This legislation authorizes vocational training and rehabilitation of prisoners through work in industries at penal units under the Texas Board of Corrections. It requires state agencies to buy prison-made products when specifications of standard and quality are met as provided by the Board of Control and authorizes political subdivisions to make similar purchases. Private enterprise is protected as the bill makes unlawful the sale of prison-produced products on the open market.

It is estimated that this measure will result in savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars in its first years of existence and will ultimately save the state millions of dollars.

Governor John Connally praised the passage of S. B. 338 by saying, "This is one of the most significant pieces of legislation to be passed during the 58th Session of the Texas Legislature. Senator Crump and Representative Townsend are to be commended for their sponsorship of S. B. 338!"

Construction To Start On New Telephone Co-op Bldg.

Contract for construction of new headquarters building in Goldthwaite for Central Texas Telephone Co-operative, Inc., was approved by the REA in Washington last Friday, according to announcement by Raymond Summy, general manager of the organization.

Bennett & Forbess Construction Company of Brownwood was awarded the contract for the new building at a cost of \$65,947.00.

Actual construction is expected to get underway in the next

few days and the contract calls for the building to be completed in 120 working days.

The new Telephone Co-op headquarters building will be located on a 120 x 150 foot lot on the corner of Reilly Street and U. S. Highway 84, four blocks east of the Courthouse square.

The building will face West with entrance on Reilly Street. It will be 56 feet wide and run 84 feet deep.

Approximately 3,600 square feet will be devoted to offices

and about 1,000 square feet for warehouse space and garage.

Construction will be of brick and masonry with a rock wall on the north facing Highway 84. The building will be air-conditioned.

Customer parking area will be at the front of the building on Reilly Street. Employee parking area will be provided in special parking lot to the South of the building.

Floor plan for the building includes: reception room, commercial and billing room, accountants' office, equipment room, storage vault, board of directors room, manager's office, supt. and map room, repair room, coffee bar, air-conditioning equipment room, janitor's supply room, rest rooms, concrete terrace and truck storage and warehouse.

\$317.55 Is Still Needed To Put Park Maintenance Fund Over Top

W. P. Duren, chairman of the Mills County Park Committee, announced Tuesday that only \$317.55 is needed to reach the \$1800.00 goal and put the park maintenance fund over the top.

The committee had set a goal of \$1800.00 in contributions this year to provide \$1,200.00 for this year's maintenance and take care of the \$600 deficit carried over from last year.

All those participating will have to have physical examination and written consent from parent or guardian. Doctors will be available at the pool Monday morning when registration starts.

Prices for the 1963 crop of grain sorghum will be supported by loans in Mills County at \$1.83 per hundredweight for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. In addition, the 1963 program provides for a 29 - cents - per - hundred - weight payment-in-kind, which will be disbursed by sight draft some time early this fall to producers with grain sorghum and who are participating in the 1963 Feed Grain Program.

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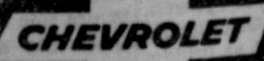

Worms don't show up very well in murky water. Add to the worm's appeal when threading it on the hook by tying a small strip of red bandanna cloth through the hook's eye. Worm soon will twist itself around the red cloth and so add to the brightness of your bait.

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TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Fishing Camp Tip

Before inserting a wedge in an axe head to tighten handle, put some pulverized rock salt into wedge slot. Salt absorbs moisture and prevents handle from working loose during dry weather.

When To Fish

You'll get many different answers if you ask for advice as to when to go fishing.

Some "experts" say only on sunny days. Others allow there should be good cloud cover. But the fact is that fish adhere to no set eating standard.

However, it has been proven that fish do feed best—whether cloudy, sunny, warm, or cold—at first light in the morning and last light in the evening. Also, during early spring and late fall.

So, it seems the best time to fish is any day during early spring or late fall, at daybreak or sundown, no matter what the weather.

Extra Fuel Tank

It's important on outboard cruises to obtain the best miles per gallon of fuel. So, adjust your speed for minimum gas consumption.

Then to prevent trouble and inconvenience, carry an extra fuel tank, as insurance, to be used only in an emergency.

Color Or Action

Expert anglers argue pro and con as to which is more important in a lure... color or action.

Most authorities agree, that color is more important, though they admit action plays a big part in catching lunkers. Use light colored lures on a cloudy day; dark colored or black lures, for night fishing.

Good Fishing Rod Case

Ever have your favorite fishing rod smashed by a car door, or trampled by careless feet? Here's how one angler solved the problem.

He purchased a steel steering wheel column as an auto junk car lot. He trimmed both ends off smooth, then capped each opening with a small can top. It made a strong yet light fishing rod case.

Crossing Barbed Fences

Anglers who fish running streams usually do a lot of fence crossing. Most fences are of barbed wire that can tear holes in britches and rubber boots. Carry with you, tucked through

your belt, a yard long, foot wide strip of canvas to lay over the barbed wire you may have to cross.

Don't Give Up First Time

Fish have pretty good memories. But usually one must be hooked five or six times for the experience to register.

So, when you lose a lunker after a battle, don't give up and move on. Try the same spot again and again. The lunker may take your lure when you least expect it.

Handy Way To Carry Oil

Use an empty nail polish bottle to carry oil in your tackle box.

It is handy to pack and you can use the brush to apply oil when needed.

Keep Line From Tangling

Every fisherman knows how badly a line tangles while you are moving from one fishing spot to another. You can prevent this by wrapping the hook and line close to your rod.

Simple method is to twist a pipe cleaner around the rod and line. Pipe cleaners are easy

to twist and easy to undo.

Added Lure For Bass

Fly tyers often add a dressing of fiber glass threads pulled from woven cloth. After tying, comb out. You'll have a fly with an unequalled sheen... tempting to bass, crappie and perch.

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

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—Rumors concerning a special session continue to bounce around the Capitol.

Most persistent rumor is that Gov. John B. Connally will "line-item" veto the appropriations bill, which he contends "short-changes" higher education . . . then call a special session in the fall.

In a "line-item" veto he would strike out items he considers unnecessary. Then try to convince Legislators that the money should go to higher education instead.

Some lawmakers think they will be called back in Septem-

ber. Others pick October. Those who predict a fall session believe they again will have to tackle the subject of congressional redistricting. They didn't agree to a solution in the regular session.

Speaker Satisfied
House Speaker Byron Tunnell of Tyler thinks a summer session is possible.

Tunnell said he is making no vacation plans until he is certain he won't be called on to preside over the House in late June or July.

But the Speaker stated he was well satisfied with the budget passed by the Legislature. He said, "They apparently did what they thought was right, and I for one will stand behind them."

"The 58th Legislature met its challenge and did its work," Tunnell said proudly.

There were many times during the 58th session when the Speaker and the House seemed at odds. But when the session ended most House members agreed that Tunnell had been a good referee.

"I have never asked anything but the right to take my position and give another man the same right," Tunnell stated when the bustle of the 58th dissolved into post-session silence.

"That is what I really like about the House; There is such a mixture of philosophies, rang-

ing from liberals like Bob Eckhardt to mine. Somewhere in between may be where the answer lies."

Instant Railroad Commissioner
Many nice things have been said about Jim C. Langdon since Governor Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission to replace Bill Murray. One thing for sure, he adapts to changes easily.

In two short hours, Langdon resigned as chief justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals; withdrew from the race for the State Supreme Court place which Judge Frank Culver of Fort Worth is expected to leave; was sworn in as Railroad Commissioner; announced as a candidate for re-election in 1964; and went right to work.

Then he and Commissioner Ben Ramsey made the announcement the oil and gas industry was waiting for—a 28 per cent allowable for June.

Governors' Choice
Langdon's appointment was the third he has received during three administrations.

Gov. Allan Shivers appointed him 112th District Judge in 1954. He was elected to that bench twice. Then Gov. Price Daniel appointed him Chief Justice of the El Paso Court in 1959. This post he resigned to accept Governor Connally's appointment.

Bills Versus Laws
A quick tabulation of the results of five months of labor by the 181 members of the 58th Legislature reveals that only about 31 per cent of the bills passed both House and Senate, to become laws.

A total of 1,723 bills were introduced. Of these, 543 were passed to law. Most of the weeding-out was done by committees. They reported as favorable only 786 bills as compared with 906 in 1961.

Supreme Court Backs Commission

State Supreme Court upheld the Railroad Commission's right to authorize an operator in a particular oil field to conduct a survey of another operator's well to determine if it were illegally slanted.

Case at bar was L & G Oil Company (headed by H. G. Lewis Jr. of Kilgore) versus the Railroad Commission et al.

L & G charged that a Railroad Commission order permitting Tidewater Oil Company to authorize Sperry-Sun Surveying Company to run a slant-hole survey on an L & G well in the East Texas field was illegal.

The 126th District Court in

Austin had supported the Railroad Commission's order.

But while the Supreme Court affirmed the right to give the order, it said it was improperly worded and sent the case back to the trial court.

Two members of the high court, however—Associate Justices Meade F. Griffin and Joe Greenhill—disagreed with their colleagues.

"To allow a citizen or a corporation—a potential foe in litigation—to go upon and take notice of another's property without even so much as an opportunity to be heard, is a clear violation of the due process clause of the Texas and Federal constitutions," they stated.

Date Mix-Up

On or about August 1, Secretary of State Crawford Martin has to start publishing proposed amendments to the constitution that will be up for a vote in a special election on Saturday, November 9.

Martin checked out the first three amendments scheduled for the ballot: One to decide whether to abolish the poll tax; one asking whether to extend the Veterans' Land Program and increase bonds; and one asking voters whether the state should increase from \$54,000,000 to \$60,000,000 state funds that can be spent each year on federal-state assistance for old folks, children, the blind and disabled.

Then he came to a fourth—a proposed amendment to authorize a retirement and benefit program for Jefferson County's drainage district employees. One clause referred to a November 9, 1963, election. Another set the election for November, 1964.

Martin couldn't decide which date was right, so he referred the matter to Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Former Speaker Lands Job

James A. Turman of Gober, former speaker of the House who ran for lieutenant governor in 1962 and was defeated by Preston Smith of Lubbock, was around Austin for a long time after his term as speaker ended on January 7.

Many political potatoes predicted he would be named Secretary of State—he wasn't. Then they said he would head Governor Connally's proposed Commission on Excellence in Higher Education, but that bill didn't pass.

Turman came out fine in the long run. Last week, he joined the U. S. Office of Education in Washington, D. C., as a Special Consultant-Expert to the Commissioner of Education.

Turman once was assistant to the president of Texas Woman's University in Denton.
