

At-Large Elections Suggested

Eighty Texas counties, in which two county precincts or more, represent a fraction of the total county vote, would be affected if a constitutional amendment by Rep. Lindsey Rodriguez of Hidalgo ever comes to a favorable vote by the public.

Under Rodriguez's plan, if the total number of votes cast in two or more commissioners' precincts amount to less than 20 per cent of the total vote cast in the election of all four commissioners, the commissioners in the small precincts would be required to run on a countywide-at-large basis.

Rodriguez described the most extreme example of a situation he's trying to cure—that in Kleberg County where two of the county's four commissioners' precincts "are behind locked gates" on the King Ranch, where 80 voters reside

Witnesses from around the state appeared in favor of Rodriguez' proposal.

But Gaines County Judge Charles Lawrence said the County Judges and Commissioners Association is opposed.
