New Year's Holiday Tuesday

Tuesday, January 1, will be observed as a holiday by Goldthwaite business firms with establishments being closed for the day.
New Year's Day is one of the holidays approved by the retail commission to be observed by closing. The post office will be on a holiday schedule with no window service and no rural route deliveries. All regular mail deliveries will be taken care of.

Aliens Must Register Soon

W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the Goldthwaite area will be required to report their addresses to the nearest General within the next few days.
All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are exempt from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomatic; (2) Persons accredited to international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers.
Forms with which to make report can be obtained from the Post Office or Immigration Service during the month of January.
J. W. Holland said the Service provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

Next Monday Is Deadline For Mills County Stock Show Entries

Entries for the 25th annual Mills County stock show must be in by Monday, December 31, according to R. L. Steen, president of the Mills County Livestock Breeders' Association.
The show is sponsored by the association and will be held on Friday and Saturday, January 11 and 12, 1963, at the show barns in Goldthwaite.
New catalogs, advertising the 1963 show and giving more detailed information with program for the two day event, are now being distributed. The new catalogs can be secured from officers of the association and from the county agent and Ag teachers of the county.
Entry cards have been distributed to the county agent and vocational agriculture teachers in Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy. All 4-H and FFA members are asked to get their entry cards filled out and turned in as early as possible.
Entry cards are also available through Mr. Steen at Steen Hardware for breeders and club members.

HORSE SHOW NEW THIS YEAR

A new addition to the annual Mills County Livestock Show this year is the horse show.
It will be a Junior Halter Show with two classes, covering all breeds, Colts foaled in 1961 and Colts foaled in 1962. There will be ribbon awards for the first five places in each class.
Jesse Moreland, horse superintendent, stated that there have been a number of inquiries about the horse show. He reminds all those who are interested that the deadline for entries is the same as for the other divisions of the show, next Monday, December 31.
The Horse show is open to all 4-H and FFA club members. Entries for the horse show may be made by contacting County Agent, George Reese, Jesse Moreland, James Green or Bob Steen.
Don Smith of Talpa, Texas will judge the horses when the show opens on Friday morning, January 11, at 9 o'clock.

So far for the month of December 1.07 inches has been recorded here.

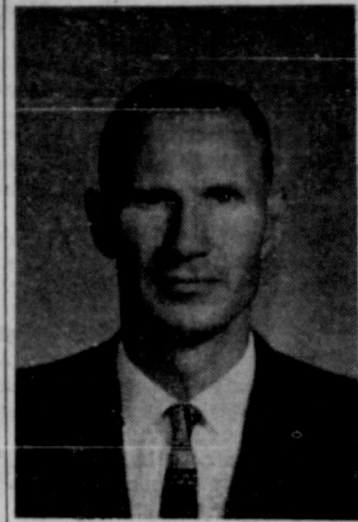
Goldthwaite Exes Defeat Mullin In Basketball Overtime

Dr. Childress And Dr. Cruzcosa Announce Formation Of Partnership

Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. C. G. Cruzcosa this week announce the formation of a partnership in Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic and Hospital in Goldthwaite.

Dr. Childress has been owner of the clinic and hospital since it was built and he moved his clinic into new quarters and opened the hospital in 1959.

Dr. Cruzcosa joined Childress Clinic and Hospital in March 1960 as a practicing physician and surgeon.

The partnership is effective January 1, 1963, according to official announcement appearing in this issue of the paper.

Construction of Childress Clinic and Hospital was completed in April 1959, after years of planning by Dr. M. A. Childress, who came to Goldthwaite in 1948. He had been a physician at the Veterans Hospital in Waco before moving here. The year following his arrival here he started making plans for a new clinic and hospital. Preliminary sketches of proposed clinic and hospital were on display for about five years before actual plans and specifications started to take shape and construction got underway in late 1958.

Dr. Childress announced opening of the new hospital on April 9, 1959 after moving his clinic from old location into the new building. Formal opening was held on Sunday, May 3, 1959.

In May 1960, plans were announced for a new wing to be added to the hospital. Contract for the new addition was let in June 1960 and construction was completed in January 1961.

The new addition more than doubled facilities for patient care.

Dr. Cruzcosa joined the hospital after working as surgical preceptee in Wichita Falls, Texas for two years. Before that he had four years of accredited surgical residency, with his senior surgical residency at Good Samaritan Hospital, Cincinnati, Ohio.

In October of this year Dr. Cruzcosa attended the annual meeting of the American College of Surgeons in Atlantic City. While there the College conferred him full pledged membership as a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

He made all-district for the past three years and was the only unanimous choice for all-district the past two years.

The Standard-Times in announcing their All West Texas team has this to say of the Eagle halfback: "Benningfield, the only unanimous choice for 9-A all-district, should also receive the Purple Heart after breaking his collar bone twice. In the first six games for Goldthwaite he scored 98 points and

rushed 1,024 yards before the first injury. He returned in the last game, carried six times, scored 8 points and then injury No. 2 came."

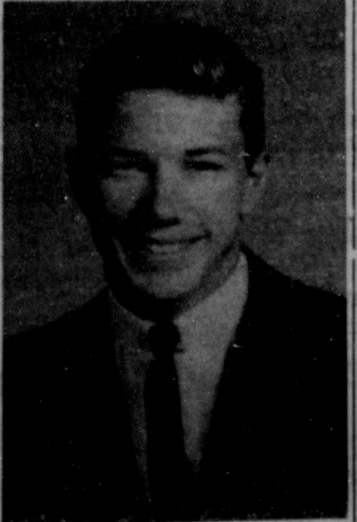

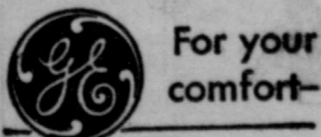
