## Screwworm Eradication Fund Drive Gets Boost From Auction Markets

An urgent "\$-0-\$" distress call is being sent out to farmers and ranchers of Texas during January by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and supporting livestock organizations.

It's an all-out emergency appeal for \$1 million in producer contributions to meet the under-subscribed \$3 million SWAHRF goal required to continue the effective program now in progress to eradicate the costly screwworm from Texas and the Southwest, according to C. G. Scruggs of Dallas, Foundation president.

One of the highlights of the big January fund-raising drive will be "\$-0-\$ Week in Texas" sponsored by the livestock auction market industry during a whirlwind six-day statewide campaign—January 21-26.

**IN GOLDTHWAITE**  
The Mills County program, and sale, will be held at the Mills County Commission Company, in Goldthwaite, on Friday, January 25.

All Mills County livestock producers are requested to set aside one or more animals to be sold with proceeds set aside for this stockmen's most worthy cause.

There will be no commission charged for the sale of these designated animals.

"Operation of the screwworm eradication program is reaching a very critical stage in its financing," declares J. R. Taylor of Amarillo, president of Texas Livestock Auction Assn., "and it is hoped that our '\$-0-\$ Week in Texas' may result in raising substantial funds to materially aid and assist the Foundation, which represents livestock producers of Texas and the Southwest."

During the week January 21-26, Texas livestock auction markets will stage sale events and expend special efforts in soliciting and receiving contributions to SWAHRF from thousands of producers in their respective areas.

The screwworm eradication program—projected to cost a total of \$12 million over a period of three years—is a joint operation of the Foundation, Texas Animal Health Commission and the Animal Disease Eradication Division, USDA.

Under terms of a memorandum signed by those groups costs were specified on a 50-50 matching basis. The USDA is providing half and the Foundation and five Southwestern states—Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico—must furnish the other 50 per cent of the required funds.

Texas Animal Health Commission, with support of state livestock producers, will request the Texas legislature to appropriate additional funds to assist in the campaign to eradicate the screwworm and to establish a barrier zone.

It has been projected by SWAHRF leaders that the barrier of sterile flies along the international border will be in full operation, weather permitting, by February 15. Outer half of the barrier will receive 600 flies per square mile per week, and the inner half, 400 sterile flies per square mile. Estimated size of the barrier is 100,000 square miles which will require 50 million flies per week until July 1, 1963.

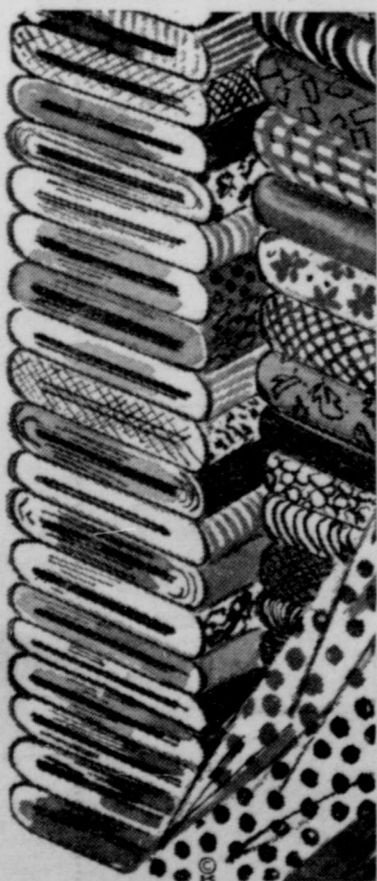

## Livestock Auction Markets To Combat Screwworms This Month

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program is in dire financial straits. L. B. Burnham, county animal health chairman, has announced and suggests that a good way to prevent the program from having to be stopped because of lack of funds is by supporting the special effort being conducted by the Texas Livestock Auction Association and its members this month.

Burnham said that the Southwest Animal Research Foundation, which represents the livestock producers and sportsmen of the Southwest, announced recently that unless the remaining one million dollars toward a three million dollar goal is collected by March 31, the eradication program may have to be stopped.

The Mills County Commission Company of Goldthwaite is one of the nearly 175 livestock auction markets from throughout the state that will help collect for the program during January. The period of January 21-26 has been designated as "S-O-S" or "Stamp-Out-Screwworms Week" in Texas. During this time many of the livestock auctions will donate part of their commissions from sales to the program. The markets are also assisting in collecting funds from individual farmers and ranchers on the basis of fifty cents per animal unit. The local market will have its sale on January 25.

Burnham commended the livestock auction markets who are participating in this special effort. He recommended that livestock producers should give their support to the auctions during this month since this is an excellent way of raising the funds required to wipe out the screwworm menace in the Southwest. The screwworm costs the southwestern livestock industry an estimated \$100 annually. Burnham pointed out.

### Reminder Issued On School Census

Residents of Mills County are reminded by ex-officio County School Supt. Cecil Egger that January 31, is the last day on which children of scholastic age should be enrolled in the regular school census, of their respective school district.

Any child who will be six, or under 18, years of age on September 1, 1963, should be enrolled.

## Registration Open For Type III Oral Polio Vaccine

Registration will be conducted for the next two weeks for those who want to take the Type III Polio Vaccine, it was announced this week by Dr. C. G. Cruzcoca.

The Department of Health recently issued a report stating that Type III oral polio (Sabin) is safe for persons below the age of 30.

It further encourages those in the below 30 years of age category to take the vaccine.

Crippling type of polio is caused by three types of polio virus, (Type I, II and III). Not taking type III, therefore, will make a person's immunization incomplete, according to the report.

Hospital officials do not know how many persons will want to take type III polio vaccine. Therefore the registration is being conducted. Interested persons may register at Mills County State Bank, Hudson Drug Store, Woody Drug Store and Childress & Cruzcoca Clinic.

Registration will close on Thursday, January 31.
