Greetings:

Throughout the United States, National Newspaper Week will be observed for the 33rd time October 14-20. Theme for this year's observance is "Newspapers Make a Big Difference in Peo-

This is an appropriate reminder of the fact that a free press is one of the foundation stones of American democracy. The free flow of information to the public is essential to the preservation of our American way of life, yet this privilege is too often taken blocking to clear the way for for granted by a people accustomed to individual freedom. When our forefathers guaranteed the right of Americans to own and Linemen turning in creditable contol a printing press without government subservience, they asured us a right often denied people of other countries. It is a Dick Standley, Clyde Cockrum right we must preserve and protect.

Our free American press stands today not only as the guardian of our freedom, but also as a shield against our own complacency and indifference.

Texas newspapers and newspapermen have consistently shown recognition of the great obligations and responsibilities which go with freedom of the press.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of October 14-20, 1962, as NEWSPAPER WEEK in Texas, and urge due recognition by all citizens of the contributions of a
