## Eaglettes Lose Bi-District Game To Baird 60 - 40

The Goldthwaite High School Eaglettes lost to the Baird Lassies by a score of 60 to 40 in the bi-district basketball game Tuesday night in Brownwood before a record crowd of boosters.

Goldthwaite girls won the district 9-A basketball championship for 1963 and Baird was the top team in district 10-A.

The game started off with Baird in possession of the ball. Goldthwaite took over seconds later and started a scoring lead they kept until the final seconds of the first quarter.

First quarter ended with a 14-14 tie. By half time Baird was leading 10 points with the score 33-23. During the third period Baird gained three more points with the score 45 to 32 and the game ended with Baird leading 60 to 40.

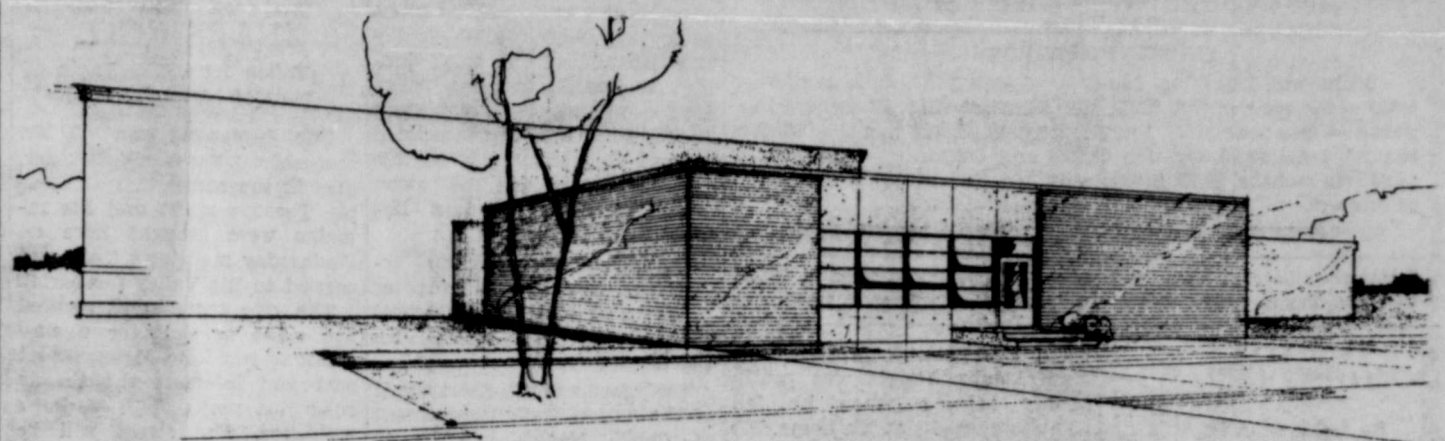

County Judge Cecil Egger announced Wednesday morning that petitions have been filed for candidates for Mullin, Star and Priddy. None had been filed Wednesday morning for the Goldthwaite school district.

Two trustees are to be elected to Mullin, Star, Priddy and Goldthwaite. Two members will be elected to the county board.

Names of candidates may be placed on the official ballot by candidate signing application, or intention, to be a candidate or by petition properly signed by five qualified voters of the respective district.

## Voters Will Be Asked To Approve Bond Issue And Tax Rate Increase

Members of the board of trustees of Goldthwaite Independent School District meeting in special session last Tuesday night accepted plans for proposed improvements and set Saturday, April 6, as the tentative date for bond election to finance the project.

A petition, requesting the school board to call the bond election, was being circulated Monday morning. About fifty signatures were placed on the document in less than two hours.

The petition will be presented to the school board at their next regular meeting Monday night, March 11, for action by that body.

Plans were presented to the board by architects after they had been approved by the Texas Education Agency as meeting requirements set forth by that agency.

The proposed improvement program would provide a vocational agriculture building, band hall, physical education building for the elementary school and new entrance and rehabilitation of dressing rooms in present gymnasium.

### BUILDINGS

The vocational agriculture building would be located about where the old high school build-

ing now stands. It would have shop, with class room and office space and contain approximately 3,200 square feet of floor space.

A band hall of approximately 2,500 square feet would be located just west of present auditorium with connected enclosed hallway between the new building and auditorium. It would provide band room to accommodate 50 students, practice rooms and uniform and instrument storage space.

Physical education facilities at the Elementary school would provide all purpose room of about 40 by 60 feet and dressing rooms and storage space. It would be located east of the north end of the elementary building which houses the school lunchroom.

The present gym entrance would be remodeled providing a 13 foot addition at the front of the gym, and modernizing the dressing rooms. (Texas Education Agency officials state that they would not approve new dressing rooms like those in Goldthwaite gym, but since they are there they have approved modernizing the below ground dressing rooms.)

### COST ESTIMATED AT \$93,000.00

School officials have announced that the cost of these improvements based on plans as presented will be an estimated \$93,000.

Qualified voters of the district will be asked to approve a tax bond issue to finance the improvements. The election has been tentatively set for Saturday, April 6. This is the same day the school trustee election will be held.

### TAX RATE INCREASE

In addition to the bond issue, school patrons will also vote on a 25 cent increase in the tax rate to retire the bond issue. This would increase the tax rate from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per \$100 valuation. The bonds would be retired over a 20 year period with this increased tax rate on present school tax roll.

The school's tax rate at present is \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation on the tax roll. Of this amount \$1.10 goes for maintenance and operation and 40 cents goes for bonded indebtedness.

The additional 25 cents per \$100 valuation would be broken down with 15 cents going for bonded indebtedness and 10 cents for maintenance and operation.

He was married to Miss Rose Sims at Killeen, December 5, 1915. They were the parents of a daughter, Robert Elizabeth Pribble, who preceded him in death.

He had lived in Mills County about 61 years. He was a former mayor of the city and had served on the school board. He

was also a member of the Royal Arch of Masonic Lodge and of the First Baptist Church and had been a deacon since 1918. He had recently retired after operating a produce business here for about 50 years.

## \$1,321.56 Contributed Last Week To Screwworm Fly Eradication Fund

Mills County livestock producers contributed an additional \$1,321.56 to the screwworm fly eradication fund during the past week, it was announced Tuesday by officials of the Mills County Animal Health committee.

This brings the total for Mills County to \$21,789.55, towards a goal of \$24,000.

Officials and committee workers from the various sections of the county are continuing with their efforts to reach the goal.

### INSPECTORS HAVE VITAL ROLE

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's screwworm livestock inspectors are vitally concerned with keeping in close contact with individual farmers and ranchers so as to stay completely informed on the screwworm situation in Mills County.

Jerry L. Morris of Goldthwaite, who serves this county, is one of the 21 inspectors assigned to the southern half of Texas. Besides Mills County, he also serves Coleman, Brown, Comanche and Hamilton Counties.

## Feed Grain Program Signup Is Reported

As of February 25, 1963, 45 farms in Mills County had been signed up for participation in the 1963 feed grain program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. County Farms eligible to be included in the program total 470. "Eligible" farms are those which grew one or more of the three feed grains—corn, grain sorghum, or barley—during the program's base years 1959 and 1960.

Feed grain acreage signed up for diversion through the program now totals 1,009 acres, including 194 acres of corn, 791 acres of grain sorghum, and 24 acres of barley. Feed grain base acreages of these participating farms amount to 1,567 acres.

Based upon farmers' intentions, as recorded at the ASCS County Office, these producers will earn an estimated \$11,150 for participating in the feed grain program this year.

The Chairman points out that the 1963 feed grain program offers farmers an opportunity to continue the progress chalked up during the past 2 years in balancing supplies with estimated needs. At the same time, the program payments give participants a substantial return from their acreage in which they usually have a heavy investment.

Under the program, a grower who reduces his feed grain acreage (of corn, grain sorghum, or barley) by at least 20 per cent of his farm's total base acreage (1959-60 average) will earn a diversion payment—for shifting the acreage from production to a conserving use, and a price-support payment—on the normal production of the 1963 feed grain planted acreage. He will also qualify for regular price-support loans and purchase agreements on all the corn, grain sorghum, and barley produced on the farm's 1963 planted acreage.

To farmers interested in taking part in the program, Mr. Burkett says: "Be sure to sign up soon. Right now, we can take care of producers without undue delay, but the later you wait, the more crowded the county office is likely to be." The signup period extends through March 22.

George Reese urges livestock producers to write down or remember the name of the local inspector and contact him immediately if a screwworm infestation is suspected. Morris's telephone number is MI 8-2649.

"The screwworm livestock inspector performs a valuable role in the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program," the county agent said. "He is here to help farmers and ranchers, but he needs their cooperation and assistance in order to effectively carry out his task."

Morris is particularly interested in talking to as many livestockmen as possible and he encourages farmers and ranchers to contact him in regard to the screwworm situation on their own premises.

"The screwworm eradication program requires the cooperation of everyone with an interest in the livestock industry," Morris said. "I am here to work with individual producers and I hope they will feel free to call on me when they suspect screwworm infestations. With the combination of sterile fly release, good management practices and prompt reporting, a screwworm-free Southwest can be a reality."

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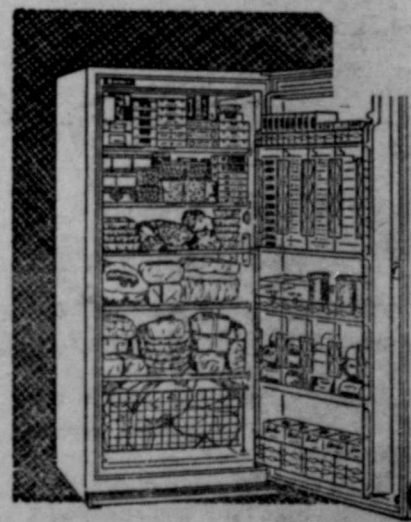
