Future Plans Are Announced For Screwworm Eradication Program

L. B. Burnham, Chairman of the Mills County Animal Health Committee, this week announced receipt of information regarding future plans for carrying out the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program which includes the Mills County area.

The program is moving ahead and stockmen are continuing with their financial contributions toward the project, according to Burnham.

The progress report as of December 7, outlines the following future plans.

"It is projected that the barrier of sterile flies along the international border shall be in full operation, weather permitting, by February 15, 1963. The outer half of the barrier will receive 600 flies per square mile per week, and the inner half, 400 sterile flies per square mile. The estimated size of the barrier is 100,000 square miles. It is estimated that about 50 million flies per week will be needed within the barrier until

July 1, 1963.

"It is projected that fly release will continue within the present drop area but that weather will force intermittent cessation of treatment in the northern half. The drop area lying outside the barrier totals approximately 50,000 square miles. Within this 50,000 square mile area varying release rates will be used depending upon weather conditions and the intensity of screwworm activity. The region north of a line running roughly from Port Lavaca through the northern part of San Antonio to Sonora, Texas, will receive an average of 200 flies per square mile weekly until it is ascertained that screwworms have not overwintered in the area. South of this line, within the barrier and outside the barrier, fly release rates will be increased when inclement weather reduces the size of the area under treatment.

"A weekly production rate of 65 million flies will be reared during January and February and 75 million flies weekly will be reared from March through June.

"Throughout the remainder of the fiscal year, increasing attention will be given to individual outbreaks of screwworms within the overwintering area and as the number of reported cases become fewer and fewer, more and more intensified efforts will be made to rapidly snuff each one out as it is reported.

"The revised budget provides for altering production and release facilities so that under emergency circumstances, 100 million sterile flies per week may be produced and released if sufficient funds are available."

Federal Land Bank To Reduce Interest Costs To Borrowers

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective on January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5% the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5%. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5 1/2% but interest on loans closed on and after December 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at 5% until further notice by the bank.

In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, President of the bank, said that of its \$280 million of loans outstanding more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of 5% and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than a half million dollars in the year 1963 alone.

Weatherford said this is the fourth time the Bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans. The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations throughout Texas. The one serving this area is the Federal Land Bank Association of Brownwood. W. E. Bursleson is the Manager and the other officers and directors are: Joe Weedon, President, Grosvenor; Gail Dudley, Vice President, Comanche; A. M. Porter, Director, Blanket; W. C. Korean Missionaries To Be Guests At Brotherhood Ladies Night Dec. 20

Rev. and Mrs. Don C. Jones, Southern Baptist Missionaries to Korea, will be guests of the Goldthwaite Baptist Brotherhood for a ladies night meeting next Thursday, December 20.

The dinner meeting will be held at 7 p. m. in the banquet room of the church, brotherhood officials announced this week.

Theme for this month's meeting is "Missions." Reservations for the dinner are to be made at the church office with R. T. Ratliff not later than Wednesday, December 19.

Rev. Jones will be guest speaker.

Rev. and Mrs. Jones are former residents of Goldthwaite. He served as assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church here during the early 1950's. They have a son, Preston Don, and are now in the States on furlough.

When Don C. Jones left Korea in 1948 after an 18-month tour of duty with the U. S. Army, a Korean friend predicted, "You will be back." The prediction came true in 1957, when Mr. Jones went to Korea as a Southern Baptist missionary.

They were appointed by the Foreign Mission Board in 1956, they studied Korean language at Yale University, New Haven, Conn., before going overseas, then continued to study in Taejon.

His first assignment after initial language study was teaching in the Korea Baptist Theological Seminary, in Taejon. Then for more than two years he was treasurer of the Korea Baptist Mission (organization of Southern Baptist missionaries), with headquarters in Seoul. He also assisted in evangelistic work and church development in the Taejon and Seoul areas and served as assistant pastor of Seoul Memorial Baptist Church, evangelism chairman of the Korea Mission, and member of various Mission committees.

After his current furlough in the States he expects to become co-ordinator of church development and assist Korean pastors in church administration. Mr. Jones received the bachelor of arts degree from Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and the bachelor of divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. Before mission appointment he was pastor of First Baptist Church, Strawn, Texas, and Pompey Mountain Baptist Church in Mills County, assistant pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, and a summer worker for the Texas Baptist music department.

Mrs. Jones is a director of the Baptist publication department in Seoul, Korea. She supervises the translating, editing, and printing of Sunday school quarterlies, tracts and pamphlets, textbooks for theological students, and study course books for church members. In 1961, her first year in publication work, the department printed more than 200,000 pieces of literature. She also directs the choir at Seoul Memorial Baptist Church, where her husband is assistant pastor. They moved to Seoul late in 1959 so that he might become treasurer of the Korea Baptist Mission (organization of Southern Baptist missionaries). Previously they taught in the Korea Baptist Theological Seminary, in Taejon.

Christmas Tree Fire Safety Tips

More than 50 million American families in the next few days will be buying Christmas trees and decorating them for the holiday season.

Unless care is taken, this happy symbol of the holiday season can bring tragedy, warns the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

These suggestions are offered by the Board to keep your Christmas tree firesafe:

- 1—When you buy a Christmas tree, choose one which appears fresh. Before you buy the tree, run your hand over the needles to make sure they are firmly attached. If needles fall when brushed, the tree is dry and you should select another one.
- 2—When you get the tree home, keep it outdoors until you are ready to decorate it. You can keep it fresh by standing it in a pail of water.
- 3—You should wait until just before Christmas before setting up the tree.
- 4—You should place the tree in the coolest part of the room, away from radiators, heaters and the fireplace. This will keep the tree from drying, and reduce the chance of fire.
- 5—Your Christmas tree stand should be of the type equipped with a water container in which the trunk can rest. Fresh trees will "drink" a sizeable amount of water, and you should fill the water container daily.
- 6—Only flameproof decorations should be used on the tree—those made of glass, metal or fire-resistant material.
- 7—Use only electric lights to illuminate the tree and be sure to check light strings before placing them on the branches. Those with frayed wires should be thrown away. If you buy a new set, select a type that bears the Underwriters' Laboratories label.
- 8—The switch controlling the tree lights should be some distance from the tree.
- 9—Electric trains—part of Christmas in many homes—should be set up away from the tree. Sparks from toy trains could be fire hazards.
- 10—Lights on Christmas trees always should be turned off when everyone is away from home.
- 11—Check the tree frequently for dryness. In particular, check tree needles near lights. If they have started to turn brittle, change the position of the lights.
- 12—When needles become so dry they start falling, take the tree down at once and put it outdoors.
- 13—When Christmas presents are opened, the gift wrappings you intend to keep should be folded and put away. Other paper, ribbon and boxes should be gathered up and thrown away promptly.
- 14—Even if the tree still appears to be fresh, take it down the day after New Year's.

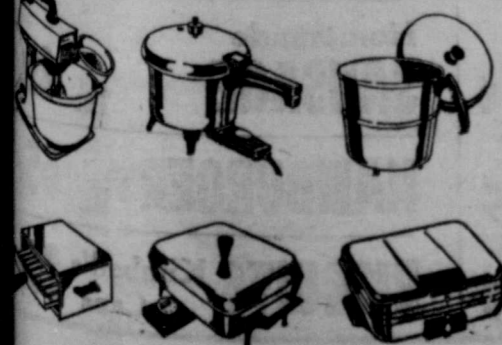

Then, should the pooch hang up on barbed wire, brush, or other impediment, he can, if necessary, slip out of his collar and escape strangulation.

Coat Hunting Knife Discs

Leather discs on hunting knives are apt to work loose with hard usage.

Should this happen to your knife, apply a coating of waterproof boot dressing at once. Dressing tightens loose discs and makes leather handle forever resistant to sweat and water.

Tip For Reload

Today, more and more gun enthusiasts, hunters, and trapshooters are loading and re-

loading their own ammunition. Some even cast their own rifle bullets.

If you are one of the latter breed, you no doubt have had trouble with impurities in your lead. To prevent this, put a small piece of pure beeswax in the melting pot.

Wax causes impurities to rise to the top where they can be easily removed.

Don't Overfeed Hunting Dog

A hunting dog whose ribs are showing like corrugations on a washboard is not being abused. He is being kept in tip-top hunting form.

Overfeeding a dog can cause shortwindedness, fatigue, even heart failure in the field.

Never overfeed your dog. He, of course, takes more food during hunting season than he does at other times because he burns up more. But watch his ribs.

When his ribs start to smooth over with flesh, cut down on his food.

Stop Dog's Barking

A barking dog—especially at night—is an abomination to neighbor and master alike.

Prevent your dog from annoying neighbors and keeping your own household awake by using a simple trick.

Attach a lawn hose to your dog's pen, the nozzle set for a wide spray. Whenever dog starts barking, turn on the water so he will be sprayed. Usually a few treatments will be enough.

But be sure he doesn't see you do it.

New Type Target

You probably have used every type of gun target in your search for novelty.

Here's how to make a new kind of target for practice shooting.

Draw a bullseye on an old window shade, then mount roller and shade onto two stakes equipped with brackets. Pull down shade and, start shooting.

Bullet holes can be patched with tape.

Remove Rust From Gun

After each trip in the field—especially after hunting over water—you will notice small pits of rust on your gun barrel. These are caused by sweat and other moisture.

If attended to at once, these pits can be removed by an ordinary typewriter eraser. Such an eraser won't damage gun bluing as steel wool or sandpaper will.

When gun is badly rusted, soak well with rust solvent before using eraser.

HUNTING DEATHS

Cecil Reid of the Sportsmen's
Clubs of Texas urges hunters to
put a stop to a tragic string of
hunting deaths and injuries by
practicing caution in the field.

He cites three recent deaths
where hunters were mistaken for
game and killed.
Reid said no hunter should
allow himself to shoot at any-
thing which he has not identi-
fied fully as game.

He urges hunters to request

passage of legislation such as
the "careless and reckless hunt-

COURT OVERRULES

RAILROAD COMMISSION

Texas Supreme Court has
negated an order of the Rail-
road Commission and revoked a
specialized motor carrier permit
to transport road building ma-
terials granted Lively Trucking
Contractors.

Decision to vacate the com-
mission's order was made on the
basis that findings on which
the permit was based were in-
sufficient.

In a concurring opinion, Asso-
ciate Justice Joe Greenhill criti-
cized the Railroad Commis-
sion's use of a printed form of
"Standard" finding-of-facts on
which an order is based; filling
in date, names and authority.
He called this "a lack of pro-
cedural due process of law."

BRACERO CALLS DOWN

Texas cotton farmers reacted
to a U. S. Department of Labor
wage standard of 70-cents an
hour, for braceros hired to chop
cotton, by resorting to almost
exclusive machine harvesting.

While 45,000 Mexican contract
laborers were hired in August of
1961, only 15,000 were used in
August this year, and they also
harvested vegetables and grain.

Enrollment Up

Number of students attending
local state-supported junior col-
leges increased 15.3 per cent
over the past year to reach a
total of 42,991 on October 15.
Thirty-six of the 37 colleges

showed an increase in enroll-
ment.

But Lee College at Baytown
showed a decrease of 7.6 per
cent. It's estimated that some
former Lee students now are
attending San Jacinto College
in nearby Pasadena, where en-
rollment boomed by 59.5 per
cent.

State Board of Education
voted to appoint a commission
to study criteria for the estab-
lishment of new junior college
districts.

Land Inventory

State school land and mineral
ownership is being inventoried.
Land Commissioner Jerry
Sadler reveals that close exam-
ination of over 153,000 separate
files is half completed.

He reports that during 1874-
1951, school lands were sold
under dozens of different stat-
utes.

Sadler estimates that "a min-
eral estate of 4,000,000 acres was
reserved in these transactions."

This, with riverbeds, sub-
merged lands, the University
domain and the almost 900,000

acres held outright by the state,
create the 22,000,000-acre total
endowment for public educa-
tion.

ST. LOUIS, Texas — Twenty changes in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on Taxation and Local Tax Policy. The changes would result in some revenue and some mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative-and-take would provide an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected

to bring \$170,000,000 into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jap S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income—if recommendations are adopted—would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicle sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all cloth-

ing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year.

2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.

3. Exempt sales made to state banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.

4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.

5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from exempt items.

ELECTION CHANGES

The Election Law Study Committee released a 221-page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.

Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of scratching those opposed.

2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.

3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.

4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers, magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.

5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.

6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

DEBT INCREASED

State Treasurer Jesse James reports that the deficit in the General Revenue Fund increased by \$6,000,000 between November 11 and November 23, when it was \$34,146,666.

GUARDSMEN WAIT

Waiting for approval of armories under the federal-state building program are 32 units of the Texas National Guard.

Federal government, which underwrites 75 per cent of the cost of each armory, is approving construction at the average rate of six per year, but there is no priority arrangement.

So far, 11 armories have been built under the program, according to Harry B. Kelton, director of the Texas National Guard Armory Board.

Eight are under construction at Bonham, Seguin, Dallas, Mexia, Kerens, Mission, Mercedes and Harlingen. Units at Brownwood, Tulla and Fredericksburg have approval for construction.

On the waiting list are units

in El Paso, Clipper, Canyon Belton, Olney, Houston, Electra, Winnsboro, Galveston, Paris, Taylor, Kingsville, Austin, Port Neches, Gatesville, Alice, Huntsville, Borger, Pecos, Monahans, San Antonio, Sulphur Springs, Grand Prairie and New Boston.

RUNS AT STANDSTILL

The "run rate" at Gatesville State School for Boys has been reduced to zero since September 4, when the new \$2,000,000 Mountain View School for serious offenders was opened.

School was dedicated last Saturday in a public ceremony featuring an address by Gov. Price Daniel.

Weldon Brewer of the Texas Youth Council said the "run rate" has been cut down gradually over the past five years.

In 1958-59, when the average monthly population at Gatesville was 1,115 boys, there was a monthly average of 51 escapes. In 1959-60, with 1,197 boys, there were 44 escapes a month. In 1960-61, with 1,364 boys, there were 31 escapes. In 1961-62, there were 1,502 boys

with only 24 escapes.

Since the 200-plus inmates most likely to run were moved into the double-fenced Mountain View campus, there have been no escapes.

"A walled home may seem cruel to some people," Brewer remarked, "But it's a very humane arrangement when you realize that the boys within are

able to take part in a training program and group recreation." had to be confined to a small room.

Before the new school was opened, the boys who broke out Guards on Gatesville's 40 acres do not carry guns.
