The annual meeting for members of the Mills County Farm Bureau will be held this Saturday night, October 19, in the High School Lunchroom at Goldthwaite, according to announcement by Allen Hardgrave, president, and W. W. Fox, secretary-treasurer of the organization.

There will be a barbecue supper served at 7:00 p. m. and the business meeting will get underway at 8:00 p. m.

Farm Bureau will furnish the meat, bread, pickles, onions and drinks and the ladies are asked to bring cakes, pies and salads, according to announcement by officials.

A large turnout is expected since there is some special business to be transacted with several policies to be discussed. Also directors and officers are to be elected.

One director will be elected from each precinct and officers will be named for the new year.

Members are reminded to give some thought to their choice of director and officers to serve them the next year.

Mills County Farm Bureau officials point out the following information to give some idea of what the organization is doing to encourage others to join the organization and work with their friends and neighbors toward a common goal.

Members of the Farm Bureau have policy sessions and as a

group keep members of the Legislature posted on what the thinking of Farm Bureau members is, with regard to proposed or needed legislation.

Local officials are urging all farm and ranch people in the county to become members of the Farm Bureau so that the organization may become even more effective in a united stand for their interests.

### POLICY COMMITTEE ISSUES AN APPEAL

Members of the policy committee are issuing an appeal to all farmers and ranchers, whether member of the Farm Bureau or not, to attend the meeting Saturday night.

All are invited to take part in the discussions and review of the policies to be adopted by the group. Only members are eligible to vote on the policies and other official business of the organization.

Arnold Head, chairman of the policy committee, issued the following statement:

"Warning to all land owners. Do you cheerfully accept liability for everyone crossing your property? Do you think you have enough insurance and how much is enough? The law could be changed, you outnumber the lawmakers who put it on you.

"Do you want to elect county commissioners from the county-at-large or on a precinct level? Do you want the State Constitution changed or re-written? There have been strong attempts made to make these changes.

"Rewards for your efforts through Farm Bureau might surpass your fondest hopes."

## Eagles Beat Copperas Cove 24-6; Play Burnet Here Friday Night

The Goldthwaite Eagles chalked up another grid victory Friday when they upset the Copperas Cove Bulldogs 24-6.

This gives the Bulldogs a 4-2 record for the season.

The Eagles on the other hand hold a 6-0 record with a 2-0 in district play.

### TO PLAY BURNET FRIDAY NIGHT

Friday night looks like another rough game when the Eagles will take on the Burnet Bulldogs who defeated Early High last week 42-24. The Bulldogs and Eagles are tied, each having won their first two conference games. Game time Friday night is 8:00 p. m. on Eagle field.

The Eagles received an early break in Friday's action when punter Charles Bishop fumbled on the snapback on fourth down for the Bulldogs. The Eagles took their opportunity and pounced on the ball on the Cove 25 yard line. Cecil Campbell carried for one yard before he was stopped. Then on the second play he dashed 24 yards for the first score of the game. Campbell carried again for the two point conversion giving Goldthwaite a 8-0 lead which they carried to the half.

In the third period the Eagles took the ball on their own 32 and were unable to move. Gene Aldridge punted and the ball died on the Bulldog 38. In three plays the Bulldogs moved the ball only six yards and were forced to punt. The Eagles began their next drive on the 25 and in six plays moved 71 yards to the Bulldog 4. Harlan Jernigan was the main ball carrier on this drive picking up good yardage. He finally plunged over for 6 points and Gene Gray added 2 making the score 16-0.

The Eagles kicked off to the Dog 38. On Copperas Cove's first play quarterback Louis Dewald took the ball, stepped back and threw to Keith Bogard who was running along the sideline. Bogard scored untouched by the Eagles. After the Eagle kickoff he didn't return to the huddle but stood in front of the Cove bench until the ball was snapped, then he ran down the sideline for 6 points after catching Dewald's pass.

The Doggies were unable, however, to make the extra points and the Eagles still led 16-6.

The last Eagle tally came when Gray went over from the 12 ending a 55 yard drive and then added the PAT. The Eagles had a 24-6 lead which they held the remainder of the hard fought game.

Jernigan and Campbell were the leading ball carriers for the evening. In 13 tries Jernigan netted 108 yards while Campbell picked up 105 in 15 attempts. Jim Childress was close behind with 92 on 12 trips. Gray picked up 26 and Jimmy Ball 17.

So far this 1963 football season Cecil Campbell has made 64 points, Jim Childress 42, Gene Gray 34, Harlan Jernigan 32, DeWayne McCasland 12, Jimmy Ball 12, Jerry Rountree 8, and Gene Aldridge 6.

There were 322 bales of cotton, counting round as half bales, ginned in Mills County, from the crop of 1938 prior to October 1, 1938, as compared with 1,265 bales ginned to October 1, 1937.

Saturday an election will be held by the city of Goldthwaite to decide whether the city shall issue \$45,000 of revenue bonds for the purpose of financing a municipal light and power system. If approved the proceeds of the bonds will be used either to purchase distribution system of the Community Public Service Company, or to build a new distribution system.

Rev. Fred R. Brucks, pastor of the Methodist Church here, will leave Wednesday for San Antonio to attend the West Texas Annual Conference. This will be the last Conference to be held by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as next year the southern and northern churches will be united and will hold their conference together.

To date Mills County has received 463 checks amounting to \$19,000 for distribution to farmers who co-operated with the 1937 soil-building program. The total amount to be paid farmers of this county will be \$69,582.

Published elsewhere in this paper is the quarterly statement of condition of the Trent State Bank. It shows that the bank has \$607,254.74 in deposits and a total resources of \$686,998.95 including \$308,912.60 in cash.

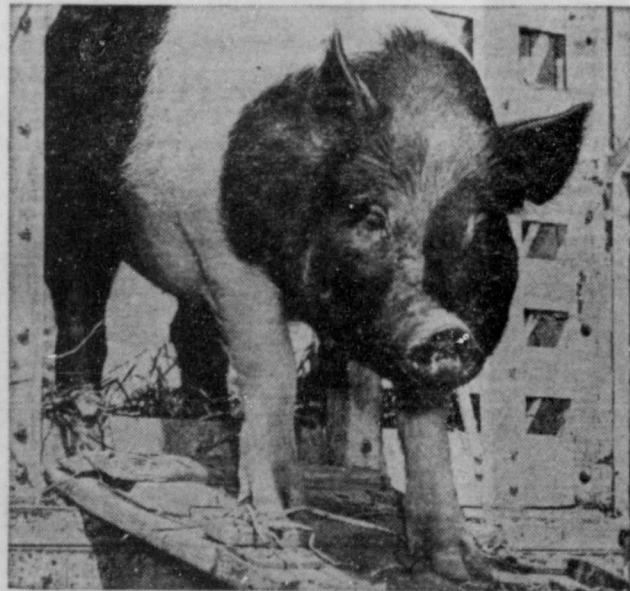

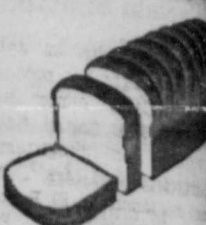

**OUTDOORS IN TEXAS**

Most hunted game bird in Texas is the mourning dove. It is also one of the most trying of all winged targets. And that probably is the reason it ranks so high with sportsmen.

When you go dove hunting, you don't just take along one box of shells. Most hunters take two boxes and sometimes more.

A few expert shotgun artists can grass a dove with almost every shot. But let's face it — only a minute percentage of hunters are expert marksmen.

The mourning dove is a small bird. It can't take a lot of punishment, and it's easy to kill. That is, if you can hit it. And hitting this bird is the real challenge in dove hunting.

To begin with, the dove flies very fast. Furthermore, its flight pattern is deceiving.

For example, most birds will tower for altitude when shot at . . . but not the mourning dove. It makes a shallow dive to pick up speed. This shallow dive confuses tyro gunners into believing they have a hit bird. Thus they don't follow up with a second shot.

The dove's small size makes range estimation difficult. With field loads in a 12-gauge gun you can kill doves at 40 to 45 yards. But at that distance the bird looks mighty small. Some hunters pass up these shots because they think the bird is out of range.

Too many hunters wait until the bird is just 20 or 25 yards out. At this distance, if they're shooting a full choke gun, they must have the bird right in the pattern. Actually, at this short range, the pattern of a full choke gun doesn't open up enough.

So, quite often they'll shoot in front of or behind the bird.

A modified choke is best for this range. Open bore is even better. But an open bore gun is useless on long range shots.

Some hunters even wait to make their shots at 10 or 15 yards.

Unless it's a straight-in shot, they'll usually miss at this close distance because of the difficulty in swinging the gun on a target crossing at 50 or 60 miles per hour. And when they do hit on these short shots, they literally blow the birds to bits.

Doves are plentiful throughout Texas. Often you can get some choice shooting just outside the city limits.

There are several ways to hunt doves. In dry years the best hunting is usually around a pond or farm tank. Take a stand and pop the birds as they sail in for water. You don't even need a blind. Just squat down in the grass and keep still.

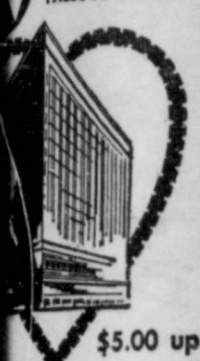

## Goldthwaite Ag Students Survey Screwworm Situation In District

An increase in screwworms this fall could hamper early completion of the program to

eradicate the insect, Layton Black, vocational agriculture teacher at Goldthwaite High School, states.

Mr. Black said the opportunities to eliminate the screwworm from the Southwest are extremely favorable at this time, but assistance from farmers and ranchers is needed or chances for success could be jeopardized.

To insure that this does not happen, Mr. Black and his students are conducting a weekly survey of livestock producers in the community to determine whether screwworm cases are being found and reported.

According to Mr. Black, the survey will work like this: (1) Each student is assigned five livestockmen to contact each weekend. (2) The student will ask the producer if he found any screwworm cases during the past week and if he collected a sample and reported the case. (3) The reports from all of the students are compiled on Monday and a single report is sent to screwworm eradication headquarters at Mission, Texas.

These reports are used by eradication workers in determining where and how many sterile flies should be released. Screwworm reports received from vocational agriculture teachers last spring may have prevented serious screwworm outbreaks in many parts of Texas, officials said.

Local livestock producers can help the program by examining their livestock frequently, treating wounds with smears and collecting 10 or more worms from infested wounds and delivering the sample to the vocational agriculture teacher, county agent or livestock inspector.

Mr. Black urged farmers and ranchers not being contacted by a Vo-ag pupil, who find a worm-infested wound, to contact him or one of the students immediately.

## District Seven Sheep And Goat Raisers To Meet

The membership of District 7 of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association will hold its annual meeting in San Saba in the High School Auditorium at 7:00 p. m., Monday, October 21.

State Senator Louis Crump of San Saba will head the list of speakers, according to L. M. Stephens of Lometa, District 7 chairman. In addition to the address by Senator Crump and reports on Association work this year, membership will elect directors to serve them on the Association's official board during 1964.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association is organized with 11 districts and district 7 is one of the largest and comprised of Brown, Burnet, Lampasas, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills and San Saba Counties.

Two hundred and fifty members attended last year's meeting, also held in San Saba, and Stephens reports that a large turnout is expected again this year. Wives of members will be welcome and a part of the program will be devoted to the wool and mohair fashion promotion programs of the Association which should be of interest to the ladies. Refreshments will be served following the meeting.

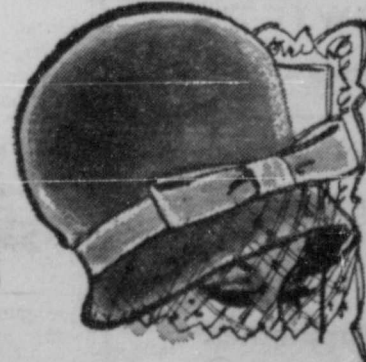

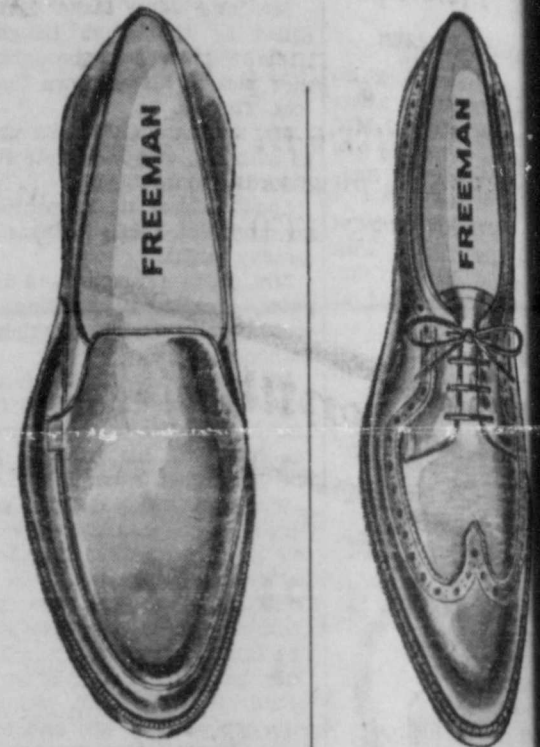
