Heart of Texas Council, Waco from September 1952 to February 1958.

Mr. Pound became a Boy Scout in Houston, Texas at the age of 12 and earned the Life Scout rank. He became a Sea Scout and qualified for the Quartermaster Award—the Sea Scout "Eagle." As an adult volunteer he held the position of Mate in Ship 1, Houston, Skipper of Ship 43, Houston and Advisor of Senior Outfit 50 in Austin.

A graduate of the University of Texas in 1949, Pound had previously attended Rice University and the University of Houston, before and after his service with the U. S. Navy in World War II.

Mr. and Mrs. Pound and their three children have been active in the Westminster Presbyterian Church, where Mr. Pound has served as member and secretary of the Board of Deacons, chairman of the adult Sunday School and member of the Christian Education Committee.

Mr. Pound will assume his new position on December 1 and will attend the Annual Meeting of the Comanche Trail Council which will be held at the Hotel Brownwood on December 6.

Mills County Pecans Eligible For San Saba Show

Mills County pecan producers are eligible to enter the San Saba Pecan Show, to be held at the Ranchmen's Tower, in San Saba, on Saturday, December 8th, according to the word received from Billy Kidd, San Saba County Agent.

Each producer is entitled to enter as many varieties as desired, and classes have been set up for every variety of pecans. A sample must consist of 1½ pounds of pecans.

Trophies will be awarded to the champion pecan in each class, and ribbons to the first three places.

Winners of the first and second places in each class will be entered in the State Pecan Show to be held at College Station during the first week in January.

Entries to the Show must be in by Friday, December 7th, at 12 p. m. Mail all entries to the San Saba Chamber of Commerce, or to the County Agent's office in San Saba.

Eagles Defeat Mustangs 47-0 In Last 9-A Conference Game

The Goldthwaite high school Eagles defeated the Marble Falls Mustangs by a wide margin of 47-0 last Friday night in the last conference game of the season.

The host Eagles returned the opening kick-off for a touchdown and continued to add points until halftime when they had a 38-0 lead, then they dallied with the Mustangs the rest of the way to a final score of 47-0.

This win gave the Eagles a tie with Santa Anna in the runner-up slot for District 9A.

Halfback Ronald Cagle got the opening kickoff on his own 15 and dashed 85 yards for the first TD. Halfback L. V. Benningfield went over for the extra points giving the Eagles a fast 8 point lead.

On their next possession the Eagles made 83 yards in 15 plays with fullback Harlan Jernigan making the final yardage.

After a swift ball exchange on an interception and fumble, Marble Falls punted out to their own 42. After just four plays Goldthwaite racked up 8 more points with quarterback Gene Gray and Jernigan doing the honors. Gray tossed to Cagle for the extra points and a score of 22-0.

Another Mustang punt put the Eagles on their own 37. Jernigan broke loose on the first play and dashed 53 yards to the Mustang 9. Later Gray tossed to Cecil Campbell for the tally. Then Gray tossed to Jim Childress for extra points.

Just before half Goldthwaite made 78 yards in 7 plays to score again, with 51 seconds left in the first half. Gray passed to Cagle for the extra points.

In the second half the Eagles eased on their attempt to score. They tried for a field goal on the Marble Falls' 10 but were unsuccessful.

The only touchdown scored in the second half was by Cagle when he went all the way from the Mustang 38, and the only other scoring came on a first down field goal from the visitors' 8 yard line, bringing the score to 47-0.

Questions And Answers About Veterans' Benefits

Question—May a widow who has previously been denied a claim for pension because her husband did not have a service-connected condition when he died, apply again under a new law?
Answer—Yes. The new pension law does not require that the veteran have a service-connected condition, but is based chiefly on the financial need of the applicant or her minor children.

Question—How does a new law affect educational benefits for reserves called up for active service during the Berlin crisis?
Answer—A reservist whose training or education under the Korean GI Bill was interrupted by the call up for active service will have his deadline for completing his education or training extended by a period of time equal to the length of his "call-up" period of service.

Question—Are young people engaged in the VA's War Orphan Educational program benefited by provisions of a new law?
Answer—Yes. If they are forced to suspend their schooling or training because of financial reasons beyond their control, such as illness in their immediate family, or because the job at which they work requires their presence on the job at a certain season, their deadline date will be extended by the length of time they are thus kept out of training.

There are a number of reasons why fishing is much better now than it was in frontier times, and why it's going to keep on improving as the years go by.

These factors are contributing to the angler's joy:

1. Construction of lakes and farm ponds.
2. Introduction of new varieties of fish.
3. Research work done by scientists in the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Now there are lakes all over Texas. They have been created by dams that have been built for water and soil conservation era, only a few near-ideal places

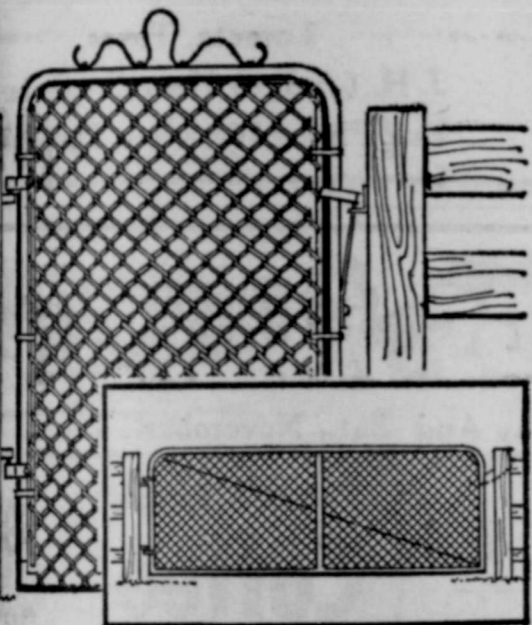

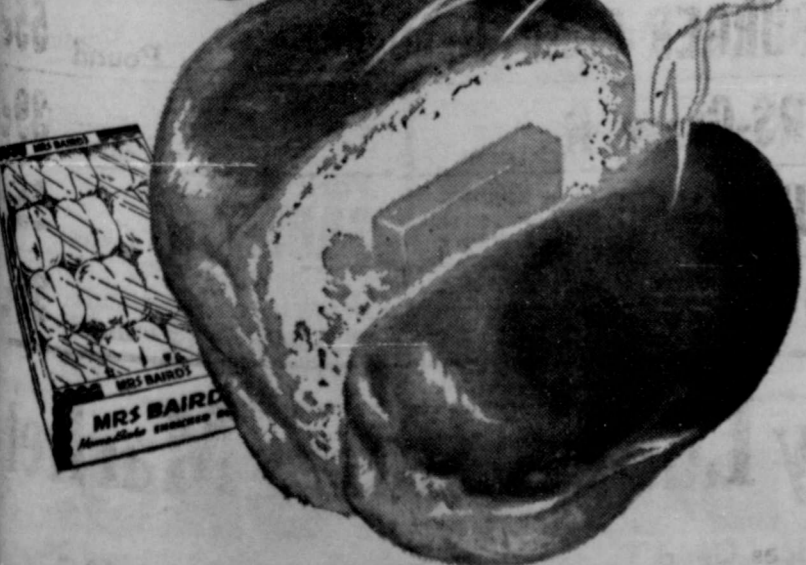

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights
by Vern Sanford

Austin, Tex. — Capital city folks are getting "Inauguration Fever."

"Inaugural plans for Governor-elect John B. Connally will be far more elaborate than any held in the past decade." So reports Frank Erwin, secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee, who is in charge of arrangements.

Festivities will begin the evening of January 14 when 5,000 Democrats are expected to pay \$25 a plate for a Victory Dinner in Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

On the morning of the 15th, there will be an interfaith Prayer Breakfast in the Driskill Hotel.

At noon Governor-elect Connally and Lieutenant Governor-elect Preston Smith will be "sworn in" in a ceremony supervised by the State Senate and House of Representatives.

Inaugural parade, following the ceremony, is expected to be one of the largest ever held in Austin. High school bands from all over the state are accepting Connally's invitation to participate. Many out-of-town floats also will participate. Also taking part will be the U. S. Navy, with a salute to its former secretary, John Connally.

The Capitol and all state buildings on its grounds will be illuminated that evening. All Texans will be invited to greet

their new chief executive and other elected state officials and enjoy refreshments and entertainment in the Capitol.

This gala evening event is a brand new innovation.

Textbooks Selected

State Board of Education voted to accept the State Textbook Committee's recommendations for new texts in 13 public school courses, and approved its recommendation not to select new economic texts at this time.

In compiling a list of some 65 textbooks for selection by local boards, the 15-member committee studied 188 books submitted by 33 publishers, with the assistance of 517 professional advisors and 400 laymen.

Texas Education Agency experts in 10 fields then reviewed their selections and submitted some 400 suggested corrections, which the publishers agreed to make.

Most of the corrections refer to typographical mistakes and minor factual errors.

State Library agreed to keep a copy of each recommended text so that they will be available to individuals who may want to protest acceptance by local school boards.

Board of Education also will send samples to local boards, according to enrollment; one set for 500 pupils; 16 sets for 10,001 to 50,000 pupils, etc.

Local boards must appoint their selection committees by December 15.
