Screwworm Fly Control Program Drive Is Still In Progress

A state-wide drive for funds to control the screwworm fly in Texas is still in progress. Officials hope to reach the required amount this month.

County Animal Health officials announced that the local organization needs to raise \$700 to complete the drive here.

A progress report issued March 15 pointed out the following:

CALL COLLECT
Following immediately where a screwworm case in the west is located has been reported to the eradication program that arrangements have been made so livestock men can call the Mission headquarters collect when an infestation is detected.

When a screwworm case is reported, officials would like producers to do two things: (1) collect about 10 worms from the wound, place them in water or alcohol and hold them for further instructions and (2) report the infestation to eradication officers by calling collect to Justice 5-1646 (Mission). No telephone call should be made unless a sample is available.

The following information should be made available at the time the call is made:
Name, address and telephone number where producer can be contacted; date when sample was collected; location of farm or ranch where case was found, and location of wound on animal.

Producers are urged to call day or night, whenever the infestation is found. At night or on weekends, the information will be relayed to eradication officials, who will contact the producer for further information and instruct him to either mail the sample or hold it to be picked up by a livestock inspector.

REPORTING CASES
Now that the weather is beginning to warm, livestock producers need to increase their vigilance in looking for possible screwworm cases. The effectiveness of the Eradication Program will depend to a large extent on producers' cooperation in reporting screwworm cases immediately.

Lometa Takes First, Eagles Place Third In Track Meet Here Tuesday

The Lometa Hornets captured first place honors at the track meet held at the Eagle football field last Tuesday with 128½ points.

Lampasas took second with 113½, followed by Goldthwaite 73, San Saba 60, Mullin 52, and Evant with 21 points.

Lometa's David Morrison was the high point single performer with 30 points.

Four new records were set for the Eagle track. Lometa's 440 yard relay started things off by breaking early's record of 47.2 by running a 46.6. Franklin Potts of Lometa shattered Tom Cody Graves' 880 yard dash record of 2:08.2 with a 2:06.4. Lancaster of Lampasas eclipsed Shaw of Lometa's 120 yard high hurdles record of 16.4 with a fine 14.7. Lometa's mile relay team rounded out the record breaking with a 3:40.9 to break record of 3:42.4. DeWayne McCasland also set a school record in the 120 yard high hurdles of 15.9. This broke his record set last year of 16.2. Scoring was based on the 10-8-6-4-2 system.

Star Juniors To Present Play Friday, March 22

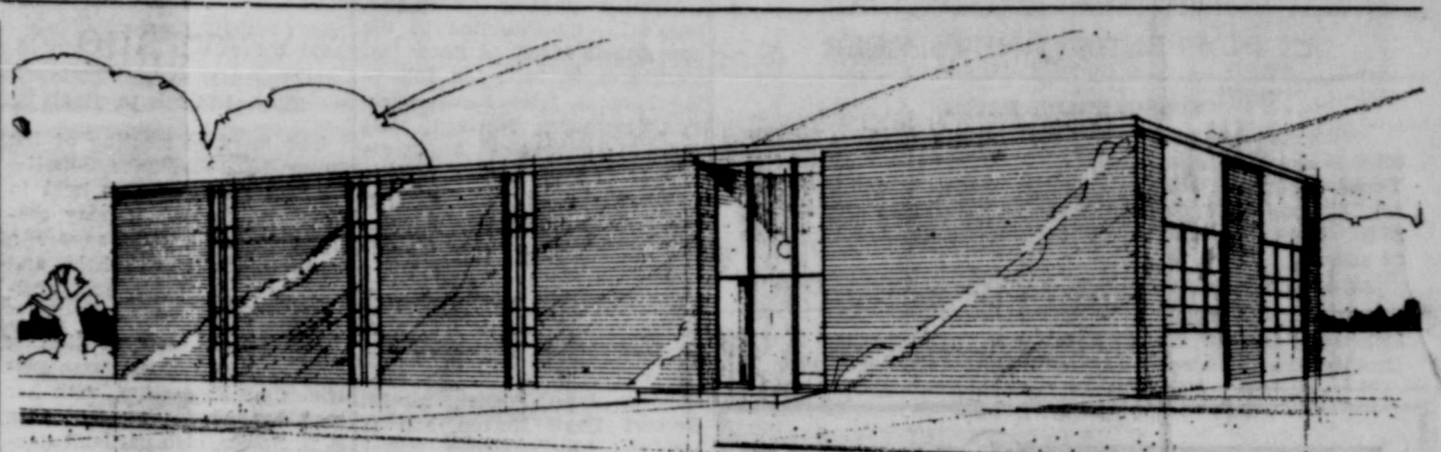
The Star Junior class will present a three act mystery-comedy, "No Where Fast," this Friday night March 22, at 8:00 o'clock, at the Star High School auditorium.

Board Orders Bond Election

The board of trustees of Goldthwaite Independent School District has ordered an election to be held on Saturday April 6, to approve \$93,000.00 bond issue to finance proposed school improvements to meet requirements recommended by Texas Education Agency.

The election was ordered by the school board after it had received a petition signed by 107 residents of the district requesting the board to call bond election.

IMPROVEMENTS

Proposed improvements in addition to the vocational agriculture building would be band hall, physical education building for the elementary school and new entrance and rehabilitation of dressing room facilities at present gymnasium.

The band hall would accommodate 50 students, provide practice room and uniform and instrument storage rooms. It would be located just west of the high school auditorium with connecting hallway.

Physical education building would be located just East of the north end of the elementary school which houses the lunchroom. It would have all purpose room of approximately 40 by 60 feet, dressing rooms and storage space.

Improvements at the gym would include new addition at front taking in space between the gym's present double entrances, providing a 13 foot ad-

Voting Eligibility On 1964 Wheat Program Outlined By ASC Chairman

Producers who have an interest in a 1964 farm wheat acreage allotment will be eligible to vote in the 1964 wheat referendum this spring, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

If the allotment is less than 15 acres, however, the farm operator will be asked to decide at least 7 days prior to the referendum—whether he wants to participate as an allotment grower in 1964. If he elects to participate, this will qualify the operator and the other wheat producers on the farm to vote in the referendum. The election will be made by signing on the back of the regular allotment notice for the farm and filling it with the ASCS County Office.

According to the Chairman, the general rule is that each person may cast only one ballot in the referendum, regardless of the number of wheat farms in which he is interested. Exceptions to this rule are: (1) Individual members of a partnership each have a vote, but the partnership as such has no vote; (2) a person may also vote as the representative of an organization, such as a corporation (which is entitled to only

ESTIMATED COST

School officials have announced that the cost of these improvements based on plans as presented will be an estimated \$93,000.

Voters of the district will be asked to approve a tax bond issue in that amount to finance the improvements.

TAX INCREASE

In addition to the bond issue school patrons will also vote on a 25 cent increase in the tax rate to retire the bonds. This would increase the tax rate from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per \$100 valuation as rendered on present tax rolls. Bonds would be retired over a 25 year period with this increase in tax rate, according to a plan presented by the board's fiscal agent. This plan has been revised from 20 to 25 years to more readily fit into the district's present bond retirement program.

The school's tax rate at present is \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation. Of this amount \$1.10 goes for maintenance and operation and 40 cents goes for bonded indebtedness.

The additional 25 cents per \$100 valuation would be broken down with 15 cents going for bonded indebtedness and 10 cents for maintenance and operation, according to school officials.

The referendum will offer wheat growers a choice between (1) limited production of wheat, a relatively high price support, and payments for wheat acreage diverted to a conservation use; or (2) no limits on production or marketings and a relatively low price support only to growers who stay within their allotments.

Tax Returns Must Be Signed

Your Federal income tax return is not complete until you have signed it, reminded Ellis Campbell, Jr. of the Internal Revenue office today. Many Federal tax returns are still being received unsigned, he said.

He added, "While we assume that failure to sign is just an oversight, we cannot accept such returns and must set them aside for special handling."

An unsigned return automatically delays any refund. On the other hand, if the taxpayer has sent in a payment for additional tax, he cannot be given credit for the payment until the return is completed.

Mr. Campbell urged taxpayers to double-check their returns for signatures before mailing. One signature for a single person; two for a married couple filing jointly. The signature should be written in the same way that the name is printed at the top of the return. Or, as he put it, "Print at the top, sign at the bottom."

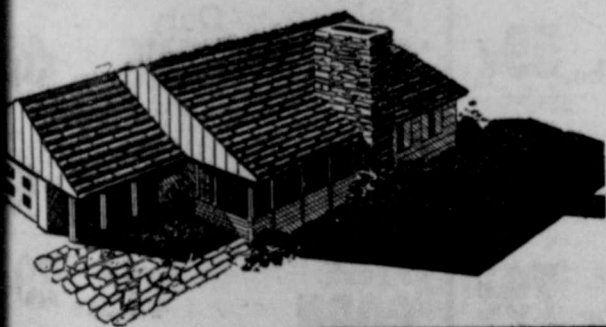

Scruggs Honored By Houston Stock Show On Record As Future Farmer

Charles G. Scruggs of Dallas, directing chief of the Southwest drive to eradicate screwworms, was saluted in February by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

The salute was on the show's annual Future Farmer Day because Scruggs was an outstanding Future Farmer.

Scruggs is editor of The Progressive Farmer, a well-known writer, speaker and leader. He ranches in both East and West Texas, producing beef cattle, Angora goats and horses.

As a high school student, he was elected president of his high school F. F. A. Chapter, state president of the Texas Assn. of Future Farmers of America and awarded the highest degree of the national organization—the American Farmer Degree.

He enlisted as a private in World War II, served as an infantry officer in Europe and is now a lieutenant colonel in the Army Reserve. After the war, he resumed work at Texas A. and M. College and was graduated in 1947 with a degree in agricultural administration.

Since elected president of the McGregor Future Farmers of America Chapter in 1939, he has held the title of president, vice-president or chairman 47 times—of agricultural groups from

local to national levels. He was the youngest man to be elected president of the Dallas Agricultural Club and the first Texan to be elected president of American Agricultural Editors' Assn. Scruggs has also received 17 major regional, state and national awards.

He is president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, the organization which spearheaded and brought about the Southwest Screw-worm Eradication Program. He also is vice-chairman of the National Brucellosis Committee, and has been invited to address two Inter-American Animal Health Congresses. He is married to the former June Wigley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fisher Wigley of Goldthwaite. They have two children.

Copies may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Travel Division, Austin. It is also available at the 25 highway district offices and eight Tourist Bureaus operated by the department. County tax offices have special cards for ordering copies of the map.

Within the year, 750,000 or more of the free maps depicting Texas delights in vivid full-color photographs will find their way to glove compartments all over the United States and the world.

Keyed to the swelling Texas tourist industry—up 14 per cent in visitor volume last year—the new travel map urges users to "Discover Texas—Today's Fun-tier." The map and its "fun-tier" theme are links in a promotional package of publications and other materials aimed at enhancing the image of Texas as a vacation paradise.

Purpose of the map is to stimulate travel in Texas by both Texans and visitors, and to make it easier for motorists to get from place to place. Scenic and cultural diversification of Texas is capsuled in a message by Governor John Connally urging prospective visitors to "visit our historical sites, vacation playgrounds, inland lakes and Gulf Coast beaches — our mountains, plains and piney woods — our cities and towns. The Texas Highway Department will be happy to provide you with any information you may need for your visit."

Eighteen full-color photographs illustrate the Governor's description of Texas' varied vacationlands. Depicting activities ranging from big-league baseball to bass fishing, the photographic cross section and easy-to-read map comprise a showpiece of the many-splendored charms of Texas.
