Mills County State Bank Is Robbed

Screwworm Eradication Meeting Is Held For Stockmen And Sportsmen

Stockmen and sportsmen of Mills County will meet at Goldthwaite High School on October 15 at 7:30 p. m. to discuss the eradication of one of the greatest problems, the screwworm.

Mr. Burnham, chairman of the county animal health committee, has emphasized the need for support of the Southwestern Screwworm Eradication program in order to rid the county of this pest which costs livestock producers an estimated \$1 million.

The assembly along with other meetings throughout the Southwestern area will attempt to raise \$1,300.00 in the campaign being conducted this month," the county chairman said. "This will mean the fulfillment of the goal of \$3 million which was established when this program got underway last year and which is needed to complete the program."

"Many of our people have already contributed toward this program," Mr. Burnham said, "and have indicated willingness to contribute more. This drive primarily is designed to offer an opportunity for those who have not already contributed to do so. Mills County had contributed \$11,184.60 toward a county goal of \$24,097.00."

The eradication program is a cooperative effort involving the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, the Texas Animal Health Commission, and other agencies in the Southwest.

The program involves the production of sterile screwworm flies at the "screwworm fly factory" near Mission, Texas, and the release of these flies over parts of Texas and New Mexico. Mating of sterile male flies with naturally occurring females results in infertile eggs and eventual eradication of the insect.

Mr. Burnham has urged all livestock producers and sportsmen to attend the meeting. A report on the progress of the eradication program and slides showing the operation of the screwworm fly plant will be presented.

Lone Bandit Captured Tuesday; All Funds Have Been Recovered

Mills County State Bank was held up by a lone bandit dressed in blue jeans Monday noon just about the time for the bank to close for lunch hour.

The robber got away with a night depository canvas bag containing approximately \$2,000 in checks and \$500 in cash which was recovered as the man was taken into custody by officers shortly after noon Tuesday.

Charges of robbery with firearms were filed here against Eldon G. Comer, 19, Abilene. Mills County Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield filed the charges early Tuesday afternoon.

Comer was taken into custody by officers shortly after noon Tuesday on the Jim Rudd farm, approximately three miles southwest of Goldthwaite.

Comer surrendered in pasture land after several shots were exchanged in a brief gun battle in which no one was injured.

Search for the robber had been centered since Monday night on the Loyd King ranch eight miles south of Goldthwaite after a person fitting the description of the suspect had been seen by C. S. "Dutch" Smith on the old Lometa road late Monday afternoon.

Officers from Mills and surrounding counties along with state and federal officers took part in the search which was hampered due to the heavy rain Monday afternoon and through Monday night.

W. P. Duren, president of the bank, announced Tuesday night that all funds had been recovered.

The lone robber entered the bank about 11:50 Monday morning. He stood around near the customers' counter in the center of the bank lobby.

Bank employees, Mrs. Zelda Johnson, Mrs. June Roberts and Mrs. Carolyn Cornelius were suspicious of the man as they watched him in the lobby.

After a while he went to the window of Victor Williams, cashier, and asked for a pencil. Williams gave him the pencil and he returned to the customers' counter and started to write out a deposit slip.

About this time Duren came out of the directors room and Mrs. Johnson told him that they were suspicious of the stranger. Duren said: "Well, call the sheriff."

Glynn Collier, vice president of the bank, started to call the sheriff and while he was placing his call the young man started for the window of teller Mrs. June Roberts. She saw him coming to her window and turned and walked into the book-keeping department.

After he stood at the window for a while Cashier Williams called to him and asked if he could help him.

The man moved to Williams' window and as he approached he pointed a pistol into the window with his left hand and handed him a note with his right.

He had printed the following note on the back of a deposit slip: "this is a holdup put all your money in paper sack do not make a sound or I will kill you."

Williams started to raise his hands and was told to keep his hands on the counter. When he told the bandit that he would have to get a paper sack and started to reach into the drawer he was told to keep his hands out of there.

Then the bandit said: "Hand me that canvas bag," and with that he left out the front door of the bank. He ran down the driveway past the drive-in banking window and disappeared. The canvas bag was a weekend deposit made by Mullin Schwartz of Schwartz Food Store through the night depository.

At first it was thought that he left on foot, but it was later found that he had a car which apparently was abandoned as it ran out of gas near the Rudd ranch.

A young man fitting the same description was picked up by Horace Gray a few miles out of Goldthwaite Monday morning and given a lift to Comanche.

Several persons also reportedly saw a person fitting the description Sunday afternoon and evening around Goldthwaite.

Eagles Defeat Mountaineers 36-8 Conference Opener Friday Night

GHS Eagles took the Anna Mountaineers to a 36-8 last Friday night in the first conference game of the season.

Coach Jackie Williams led the Eagles to four victories to date so far this year. The first game was against San Saba with a heavy rain. Then they defeated Evant and Comanche and Dublin their sweet victory last night.

Eagles' line of power in offense and defense again played a major role in their tremendous blocking and tackling according to Williams, by Delton Riparian Jernigan, Cecil Bell, Dick Standley, Clyde and Ronnie Allison.

Benningsfield and Ronald were the top men on the pole in piling up the yards for the Eagles.

Eagles made 303 yards and with their passing an additional 45 yards for a total of 348 yards. The Mountaineers made 39 yards and 37 passing for a total of 76 yards.

After the game opened the Eagles took the ball and ran 75 yards down the field for their first tally. QB Gray plunged across for 34 yards and then passed to halfback Ronald Cagle for the extra point.

The next score came late in the second quarter when Gray tried to pass to halfback Ronald Cagle for the extra point.

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Starting the second half the Eagles drove 76 yards for a score in 12 plays. Gray again plunged over from the one for the TD and it was 20-0.

The Mountaineers made their only touchdown and extra points in the third quarter.

Ronnie Allison intercepted a pass and then Benningsfield put another one across into the end zone on two plunges through the line for the next TD and Gray threw to Cagle for the extra points.

One that will go down in history came on the following kick-off. The ball rolled into the end zone and some of the Mountaineers were standing waiting for it to be blown dead. Meanwhile Goldthwaite freshman fullback Jim Childress dived through and recovered in the end zone for another TD for the Eagles. Childress also plunged for the extra points ending scoring for the evening.

Benningsfield tacked up 176 yards in 28 carries, Cagle picked up 76 and fullback Harlan Jernigan made 39.

The Eagle rain gauge on Hannah Valley Road showed 4.10 inches.



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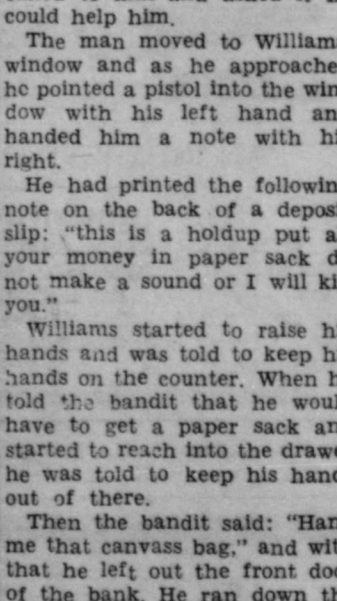

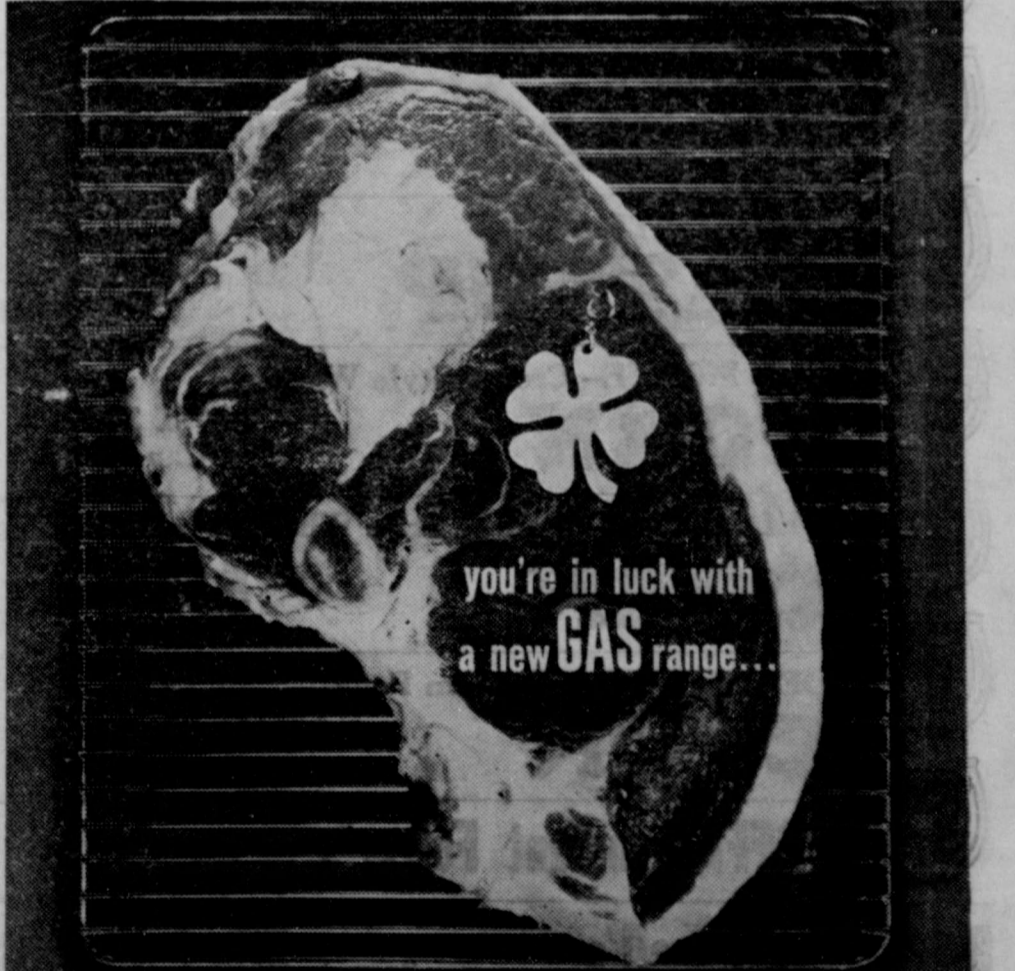

Re-Survey Of City's Water Sources Reported By Barnett To Lions Club

W. C. Barnett, city manager, gave a report of the re-survey of the City's possible water sources, as presented by engineers, to members of the Goldthwaite Lions Club last Tuesday night.

He told the group that the report was accepted by the city council and members of the board of directors of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District. It is now under consideration by the two official groups and every effort will be made to acquaint the public with the facts and recommendations of the report.

What action the Council and Water Board will take will depend in a large measure on what reaction comes from the taxpayers and water users of the city.

If the people really want to do something about securing an adequate water supply for the city and express themselves accordingly the city council and water district board are ready to carry the matter further. There must be some interest expressed on the part of the citizens if the project is to move forward in the hopes of providing an adequate water supply for the future.

HISTORY TRACED

Barnett traced the history of the city's water department from the time the city was organized. The first city water line with fire plugs was installed in 1917. During the years from 1917 un-

til about 1940 Goldthwaite was known as the city of windmills.

In 1941 the city had 300 water customers. The supply began to run short as residents abandoned their windmills and tied on the city water system. As the supply ran short the city added a new well thinking the problem would be solved, and within a short time they were faced with the same condition—not enough water.

The last new well was added in 1956 when production again appeared to take care of the needs. But, each summer there was a water shortage as the number of customers kept increasing and the demand kept going up.

In 1959 the city employed an engineer to make survey to determine what the city could do to provide an adequate water supply for years to come. A water district was organized and engineers reported the best solution was the Colorado River.

Election was called to approve \$600,000 bond issue to finance proposed project to

provide water for an estimated population of 4,000 persons. Voters failed to approve the bonds.

Now the city has had a re-survey made based on a population of 2,000 persons with estimated cost of the project cut from \$600,000 to \$425,000.

Under this new proposal the size of the water line would be cut down, off channel storage would be reduced and improvements in the distribution system would be eliminated.

FINANCING

How would the project be financed?

This could come from voting \$200,000 in City of Goldthwaite Utility Revenue Bonds at 4 1/2 per cent interest which would be retired from net operating profits from existing utility receipts over a 30 year span.

Voting \$225,000 in Water District Tax Bonds which would be retired over a period of 30 years. To accomplish this, a taxroll would be set up in the amount of \$1 million with a rate of \$1.50 per \$100 value, which would be

identical with existing values on the city tax roll, which is 15 to 20 per cent of today's value. Each person's cost would be what they are now paying in city taxes, according to the finance plan.
