Bank Deposits In Mills County Higher Than A Year Ago

Bank deposits in Mills County are higher than they were a year ago, according to official reports, in this issue, of the county State Bank, Goldthwaite and Farmers and Merchants Bank at Priddy.

Deposits at Farmers and Merchants Bank are \$378,852.17. A year ago deposits were \$354,-

932.86, showing a nice increase for the year.

Mills County State Bank deposits are \$4,802,062.28. A year ago deposits in Goldthwaite were \$4,065,008.45, reflecting nearly three quarter million dollar increase for the year.

Loans and discounts are up over a year ago for both institutions. Farmers and Merchants Bank has loans and discounts of \$249,291.04 while a year ago they were \$242,843.34.

Mills County State Bank has loans and discounts amounting to \$2,574,990.40 while a year ago they were \$2,244,346.08.

Total resources of Farmers and Merchants Bank are \$429,-

380.74. Mills County State Bank has total resources of \$5,360,-

525.51.

Mrs. Jernigan Instructs Mullin Group On Red Cross First Aid

Sponsored by the Mullin Community Organization, a very successful Red Cross First Aid course has been completed at Mullin.

The course was taught by Mrs. Luther Jernigan of Goldthwaite. Classes were held in the Mullin Community Center each Monday night.

Mrs. Jernigan prefaced the course with a lecture on the importance of first aid in our responsibilities to ourselves, our families, and our neighbors, and gave some personal experiences where first aid proved valuable.

During the first hour of each two-hour class period, Mrs. Jernigan explained first aid treatment which should be given for the different accidents that might occur in the home, on the highway, or on the job. The second hour was spent in questions and answers or practicing such things as bandaging, artificial respiration, or moving injured victims.

The final class period was held in the instructor's home where, as a test over the course, each student was given a problem in which he might actually

be called upon to render first aid.

Following the test period, refreshments were served by Mrs. Jernigan, and the class members presented her with a gift in appreciation of her services.

The people of the Community Improvement Organization feel that they are indeed fortunate to have had a course like this, for they believe that better informed people make better prepared people.

Members of the class agreed that the course had been enjoyable as well as educational. They also agreed that they were much more safety conscious after taking the course.

Mrs. Jernigan encouraged the group all through the course with this philosophy, "Let's prepare ourselves and if the necessity arises, we will be ready."

The fate of Mills County Park, in Goldthwaite, was discussed by members of the Park Board in a session last Friday morning.

W. P. Duren, chairman, presided over the meeting. Other members attending were Charles Conradt, Harold Yarbrough, and Lewis Hudson. City Manager W. C. Barnett also was present.

It was pointed out that the park fund has accumulated a deficit of approximately \$600. This amount has been advanced by the city for caretaker's pay during the past year.

It was agreed that concerted effort should be made to raise these funds in the near future or discontinue maintenance.

Board members are making plans for a renewed effort to enlist support from interested parties all over the county to finance the park maintenance.

From all indications it all boils down to this. If the people of Goldthwaite and Mills County want a nice park they will have to give their financial support to keep it up. Otherwise there can be no park.

Council Meets Monday Night

The City Council met in regular session Monday night at the city hall.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments and quarterly treasurer's report, were presented to the council by City Manager, W. C. Barnett.

The council heard report on proposed paint job on the swimming pool.

Estimates were checked and plans discussed for proposed storage shed to be constructed near other warehouse on city property on the old Priddy road.

The council voted to proceed with the building project and construct the 30 ft. by 60 ft. steel storage shed for city equipment. Plans also call for a fence with proper gates across front of property.

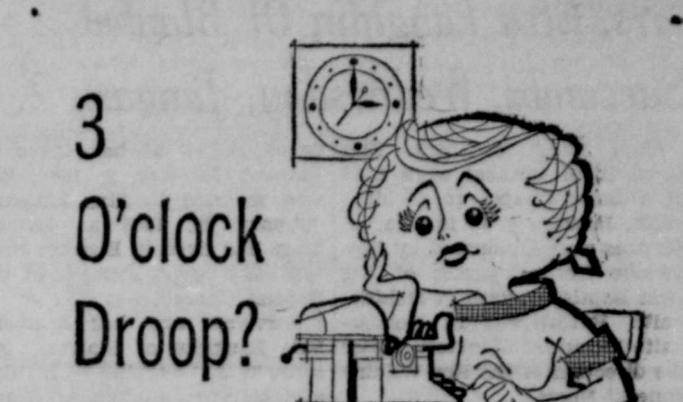

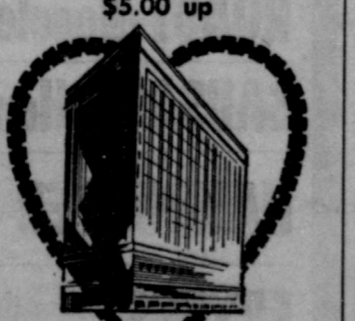

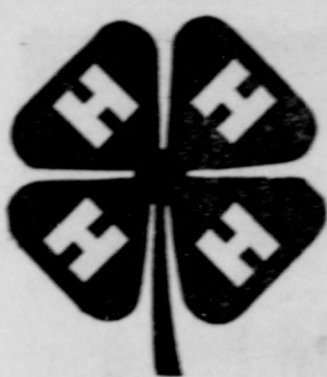

Screwworm Eradication Fund Drive Gets Boost From Auction Markets

An urgent "\$-0-\$" distress call is being sent out to farmers and ranchers of Texas during January by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and supporting livestock organizations.

It's an all-out emergency appeal for \$1 million in producer contributions to meet the under-subscribed \$3 million SWAHRF goal required to continue the effective program now in progress to eradicate the costly screwworm from Texas and the Southwest, according to C. G. Scruggs of Dallas, Foundation president.

One of the highlights of the big January fund-raising drive will be "\$-0-\$ Week in Texas" sponsored by the livestock auction market industry during a whirlwind six-day statewide campaign—January 21-28.

IN GOLDTHWAITE

The Mills County program, and sale, will be held at the Mills County Commission Company, in Goldthwaite, on Friday, January 25.

All Mills County livestock producers are requested to set aside one or more animals to be sold with proceeds set aside for this stockmen's most worthy cause.

There will be no commission charged for the sale of these designated animals.

"Operation of the screwworm eradication program is reaching a very critical stage in its financing," declares J. R. Taylor of Amarillo, president of Texas Livestock Auction Assn., "and it is hoped that our '\$-0-\$ Week in Texas' may result in raising substantial funds to materially aid and assist the Foundation, which represents livestock producers of Texas and the Southwest."

During the week January 21-28, Texas livestock auction markets will stage sale events and expend special efforts in soliciting and receiving contributions to SWAHRF from thousands of producers in their respective areas.

The screwworm eradication program—projected to cost a total of \$12 million over a period of three years—is a joint operation of the Foundation, Texas Animal Health Commission

and the Animal Disease Eradication Division, USDA. Under terms of a memorandum signed by those groups costs were specified on a 50-50 matching basis. The USDA is providing half and the Foundation and five Southwestern states—Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico—must furnish the other 50 per cent of the required funds.

Texas Animal Health Commission, with support of state livestock producers, will request the Texas legislature to appropriate additional funds to assist in the campaign to eradicate the screwworm and to establish a barrier zone.

It has been projected by SWAHRF leaders that the barrier of sterile flies along the international border will be in full operation, weather permitting, by February 15. Outer half of the barrier will receive 600 flies per square mile per week, and the inner half, 400 sterile flies per square mile. Estimated size of the barrier is 100,000 square miles which will require 50 million flies per week until July 1, 1963.

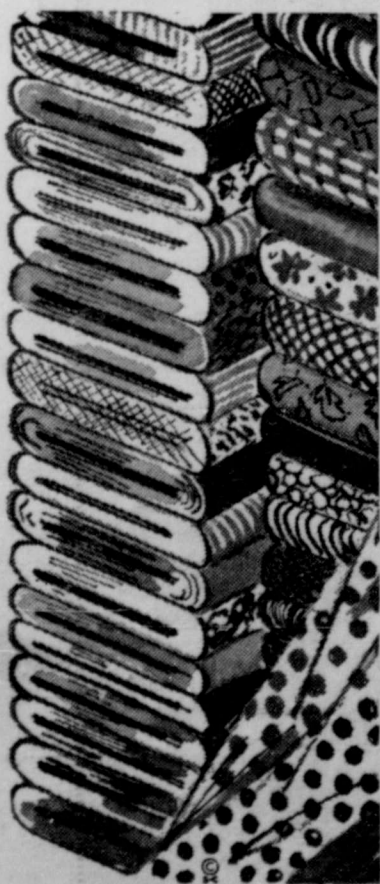
