The proposed improvement is planned to take care of the city's present population and allowing for increase of up to 2,000 population to take care of future growth.

The City of Goldthwaite has a permit to take water from the Colorado River.

This bond issue would be paid for from a water district tax. The tax roll would be set up on

approximately \$1,000,000,00, with a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

The tax bonds would be paid for over a period of not to exceed 35 years with interest at the prevailing rate for similar bonds but not to exceed four and one-half per cent.

COST TO TAXPAYER

The question that is naturally in the minds of all residents of the city and the water district is: What will it cost me?

That can be answered in easy simple terms. A person who now pays \$15.00 in city taxes would pay \$15.00 in water district taxes. An individual or business firm who pays \$200.00 in taxes to the city would pay a \$200.00 water district tax. Or, a person who now pays \$7.00 in city taxes would pay \$7.00 in water district taxes.



Bond

General Qualifications For Voting

In the City of Goldthwaite Bond Election and Water Contract Election, and the Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 **Bond Election**

Those Not Qualified:

- 1. Persons under 21 years of age.
- 2. Idiots and lunatics.
- 3. Paupers supported by the County.
- 4. Persons convicted of felony, except those restored to full citizenship or pardoned.

Persons Generally Qualified to Vote:

- 1. Must be at least 21 years of age.
- 2. Must be a citizen of the United States.
- 3. Must have resided in the State of Texas at least one year next preceding the date of the election.
- 4. Must be a resident of the county at the time of election and must have resided in the county continuously for a period at least six months prior to election date.
- 5. Must possess a 1963 poll tax receipt which must have been purchased prior to February 1, 1963 if he is a person obligated to pay the poll tax. (Persons exempt from poll tax: a person who is more than 60 years old, or who is blind, or deaf, or dumb, or is permanently disabled, or has lost one hand or foot, or a person who became 21 years of age after January 1, 1963 and before the day of the election. Voters residing in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or more must have obtained an exemption certificate prior to February 1, 1963, in order to vote. In cities or districts with inhabitants of less than 10,000, no exemption certificate is required to qualify them to vote at the election.)

Specific Qualifications for Voting in the **City Bond and Contract Election:**

1. Must posses the general qualifications listed above.



- 2. Must have resided within the city continuously for at least six months prior to the election date and must be a resident of the city on the date of the election.
- 3. Must own taxable property (or a community property interest therein, if husband and wife) within the City Limits of the City of Goldthwaite and must have duly rendered the same for taxation.

(Property shall be deemed to have been duly rendered for taxation for the purpose of determining eligibility to vote only if the property was rendered to the city within the period of time fixed by law for such rendition, or was placed on the tax rolls by the Tax Assessor prior to the date on which the election was ordered, if the regular rendition period expired before that date.)

Persons Qualified to Vote in District Election:

- 1. All persons qualified to vote in the City election as listed above.
- 2. All persons who possess the general qualifications listed above and who:
 - (a) reside within the District at the time of the election, even though less than six months; and
 - (b) own taxable property within the corporate limits of the District and have duly rendered the same for taxation (see notes above re this matter).

1. QUESTION: What will the water improvement project cost?

ANSWER: The overall cost will be \$425,000.00.

2. QUESTION: How will this be financed?

ANSWER: \$200,000.00 will be financed through City Utilities Revenue Bonds and \$225,000.00 will be financed through Water District Tax Bonds.

3. QUESTION: How will the city revenue bonds be paid?

ANSWER: This will be paid from the net revenues from the City Water, Sewer and Electric Utilities departments. The city's audit reports show ample operating profit over a period of years at the existing rates to retire these bonds which will amount to approximately \$12,000.00 per year. No tax will be paid to support this portion of the project.

4. QUESTION How will the water district tax bonds be paid?

ANSWER: This will be be paid from a water dis-

The tax rate will be \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation on a tax roll of \$1,000,000.00 which is equivalent to what the city now collects in taxes. For example: If you now pay city taxes in the amount of \$15.00 per year, you would pay water district taxes in the amount of \$15.00 per year. A person or firm paying \$100.00 in city taxes would pay water district tax in the amount of \$100.00, and a person now paying \$7.00 in city taxes would pay a water district tax of \$7.00.

5. QUESTION: Will Water rates be raised?

ANSWER: No, because the city's audit reports show that it will not be necessary to raise the present rate.

6. QUESTION: Who will buy the bonds and what will the interest rate be?

ANSWER: Bonds will be sold to private investment bidders, at the prevailing rate for similar bonds at the time of sale with the rate not to exceed four and one-half per cent. There is a good chance that the rate may be considerably less.

If you have a question that is unanswered in your own mind about the proposed water project you are invited to contact any member of the water improvement committee and they will be glad to talk to you about it. The committee invites and will welcome questions from any interested citizen.

More questions and answers will be presented next week.


