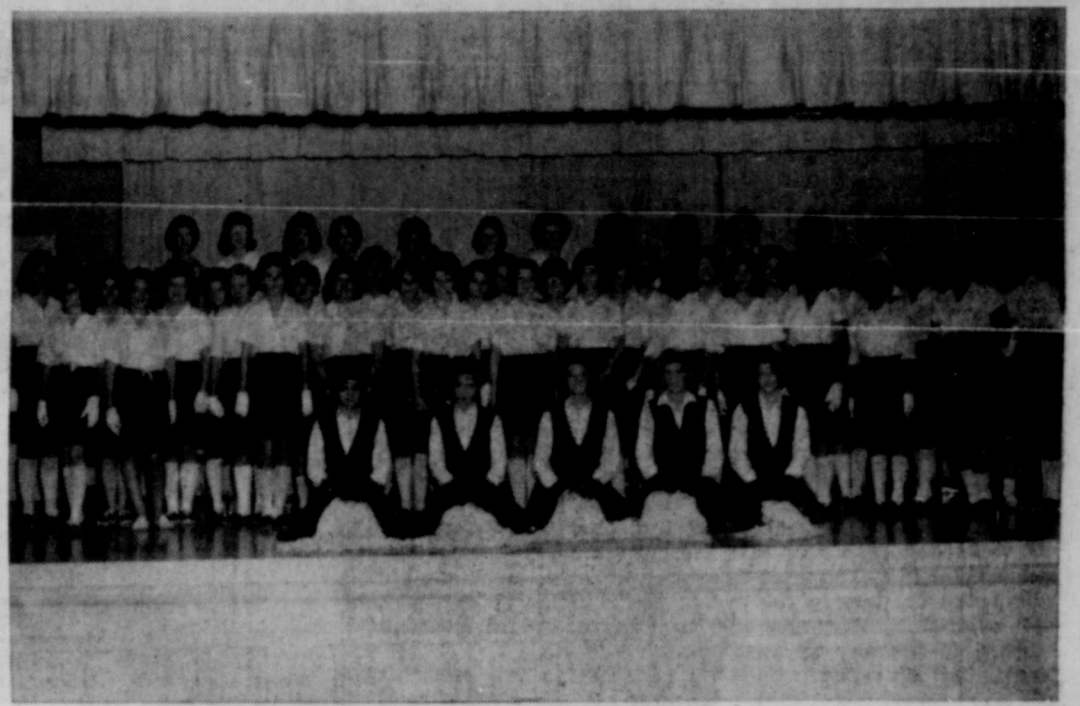

## Maneuver Is Called Off

The proposed Army Maneuver  
Core Shield which was tenta-  
tively scheduled to be held in  
this Central Texas area in Oc-  
tober has been called off, ac-  
cording to official announce-  
ment from Fort Hood Tuesday  
afternoon.

General Paul T. Adams, Com-  
mander in Chief, U. S. Strike  
Command, announced at his  
headquarters at MacDill Air  
Force Base, Florida, that:

"Joint training exercise Core  
Shield cannot be conducted be-  
cause of the inability to obtain  
adequate land to make the ex-  
ercise feasible and worthwhile  
as a training vehicle.

"In lieu of Core Shield an ex-  
ercise greatly restricted in scope  
will be conducted during the  
period October 15-30 on Fort  
Hood Military Reservation in  
which the Army and Air Force  
will conduct joint training with  
subordinate elements of armor-  
ed division through a series of  
three successive combat com-  
mand size opposing force oper-  
ations.

"It is pointed out however  
that these small scale exercises  
will not fill the training void  
that is created through inabil-  
ity of the Army organization to  
maneuver as divisions over  
areas comparable to the areas  
they would have to use in com-

bat; or test their communica-  
tions over normal combat dis-  
tances; or prove out their logis-  
tical and administrative organ-  
izations which are essential to  
sustain combat. Nor can the  
supporting combat Air Force  
units obtain the training they  
require with major Army or-  
ganizations deployed in combat  
formation.

"General Adams expressed  
appreciation to those landown-  
ers who have generously made  
their land available for Exercise  
Core Shield, but due to the fact  
that other land owners did not  
exhibit similar generosity ade-  
quate land areas to make Core  
Shield worthwhile, could not be  
obtained, consequently none of  
the land areas previously offer-  
ed will be used for the ex-  
ercise."

## J. D. Harper Invited To Take Part In 1963 Christian Crusade In Japan

J. D. Harper, Goldthwaite  
businessman and layman in the  
First Baptist Church, has been  
extended an invitation to par-  
ticipate in the Japan Baptist  
New Life Movement which will  
be conducted March 26 through  
May 6, 1963.

The invitation was extended  
to Harper by Dr. T. A. Patter-  
son, Executive Secretary of the  
Movement, and secretary of the  
Executive Board of the Baptist  
General Convention of Texas.

Dr. Patterson stated that the  
movement represents the larg-  
est attempt at evangelism ever  
made on a mission field, per-  
haps the largest in the history  
of Christian missions.

The Baptist New Life Move-  
ment is sponsored by the Bap-  
tist General Convention of Tex-  
as in cooperation with the  
Japan Baptist Convention and

the Foreign Mission Board.  
Pastors and laymen from  
throughout Texas will take part  
in the Crusade, which, accord-  
ing to officials, may include the  
Philippines, Formosa, Hong  
Kong and Korea.

Those taking part in the Cru-  
sade will pay their own expenses  
which will amount to \$1500 to  
\$1600 per person.

Mrs. Harper is also invited to  
join her husband in the Cru-  
sade if he should accept the in-  
vitation. If they go on this mis-  
sionary endeavor they would be  
away from home approximately  
three weeks. The Harpers have  
made no decision on the invita-  
tion at this time.

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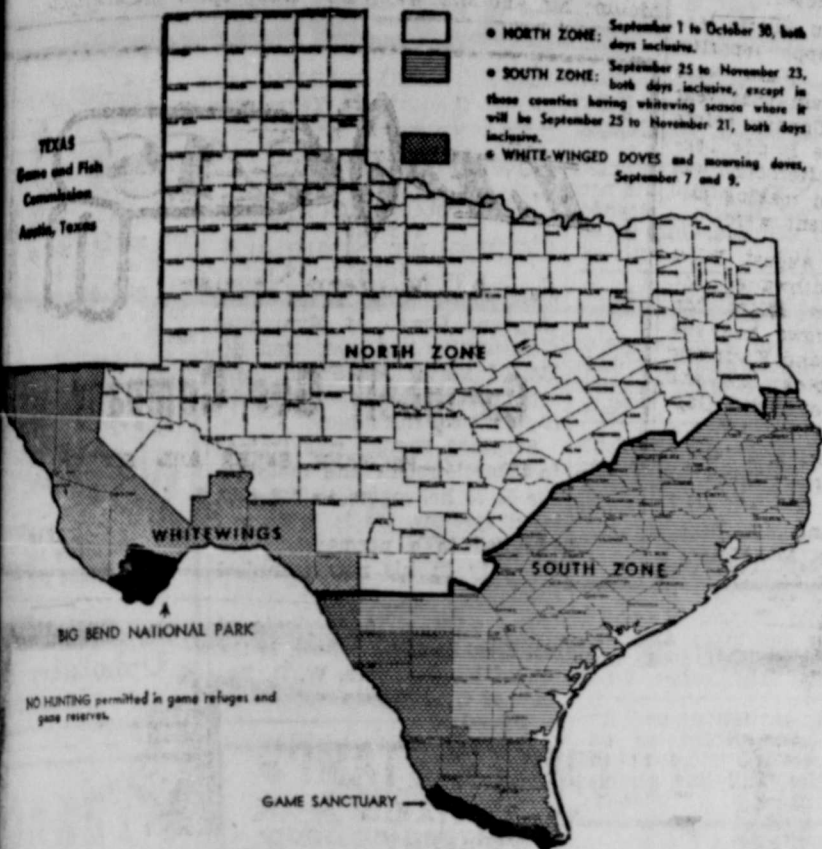
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**MOURNING DOVE — WHITE-WINGED DOVE**  
Open Seasons 1962

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—25. Possession limit—not to exceed 24.  
WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—24, in the aggregate, and not more than 20 may be white-winged doves.



NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game sanctuaries.

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary," and the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County. One feathered wing must remain attached to each bird taken during the two-day whitewing season.

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having whitewing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 7 and 9 only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

The spinose ear tick (only soft tick of the five), suspected in Q fever and anthrax, has been identified in Randall, Wichita and Comal Counties.

**TRAFFIC SAFETY WEEK**

Governor Daniel expressed "deep concern over the dangerous upward trend in traffic deaths among Texas high school and college students," as he proclaimed September 17-21 as fifth annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week.

He noted, however, that the 25 Texas traffic deaths in the 3-day Labor Day holiday were the second lowest toll since 1951.

**EXPORTS**

Texans can start thinking of themselves as exporters in big style.

Nobody had counted it up before, but now the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research finds that Texas is exporting to foreign countries \$837,000,000 worth of manufactured products, \$446,000,000 of agricultural products and \$31,000,000 of other products, mainly sulphur, salt, talc and fishery products.

Petroleum exports came to \$177,000,000 and chemicals to \$247,000,000 . . . showing how the petro-chemical industry has turned Texas' sales of oil abroad from a raw to a manufactured product.

**SCHOOLS**

The men and women who run the schools—board members and administrators—come to Austin on September 30 for their annual conventions. They plan searching looks at the problems of schools, many of which sum up into five letters—M-O-N-E-Y.

Overhaul of the ad valorem tax system was proposed by a series of clinics held by schoolmen earlier this year.

Problems of textbook selection and teaching Americanism will be aired.

The textbook panel will review recent criticisms, as well as prospective legislation which may be recommended by a study committee.

**BLONDE HOUSE**

The Texas House of Representatives is becoming a blond. Eleven coats of varnish, ap-

The House gallery, where so many Texans have sat in hard chairs watching legislation move through the House, is getting new upholstered chairs to make the taxpayers more comfortable. Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, whose Rules Committee chairmanship puts him in a general supervisory position on the work of the State Board of Control, thinks it will be finished by November 1.

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
*AND Sidelights*

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Texas—A campaign to a meeting of the Statewide Water Conservation Commission in Austin. The committee is composed of just about everybody who is interested in water conservation and devel-

opment.

Proposed amendment would permit the State Water Development Board to acquire storage space in reservoirs built either by local or Federal agencies and conserve storm and flood waters for beneficial uses.

Gov. Price Daniel addressed the meeting and thanked the committee for its "dedicated efforts in promoting Texas water program.

John Vandertulp, the State Water Commission's chief engineer, reported on the broad plan for meeting the State's water needs in 1980. Marvin Nichols of Fort Worth, chairman of the Development Board, discussed the lending program through which water projects have been financed. And Joe Carter, chairman of the Water Commission, explained the proposed amendment in detail and emphasized the need for its approval.

The Statewide committee urged its members to back the amendment and approved the Water Commission's proposed budget. It also commended Governor Daniel for his "courageous, bold and dynamic leadership" in bringing about "the greatest and most comprehensive water resources conservation and development program in the history of Texas."

Ben Carpenter of Dallas was named chairman of the finance committee for the conservation amendment campaign.

**TICK SURVEY**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has turned up five kinds of ticks which are suspect as fever carriers in a survey currently being conducted in Texas.

The Lone Star tick, believed a carrier of Rocky Mountain spotted fever, Q fever and tularemia and also a transmitter of Bullis fever and tick paralysis, has been found in Robertson, Rusk, Colorado, Medina, Kerr, Comal, Nueces, Karnes, Harris and Hays Counties.

The Cayenne tick, found only in South Texas and a producer or transmitter of Q fever, has been discovered in Kenedy County.

The Gulf Coast tick, blamed for tick paralysis, has shown up in Washington County while its imitator (amblyomma imitator), rarely seen in the U. S., was found in Nueces County.

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

By ELGIN SMITH

This time of year we find the farmers preparing for fall sowing. A fairly large amount of cropland in Mills County is planted to the small grains. Other valuable crops to be planted this time of year are the winter cover crops. Although the cover crops are not often considered cash crops, they are capable of conditioning or improving the soil. This increases production of cash crops which follow the cover crops.

All of our cropland soils need some type of soil improving crop to maintain condition, increase organic matter and to get or maintain top production. How often this soil improving crop is needed will depend on the type of soil and the kinds of other crops grown.

Continuous cropping of land results in the removal of nutrients and burning off of organic matter. The soil loses its structure and runs together so rainfall can't soak in as fast. Then runoff — erosion — water loss — and soil loss. That muddy complexion we see in the creeks and rivers is soil that will probably never produce crops again. Much of the rainfall that does soak into this sick soil is lost because the soil is not capable of holding it. This is the field that needed another rain.

Since we can't do anything about the weather, we need to do something about conditioning the soil to help keep the moisture where it falls available for crops. Cover cropping is one way to get that condition.

Some of the crops which are used for winter cover crops in this area are Austrian winterpeas, hairy vetch and the sweet clovers. All are legumes and when inoculated before planting will increase the available nitrogen in the soil.

Austrian winterpeas and hairy vetch have shallow fibrous root systems. They will fill the top six to eight inches of soil with roots. These roots along with the residue from the plant add organic matter to the soil and help condition it.

The sweetclovers have a deep taproot capable of going through the plow pan and opening the soil. They are preferable for opening the deeper tighter soils. Hubam and Madrid are the two most popular species of sweetclover. Hubam is an annual and Madrid is biennial. Israel is an annual that is more leafy and looks promising for this area. The subsoiling action coupled with the added organic matter and nitrogen from a good growth of clover is much cheaper than deep subsoiling and hauling manure and fertilizer to the field.

## Many 4-F Registrants To Get New Selective Service Classification

A new major amendment to the draft regulations will affect thousands of draft-age men as explained by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, in January of this year.

The new amendment, authorized by Presidential executive order, creates a new draft classification immediately.

The new classification is I-Y. Men found not qualified by the armed forces for military service under current physical, mental and moral standards, but who are considered to be qualified to serve in time of war or national emergency declared by Congress will be placed in the new class.

Previously these men were placed in Class 4-F. Only men not qualified for any military service will be placed in Class 4-F hereafter.

A large number of registrants of Local Board 84, composed of registrants from Burnet, Mills, San Saba, and Lampasas counties will qualify for the new Class I-Y and will be reclassified and notified accordingly within the next few months.

In case of emergency these registrants could serve in many capacities other than actual combat.

The new classification permits ready identification, day by day, of men who are considered to be qualified and available in an emergency, and thus facilitates more rapid mobilization of manpower in case of need, the state Selective Service director said.

## Increasing Numbers Are Interested In Reseeding Their Land To Grass

"Increasing numbers of farmers and ranchmen are becoming interested in planting or reseeding their lands to grass," says Elgin Smith, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service Work Unit. Recent plantings that have been made with adapted seed of good quality and put out with the right kind of equipment have been successful in about all instances.

Many are interested in planting old fields that have been turned out of cultivation. Most of these are being planted to a mixture of native grasses on prepared seedbeds. Some are trying a new method for this area, seeding in a thin stand of small grain where blowing is a problem in establishing grass seedlings. "This promises to be one of the better methods," Smith said. The grain is mowed or shredded in the boot or early head stage and not allowed to mature seed or to compete excessively for shade and moisture. This method offers a firm seedbed with very little competition and seems as a nurse crop for young and tender grass plants.

Planting grass on rangeland following brush control is one of the most popular practices. Most of it is done following tree dozing, root raking or root-planting.

Seeding in the holes and disturbed areas following tree dozing has been highly successful when done thoroughly and seed are placed in the disturbed areas. This is one of the least expensive methods for adding better grasses to existing stands of grass. Planting the seed immediately after the ground is disturbed and before a rain is essential. The first rain melts the clods to cover the seed and the plant starts growth immediately.

When the existing grass stand is poor and it is desirable to seed the entire area, a rootrake or roller chopper is used to disturb the soil and prepare the seedbed. Regular farm equipment such as a chisel type plow or tandem disc may be used where rocks, brush or stumps do not prohibit. Seeding rangeland without some type of soil disturbance has not been successful.

Rootplowing creates a seedbed that in most instances must be modified or firmed for good results. Some of the methods used to firm the seedbed are anchor chains, pipe drags and rolling packers or choppers. Some ranchmen prefer to use the root rake and pile the brush in order to leave the area smooth enough to spray or mow for weed control later if necessary. In this case, seed are planted at time root raking is done.

Resting the grass on the seeded area during the first growing season is a must for early establishment. After light grazing during the winter, a second rest the next growing season is often desirable. The young grass seedlings need a chance to establish a deep and vigorous root system and to produce viable seed as soon as possible. Practicing proper range use by removing no more than half of each year's growth will insure a vigorous plant with a long production life.

Weed control is frequently needed and the planting can be sprayed when weeds offer damaging competition for moisture and sunlight. Care should be exercised to spray at recommended rates, according to local and State laws, and after the grass plants have developed three to five leaves. Some plantings can be successfully mowed or shredded for weed control. In all cases, grass plantings need to have good management and each planting generally presents need for special treatment, based upon existing conditions.

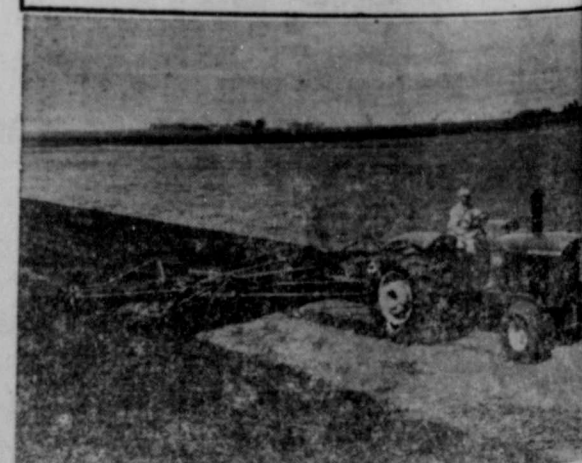

## First 100-HP Tractor Farmers Hike Horsepower 70% in Decade



The average horsepower size of farm tractors in the U. S. and Canada has jumped 70 per cent in the past ten years as farmers have turned to bigger, more productive machinery to ease the cost-price squeeze.

The average size of all farm tractors shipped by U. S. manufacturers in 1961 was 51 horsepower compared to 30 horsepower just ten years earlier in 1951.

In 1951, of all wheel tractors shipped by manufacturers 88 per cent were under 35 horsepower. By last year these figures were reversed and 88 per cent were over 35 horsepower. In fact, in 1961, 33 per cent were over 60 horsepower and 15 per cent were over 70 horsepower.

There is no sign the demand for bigger tractors is slowing down. The first standard farm tractor ever to exceed 100-horsepower has just been developed by John Deere engineers. It's a 117-horsepower unit; it's roughly a third bigger than last year's standard tractor available now. To transmit the huge power load efficiently, the big farm tires ever built are produced.

The bigger tractors permit farmers not only to haul larger equipment, such as 27-foot wide double-action harrows shown above, but also have the power to permit farmers to work at faster speeds.

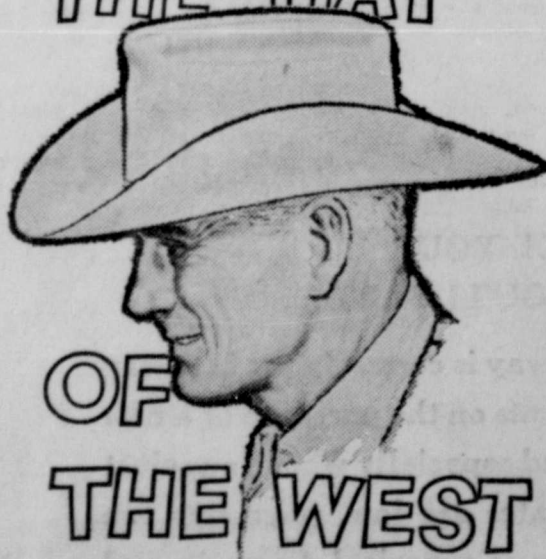
