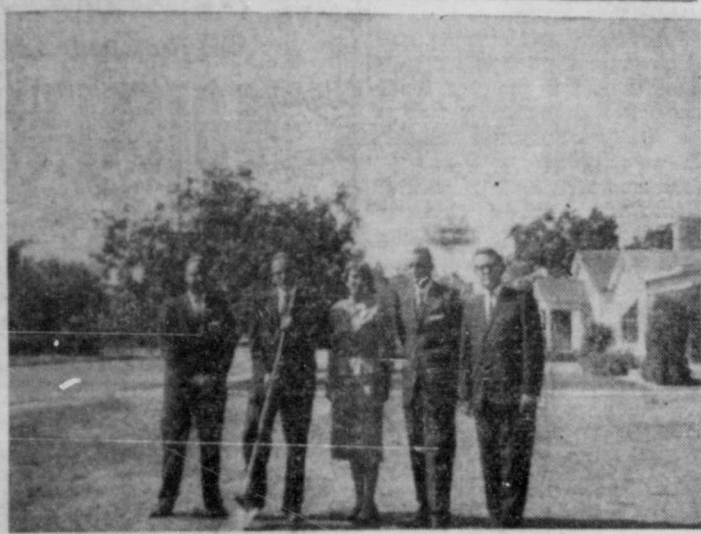

Eagles Defeat Comanche 38-0; District Play Opens Friday Nite

Truett Auldridge is general contractor. It will be a three bedroom brick home with two car garage and will be completely air-conditioned.

The fighting Eagles won their fourth football victory Friday night by defeating the Comanche Indians 38-0.

In four games the Eagles have scored 134 points with an average of 33 points per game. Their opponents have scored a total of only 38 points. The Eagles have also averaged, each game, 320 yards rushing. Top yardage gainers in Friday's action were Jim Childress netting 145 yards, Cecil Campbell netting 128, Harlan Jernigan 107, and Jerry Rountree 49.

The Indians were off with a war whoop in the opener of the game. Charles McNutt stepped off 48 yards before being stopped and a quick pass from Indian Chief Gray Jolink to number one Brave McNutt put the Indians on the Goldthwaite 12. Another Jolink, McNutt pass brought the Indians to a standstill when Eagle DeWayne McCasland intercepted the ball on the two yard line.

The shock-up Eagles began to fight back, however, and 13 plays later or 98 yards away on the other end of the field Gene Gray stepped over the goal line for 6 points and Cecil Campbell added another 2. From then on it was the Eagles' game. Harlan Jernigan carried the ball 30 yards setting up the next Eagle TD. Try for points after failed, making the score at halftime 14-0.

In the third period the Eagle line was opening up big enough holes that in 11 plays they drove 90 yards for 8 more points.

An onside kick recovered by Campbell and a few quick bursts by Jernigan and Childress brought the score to 30-0. The final Eagle tally was set up when Gene Auldridge recovered an Indian fumble on the Indian 34. Gray finally passed to McCasland and Jernigan carried for the PAT ending the game with the score at 38-0.

CONFERENCE PLAY OPENS FRIDAY NIGHT

Friday the Eagles will take on the Santa Anna Mountaineers in the first conference game of the season. All the way big Eagles! Game time is 7:30 on Eagle Field in Goldthwaite.

City Council And Water Board Will Sell Bonds Monday Night

Members of the City Council and the Board of Trustees of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, will meet in joint session Monday night, October 7, in the city hall to receive bids for the City Revenue and Water District tax bonds.

Bonds are to be sold on the open bond market to the best bidder.

Brochure and prospectus have been prepared along with the transcript for sale of the bonds. City revenue bond issue amounts to \$200,000.00 while the Water District Tax bond issue is in the amount of \$225,000.00.

City Manager W. C. Barnett announced Tuesday that survey work on the project is nearing completion. The site for pump-

ing facilities at the river has been located as well as the site for the off-channel storage reservoir. Both will be located on the Floyd Sykes property.

The off-channel storage reservoir will be approximately one-half mile from the river. Sales contract has been entered into by the City of Goldthwaite and Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Sykes for purchase of approximately 18 acres of land, easement across their property and a fifty year lease for approximately one acre of land at the river with renewable clause for an additional 50 years.

Total cost for the purchase of land, easement and lease arrangement is \$9,000.00.

The court has had a wooden tank tower erected on the court yard, which will place the water tank high enough to put the water in the court house.

Messrs. W. A. Hawkins, F. F. Henry and Henry Peck were here from Star Monday buying lumber for a Masonic Hall at Star. The hall will be built as a second story to Hawkins Bros. Drug Store and in order to make the upper story of sufficient width the lower story will be widened several feet.

The public school opened Monday with an attendance of 360 and a very encouraging outlook for a successful term.

The new court house will be completed in a short time, as only a small amount of "finishing" is necessary. All who see the building is pleased with it and wonder that the court could have secured such a building for the contract price. While the cost to Mill's County will be very little more than \$68,000, it is not likely the house could be duplicated for less than \$100,000.

Up to the time the Eagle was put to press 1960 bales of cotton had been received at the Union Yard and Warehouse and 1600 at the public yard.

On the same date last year the Union Yard and Warehouse had received 3429 and the public yard 1729.

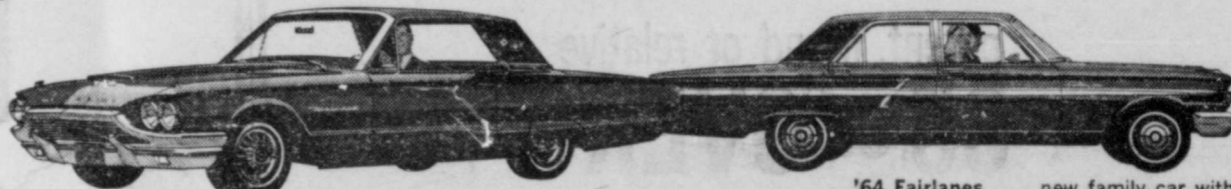

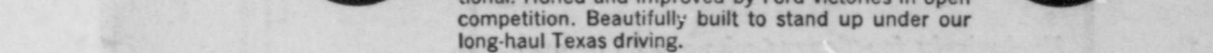

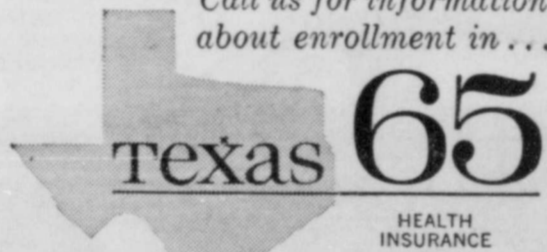

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas — Gov. John Connally spiked increasing rumors of a "near future" special legislative session on congressional redistricting and made clear that he plans to await the decision of a federal court on this touchy issue.

In a specially-called press conference, the Governor also emphasized his support for poll tax repeal. He said "chaos" will result at the polls if the state constitutional amendment is rejected and the Federal amendment to ban the poll tax requirement for voting in presidential and congressional elections is ratified.

Connally was in Washington this week to discuss U. S. financing of the screwworm eradication program, oil imports, forest lands around Toledo Bend Dam, the Jefferson County seawall project, and possibility of a national park in the Guadalupe Mountain Peak area.

He said that President Kennedy may come to Texas on or about November 21-22.

Connally indicated no surprise at a recent statewide Belden Poll which showed that 61 per cent of the voters interviewed approved of the way he is running his office. That's an increase of seven per cent since May. Survey revealed that Mexican-American, Negro and labor representatives liked the Governor by about the same percentage as other voters.

Redistricting Suit Heard

A federal court took under advisement a Republican group's suit for Texas congressional reapportionment. Suit alleges discrimination against big cities in present representation.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr argued that the U. S. Supreme Court has furnished the Legislature no real guidelines for carrying out new districts.

Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen, chairman of the House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts, testified that this was a key factor in the Legislature's failure to redistrict this year.

Await Federal Action

Carr told newsmen he plans to take speedy action to enforce the Texas Communist registration law after the federal government winds up its present proceedings against John W. Stanford Jr. of San Antonio.

U. S. Subversive Activities Control Board held lengthy hearings on alleged-Communist Stanford's activities at the request of U. S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy.

Stanford refused to register under either State or Federal Communist control laws. Recently he wrote President Kennedy: "The government has no business telling me what my politics should be."

Law Enforcement Conference

Hundreds of local prosecutors, sheriffs, judges and policemen met here for the 13th annual attorney general's law enforcement conference.

Speakers included Carr; Dist. Atty. Alton R. Griffin, 72nd judicial district; Gaines Co. Judge Charles E. Lawrence; Dawson Co. Sheriff Henry C. Mayfield; Washington Atty. Gen. John J. O'Connell; Midland Co. Atty. Harrell Moore; Harris Co. D. A. Frank Briscoe; Runnels County Judge W. H. Rampy; Gray Co. Sheriff R. H. (Rufe) Jordan; Dallas Co. D. A. Henry Wade; State Atty. Leon Douglas of Vernon; Dist. Atty. Bill W. Waters of Pampa; State Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall; Assistant Atty. Gen. J. C. Davis; and Federal Judge John R. Brown of Houston.

Tribute To Garrison

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., received a surprise tribute on his 25th anniversary as director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Said Sec. of State Crawford C. Martin, representing the Governor at the program honoring Garrison: "It is a tremendous job protecting the lives and property of the people of Texas. We Texans are very fortunate in having a tremendous man to do the job over the past quarter of a century."

Crisis Period Ahead

Following a meeting of leaders in the screwworm program, Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde, predicted the eradication drive will face perhaps its most crucial test within the next 30 to 60 days.

Screwworm cases were reported in the Big Bend area, Wilson, Kinney, Medina, Bandera, Dimmit, Maverick, Edwards, Prio, Val Verde and Zavala counties.

Program leaders called for early drop of more sterile flies

in the areas hardest hit. Also establishment of a federally-financed "barrier" zone 200 miles deep into Mexico to block continued migrations of screwworm flies across the border.

Disaster Areas Proclaimed

President Kennedy notified Governor Connally that he has declared the zone hit by Hurricane Cindy on September 16 as a "major disaster" area. He also advised that damages are being surveyed by federal government representatives to determine assistance requirements. President Kennedy pledged "all possible assistance in the rehabilitation of the area."

New Appointments

A Governor's Committee on Eradication of Tuberculosis in Texas, headed by Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre of Woodlawn Hospital, Dallas, has been appointed by Governor Connally.

He also reappointed Louis A. Scott, El Paso attorney as Rio Grande Compact Commissioner

Vacancy Claim

Guerry Strong of Austin contends that a land "vacancy" exists in Victoria County. However, his claim has been turned down by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

So Strong will file suit in Victoria County within 90 days, seeking to have some 6,300 acres of land declared the property of the public school fund, instead of private owners. Since the land involved contains much oil and gas production, the claim is being hotly contested by the landowners and oil and gas companies with interests in the area.

Strong has filed another claim in Hidalgo County on a long, thin stretch of land which has 1,800 landowners.

Should Strong be successful, the "good faith claimants" will have the right to buy back the land they thought they owned, at a price set by Sadler. Strong will get one-sixteenth of the oil and gas, and the school fund will get the rest of the royalty.

Health Report

Only 49 cases of polio had been reported to the State Health Department by mid-month.

Veneral disease is on the upswing in Texas. By September 14, a total of 21,405 cases of gonorrhea had been reported, compared to 1962's high of 20,086. Syphilis cases totaled 4,156, compared to 3,562 at this point last year.

Thornberry Resigns

Tenth District Congressman Homer Thornberry of Austin has resigned. Effective date is December 20. Thornberry is to become a federal district judge in El Paso.

Voters will select a new congressman on November 9. That's the day Texans vote on the four proposed constitutional Amendments.

Immediately following Thornberry's resignation J. J. (Jake) Pickle of Austin resigned his post on the Texas Employment Commission and announced as a candidate for Congress.

Pickle, 49, was appointed by Gov. Price Daniel to a five year term on the TEC in January of 1961. He has been active in Democratic circles since his graduation from the University of Texas in 1938.

Rep. Jack Ritter Jr. of Austin announced for the post several weeks ago when Thornberry first indicated he might resign.

Ogallala

A vast underground water reservoir, which supplies irrigation and municipal water for all or part of 48 counties in West Texas, was the subject of a two-day hearing before the Texas Water Pollution Control Board.

Water districts in the area from Dalhart to Odessa asked the board to outlaw the use of open, unlined salt-water disposal pits by oil and gas operators. Their experts contend that salt seeps into the underground formation, contaminating the water.

Oilmen were concerned that the Pollution Control Board might set up regulations for the use of salt water disposal wells which would replace the pits as a means of getting rid of the water. They want supervision of their operations to remain under the Railroad Commission.

Board delayed hearing until November 20, to give the oil industry time to make suggestions for curing the problem.

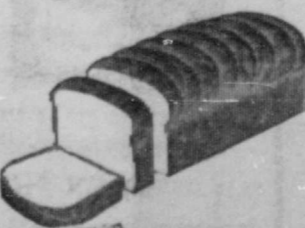

Marlin's artesian wells first sprang forth when a driller, hired by the town to dig a municipal well, struck a gusher of steaming water. This water ran as hot as 147 degrees and had a distinct taste. Though at first disgusted, the town finally realized the importance of this gusher. Marlin soon became a mecca for the ill. Today this everlasting

spring, that flows 380,000 gallons a day, is the world's deepest hot mineral water supply. Why not make your next vacation a real vacation for health . . . and visit Marlin?

Tex-Ark-Ana, 3 In 1
Called "The Pleasure Crossroads of the Gulf Southwest," it's officially named Texarkana, Texas. Texarkana lies right on the Texas-Arkansas border. But it derives its name from three states—TEXAS, ARKANSAS and LOUISIANA. It might well have added a fourth state in its name, as it's located just 26 miles south of the Oklahoma border too. Texarkana is truly a composite of four states and is the great recreational center for the Northeast Texas area.

Old Trails Not Forgotten
Very few of today's highways are known throughout the country. Even fewer will be remembered in the years to come. This is not true of the old trails and the men who guided early-day travelers across the country. Nevermore shall bold Mackenzie, With his brave and dauntless band, Guide the restless, roving settlers Through the Texas borderland. Yes; that soldier's work is over, And the dim trail rests at last; But his name and trail still leads us Through the borders of the past.

San Antonio's Little City
San Antonio's earliest residential settlement has been restored. Back in 1722 it housed the soldiers attached to Mission San Antonio de Valero — better known as the Alamo. Mexican General Cos surrendered there after the Texans captured San Antonio in 1835. The little settlement to which we refer is La Villita, the "Little City." It is located in the heart

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

By ELGIN SMITH

September brings us back to time to start preparing for fall planting. Most of the Brown-Mills SCD landowners and operators plant a large part of their cropland to small grain. Other valuable crops to be planted in the fall are the winter cover crops.

All cropland soils need soil improving crops to maintain condition, increase or maintain organic matter and to get and maintain top production. How often the soil improving crop is needed will depend on the type of soil and kinds of other crops grown.

Continuous cropping of land results in the removal of nutrients and burning out of organic matter. A soil in this condition loses its structure, fertility, and runs to gether.

We can't do anything about the weather, but we can do something about conditioning the soil. Cover cropping is one way to get that condition.

One of our more popular winter legumes is Austrian Winter Peas. They should be planted in October at the rate of about 30 pounds per acre if drilled

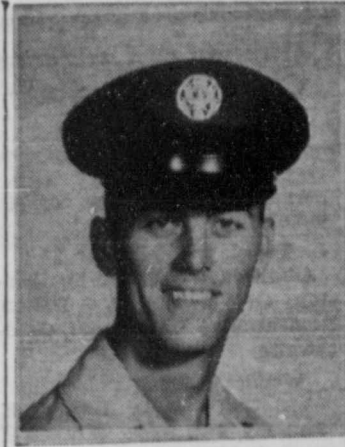
V. C. Tyler, Jr., Completes Training At San Diego Base

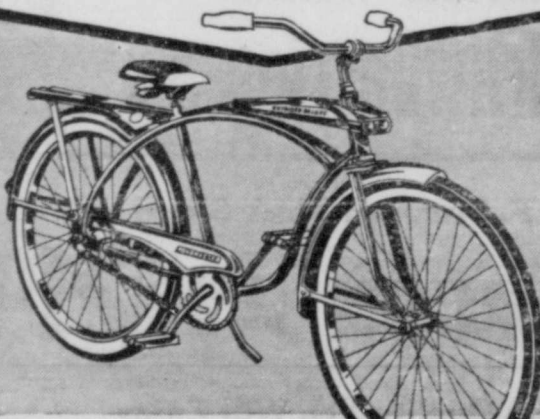

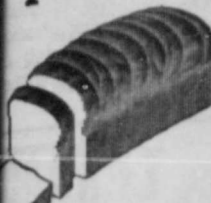

Mills County Gets First Of Seven Civil War Veterans Grave Markers

The Mills County Historical Survey Committee has received the first Memorial Marker for a Civil War veteran's grave of the seven ordered. The marker is for the grave of James W. "Tarheel" Smith, 1842-1931, who is buried in the Oak View Cemetery at Mullin. The stone was ordered at the request of Mr. E. P. Smith of Brownwood, who is a grandson of the veteran, according to Mrs. Floyd Manuel, Chairman of the Civil War Graves Marking Committee.

The State of Texas, working through Survey Committees, organized in each county, is in an intensive campaign to preserve historical sites within the state, such as old buildings, towns, forts, trees, cemeteries of historical significance, and graves of Civil War veterans.

Two buildings in the county, the jail and the Masonic Lodge Hall at Center City, have been marked with the historical building Medallions.

From now through March, 1965, the Centennial of the Civil War, the Mills County Historical Survey Committee would like to place a memorial marker at the grave of each Civil War veteran buried in the county whose grave is not marked. The United

States Government will furnish a monument for the grave of any veteran. The only expense to the veteran's family is transporting the stone from the Goldthwaite Freight Depot and setting it at the grave. There are five styles of markers to choose from.

The Mills County Survey Committee urges the cooperation of everyone in an endeavor to mark all graves of veterans at this time. They ask that each one take a look at the cemeteries with which they are acquainted, locate old unmarked graves, and help the committee find and identify the graves of veterans.

To apply for a marker, they need the veteran's full name, birth and death dates, service record, and any other pertinent information. If they have the name and the state in which he enlisted they can get the service record from the archives of the State Library. The names of his officers or men who served with him often help in identifying a veteran with his record.

New Health Insurance Plan Now Available To Texans 65 And Over

Governor John Connally was proclaimed October as Texas 65 Month in observance of the first enrollment period of the new health insurance Plan for Texans 65 years of age and over.

In declaring Texas 65 Month, the Governor stated, "Texas 65 permits commercial insurance companies doing business in Texas to pool their resources to provide a special program of voluntary insurance for our senior citizens. It is a vital step in our plans to assure adequate health care for all Texans 65 years old and past regardless of their health."

"Texas 65 is being introduced in October, and my Proclamation calls attention to the Plan and its contribution to the public welfare," he stated.

Present in the Governor's office when he issued the Texas 65 proclamation were representatives of the insurance industry, members of the State Board of Insurance, the Insurance Commissioner and officials of the Texas 65 Health Insurance Association.

The unique health insurance plan will be available, during October, to all Texans 65 years of age and over through insurance agents licensed to sell health insurance in the state.

Stacy's Insurance Agency and Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital in Goldthwaite are supporting the Texas 65 plan to provide this new health insurance to residents of Mills County who are 65 years old and over. Their message appears in this paper.

Rural Community Water System Loan Program Is Expanded By FHA

Modern water systems will be serving 40,000 rural Americans for the first time soon.

These people are resident of 135 rural communities in 28 states where the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration approved \$15 million in loans during fiscal 1963 to finance community water systems.

In making the announcement, Secretary Orville L. Freeman pointed out that the loan program to finance rural water systems has been greatly expanded during the past three years.

He said the number of water system loans had increased ninefold during this period, and that the volume of loans had increased from less than \$1 million to the present \$15 million level.

This FHA program makes possible low cost, long-term loans to rural communities, water districts and other nonprofit sponsoring groups in rural areas for equipment and construction work necessary to provide

pipled-in water for homes, farms, businesses, schools, churches and other community enterprises. These loans are repaid over periods up to 40 years, and carry a maximum interest rate of 5 per cent, according to Marlis C. Barker, County FHA supervisor.

"Farmers Home Administration rural water system loans have a direct, immediate impact on a community's overall development," Secretary Freeman said. "They not only provide a fundamental resource—ample, clean water supplies—to encourage rural businesses and industries, but also help bring a higher level of family living."

Largest number of community water system loans was made in Texas—32 totaling \$2,217,060. The next largest number of loans, 19, was made in Kansas for a total of \$1,179,070. The third largest number of water supply loans was closed by the Colorado Farmers Home Administration office with 14 valued at \$3,295,300.

Study Shows Texas Banks Largest Lenders To Farmers And Ranchers

Texas banks were serving farmers and ranchers with more credit and other financial service than any group of lenders at the beginning of this year, according to W. P. Duren, President, Mills County State Bank. During 1962, the state's banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services.

Based on the 22nd annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural Committee of The American Bankers Association, Mr. Duren reported that at the beginning of the year, Texas banks were helping farmers and ranchers with \$509 million in loans, 21 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$430 million in production loans and \$79 million in farm mortgages. At the same time, \$344 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies; \$263 million by the Federal Land Banks; \$135 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$69 million in non-real estate loans plus \$54 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 68 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Texas farmers and ranchers came from banks.

Mr. Duren said that "bankers in Texas, as well as throughout the country, are taking a realistic look at agriculture, ap-

praising it from the standpoint of its total contribution to the economy. Through the years the agricultural industry, as a part of the total economy, has remained relatively stable, with the 'off-the-farm' portion becoming increasingly significant. Bankers, therefore, are broadening their services and are also developing and promoting programs that consider the interwoven relationships between farmers and ranchers and related businesses.

"Capital has become one of the main pillars in agriculture, with the total investment increasing fourfold during the past 20 years. Today farm and ranch families nationally have approximately \$196 billion invested in their operations, with the average investment per farm or ranch estimated to be \$47,632—twice the amount reported just 10 years ago."

Mr. Duren stressed the importance of farmers and ranchers and bankers working closely together to improve farm and ranch financial arrangements. He reported that 94 per cent of the insured banks throughout the country had agricultural loans outstanding at the first of the year, with 95 per cent of the insured commercial banks in Texas extending credit to farm and ranch people.
