Screwworm Program Contributions Coming In Slow, Burnham Reports

Contributions to the Screwworm Eradication program fund are coming in at a slow rate, L. B. Burnham, Mills County Animal Health Committee chairman, reported Monday morning.

Burnham said that a number of interested parties have inquired about where to send their check. He points out that contributions may be paid to Glynn Collier, secretary-treasurer of the committee, at Mills County State Bank or they may be turned in to the chairman. Up through last week Mills County stockmen had contributed slightly under one-half of the goal of \$24,000, which was adopted by the committee last spring.

During the drive earlier this year over \$11,000 was paid into the fund by Mills County stockmen. Since the drive was reactivated a few weeks ago additional contributions have boosted

the fund to nearly \$12,000.

Mr. Burnham pointed out that if producers contribute on a basis of 50 cents for each head of dairy and beef animal and 10 cents per head of swine, sheep and goats the remainder of needed funds can easily be raised.

Program officials expect expenditures of \$4,700,000 during the year July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963. Broken down, this amounts to nearly \$1 million for meat, blood and honey to raise the sterile screwworm flies at Mission, Texas; \$550,000 for fly dispersal; \$2,050,000 for salaries and travel; and \$1,100,000 for plant maintenance, utilities and other services.

After July 1, 1963, officials anticipate a cost of \$5,450,000 for final eradication and establishing of a barrier zone which will keep the flies from entering the United States from Mexico.

21.77 Inches Of Rainfall Here In Past Ten Months

Goldthwaite received 21.77 inches of rainfall during the past ten months, January through October, with an unofficial six inches recorded during October.

The Eagle rain gauge on Hannah Valley Road recorded 6 inches for the month of October. Of this amount .70 inch was measured over the past week-end.

Official weather observer for Goldthwaite, Harry Allen, is still off the job due to illness, and official report was not available as the Eagle went to press.

There has been considerable interest throughout the county in the Governor's race which

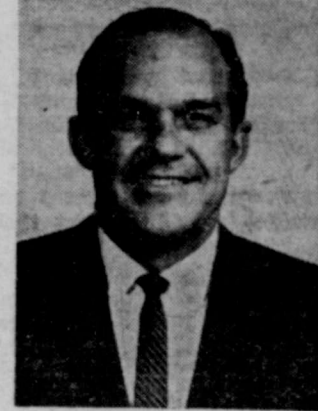
may bring out reasonably heavy vote, according to local observers.

The Goldthwaite High School Eagles were upset by the Bangs Dragons for their homecoming game here last Friday night.

After trailing the Eagles 16-0 at the half time the Dragons got fired up during the second half to clip the Eagles 18-16 by taking three touchdowns in short order.

Goldthwaite opened the scoring in the second period when guard Lynn Elliott recovered a Bangs fumble on the Dragon 18. Four plays later fullback Harlan Jernigan made his way over left tackle from six yards out for the touchdown. Quarterback Gene Gray tossed to Ronald Cagle for the extra points making it 8-0.

The Eagles wasted no time in getting their second touchdown. End Cecil Kambell recovered an on-side kickoff for the Eagles on Bangs' 41 yard line. Two rushing plays moved the ball to the 25, but a 15 yard penalty set the Eagles back to the 40. From there Jernigan took over again and fought off three Dragons as he scampered in for another score. Gray passed to Clyde Cockrum for the extra points, and Goldthwaite led 16-0.

From a look at the statistics the Eagles played a good game in every department except the scoring bracket.

The Eagles, while leading at the half time, failed to get into high gear as the second half got underway. Things failed to click and they lost their second conference game of this season.

Next week the Eagles will have an open date with no game scheduled for Friday, November 9.

JUST IMAGINE!—"Imagine that your salary is \$8,200 a year—and you are almost \$30,000 in debt," says Congressman Norblad, of Oregon. "Last year your debt increased by \$390. This year you are adding at least \$700 to your indebtedness."

"Your friends are warning you that you can't continue to pile up additional debt—that this is the road to financial ruin. So you and your wife talk it over and decide to draw up a budget for next year. But instead of reducing expenditures—or even holding them at their present level—you decide that you will spend \$340 more next year than this year. You reach this decision on the assumption—there is nothing definite—that you will receive a salary increase next year; therefore an increase in spending is in order. Little or no consideration is given to the \$30,000 debt. The significant thing is that you expect to make more money next year—therefore you plan to spend it."

"Nearly everyone will agree that a family handling its finances on this basis is headed for serious trouble. Yet, add seven ciphers to these figures, and you have the exact fiscal situation of the Government."

Continually spending more than you earn, whether you are a private citizen or a government is the way to bankruptcy. It is a cold-blooded financial problem, not a partisan political issue.

TRAGIC FAILURE—This modern world provides the best example in recorded history of the ancient saying that, "that government is best which governs least."

The "most governed" nations are in the communist bloc. These are the nations that threaten not only the peace of the world but the very existence of mankind. The masses of their people certainly are not warmongers. They, like peoples everywhere, want peace, happiness, a good life. But, living under an all-powerful government, they have nothing to say about what is to happen. A power drunk dictator need only order a button pushed and Armageddon comes.

And the sins of big government certainly are not confined to the dictatorships. In our own country, as in England and other free nations, big government has saddled us with a debt of almost unimaginable size along with cruel taxes. We cannot blame all this on past, present and possible future wars, whether hot or cold. The Welfare State philosophy, which holds that government should be all things to all men, and should exercise more and more control over our lives and destiny while providing a dubious cradle to the grave security, must bear much of the blame.

The people by endorsing more and more government encroachment on their lives and activities, steadily restrict their opportunities as free men.

The New Yorker magazine recently ran a cartoon showing two tourists gazing at one of the wonders of the world, the Taj Mahal. One tourist says to the other: "I'll just bet they didn't come crying for foreign aid to build that."

This year shopping center developers in the United States and Canada will spend more than \$2.4 billion on construction and equipment. New buildings, including additions to existing centers, will total 193 million square feet. On top of that, real estate purchases by the developers will total 18,000 acres and cost about \$200 million.

SCHOOL BOY LOGIC—There is too much talk today about the profits of business being excessive. The critics of profits never mention the fact that government would be flat-busted with its excessive cost of operation, if it were not for profits to tax. The federal government runs billions in the red now. We can create a real depression if the anti-business talk keeps up and is reflected in action. Then watch the public debt climb and the value of the dollar drop.

It is generally conceded that a bank must have a healthy earning capacity. If it were to lend money at no interest it would be bankrupt. Industry is no different than a bank; if it produces goods and services at no profit or too little profit, it will go bankrupt.

Government has no income except what it first takes from its citizens in taxes. Its solvency depends on the ability of its citizens to produce a surplus (profit) to tax.

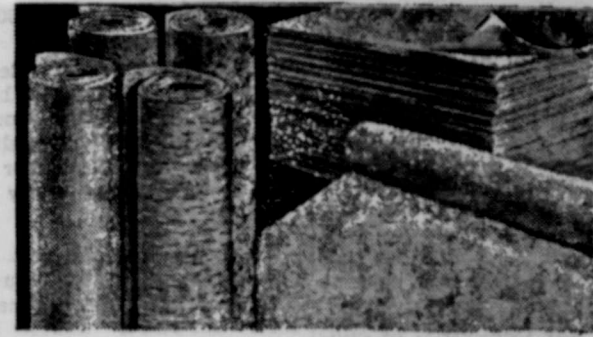

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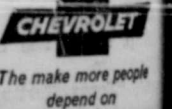

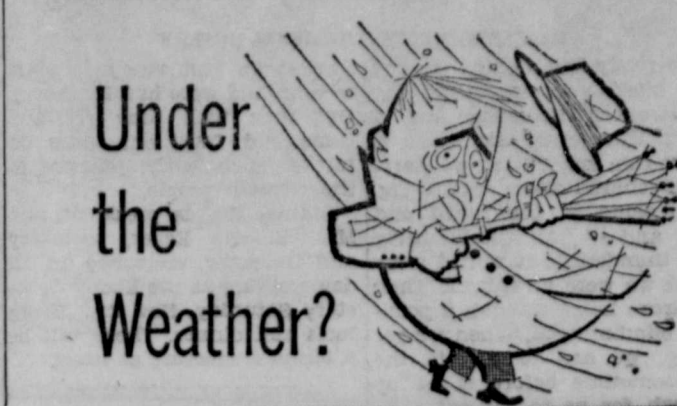

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Attorney General Will Wilson issued an opinion that the Constitution of Texas cannot nominate members for district offices at its state convention.

But the opinion came a bit late. Election ballots already have been printed, and the tardy nominations are listed.

Secretary of State P. Frank Lake made the request for an opinion on Constitutional Party nomination procedure in September. The "third party" did not release its list of nominations until early summer, whereas Republicans and Democrats had to comply with a law that says candidates must announce by the second Monday of February.

According to Wilson, the same law applies to the Constitutional Party.

HIGH COST OF LEARNING

Tuition for Texas' 20 state universities and colleges may be doubled by the time members of the 1964 high school graduating classes are ready to enroll.

Texas Commission on Higher Education decided to ask the Legislature to double tuition — from \$50 to \$100 a semester — and increase appropriations by 55 per cent during 1964-65.

Commission approved a \$4,000,000 boost in the previously recommended biennial budget of \$162,000,000; agreed to raise college presidents' salaries; and ordered its staff to look into the elimination of remedial writing and reading and tours from college curriculums.

Requests for more money came after it was noted that this fall's enrollment of 110,000 students in 19 colleges was an increase of 9 per cent over last year, and the "war babies" will soon be knocking at the doors.

DEFICIT RISES

Deficit in the State's General Revenue Fund increased by almost \$13,000,000 during mid-October, according to a report from State Treasurer Jesse James.

On October 9, the State was in the red to the tune of \$41,250,349. By October 24, the deficit was \$54,074,283.

MAP PROJECT PUSHED

Absence of topographic maps of the entire state may be holding us back in the nationwide race for new industries.

At a meeting of the Texas Mapping Advisory Committee, Harry Clark, director of the Texas Industrial Commission, said that topographical maps are very necessary to industries considering sites here. Chairman John J. Vandertulp said the maps are essential to industrial and agricultural planning.

Topographic maps are those that show the physical features of a region in minute detail.

When a mapping program of 73 counties is completed, Texas will be half-mapped.

ATTRACTIVE NUISANCES

State Health Department officials issued a warning against the use of arsenic acid containers for water bottles.

Field engineers recently found about 40 of the one-gallon size containers along the highway in Collin County. One had about

one and one-half ounces of arsenic left in it—enough to kill more than 100 people.

Death of three members of a Josephine farm family was attributed to accidental poisoning caused by drinking water out of a container which had been used for cotton defoliation. "These plastic bottles are attractive nuisances . . . and deadly," an official said.

RADIATION DETECTION PLAN

An officer of the Texas Department of Public Safety soon should be able to help out at the scene of a radiation accident or incident anywhere in the State in about 30 minutes, Col. Homer Garrison Jr. announced.

A stepped-up training program in radiation detection which began on October 29 is expected to provide enough trained men to handle any emergency.

Officers who have completed the course already are driving vehicles equipped with a Geiger Counter to measure very low amounts of radiation, a mid-range survey meter, and a high-range meter.

Men also carry personal "Dosimeters" on their persons so they periodically can determine the amount of radiation they have been subjected to during the survey of an area in which radio-active spillage has occurred.

Department's also helping to train members of city police departments, sheriffs' departments, rescue squads and other groups.

HIGHWAY HOME HELP

Property owners and tenants who become displaced by Interstate Highway right-of-way acquisition now are entitled to help from district engineers of the State Highway Department. In compliance with the 1962 Federal Aid Highway Act, people who must give up their homes or property because of right-of-way acquisition can get relocation assistance.

and 17, or a female juvenile, between 10 and 18, cannot be tried in a county court for negligent homicide in the second degree, Wellington County Attorney R. L. Templeton was informed.

A county court cannot commit a person to a mental hospital for temporary hospitaliza-

tion for any longer than 30 days.

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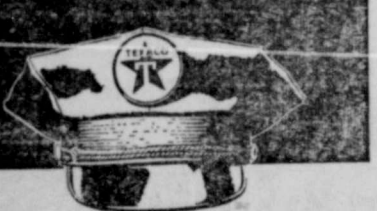

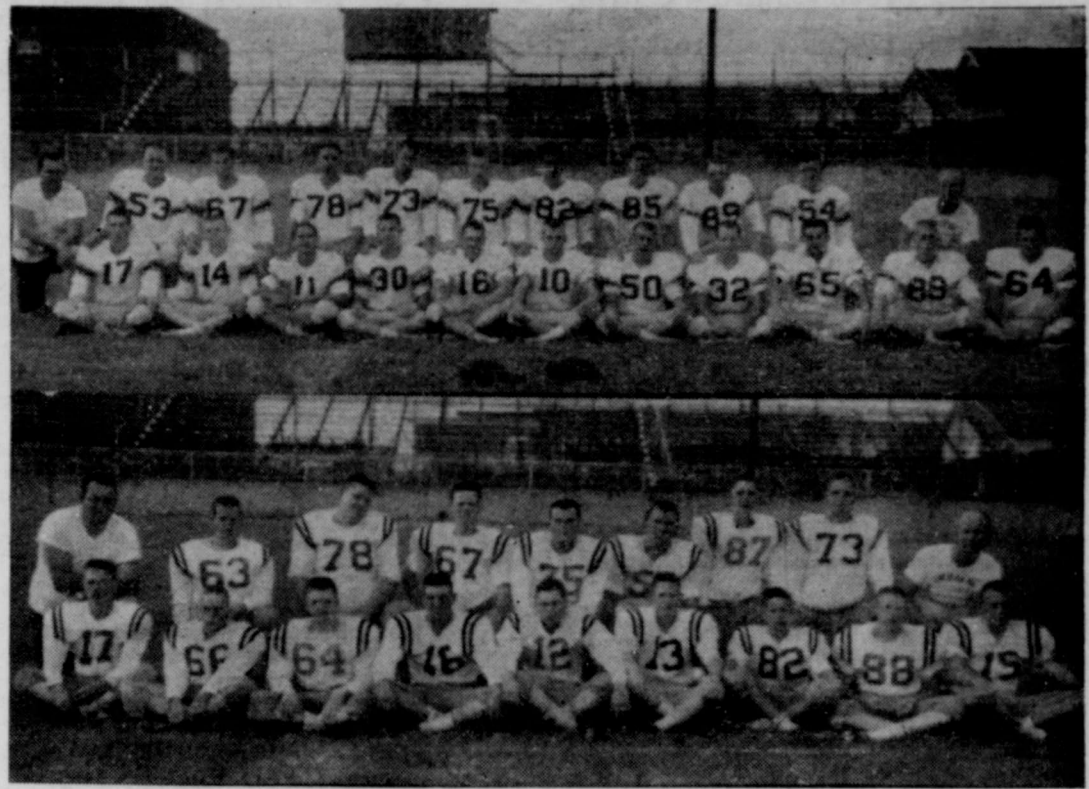

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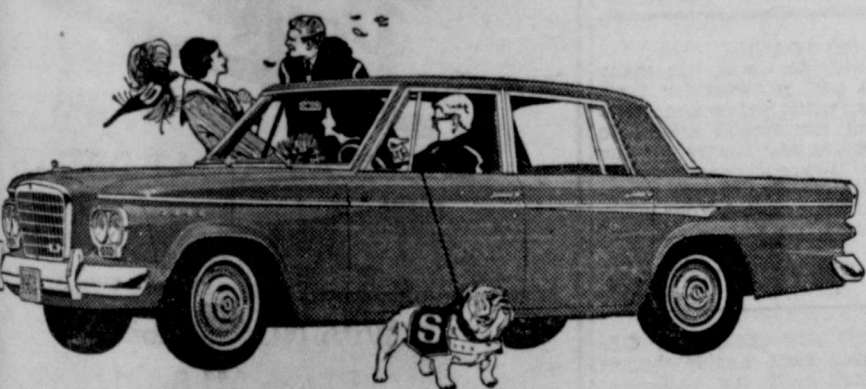

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Jet Bombers Start Missions Nov. 6 To Simulated Targets At San Saba

OFFUTT AFB, Neb.—Jet bombers of the Strategic Air Command will begin flying missions on November 6 against simulated targets near San Saba, Tex. Radar bomb scoring equipment mounted on an Air Force train parked near San Saba will score the accuracy of simulated bomb drops by means of radio and radar signals.

B-47, B-52 and B-58 bombers traveling along a 10-mile wide training corridor will fly at an altitude of approximately 5,000 feet during the simulated bomb runs.

The bombers will enter a flying corridor south of Ozona, Texas, proceed west to near Sheffield, turn south to near Langtry, fly east to near Kerr-

ville and then turn north to the aiming points in the vicinity of San Saba.

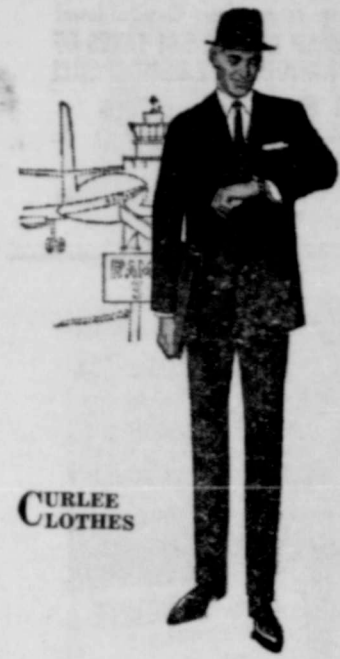
No bombs are carried by the SAC aircraft on these training missions. After the corridors and targets have been used for approximately 45 days, operations along the route will be suspended, because the crews become familiar with the landmarks and other identifying characteristics of the area to the point the route no longer offers realistic training benefits.

All targets and route selections have been coordinated in advance with the Federal Aviation Agency. Highly populated areas and areas of heaviest air traffic are avoided.

The RBS Express, designation for the Air Force train which carries the mobil radar bomb scoring equipment, is designed to inject more realism into SAC's training program, providing crews with a wider range of unfamiliar targets and routes. This is done by moving the RBS Express to a new geographical location periodically to simulate new and different target areas. With each relocation, new routes terminating near the RBS Express are used.

The train is manned by about 65 Air Force personnel. These are radar and electronic technicians plus personnel needed to maintain and furnish other support. Civilian train crews move the RBS Express between target locations.

Each train has 10 cars carrying radar and communications equipment, fuel and supplies. The cars are from U. S. Army stock.

1963 Wheat Program Outlined

Wheat diversion and additional price-support payments are new features of the 1963 wheat stabilization program. E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said today.

These payments were provided by the new farm law, signed by President Kennedy on September 27, 1962. They supplement the marketing quotas and price supports previously in effect for the 1963 wheat crop.

The Chairman explained that the diversion payments will be similar to the payments made under the 1962 wheat stabilization program. They will be available to growers who reduce their wheat acreage by at least 20 per cent and who devote the diverted acres to an approved conservation use. The payment will be based on the farm's established wheat yield and one-half the county price-support loan rate.

In addition, a price-support payment of 18 cents a bushel on the normal production of the final 1963 wheat acreage will

be available to growers who participate in the wheat-diversion part of the program. Small farms must also be in compliance with their farm acreage allotments in order to be eligible for price-support loans or purchase agreements and the 18-cent price-support payment.

Price-support loans and purchase agreements averaging \$1.82 per bushel nationally will be available to growers who comply with their acreage allotments. This part of the wheat program is the same as in previous years.

Mr. Burkett pointed out that the regular price support is available on the 1963-crop wheat which a grower produces in compliance with his farm allotment and puts under a loan or purchase agreement. The 18-cent payment, on the other hand, is made to such a grower—who is also participating in
