ties for elderly persons and families in rural areas. It liberalizes some regulations on rural housing loans now being made tion amends Title V of the tion and sets up new direct and This new legislation will be administered in Mills County by

USDA's Farmers Home Administration. Rural housing loans are made by this agency to farmers and other families living in rural areas who need improved housing and cannot qualify for credit from other sources.

One new provision will give those people, who are 62 years of age or over, special advantages not available under the earlier loan program. First, they can buy previously-occupied existing housing as well as improve their homes, Second, they can finance the cost of the building site as well as the dwelling with the loan proceeds; other families must own the land on which to build the homes before they can apply be used by elderly applicants now being made by Farmers Home Administration, these direct loans will bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent and may be repaid over a period not exceeding 33 years. For detailed information concerning rural housing loans for the senior citizen, Mr. Marlis C. Barker, local County Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration, may be contacted.

# **Answers About** ng anniversary. Bob Cockrum had his arm Social Security

The staff of the Social Security Administration answers many questions each day concerning payment of benefits to persons who are still working. Durelle L. Allen, manager of the Temple district office, lists more examples and gives the answers to them.

Q. I was retired by my company this year. I receive a monthly social security benefit of \$120. Recently, my former employer offered me part-time work at \$200 per month for all of next year. Can I get any benefits next year while I am earning \$2400?

A. Yes, you would be entitled to receive \$490 in social security enrolled as a Junior for the benefits. If you did not work, you would get \$1440. While working you lose \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you earn above and Mrs. H. J. Starnes of \$1200 and under \$1700. For \$1 Brookesmith came in Thursday you earn over \$1700 you lose \$1 of benefits. In your case, you would lose \$950 in benefits for your \$2400 earnings, leaving you \$490 in benefits.

> Q. I estimated my earnings for this year to be \$1600 when I applied for benefits last year, If I get a \$200 bonus in December of this year, what effect will





Antlerless Deer Permits are issued to landowners by the Game and Fish Commission when the following conditions are met: (1) The County in which his land is located is under Regulatory Authority of the (2) When the game census shows that the land has a surplus of Antlerless or Doe Deer; (3) When the landowner requests these permits. The number of permits he receives will depend upon the number of acres owned and the extent of population of the deer herd. Permits are issued at no cost to the landowner or his agent and he in turn issues them to the hunter at his dis-

(4) The purpose of the Bonus Deer Tag is to increase the kill of doe deer in areas having an over population Past experience has shown that hunters are reluctant to use their "buck tags' on a doe deer. Although each hunting license sold has a Bonus Tag attached, their use will be limited by the number of Antlerless or Doe Deer Permits that are issued. As an example: The residents of a particular county may purchase, say, 10,000 hunting licenses: on the other hand only 100 Antlerless or Doe Permits are issued in the county. In spite of the fact that

10,000 hunters would have a total of 10,000 Bonus Deer Tags, only 100 of these could be used in this county, since a Bonus Tag can only be used when it has an Antlerless Deer Permit to go with it.

REMEMBER: If you wish to use your Bonus Deer Tag, you must first find out whether the landowner on whose land you are hunting has obtained Antlerless or Doe Deer Permits, and if so, whether or not he will issue you one. 



More Soil **Being Tested** 

Soil testing is being recognized by farmers, ranchers and gardeners as the accurate way to determine the fertility needs of their land, according to a report by William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the report year of September 1961 to September 1962, a record total of 17,768 soil tests were made by the three A&M College laboratories, Bennett says. This exceeds the previous record year of 1959-60 by almost 2,000 tests, and is much higher than the 1960-61 number of 13,987.

The Baylor county laboratory during the year just completed, tested 1.756 samples compared with less than a thousand in 1959-60, says Bennett. The High Plains laboratory, now in its second year of operation, handled more than 4,000 samples as compared with 3,772 last year, Admitted - Ed W. Knight, he adds. The Texas A&M College laboratory tested 11,900 samples this year, some 2,000

The counties submitting the largest number of samples were Hunt, 693; Fannin, 650; and Baylor, 577. Thirteen other counties submitted more than 200 samples, while 30 sent in over 100. Bennett says. Some of the out-of-state samples sent for analysis came from Mexico,

These figures show that people are realizing more each year the importance of this service performed by the three laborktories in Texas, says Bennett.
