Livestock Producers Reminded Of Urgent Need For Screwworm Funds

Trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation say that if producers do not raise the remainder toward a goal of \$3 million, the eradication effort may not be carried to completion. The Foundation is conducting a fund raising drive this month to raise \$1.2 million. In a drive last fall and spring, producers chipped in \$1.8 million.

C. C. Scruggs, president of the Foundation, explained that the program is being financed by the Federal Government matching non-federal funds on a 50-50 basis. When the federal funds were appropriated, it was stipulated that as soon as non-federal funds were not available on a matching basis, federal funds could not continue.

Scruggs said it would take at least \$12 million to eradicate screwworms in the Southwest. Three million dollars is expected from the Texas Legislature, \$6 million from the Fed-

eral Government and the other \$3 million must come from livestock producers and sportsmen.

He emphasized that the Foundation is not asking those producers who have already contributed their full 50 cents per animal unit to give again, although many of them have indicated their willingness to contribute again.

L. B. Burnham, Chairman of the Mills County Program, said, "We hope to raise the money by giving those who have not yet contributed, or have not invested their full share, a chance to do so."

Loan Covering New Home For Telephone Coop Is Approved

A loan providing funds for a new headquarters building for Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, Inc., along with other expansion program has been approved by the REA in Washington, it was learned here Tuesday morning.

Raymond Summy, general manager, and J. C. McBride, REA field representative told the Eagle that telegram was received Tuesday morning from Washington stating that the Cooperative had been granted a loan in the amount of \$417,000.00.

In addition to the new headquarters building the loan will also provide funds for purchase of the Evant Telephone Company and other general improvement and expansion of present facilities.

Approximately \$50,000 is for the new home to be constructed in Goldthwaite on East Fourth Street on lots that were provided to the Telephone Coop by business firms in Goldthwaite.

Negotiations for purchase of Evant Telephone Company have been underway for some time. Approximately \$150,000.00 of the loan will go for that purpose.

Greetings:

Throughout the United States, National Newspaper Week will be observed for the 33rd time October 14-20. Theme for this year's observance is "Newspapers Make a Big Difference in People's Lives."

This is an appropriate reminder of the fact that a free press is one of the foundation stones of American democracy. The free flow of information to the public is essential to the preservation of our American way of life, yet this privilege is too often taken for granted by a people accustomed to individual freedom. When our forefathers guaranteed the right of Americans to own and control a printing press without government subservience, they assured us a right often denied people of other countries. It is a right we must preserve and protect.

Our free American press stands today not only as the guardian of our freedom, but also as a shield against our own complacency and indifference.

Texas newspapers and newspapermen have consistently shown recognition of the great obligations and responsibilities which go with freedom of the press.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of October 14-20, 1962, as NEWSPAPER WEEK in Texas, and urge due recognition by all citizens of the contributions of a free press.

Ronnie Allison covered a Bulldog fumble that turned the tide for the Eagles' second touchdown of the evening.

The Bulldogs put up stiff resistance in the second period but couldn't hold the Eagles as they came through for their third TD just before the whistle that made the score 20-0 at the half.

During the third period the Eagles piled up 22 points and then started to punt on first downs for the entire fourth period with all members of the squad seeing action before the game was over.

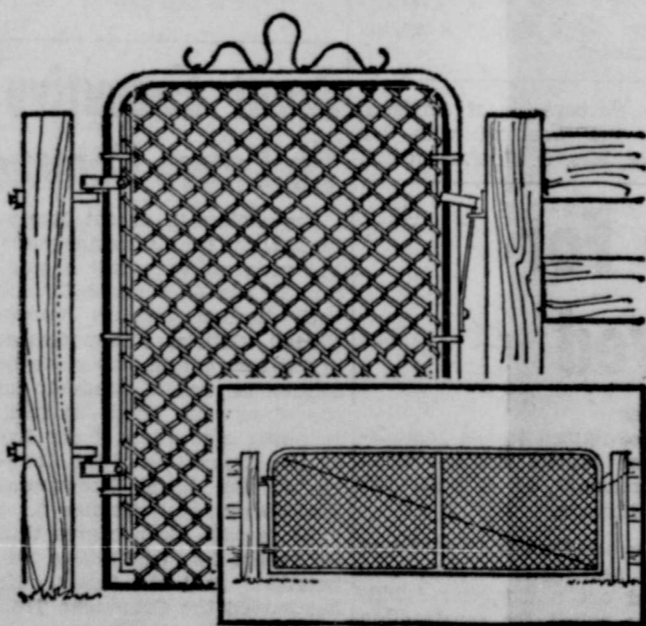

Highlights
AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas — With 12 indictments already returned in the East Texas slant-hole investigation, there are strong side-currents growing out of the East Texas scandals.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger and his fellow House investigators sent a preliminary report to Speaker James A. Tur-

man and Gov. Price Daniel. They urged "immediate action" on eight changes in or additions to the criminal laws.

They also proposed that a procedure be set up to replace state officials who become ill and unable to handle their duties. This obviously is a reference to Railroad Commission-

er Ernest O. Thompson, who has been ill at his home in Amarillo for several months.

A major policy change would be revision of the old "marginal well law" which could be very important to many Texans, particularly in old oil areas.

Present law says that if an oil well cannot make as much as 20 barrels a day, it is a "marginal well" which must be exempt from shutdown days. Thus, a well producing 19 barrels a day will get an allowable of 570 barrels a month. But a well capable of making 1,000 barrels a day will be held to 160 barrels a month—20 barrels a day times eight producing days.

Committee recommended that marginal wells be held to the same monthly allowable as a non-marginal well in the same field.

Governor Daniel has been noncommittal on the possibility of calling a special session of the Legislature to act on this and other current problem

areas.

COMMISSION SHAKEUP
Texas Railroad Commission is under a reorganization study by the Texas Research League. Already changes in procedures are being put into effect.

Commissioners William J. Murray Jr. and Ben Ramsey named a committee of oilmen headed by James E. Russell of Abilene to advise on revision of rules and procedures which most admit had become too cumbersome and slow.

PADRE AND MADRE
Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler continues his battle against creation of the Padre Island National Seashore.

He has charged that oilmen bidding on state school leases in Laguna Madre did not make big cash bonus offers to the state because of passage of the Padre Island bill.

Sadler intends to oppose legislation to authorize sales of state land in Laguna Madre to the U. S. for recreation area.

He has hired Captain William C. Russell of Fort Worth, recently retired as director of the Southwest Division of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, to survey the area along the Gulf. Although the so-called "tidelands" law was passed in 1953, there has not been a settlement between Texas and the U. S. as to where the exact boundary lies. Russell, whose life work has been in coastal surveying, will undertake that chore.

It is made doubly hard because the line is supposed to be three marine leagues off the shore, as it was in 1848 when Texas entered the union. The shoreline has changed considerably in the intervening years.

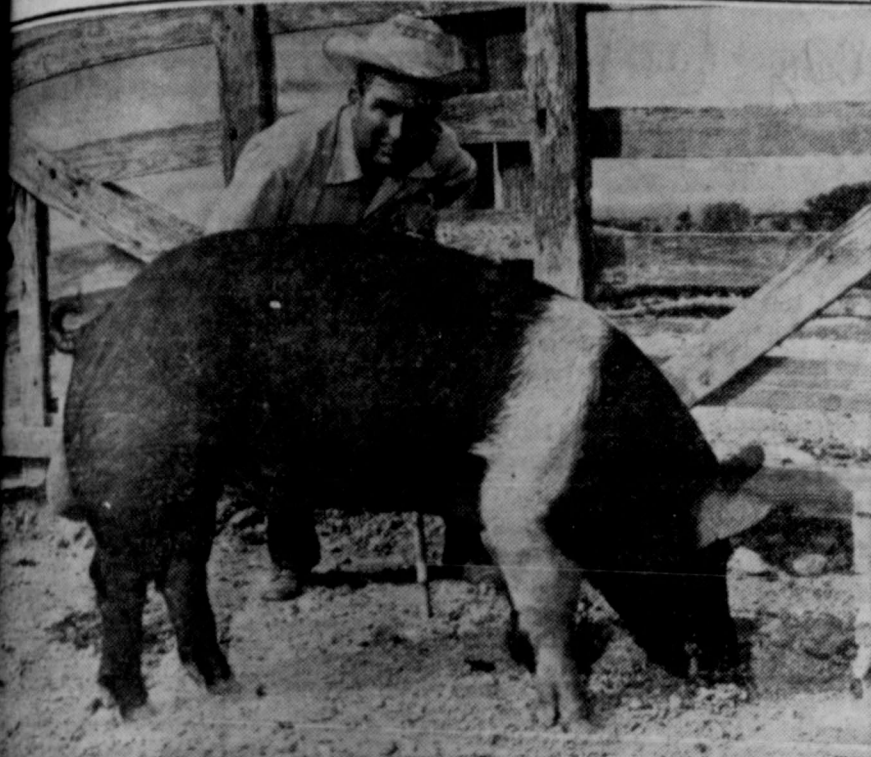

pleted. The interior work will get underway next week.

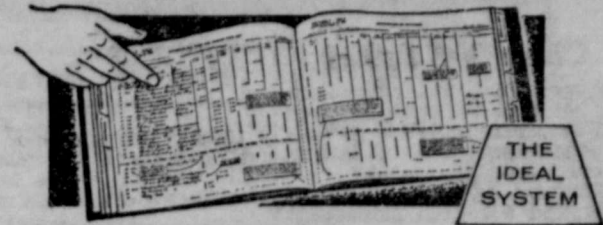

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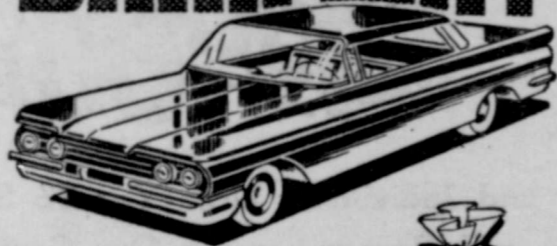

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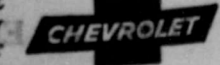

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Mail Early For Christmas Hints

Postmaster Lucile Fairman this week issued the following hints in calling attention to the Mail Early For Christmas campaign which is now in progress in the post office department.

Patrons are urged to mail their gift packages for DISTANT STATES during the week December 3-8 to insure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 12.

Greeting cards for Distant States should be mailed not later than December 10. Greeting cards for local and nearby areas should be mailed by December 15, to insure delivery before Christmas.

Surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii should be prepaid at the first class rate but if NOT prepaid at the first class rate they should be mailed not later than December 1, in order to reach their destination by Christmas.

There will be no delivery of Christmas cards and letter mail, other than by Special Delivery, on Christmas December 25.

Some mailing suggestions: Greeting cards mailed at the first class rate may be sealed, contain writing, receive priority of dispatch and delivery, can be forwarded and/or returned if undeliverable at no extra cost. Not so with those which are

prepaid at the third class rate.

Always show return address on all greeting cards and parcels and on a slip of paper on the inside of each parcel in case the outside address and return are torn off or obliterated and not legible.

The use of combination service—a letter may be enclosed inside the parcel with only the first class letter postage paid for on the outside of the parcel along with the parcel postage, with the proper endorsement of "Letter Inside."

Special Delivery and Special Handling articles are delivered at point of destination if they arrive before 11:00 p. m. or time of closing. Also they will be delivered on Christmas Day and Sundays. They receive priority dispatch and transportation to office of address.

Use AIRMAIL on cards and gift parcels especially during the last week before Christmas. Separate and tie out cards and use "Local" and "Out Of Town" labels. These labels will be on each lobby table and at all Post Office service windows.

Farmers Can Continue Diverting Land On Conservation Reserve

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced October 5 that most farmers who are participating in the Conservation Reserve Program and whose contracts will expire December 31, 1962, will have an opportunity to continue their land in conserving use for another year under a 1963 Land Use Adjustment Program authorized by the recently enacted Food and Agriculture Act of 1962.

Farmers who have land on which contracts expire this year were urged not to destroy the protective cover on the land until they become acquainted with provisions of the new program.

USDA officials say that terms and conditions to be offered farmers for continuing to hold eligible land in a conserving use will be similar to those for the existing contracts. Specific details concerning payment rates

Screwworm Eradication Program Being Received With Satisfaction

More than 62 million sterile screwworm flies were released in Texas and New Mexico during the week of September 16-22, county agent George Reese, has announced. Production of the flies at the plant near Mission, Texas has increased steadily since it started operation in June.

Livestock producers and sportsmen apparently are receiving the Screwworm Eradication Program with widespread satisfaction, Reese said. Many Mills County producers have reported a marked decrease in the number of screwworm cases this year as compared to other years.

Lloyd King, who operates a ranch in the South part of Mills County, expresses a typical reaction.

"I have found only a fraction of the cases that I usually experience," King said. "Since the weather conditions this summer have been much the same as in previous years, I am convinced that the release of sterile flies has helped reduce the number of cases."

Other producers in this county and throughout the state have indicated similar results, Reese reported. He said some producers in Texas are having a lot of trouble with screwworms, but even in the most heavily infested areas, producers

admit that their cases are less numerous than in other years.

Reese also said that Louisiana and Arkansas are experiencing no screwworms this year which is contrary to the past, while Oklahoma has reported only 300 cases—a fraction of the normal cases.

Individual inspection and treatment will continue to play an important role in the Screwworm Eradication Program, Reese said. He urges producers to inspect their animals at least twice a week and treat wounds with approved screwworm remedies such as Korlan Smear, Co-Ral Powder, EQ 335 or Smear 62. He also recommends systematic spraying every 10 to 14 days with a 0.25 per cent Co-ral or 0.5 per cent Korlan solution.

"This time of the year, we are especially vulnerable to screwworm infestation because of the wet, cool weather which is favorable for the screwworm fly," he said. "Remember that each case of screwworms you destroy will prevent thousands from occurring later."

He also urged producers to continue to collect 10 maggots from wounds, put them in alcohol or water and deliver them to him or send them directly to: Screwworm Identification, Post Office Box 969, Mission, Texas. Reporting cases is an important aspect in the success of the program, he said.

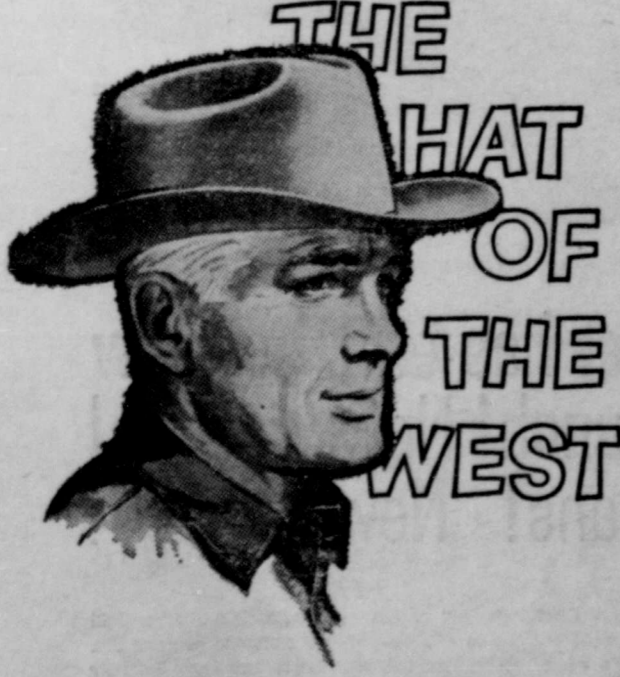
