## Pasture Short Course Will Be Conducted Here November 12-15

A pasture short course for adult farmers and ranchers will be held Nov. 12 through 15 under the sponsorship of the Goldthwaite High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Leroy Beard, Superintendent, and Thurman Head, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Tom Bowers, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Educational Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College.

Mr. Bowers holds a B. S. degree in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech and has completed work at A&M toward a M. S. degree in Agronomy. He has had 9 years of field experience as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Bowers and all have met with outstanding success," according to W. H. Pittard, Jr., area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Austin, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short course in pasture and in other fields are made through Mr. Pittard's office.

## Mail Early For Christmas Hints

Postmaster Lucile Fairman this week issued the following hints in calling attention to the Mail Early For Christmas campaign which is now in progress in the post office department.

Patrons are urged to mail their gift packages for DISTANT STATES during the week December 3-8 to insure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 12.

Greeting cards for Distant States should be mailed not later than December 10. Greeting cards for local and nearby areas should be mailed by December 15, to insure delivery before Christmas.

Surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii should be prepaid at the first class rate but if NOT prepaid at the first class rate they should be mailed not later than December 1, in order to reach their destination by Christmas.

There will be no delivery of Christmas cards and letter mail, other than by Special Delivery, on Christmas December 25.

Some mailing suggestions:  
Greeting cards mailed at the first class rate may be sealed, contain writing, receive priority of dispatch and delivery, can be forwarded and/or returned if undeliverable at no extra cost. Not so with those which are

prepaid at the third class rate. Always show return address on all greeting cards and parcels and on a slip of paper on the inside of each parcel in case the outside address and return are torn off or obliterated and not legible.

The use of combination service—a letter may be enclosed inside the parcel with only the first class letter postage paid for on the outside of the parcel along with the parcel postage, with the proper endorsement of "Letter Inside."

Special Delivery and Special Handling articles are delivered at point of destination if they arrive before 11:00 p. m. or time of closing. Also they will be delivered on Christmas Day and Sundays. They receive priority dispatch and transportation to office of address.

Use AIRMAIL on cards and gift parcels especially during the last week before Christmas. Separate and tie out cards and use "Local" and "Out Of Town" labels. These labels will be on each lobby table and at all Post Office service windows.

## Farmers Can Continue Diverting Land On Conservation Reserve

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced October 5 that most farmers who are participating in the Conservation Reserve Program and whose contracts will expire December 31, 1962, will have an opportunity to continue their land in conserving use for another year under a 1963 Land Use Adjustment Program authorized by the recently enacted Food and Agriculture Act of 1962.

Farmers who have land on which contracts expire this year were urged not to destroy the protective cover on the land until they become acquainted with provisions of the new program.

USDA officials say that terms and conditions to be offered farmers for continuing to hold eligible land in a conserving use will be similar to those for the existing contracts. Specific details concerning payment rates

and other provisions will be available in county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices around mid-October.

Officials pointed out that under the 1963 program, as under the Conservation Reserve Program, farmers will be required to provide a cover which will protect the land from wind and water erosion.

Longer range aspects of the Land Use Adjustment Program are being developed and will be announced later.

## Screwworm Eradication Program Being Received With Satisfaction

More than 62 million sterile screwworm flies were released in Texas and New Mexico during the week of September 16-22, county agent George Reese, has announced. Production of the flies at the plant near Mission, Texas has increased steadily since it started operation in June.

Livestock producers and sportsmen apparently are receiving the Screwworm Eradication Program with widespread satisfaction, Reese said. Many Mills County producers have reported a marked decrease in the number of screwworm cases this year as compared to other years.

Lloyd King, who operates a ranch in the South part of Mills County, expresses a typical reaction.

"I have found only a fraction of the cases that I usually experience," King said. "Since the weather conditions this summer have been much the same as in previous years, I am convinced that the release of sterile flies has helped reduce the number of cases."

Other producers in this county and throughout the state have indicated similar results, Reese reported. He said some producers in Texas are having a lot of trouble with screwworms, but even in the most heavily infested areas, producers admit that their cases are less numerous than in other years.

Reese also said that Louisiana and Arkansas are experiencing no screwworms this year which is contrary to the past, while Oklahoma has reported only 300 cases—a fraction of the normal cases.

Individual inspection and treatment will continue to play an important role in the Screwworm Eradication Program, Reese said. He urges producers to inspect their animals at least twice a week and treat wounds with approved screwworm remedies such as Korlan Smear, Corral Powder, EQ 335 or Smear 62. He also recommends systematic spraying every 10 to 14 days with a 0.25 per cent Corral or 0.5 per cent Korlan solution.

"This time of the year, we are especially vulnerable to screwworm infestation because of the wet, cool weather which is favorable for the screwworm fly," he said, "Remember that each case of screwworms you destroy will prevent thousands from occurring later."

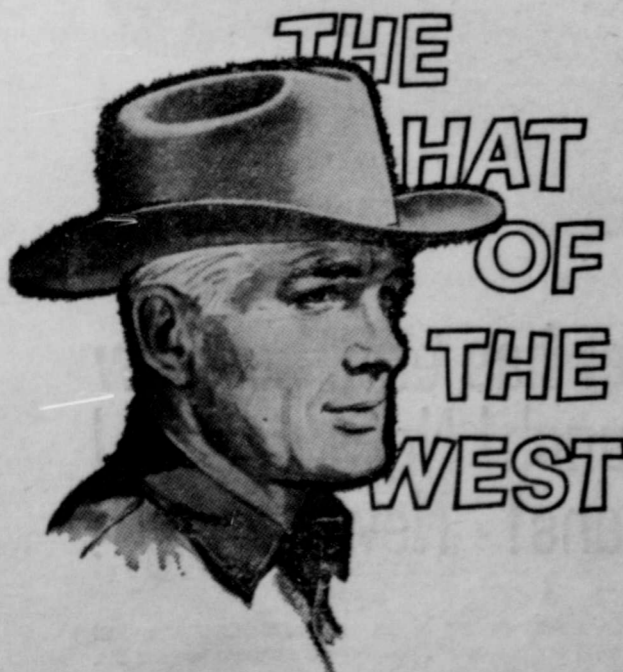
He also urged producers to continue to collect 10 maggots from wounds, put them in alcohol or water and deliver them to him or send them directly to: Screwworm Identification, Post Office Box 969, Mission, Texas. Reporting cases is an important aspect in the success of the program, he said.

Mr. Bowers states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of course is in helping farmers and ranchers to make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M College," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy cattle, oxy-acetylene welding, and pasture.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Bowers and all have met with outstanding success," according to W. H. Pittard, Jr., area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Austin, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short course in pasture and in other fields are made through Mr. Pittard's office.

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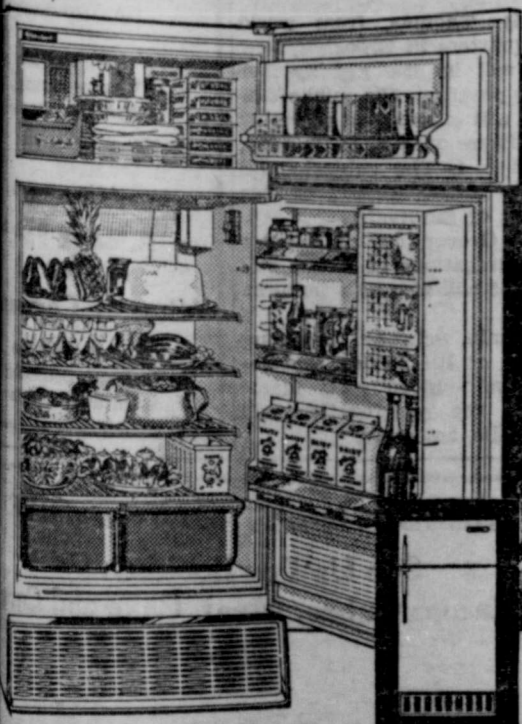
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## Livestock Men Hear Report On Screwworm Eradication Program

"A screwworm-free Southwest will cost an estimated \$12 million," Mr. L. B. Burnham, chairman of the county animal health committee reported this week.

Of this, livestock producers and sportsmen will raise \$3 million and the rest will come from State and Federal sources, Mr. Burnham said.

The county chairman announced that this was the object of the general meeting that was held on October 15, at Goldthwaite. Producers raised \$1.7 million toward this goal last spring.

The Screwworm Eradication Program entails the release of sterile screwworm flies by airplanes. The sterile male flies mate with naturally-occurring females, thus producing infertile eggs. The program is a cooperative venture of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the

Texas Animal Health Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and agencies of other Southwestern States.

Mr. Burnham outlined the expenditures that are required to wipe out the livestock pest that does an estimated annual damage of \$100 million. From February 14, 1962—when the first sterile screwworm flies were released in Texas—until July 1, a total of \$1,850,000 was spent.

Program officials expect expenditures of \$4,700,000 during the year July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963. Broken down, this amounts to nearly \$1 million for meat, blood and honey to raise the sterile screwworm flies at Mission, Texas; \$550,000 for fly dispersal; \$2,050.00 for salaries and travel; and \$1,100,000 for plant maintenance, utilities and other services.
