Central Texas Telephone Co-op Buys Evant Telephone Company

Central Texas Telephone Co-operative, Inc., has purchased the Evant Telephone Company, was announced this week by C. Sweeney, manager of the co-op, at the company headquarters in Goldthwaite.

The Evant property was acquired from H. Y. Price, Jr., of San Marcos, Texas, with the change of ownership effective last Saturday, February 9.

The Evant exchange, with approximately 300 subscribers, is the 17th added to the Central Texas Co-op's operation. This brings the total subscribers for the Co-op to approximately 2,300.

Indian Gap Telephone Company was consolidated with the Priddy exchange last month, in a program of expansion of the Co-operative firm which serves a wide Central Texas area.

Central Texas Telephone Co-operative, Inc., started in 1954 with approximately 600 subscribers. It has shown a steady growth during the past eight years providing modern dial telephone service to the rural areas.

There will be no rural delivery service and only one hour window service for delivery of mail, from 8 to 9 a. m.

All special delivery matter will be given prompt delivery and the regular holiday schedule for receipt and dispatch of regular mail will be observed.

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Screwworm Contributions Still Coming In

Contributions to the screwworm eradication fund are continuing to come in according to report Tuesday morning by L. B. Burnham, chairman and Glynn Collier, secretary-treasurer of the Mills County Animal Health Committee.

From last Thursday until Tuesday morning \$750.50 was turned in to the treasurer. This brings the total for the county to \$16,787.28, Burnham announced.

"Mills County has the name of being outstanding in matters pertaining to livestock, and it is the hope of the committee that we will continue to live up to that good name," Burnham stated.

WHERE ARE WE NOW?

Production at the Sterile Fly Production Plant at Mission is being maintained near the 75 million flies per week mark and flies are continuing to be dispersed in the overwintering areas of Texas and New Mexico with varying rates being utilized. Sterile flies are also being released on the Mexico side of the international border as the first step toward establishing an artificial barrier of live flies. Areas within the fly release area as well as areas outside where heavy concentration of native flies have been reported are being given special treatment.

LOOKING AHEAD

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program is designed as a three-year program, costing approximately \$12 million. Livestock producers must raise the remaining \$1,000,000 toward their \$3,000,000 goal. The Federal government will provide \$6,000,000 and the Texas Legislature is being asked to appropriate \$3,000,000 to complete the program.

During forthcoming years, continued fly drop is anticipated within the overwintering area. Outbreaks outside of the release area will be treated with sterile flies as long as production and dispersal capabilities make both routine treatment and "hot spotting" possible. Insecticide sprays will also be utilized in "hot spotting".

Production will be maintained near the 75 million per week mark, with provisions being made to rear up to 100 million flies per week if deemed necessary.

Sammy Lou Rahl Named Homemaker Of Tomorrow, Goldthwaite School

Sammy Lou Rahl has been named Homemaker of Tomorrow for Goldthwaite school in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Having achieved the highest score in a knowledge and attitude test given senior girls December 4, she now is eligible, along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of state Homemaker of Tomorrow. Miss Rahl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam H. Rahl of Goldthwaite. Her FHA advisor is Mrs. Patty Johnson.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills, sponsor of the program. The runner-up receives a \$500 scholarship. The school of each state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow, accompanied by her

school advisor, also will join with other state winners in an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring. During the tour, the 1963 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and national runners-up will be named. The Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will have her scholarship raised to \$5,000, with second, third and fourth place winners being awarded scholarships of \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

Basis for selection of local and state winners is a test prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago. Personal observation and interviews are added factors in determining national winners.

The 1963 Search reached another all-time high in enrollment, with 410,446 girls in 12,964 schools participating.

The Department of Health recently issued a report stating that Type III oral is safe for persons below 30 years of age.

Your REPRESENTATIVE Reports

To The People of Mills County:

Your Representative wants to take this opportunity to thank this newspaper for again running my column on legislative activities as a public service feature. Every effort will be made by me to continue to keep informed the people of the 65th District as to the legislation pending before the 58th

Session of the Texas Legislature.

The first several weeks of any session of the Legislature are principally spent in public hearings on pending legislation by the various committees. Having observed the legislature in action for the past 10 years, it is my opinion that this session is off to a very fast start. I hopefully predict that no special session will have to be called.

I have introduced the following bills and resolutions in the House of Representatives:

H. J. R. Number 2 would submit a Constitutional Amendment to the people of Texas to provide for the election of the Speaker of the House during the last week of any regular session. It is my feeling that the members who have had the experience of serving are in the best position to select the most qualified member to be Speaker.

House Bill 31 changes the Texas Motor Carrier Act to broaden its coverage. This is a technical bill which will benefit the public and truckers.

House Bill 141 is one of the three major bills being sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau. It regulates the operation of disposal plants or rendering plants so as to maintain minimum health standards.

House Bill 142 is a bill to make it unlawful for persons to hunt game on the railroad right-of-way without the permission of the land owners. This bill would have passed the legislature last session if time had not run out and was suggested by interested Burnet County citizens.

House Bill 276 will provide State financing for Driver Education courses in Texas public schools. The bill is of a permissive nature; many schools now offer such a course, but it must be financed through local funds. If passed, the State will pay 80% of the program in those school districts that participate.

House Bill 401 provides minimum safety standards governing the transportation of migrant agricultural workers so as to protect the migrant and the general public. This measure passed the House last session.

House Bill 435 reinstates the "accepted work doctrine" as it has been known in Texas for over 100 years.

Austin, Texas — Lawyers are wondering if the Texas Senate really passed a constitutional amendment resolution proposing that the voters give women equal rights.

Records show that this resolution passed the Senate 26-5. But it also shows that the Senate voted down an amendment which would have made it clear that the purpose of the proposal was to repeal all laws on the statute books which treat women differently from men.

When courts interpret the laws and the constitution, legislative intent is what they must determine. Records show that the legislative intent of the Senate was not to repeal all the discriminatory laws about women.

This proposal, by Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan, has been defeated in the Senate many times before.

It now goes to the House of Representatives, which has passed it many times before.

TEXAS SELLS ITSELF

Legislators' proposals to add such slogans as "Lone Star State" and "Texas Has Everything" to auto license plates haven't found favor with Dewitt Greer, chief engineer for the State Highway Department.

"T-E-X-A-S is the only slogan this state needs," Greer told the House Appropriations Committee. He added that more wording on car tags just means additional expense.

Supersonic Training Flights Over Mills County To Start Next Monday

OFFUTT AFB, Neb., (Spec.)—Supersonic training flights by Strategic Air Command B-58 Hustler bombers will start February 18 along a corridor from Matagorda Island, Texas, to near Brownwood, Texas.

Radar bomb scoring equipment at permanent sites on Matagorda Island and at the Army Nike site at Bergstrom AFB, near Austin, will score the accuracy of the simulated bomb drops by radio and radar signals.

The B-58 bombers will be flying at supersonic speeds up to Mach 2 (1,300 m. p. h.) at altitudes above 35,000 feet en route to the target area. They will be flying along a near straight-line 40-mile-wide training corridor.

Goldthwaite will be in the area covered by these flights.

The B-58 bombers may travel

both directions along the route. No bombs are carried by the SAC aircraft on these training missions which are scheduled to continue along the route until March 31. After the corridor and targets have been used for this length of time, crews in the training cycle normally become familiar with the landmarks, simulated target complexes and other identifying characteristics of the area to the point that the route no longer offers realistic training benefits.

One of the features of the B-58, the free world's fastest bomber, is its ability to sustain supersonic speed over substantial distances while approaching and leaving its target. This capability enhances crew survival and assures a higher probability of mission success despite strong enemy defensive measures normally expected over a target.

A costly supersonic bomber is of little value in combat if the crew cannot use its full capabilities because of inadequate prior training. Consequently, these aircraft must fly at high speeds, creating sonic booms along the routes. Because of the high altitudes, the booms are comparatively weak in strength. Although sometimes startling or distracting in their suddenness, the booms will in no circumstances cause personal injury.

All target and route selections are coordinated in advance with the Federal Aviation Agency. Heavily populated areas and areas of heaviest air traffic are avoided when possible.



Advance Payments Are Offered In 1963 Feed Grain Program

Producers who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive payments for diverting acreage from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. Part of the estimated payment to be earned for such diversion may be paid in advance when the producer signs up to participate. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price-support payment will be made next summer.

The Chairman said that this program provision should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra ready cash during the spring planting season. Sign up for the program runs from February 1 through March 22.

Besides the payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved commodities, the feed grain program offers price-support payments on normal production of feed grain planted to last month 1963.
