An Editorial Goldthwaite Needs More Water!

Goldthwaite needs more water.

Why does Goldthwaite need more water?

Because the community has been short of water each summer for the past fifteen years. Despite the fact that new and additional wells have been added during the years, the city's wells have been unable to keep up with the tremendous demand by water users during the summer months.

How badly does Goldthwaite need more water?

The story of just how badly Goldthwaite needs more water can best be told by some of the families that have been, and are, less fortunate than others and are completely out of water when the shortage hits the city during the hot dry weather seasons.

You can ask some of them, they can tell you the first hand story. If you don't know who these neighbors are, their names can be supplied.

Ask a family with one, two or three children, what it is like to be without water from around six o'clock in the morning until 10 or 12 midnight for six or eight weeks in the summer. When you hear their story you will know how badly more water is needed.

When a father tells you: "My family has had to leave home every summer for years, because we have no water. My wife just can't stay there with the children, especially with a baby, when we don't have water." Then you get the picture of how badly Goldthwaite needs more water.

Some are fortunate and have a well. This gives them water for their lawn, trees, shrubs and they can even connect it with the residence for household use. This is a big consolation.

How much consolation would there be though should their home catch on fire and the fire hydrant down on the corner is without water pressure? The home would be consumed by flames and they would even spread to the homes of neighbors and friends.

That may be a harsh illustration, and it would indeed be a terrible way to find out just how badly Goldthwaite needs more water.

A Vote For Water Bonds Is Vote Of Confidence In Community

Next Tuesday, August 20, qualified voters of the City of Goldthwaite and the Mills County Fresh Water Supply District Number One, will go to the polls and vote on \$425,000.00 in Bonds to finance an adequate water supply for the City and Water District.

Bonds To Finance Project Of Going To The Colorado River

Voters of the City of Goldthwaite and the Mills County Fresh Water Supply District Number One, will go to the polls next Tuesday, August 20, to vote on \$425,000.00 in two bond issues to finance a water improvement program that will insure an adequate water supply for the city and district for the future.

The election will be held in the City Hall with polls open from 8:00 a. m. until 6:00 p. m.

OFFICIALS FOR IT

This is a joint venture between the city and water district. The plan has the unanimous endorsement from the City Council and Water District Supervisors.

The water district boundaries are along old established survey lines which run substantially along the city limits with few exceptions where a few properties outside the city limits are included in the district because of the survey lines.

CITIZENS REQUEST IT

The bond Election was called by the City Council and the Board of Supervisors of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District after they were petitioned by nearly 500 interested citizens who requested that immediate steps be taken to try and solve the city's water supply problem.

without water from about 6 a. m. until near midnight for several weeks during the hot dry summer season.

TO COLORADO RIVER

The bond issues to be voted on will provide money to go to the Colorado River to get water. The City has a permit to take water from the river.

Proposed plans include pumping facilities at the river, an off-channel storage reservoir, filtration plant and pipe line to the city.

Pumping installation at the river will be sufficient to fill the settling basin, or storage reservoir, in 16 to 18 days. This will allow for pumping water when it is at its best and it will not be necessary to take water from the river when it is flooding or when it is low in flow.

Storage reservoir will cover 10 acres and will be 10 feet deep, holding 100 acre feet of water. After allowing 41 acre feet for evaporation and siltation this will provide enough water to run the city of Goldthwaite from two to three months without pumping from the river.

BEST PLAN AVAILABLE

This plan was recommended by Engineers employed by the city to make a survey and studies of every possible source of supply. The Colorado River project has been recommended by Engineers as the best source of supply and the most economical one to provide adequate water supply.

TWO BOND ISSUES

The project will be financed with the two bond issues to be voted on Tuesday.

One will be a City Utilities Revenue Bond issue in the amount of \$200,000.00 which will be paid for from net profits out of revenues from the city's water, sewer and electric utilities departments. These bonds will be paid out in not to exceed 30 years with not to exceed four and one-half per cent interest.

The other will be Water District tax bond issue in the amount of \$225,000.00 which will be paid for from a water district tax of \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation. The water district tax roll will be set up to correspond with the city's tax roll of approximately \$1,000,000.00 which is about 15 per cent of actual market value. The tax bonds will be paid out in not to exceed 35 years with interest not to exceed four and one-half per cent.

THREE BALLOTS

Voters will have three ballots in the Tuesday election. One will be for the city utilities revenue bonds, a second ballot on a contract for the city to purchase water from the district, and another ballot will be for the water district tax bonds.

Residents of the city will vote on all propositions and residents of the water district who reside outside the city limits will ballot only on the water district tax proposition.

WHO CAN VOTE

All resident, qualified electors of city and, or, water district who own taxable property in said city, and, or, water district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote in the election.
