Mills County Historical Society Places Marker Over Old Town Well

A gray granite marker 18 by 24 inches, set in cement, was placed over the old Town Well on the court house lawn, April 3, under the supervision of the Mills County Historical Society. The inscription on the slab reads as follows:

The Old Town Well
Mr. Peyton Died From Poison
Fumes In Digging This Well
Ben Cox Was Also Overcome
Deed H. Mayar Rescued Mr. Cox
And Brought Up Mr. Peyton's
Body
August 1887

In Memory Of These Three Men
Mills County Historical Society.

The following article, written by the late Hon. Phil H. Clements and published in the March 1, 1913 issue of the Goldthwaite Eagle, gives in detail the history of the well and also explains why the Historical Society had the marker placed over the well.

WANTS WELL TO REMAIN

"The well on the public square was dug in August, 1887. An election was pending for the purpose of organizing the county and establishing the county seat. A barbecue had been advertised for the 26th of the month and a large crowd was expected. A drought was on and there were but few wells in Goldthwaite at that time. To supply water for the occasion was a serious problem. A meeting was called and Dunk Harris and the writer were appointed as a committee on "ways and

means." We decided to dig a well, raised the necessary money and let the contract to a Mr. Peyton.

"Work was rushed, two sets of hands being employed. Dynamite was used in blasting. As a result of the haste, Mr. Peyton descended into the well too soon after an explosion. He felt the damp and called to be quickly raised. When near the top he fell back in the well with the result that his skull was burst.

"Ben Cox volunteered to rescue the unfortunate man and was soon lying faint across the body of Peyton. Great excitement prevailed. All seemed to lose their heads except John L. Lewis, at whose suggestion a turpentine ball was prepared, ignited and thrown into the well. An explosion followed and flames shot into the air. Just at this time Deed H. Mayar reached the scene, tied a rope around his body, and over the protest of all, swung himself into what seemed certain death.

"By the sense of touch he discovered that Peyton was dead, his head being crushed. So he sent Cox up first, who looked to be dead and who did not recover consciousness for some hours.

"Mr. Mayar kept a rope securely tied under his arms all the time, and when he was drawn to the surface he was more dead than alive. These were the most heroic deeds ever

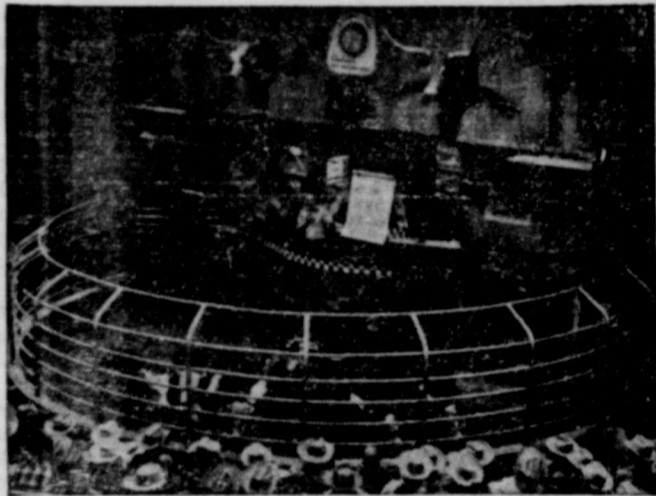

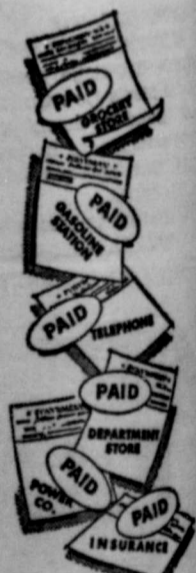

Sears Foundation Swine Program Will Provide Six To Mills County

Five registered gilts and a boar will be given to Mills County 4-H Club members during May under the Sears-Roebuck Foundation 4-H Swine Service Program. It was announced this week by George Reese, county agent.

These gilts will be awarded to members who have a genuine interest and are willing to provide the facilities to have a successful project. The contest is open to all 4-H Club members in the county who have not been previous winners.

In order to qualify for one of these pigs, the 4-H Club member will write and submit an essay entitled, "Why I'd Like to Have a Sears Pig" or other title selected by the agent and committee. The essay will have not more than 300 words.

All essays must be in the hands of the county agents by April 20, and must be written

on notebook paper, typed or in ink and must contain the name of the club member, address and name of club. The essay will be judged by a committee in the county appointed by the county agent and the county swine or livestock committee.

Pigs will be awarded on the basis of 30% on the essay and 70% upon his facilities and ability to successfully complete the demonstration. Judges reserve the right to talk to the contestants, to inspect the farm and to talk to the parents and others in making their decisions.

Each essay must be accompanied by a "Program Agreement Statement" signed by the contestant and parent or guardian. In the agreement the club members agree to feed, care for and breed the sow pigs under the direction and supervision of the county agent. They further agree to return either \$15 or the choice gilt, with certificate of registration, from their first litter to the county agent for distribution to other club members in the county the following year. The county agent and committee will select the top gilt from the first litter or they may choose to take the \$15 in lieu of a sow pig. If the sow pig is selected, it is to be delivered on or after it is ten weeks of age.

The pigs which have been distributed to the contestants will be returned to a show in

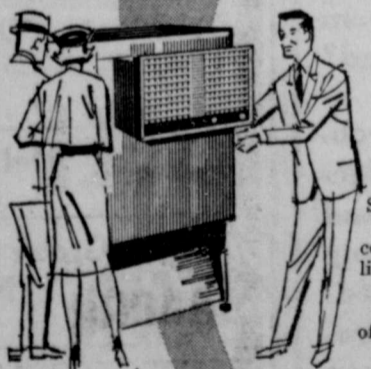

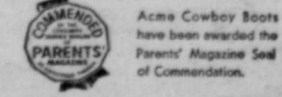

performed in our county, and if medals had been the fashion in those days, Ben Cox and Deed H. Mayar would have received awards as heroes.

"It may be only a matter of sentiment, but for one I protest against destroying the public well. When the time comes that water is no longer needed in Goldthwaite, let the well be sealed with a tablet stone on which the names of Ben F. Cox and Deed H. Mayar are cut and let the spot be sacred to heroic deeds."

A windmill and tank were erected over the well and after the old court house burned and the present one was completed

in 1913, the well was at the edge of the new lawn, so the well was abandoned and the windmill and tank removed.

In order that the spot not be obliterated, members of the Self Culture Club had a cement slab placed over the well several years ago.

Mr. R. E. Clements, son of the late Phil H. Clements, presented to the Mills County Historical Society plans for permanent marker on spot in memory of the men who dug the well. This was accomplished on Monday, April 3, 1963.
