School Board Meets Monday Night; Election Returns Are Canvassed

The school board of Goldth-
waite Independent School Dis-
trict held its regular meeting
Monday night when election re-
turns for the school bonds, tax
increase and school trustees
were canvassed and certified.

Y. B. Johnson and Charles
Conradt were declared elected
to the board for a three year
term.

ed a \$93,000.00 bond issue and a
25 cent tax rate increase by a

margin of better than three to
one last Saturday.

A total of 608 turned out to
cast their ballots in the bond
election called to finance a
school improvement program.
The two-fold program was pre-
sented by the board of educa-
tion to provide building facili-
ties that will meet minimum
accreditation standards as set
up by the Texas Education Ag-
ency and approved by the State
Board of Education.

Official returns of the vote
are as follows:
For maintenance tax—495;
Against maintenance tax—153.
For the issuance of bonds—
498; Against the issuance of
bonds—148.

IMPROVEMENTS
The proposed improvement
program will provide a new vo-
cational agriculture building,
new band hall, physical educa-
tion building for the elemen-
tary school and new entrance
and remodeling of dressing
rooms in the gymnasium.

BUILDINGS
The vocational agriculture
building will be located where
the old high school building
now stands. It will have shop,
with class room and office
space and contain approximate-
ly 3,200 square feet of floor
space.

A band hall of approximately
2,500 square feet will be located
just west of present auditor-
ium with connected enclosed
hallway between the new build-
ing and auditorium. It will pro-
vide band room to accommo-
date 50 students, practice rooms,
office and uniform and instru-
ment storage space.

Physical education building
at the elementary school will
provide all purpose room of
about 40 by 60 feet and dress-
ing rooms and storage space
with about 3,500 square feet. It
will be located east of the
north end of the elementary
building which houses the
school lunchroom.

The present gym entrance
will be remodeled providing a
13 foot addition at the front of
the gym, and modernizing the
dressing rooms.

The tax rate will be increased
from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per \$100 val-
uation on the present school
tax roll, according to school of-
ficials. The bonds will be paid
out over a 25 year period.

Council Certifies Election Returns; New Aldermen Take Office Thursday

The City Council meeting in
special session last Thursday
night at the city hall certified
returns and two new aldermen
took office for a two year term.

J. C. Wesson and Bob Steen
took office after being declared
elected to succeed F. D. Reyn-
olds and S. A. Edington, who
did not seek re-election. Only 39
ballots were cast in the election
last week Tuesday with each
candidate receiving 39 votes.
There were no write-in votes.

Members of the council were
paid for the past year.
Reports of departmental re-
ceipts and disbursements for
the past month and quarterly

treasurer's report were present-
ed to the council by city man-
ager W. C. Barnett, and were
approved by the council.

Barnett reported on work be-
ing done during the past month
on city water well No. 3, on
highway 84, and condition of
the well and pumping facili-
ties. The well has been in op-
eration since 1952 with no ma-
jor pump repairs since 1955. A
new pump was installed in get-
ting the system ready for the
spring and summer season.

The council heard report on
new water lines being installed
in the Fair Lawn addition and
plans for installing larger wa-
ter lines in the Campbell addi-
tion. New homes are being built
in both of these additions.

Report was made by commit-
tee investigating purchase of
new tank and truck for the
trash and garbage department.

Other matters that came up
for discussion were: extended
electric service to the proposed
new home for Central Texas
Telephone Cooperative; renew-
al of the city's permit to get
water from the Colorado River;
employee for the park and fin-
ancing the project; a landing
strip for the city and a propos-
ed new rest home.

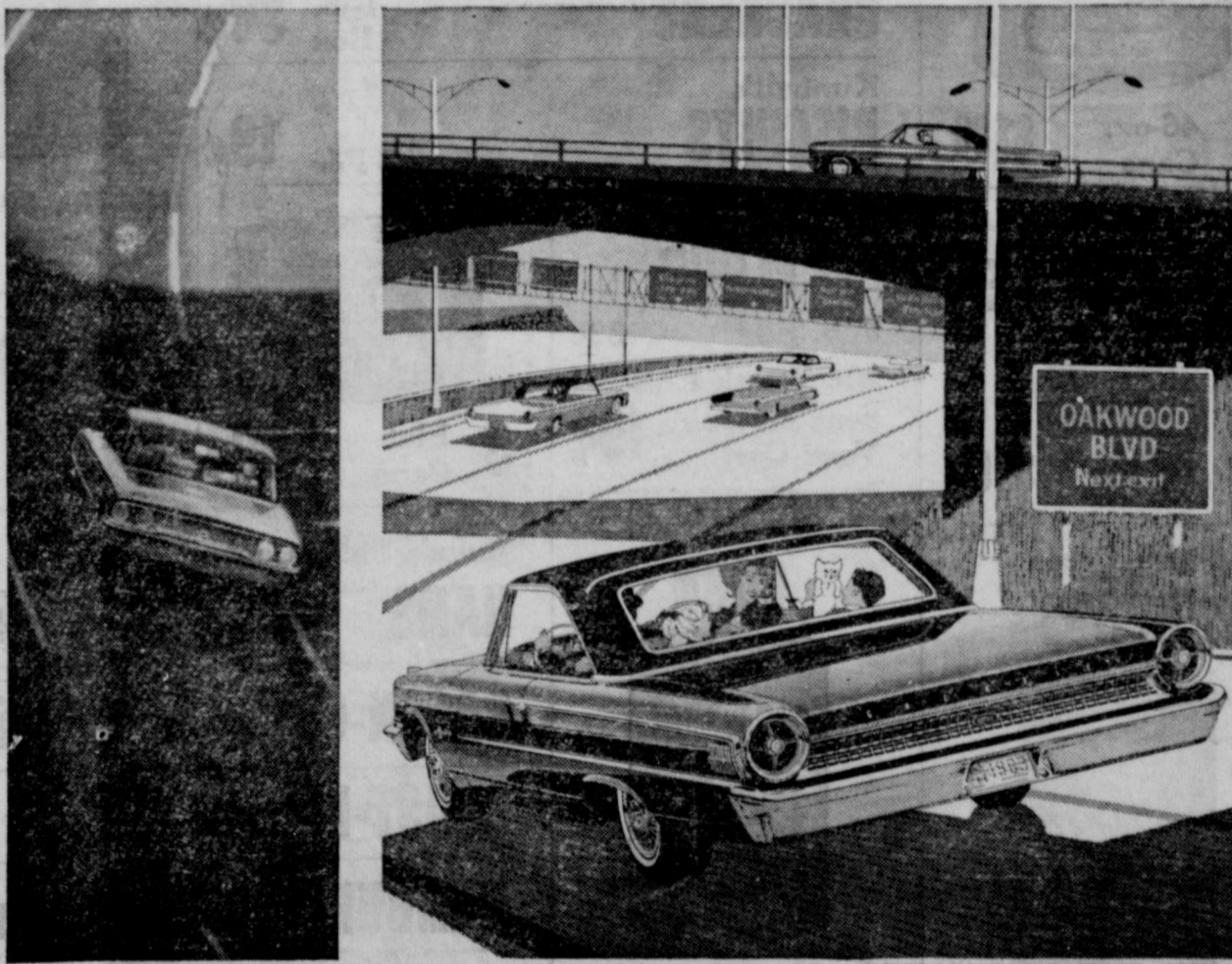

Screwworm Fly Progress Report

Progress report as of April 5, from the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program announces the following:
95,432,050 sterile screwworm flies were released during the week March 24-30.
Thirteen screwworm cases were confirmed from Texas and one from Mexico.
Samples identified as non-screwworms totaled 218 from Texas and 1 from New Mexico. Non-screwworms made up 94 per cent of the total samples.
During March, Texas reported 50 screwworms and 409 non-screwworms. Mexico had 2 screwworms and 1 non-screwworm; New Mexico 10 non-screwworms.

SOME PRODUCERS JEOPARDIZING PROGRAM
Producers in some counties are "playing with fire," eradication officials declare, by not treating wounds and infestations and by not taking all precautionary measures in handling their livestock. This attitude, if left unchanged, could cause the spread of screwworms throughout the entire state, officials said.

LOCAL ACTIVITIES
Mills County officials announced that local stockmen who send in samples should not become concerned if there is a delay in getting a report. Delay of report is caused by the fact that the sample was identified as non-screwworm.
The county committee is still in need of some contributions to go over the top, according to report Tuesday.
