New improvements will include a new Vocational Agriculture Building, Band Hall, Physical Education building for the elementary school and addition and improvements at the gymnasium.

Construction Underway On Telephone Co-Op Building

Construction got underway here during the past week on the new headquarters building for Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

The building will cost \$65,947.00 and is located on a 120 x 150 foot lot on the corner of Reilly Street and U. S. Highway 94. The building will be air-conditioned.

Customer parking area will be at the front of the building on Reilly Street. Employee parking area will be provided in special parking lot to the South of the building.

Floor plan for the building includes: reception room, commercial and billing room, accountants' office, equipment room, storage vault, board of directors room, manager's office, supt. and map room, repair room, coffee bar, air-conditioning equipment room, janitor's supply room, rest rooms, concrete terrace and truck storage and warehouse.

Water Bond Committee Organized; Officials To Get Petitions Soon

The special 15 member water bond committee appointed by the Lions Club Tuesday noon met Tuesday night in the community room of the bank and organized for their campaign.

Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa was named chairman; Dr. M. A. Childress secretary and W. P. Duren, treasurer.

Others getting petitions signed now to be presented to the City Council and Water District Board of Directors requesting the bond election be called.

About 100 signatures were secured Tuesday afternoon and the committee plans to complete the petitions by Friday with several hundred signatures. Time of meeting with the council is to be set.

ENGINEERS REPORT

The group heard report from Bob King, project engineer for The Joe Rady Company, engineers for the city, regarding the re-survey that firm made in 1962 with respect to providing an adequate water supply for the city.

His report showed the best possible source is to get water from the Colorado River. The project has been scaled down however from the original estimate of \$650,000.00 three years ago to an estimated cost of \$425,000.00.

In the re-survey made to get a lower cost figure the following changes were made:

- 1) Cut down supply estimate for possible 4,000 population in the future to present population with some increase to about 2,000.
- 2) Reduce size of pipe line and off channel storage facilities.
- 3) Eliminate all improvements to distribution system in the city.

The \$425,000.00 project would be financed with two bond issues, 1) A \$200,000.00 water, sewer and electric Revenue Bond issue, and 2) a \$225,000.00 water district tax bond issue.

The revenue bonds would be retired from revenues out of the water, sewer and electric departments.

Water District tax bonds would be retired from a water district tax of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation based on the same rendition as the present city tax roll.

Both bond issues would be paid out in 30 years. There would be no water rate increase.

Billy Summy will be doing the catching now with some help from Mike Wright who has been picked up from the Little League.

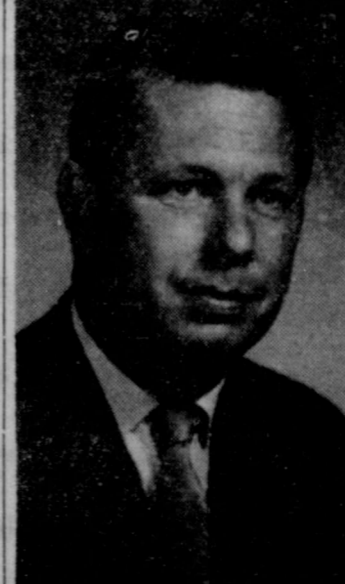
The last home games will be tonight with Lometa and Tuesday, July 23, with American Legion from San Saba. Everyone is urged to get out and see the boys in action.

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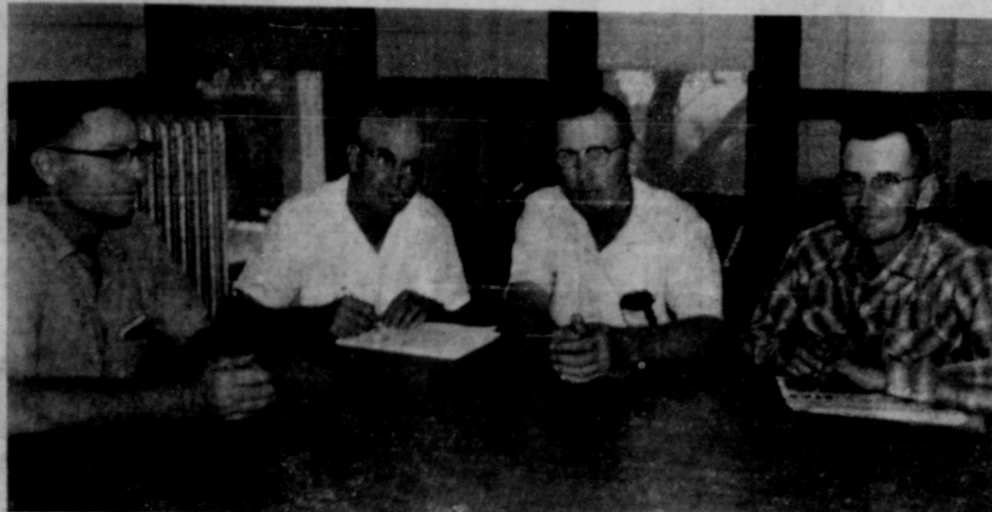
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Rev. Goodenough Preach At Methodist Revival

Construction Underway On Telephone Co-Op Building

Construction got underway here during the past week on the new headquarters building for Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

The building will cost \$65,947.00 and is located on a 120 x 150 foot lot on the corner of Reilly Street and U. S. Highway 84, four blocks east of the courthouse square.

Contract calls for the building to be completed in 120 working days, according to Raymond Summy, general manager of the firm.

The building will face West with entrance on Reilly Street. It will be 56 feet wide and run

84 feet deep. Approximately 3,600 square feet will be devoted to offices and about 1,000 square feet for warehouse space and garage.

Construction will be of brick and masonry with a rock wall on the north facing Highway 84. The building will be air-conditioned.

Customer parking area will be at the front of the building on Reilly Street. Employee parking area will be provided in special parking lot to the South of the building.

Floor plan for the building includes: reception room, commercial and billing room, accountants' office, equipment room, storage vault, board of directors room, manager's office, supt. and map room, repair room, coffee bar, air-conditioning equipment room, janitor's supply room, rest rooms, concrete terrace and truck storage and warehouse.

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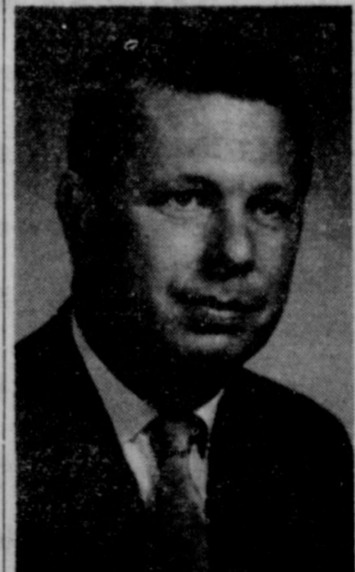

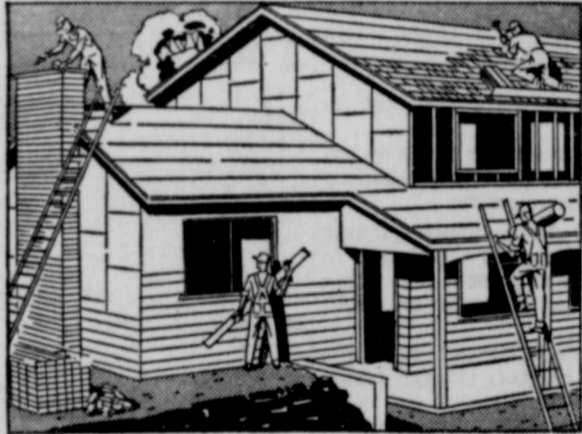

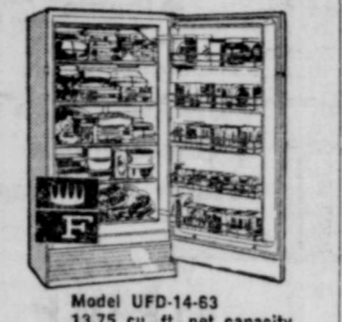

In the future it may be possible for every landowner, with a good sized fishing hole or a satisfactory place to hunt, to borrow money to develop the project.

A program has been developed by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman to broaden the lending program of the Farmers Home Administration to increase rural recreation facilities.

FHA now will accept loan applications from family farmers for recreational enterprises to supplement their farm incomes.

These same loans also are available to non-profit associations to cover costs involved in shifting land to new and more economic uses, which will include recreation.

Camping grounds, swimming facilities, tennis courts, riding stables, vacation cottages, lodges, lakes, ponds of water for sports, docks, nature trails, picnic grounds and hunting preserves may be provided on family farms through such funds, under the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962.

Maximum amount a landowner may receive for recreational enterprises is \$35,000. Amount of real estate development of land and building, including this development for recreational enterprises, is \$60,000.

Operating loans are made for up to seven years, but real estate loans are for up to 40 years. Interest rate is 5 per cent.

These funds are available to farm residents who are unable to provide needed funds or who cannot get credit elsewhere at reasonable rates and terms to finance actual needs. Landowners may get necessary information from their nearest county Farmers Home Administration office.

This can be considered implementation of the national recreational program announced last year, in which the importance of recreation to growing America was shown.

How much of the program that will be used remains to be seen.

Most major landowners admit they would rather not have a bevy of hunters on their places in the Fall. There are a few notable exceptions where places have been made available on a fee basis. Some of these have been possible because much of the deer country now is becoming overrun with deer and the landowners find fees for hunting will help offset the feed bill.

But there has been a general tendency within recent years for landowners to make available their raw lands for fee uses in hunting. Also many places have allowed use of their fish-planted stock ponds at per day rates to fishermen.

It might be generally agreed that most of these places have shown no profit, but they do add some cash to the chicken and egg basket of the house-

hold. Landowners have been able to get fish from the Game & Fish Commission for restocking their tanks and lakes. Some of them have taken advantage of the commission's hatchery to get pen-raised quail to restock their range.

Drouth and other conditions unfortunately made bird restocking an uncertainty, with about as many dismal failures as profitable ventures. Mainly, where landowners have provided necessary cover, food and water, they have found their bird restocking programs worthwhile.

Naturally if a landowner borrows money from the FHA to equip his place with recreational facilities, same must be provided. If he wants to sell per day hunting for birds,

or the use of his fishing lake, the customer must be satisfied. Or if it is a nature trail, a swimming pool or just a restful cabin, then the things expected by the man who pays the bill must be there.

Perhaps the local Chamber of Commerce might be a better approach to the problem. Even though Federal money is available to individuals, a community project might fare better.

But it is worth looking into.

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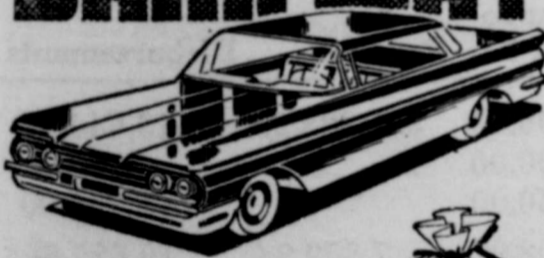

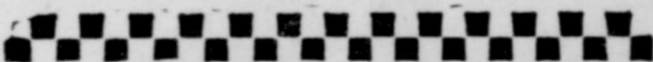

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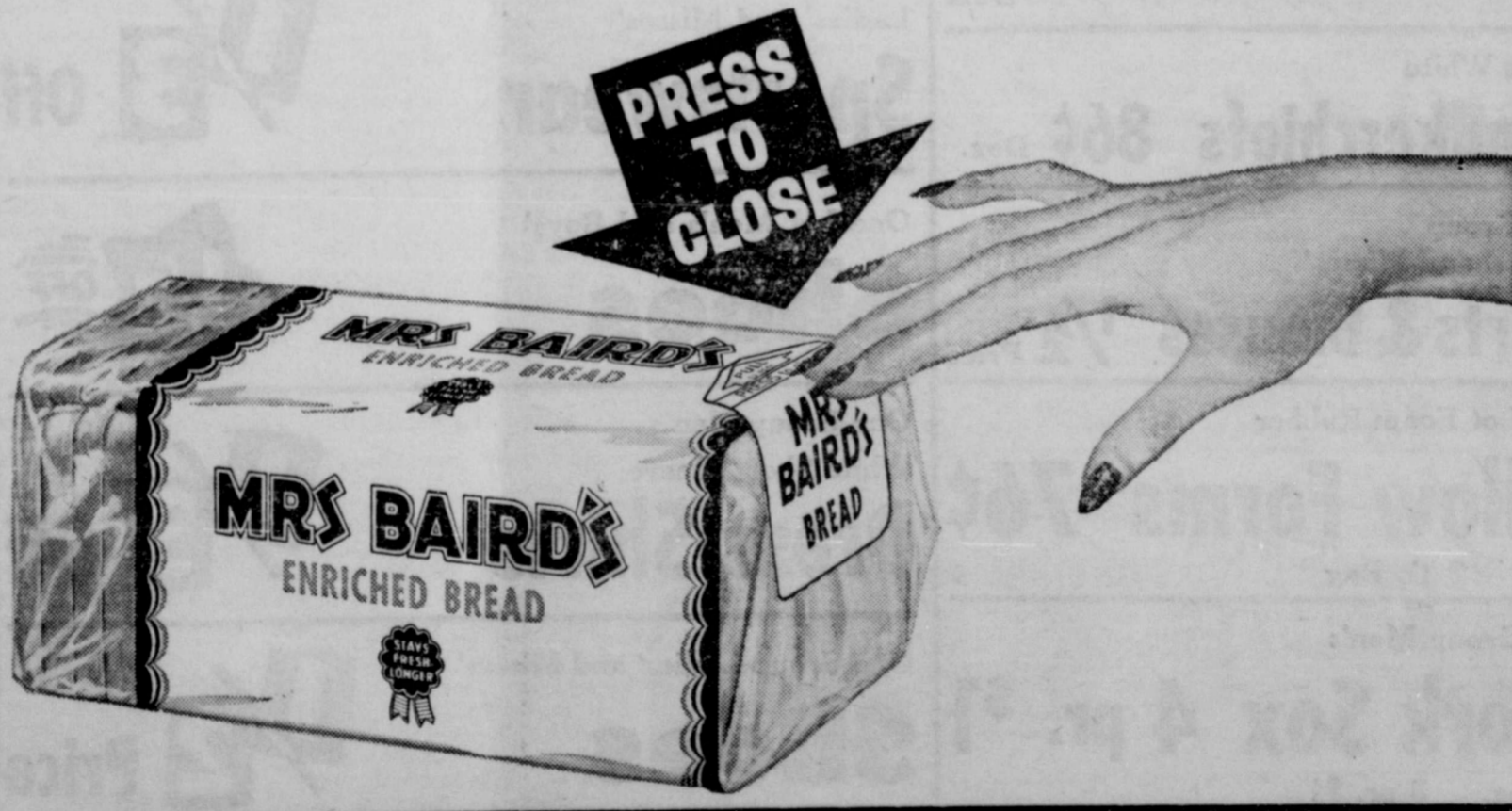
