## County Wool And Mohair Producers Received \$173,730 In Incentive Checks

Wool and mohair producers received \$173,730 in incentive payments for 1962 year under the wool and mohair program, according to announcement by Tabor, office manager of Mills County Agricultural Extension and Conservation.

Checks went to over 1,450 producers. Part of the checks were handed out at the ASCS office Monday and the balance were mailed to producers.

Wool payments amounted to \$135,715.34; lamb payments were \$9,745.01 and mohair payments were \$28,270.42. The wool and lamb payments reflect the totals received by producers after deductions for the wool and lamb promotion program.

This meeting was well attended by teachers and administrators from throughout the state and the program provided was of much value to those in attendance, according to Mr. Standley.

The speakers were recognized experts in their field on such topics being discussed as Elementary Science, Social Studies, New Trends in Elementary Mathematics, the Non-Graded Elementary School, and Ways to Challenge the Able Learner.

The local group was particularly attentive to discussions on the Non-Graded School. Plans are being made to use this type of grouping in the Goldthwaite School beginning this fall in grades one and two.

This non-graded arrangement is now working with success in many schools throughout the state. Its basic advantages are that a pupil is allowed to travel at his "own" speed in mastering learning skills rather than be held along with the rest of his group (where the child is an able learner) or "pushed" too hard to stay up (where a slow learner is involved). The plan is not to skip grades but rather to enrich the student's curriculum if the need is shown, according to officials.

## Subscriptions Exempt From Tax

Effective Monday, July 1, all subscriptions to The Goldthwaite Eagle will be exempt from the State Sales Tax.

This exemption was made in the new Sales Tax law passed by the Legislature in the last session.

Subscriptions will be \$3.50 in the county and the surrounding counties and \$4.00 per year elsewhere in Texas. The outside Texas rate remains the same, \$5.00 per year.

If subscribers have received notices with the 6c to 8c tax added, the tax is to be disregarded.

## June Rainfall Is 3.88 Inches

Rainfall recorded here for the month of June measured 3.88 inches, according to official record kept by Harry Allen.

In 1962 Goldthwaite received 5.61 inches of rain during June, 10.21 inches.

For the first half of this year, January through June, 10.21 inches of rain was recorded here.

For the first five months, January through May, only 6.33 inches was recorded in Goldthwaite.

Local showers have brought considerable relief to some sections of the county during the past 10 days. Heavy downpour has provided stock water by filling many tanks in various sections.

## Representative Terry Townsend Blasts Insurance Rate Increase

Representative Terry Townsend of Brady, who represents the 65th District in the Texas House of Representatives, has issued strong criticism of House Bill 48, which amends the Texas Safety Responsibility Law to increase the rates of automobile liability insurance.

Representative Townsend stated: "I am very disappointed that House Bill 48 was signed into law, which will place this law into effect on August 27, 1963. While I certainly support that part of the measure to stiffen the motor vehicle safety responsibility law, I feel that the doubling of the minimum automobile liability insurance coverage is too great a price for the public to pay. The bill will increase auto insurance rates by up to 25% for the driving public that meets the standards set by the State of Texas Responsibility Law. Since the law has been amended to put some teeth in it, it is presumed that nearly all of the driving public will comply with it."

"The bill will raise the limit on liability insurance from \$5,000 for death or injury to one person and \$10,000 for more than one death or injury to \$10,000 and \$20,000 respectively. The \$5,000 limit for destruction of property would remain the same. So controversial were these raises of rate costs to the general public, that the Senate amended the measure passed by the House, after a closed vote in the Senate, by the slim margin of one vote."

"As your State Representative," Townsend said, "I opposed the passage of this bill because of the burden of the 25% increased rate cost. The state-wide increased cost will probably run as high as from \$33 to \$41 in the best classed drivers up to a cost increase from \$61 to \$74 per year.

"The actual cost to meet the new requirements for minimum insurance to meet the standards set by the Texas Safety Responsibility Law for those living in the 65th District, based on current figures furnished me by the State Board of Insurance, are as follows:

"Burnet, Gillespie, Llano, McCulloch, and San Saba Counties will probably have an annual increase in automobile insurance cost (other than farmers' and ranchers') for bodily injury in the following Classes: Class 1A—raised from \$33 to \$41; Class 1B—raised from \$41 to \$50; Class 2A—raised from \$51 to \$78; Class 2C—raised from \$91 to \$110; and Class 3—raised from \$61 to \$74. Farmers' and Ranchers: Class 1A—raised from \$25 to \$31; Class 2A—raised from \$48 to \$59; and Class 2C—raised from \$68 to \$83.

"The new annual rates for Lampasas and Mills Counties will probably be: Class 1A—raised from \$16 to \$20; Class 1B—raised from \$16 to \$20; and Class 2A—raised from \$29 to \$36; Class 2C—raised from \$42 to \$51; and Class 3—raised from \$24 to \$30. Farmers' and Ranchers: Class 1A—raised from \$12 to \$15; Class 2A—raised from \$32 to \$39; and Class 2C—raised from \$32 to \$39.

"Of course, these figures only represent about two thirds of your total insurance cost; on top of this the present rate cost of property damage insurance will have to be added."

Preparative Townsend concluded by saying, "Car insurance costs are too high at the present time without adding these additional rate increases. I am proud, consistent with my past record, to be reflected as having opposed these increases; many of my colleagues may wish they had when the public wakes up to what has been done to them."

## Medallion For Mills County Jail Dedicated Sunday, June 30

Dedication ceremonies in the placing of a State Historical Medallion on the Mills County Jail were held here Sunday afternoon, at 5:30 o'clock on the East side of the courthouse square, with a large crowd attending.

Howard Campbell, Mayor of Goldthwaite, was master of ceremonies.

Mrs. John A. Hester, chairman of the Mills County Historical Society, gave the objective of the Texas Historical Survey Committee, County Judge Cecil Egger gave a brief history of the jail, and Mrs. Flora G. Bowles told the significance of the marker.

Mrs. Floyd Manuel described the program of marking the graves of all Civil War Veterans, which is now underway in the county and state. Mrs. Aurora Hudson, secretary-treasurer of the Mills County Society, dedicated the Medallion.

Rev. Dwaine Green, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite, gave the invocation. Rev. Charles Runk, pastor of the First Methodist Church, gave the benediction and Bill Taylor, Music Director of the First Baptist Church, led the group in singing "Texas Our Texas."

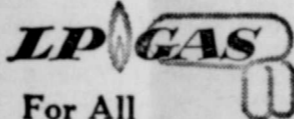
25 YEARS AGO-

**Bond Sales For Month Of May**

Bond sales in Mills County totaled \$3,456 during May according to W. P. Duren, chairman of Mills County Savings Bonds Committee.

Savings Bonds sales in Texas rapidly assuming proportions and will be one of the nicest residences in the city. It is built on the site of his old home on the corner of Sixth and Front Streets.

A census report which has just been published shows 4,239 goats in Mills County in 1910 which are valued at \$7,882. The report is based on data gathered by the census enumerators in 1910.
