United Methodist Witness Night Scheduled For Sunday Evening

Sunday evening, July 14, there will be a United Methodist Witness Night at the First Methodist Church, Goldthwaite. Participating in this service will be all the Methodist Churches of Mills County that are in the Kerrville District of the Methodist Church. This will be a co-operative program among the five Methodist churches in this area of the county. The service will begin at 8:00 p. m.

The speaker for this occasion will be the Reverend H. Ellis Thomas, District Superintendent of the Kerrville District. Rev. Thomas has held several important offices in the Methodist Church as chairman of several Boards in the Southwest Texas Annual Conference. He has attended two General Conferences and three Jurisdictional Conferences of the Church. He has served 12 churches in the Kerrville District including Hondo and Uvalde where he served as pastor for eight years. He has also served Oak Park Methodist Church, Corpus Christi; First Methodist Church, Brownsville; and First Methodist Church, Alice. He was a member of the Evangelistic Team to Cuba in 1958. In the spring of 1962, Rev. and Mrs. Thomas spent a month in Bolivia for the Board of Missions. Rev. Thomas is beginning his second year as District Superintendent of the Kerrville District.

One of the purposes of this United Methodist Witness Night

is to explore the possibility of organizing a Larger Parish among the Methodist Churches in the county in order to unite the total witness and program of the Church and Methodism, to foster Evangelism, and to provide a Christian fellowship among the Methodists in Mills County. Churches which would be involved in such a plan are Star Methodist Church, Center City Methodist Church, Pleasant Grove Methodist Church, Bethel Methodist Church, and First Methodist, Goldthwaite.

All members of these five churches are invited to attend this important service, according to announcement by Rev. Charles E. Runk, pastor of the Goldthwaite Church.

Board To Get School Plans By Monday Night

The Board of Trustees, Goldthwaite Independent School District, will receive final plans for the proposed school improvement program Monday night, July 15, according to announcement by LeRoy Beard, superintendent.

Architect for the proposed buildings is to have plans complete and present them to the school board at that time.

After the plans are accepted by the board they will be released to contractors and the school district will advertise for construction bids.

Tax Levy And Budget Adopted By City Council Monday Night

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night approved ordinance establishing the tax levy and budget for governmental functions of the city for the next year. The budget for tax supported functions of the city remains approximately as it was the past year and the tax rate remains the same.

Operating statements of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for the month of June were presented to the council along with quarterly treasurer's report.

City Manager W. C. Barnett presented the council with detailed operating statements for the past year covering the electric, water, and sewer departments, also the swimming pool, ball park and cemetery operations. Also proposed budgets for the new year. These reports were approved and budgets adopted.

The council voted to transfer \$15,000.00 from the electric department to the general fund and also voted to transfer \$15,000.00 from the electric department fund and deposit it in a savings account with Mills County State Bank.

Lee Tabor appeared before the council with a request for an extra pole for the electric service line from main line to his residence.

WATER SHORTAGE IS DISCUSSED

The current water shortage hitting some sections of the city was discussed by the council. It was pointed out that it is the same story facing the city each summer. When hot and dry weather hits, the city wells and pumping facilities fail to meet the high demand for water leaving the pressure low and some higher places without water most of the day.

Members of the council also reviewed the history of the water department and the re-survey that was made a year ago with the idea of scaling down the proposed water improvement project for the city with a cost figure that might be more acceptable to citizens.

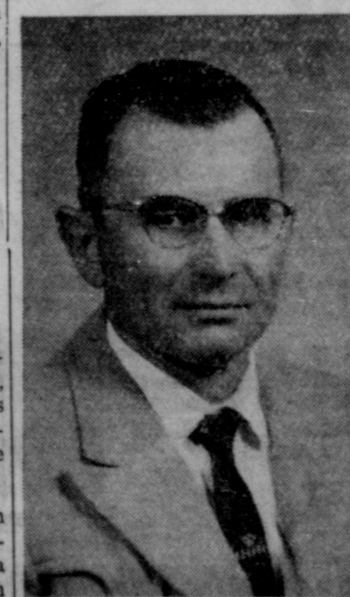

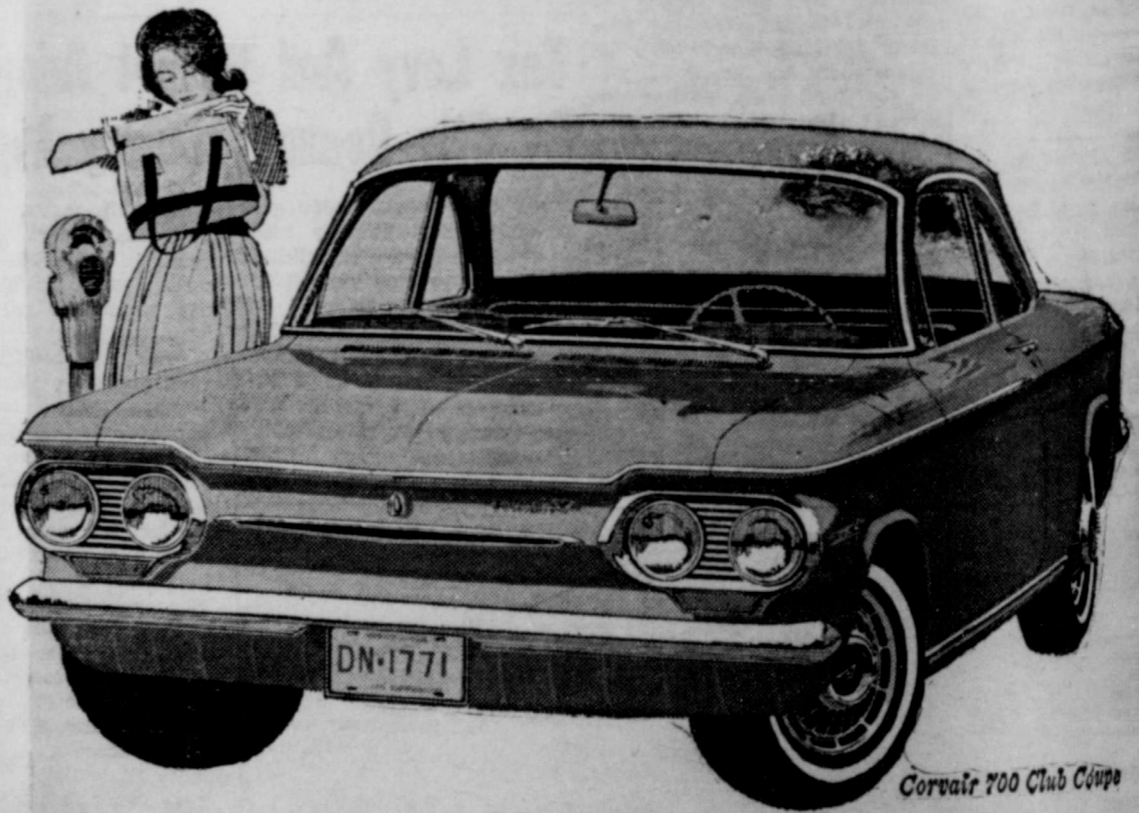

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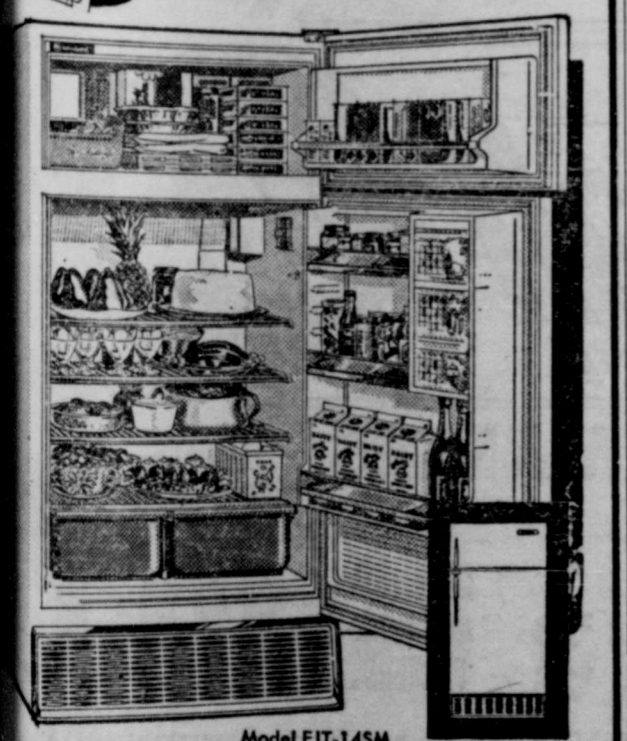

Facts About Your Hearing

For the past several years Doctors and research departments have been testing and studying ways to combat the alarming amount of people that are becoming hard of hearing. Not only did they find that lots of our older people are hard of hearing—they also found over one million children have some kind of hearing problem. Sounds bad, but it's true.

Here are some other facts that you might be interested in.

That over 50% of the people that wear hearing aids are mis-fitted for one reason or the other. In lots of cases people have shopped for a hearing aid like shopping at a dime store, not knowing if the aid fit their trouble or not. Others are trying to wear cast-off hearing aids left by some loved one that has gone to rest.

That over two million people need to do something about their hearing problem but just keep putting it off for one reason or the other. Some of the reasons: Mrs. Jones wears one and she can't hear a thing, although it's possible that Mrs. Jones is one of the above that is mis-fitted. To her, all hearing aids are the same, and she will run up and down the street and tell people that could be helped not to get one. Yet the same Mrs. Jones, when she started going blind, had her eyes tested and glasses fitted to her eyes. The same with her teeth—they were fitted to her, but to the most important part of her head, (the ears) she picked up the first aid she could find and then wondered why she could not hear. One of the big factors of why people won't do anything about their hearing problem is vanity. They are so afraid that someone will stare at them. Yet this same person will either ask over and over what someone said or put their hand behind their ear trying to understand what is being said, or they sit in a crowd and say yes when they should have said no, or they will go in a shell and stay away from people, church, etc., and yet they are afraid someone will notice that they wear a hearing aid.

Other facts: If people would have a hearing test made when they noticed the first sign that they were getting hard of hearing, they would not have so much trouble later on. Yet lots of people will put it off until they get in real trouble—then expect to be corrected over night, although they have been several years getting that way—they still want correction over night. If this same person had taken time out to have their hearing tested at least every six months, they would not have gotten in trouble. You do not wait until you're nearly blind to have your eyes tested, do you?

Maybe the above statements are a little blunt, and maybe they hit below the belt, but we in the hearing business have spent thousands of dollars on research to aid and help the hard of hearing. Commissioner Jerry said the sale of 82 of forfeited veterans land (2,223 acres) was "a big thing," since it brought in more than the state's original land plus taxes paid for forfeiture.

Road Mileage Extended
The Highway Commission approved construction of about 1,000 new miles of two-market roads in 172

counties at a cost of some \$24,000,000.

Completion of the 1963 F-M road program would bring the state's F-M system to more than 37,000 miles. That's just 13,000 miles short of the commission's ultimate goal of 50,000 miles. Most of the farm roads have been built since 1949.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer linked development of the system to burgeoning city growth in the state. "Farms and cities will always be inter-dependent," he said. "... getting goods to market is a fundamental to commerce as is the transaction between merchant and customer."
