Work On New School Buildings Moving On Schedule

Construction work on the new Goldthwaite school buildings is moving along on, or ahead of, schedule, according to LeRoy Beard, superintendent of schools. Walls on the new vocational agriculture building, band hall and physical education building for elementary school are up and workers are putting on the roofs now. Brick work on the walls is progressing at a rapid rate and is expected to be completed within the next week or 10 days.

The new gym entrance is also taking shape and is expected to be complete before the basketball season gets underway.

Sparks Construction Company, has the contract to put up the three new buildings and gym improvements which were approved by school district taxpayers in bond issue election last spring.

Council Meets Monday Night

The City Council met in regular session Monday night in the city hall.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments.

Engineering report was presented on the water project which is moving ahead on schedule.

The engineers hope to have plans and specifications ready to present to the council and water district board by their next regular meeting on December 2.

If plans are approved at that time, bids for construction will be advertised for and should be ready for awarding of contract by the following regular meeting on January 7.

The council adopted ordinance setting forth \$250.00 Arson Reward for the arrest and conviction of a person guilty of committing act of arson within the city limits of Goldthwaite.

Also an ordinance was approved setting forth speed limits on highways within the city limits of Goldthwaite as set up by the highway department.

Testimonial Dinner In Austin To Honor Senator Louis Crump

It was announced here this week that Senator Louis Crump of San Saba, State Senator for the 16th Senatorial District, will be honored at a testimonial dinner being given November 14th in Austin by his friends in the 18 county district which he represents. D. A. Cameron, Mayor of San Saba, is chairman of a committee of Crump's home town friends in charge of arrangements.

Mayor Cameron, in making the announcement, said that Crump would be the acting Governor of Texas on November 14, due to Governor John Connally's and Lt. Governor Preston Smith's absence from the state on that date. Crump, as President Pro Tempore of the State Senate, automatically becomes the state's Chief Executive in the absence of the Governor and Lt. Governor. Earlier this year Senator Crump acted as Governor for almost a week when Connally and Smith were both out of the state.

"We believe there can be no better time for expressing our appreciation of Louis Crump as our State Senator than on a day when he is occupying the office of Governor of Texas," Mayor Cameron said. "Accordingly, a group of his friends here in San Saba, joined by similar groups in each of the counties of his district, will go to Austin on November 14 to pay our respects to Acting Governor Crump at the Governor's office in the state capitol, and to honor him with a dinner that evening."

1964 Football Schedule Announced

The new 1964 football schedule for the Goldthwaite High School has been announced this week, with hopes of filling one more open date.

Schedule as announced Wednesday morning calls for nine games with two openings. School officials stated that of the two open dates, September 25, and October 23, they would like to schedule a game to be played with some school within any reasonable distance for the September opening. They prefer to keep the October 23 date open.

The schedule for next year calls for only four conference games, with five schools in district 9A.

Goldthwaite will not play Copperas Cove, Evant and Bangs next year while with the new schedule De Leon, Johnson City and Llano will be added.

In the schedule the Eagles will play three double A teams and one B team. San Saba, Comanche and Llano are the AA teams and Johnson City the B team.

Mills County Gets Heavy Rain Friday

Practically all of Mills County received some heavy rain last Friday with reports ranging from one and one-half inches up to more than five inches.

Goldthwaite got an official 3.14 inches, according to Harry Allen, weather observer.

Scallorn community reported 3.15 inches. The Mullin area reports up to 4 inches and better.

Chappell Hill community reported from three to five inches. In the Star area reports range from two to 3.50 inches.

Big Valley reported 3.15 to 4.15 inches. In Priddy they measured 2.50 inches while a few miles west of Priddy they reported 3.50 inches.

The Moline area reported a million dollar rain. Only part of the county reporting lighter rain was the extreme western area.

Farmers and ranchers were happy over the rainfall which

promises grazing prospects and also gave much needed relief in stock water.

Many reports indicate that stock tanks were filled and running round.

Ranchers report that if warm weather holds out for a while prospects are good for winter grasses and other vegetation to get started and provide some grazing for stock.

TEN MONTHS RAIN ONLY 12.61 INCHES

Rainfall recorded in Goldthwaite for the first ten months of this year measured only 12.61 inches.

The rain last Friday measured considerably more than was recorded here the past four months.

During the July, August, September and October months only 1.95 inches was chalked up. Of this amount July had .02 inch; August .95 inch; September .48 inch and October .50 inch.

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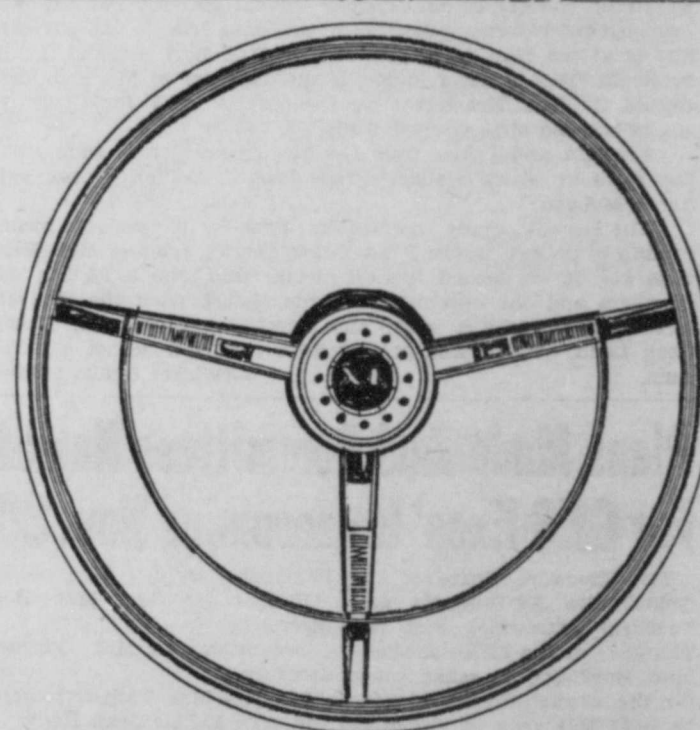

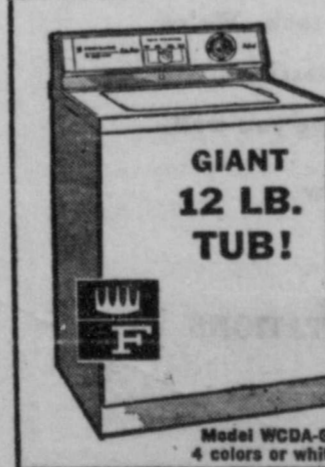

Austin, Texas — Gov. John Connally has made public the itinerary of his famous guests, President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy.

They are due in the Lone Star State on November 21 and 22.

The Kennedys will visit San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth, Dallas and Austin — in that order.

In San Antonio the President will preside at dedication ceremonies at the Aerospace Medical Center. He will arrive at Kelly Air Force Base about 3 p. m. on November 21.

That evening he will attend a dinner in Houston for Congressman Albert Thomas.

Next morning, Kennedy will be honor guest at a breakfast sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

At noon, he'll attend a Dallas Citizens Council and Graduate Research Center luncheon in Dallas.

Then he'll fly to Austin, arriving at Bergstrom Air Force Base about 4 p. m. That evening Gov. and Mrs. Connally will honor the Kennedys with a reception at the Mansion. Elected Democratic State officials and their wives will attend.

Tickets By The Ton
Most touted attraction of President Kennedy's Texas trip is the \$100-a-plate dinner, which the State Democratic Executive Committee will sponsor in the Austin Municipal Auditorium at 7:30 p. m. on November 22.

An SDEC aide estimates that

a ton of invitations—60,000 in all—have been mailed to Democrats over the state.

Goldwater Wagon

State Rep. Dick Morgan of Dallas, chairman of Texas' Draft Goldwater Committee, named Lewis J. Moorman Jr., San Antonio rancher-oilman as state finance chairman.

Moorman was state GOP finance chairman during the Nixon - for - President Campaign, and in U. S. Sen. John Tower's race in 1961.

GOP National Committeeman Albert B. Fay of Houston appointed members of the party's Candidates Committee to recruit "a blue-ribbon slate of candidates" for Republican primaries in 1964. They will meet in Dallas on December 12, for Republican primaries in 1964.

Recruiting Committee includes Fay, Mrs. Ike Kampmann Jr. of San Antonio, State Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. of Dallas, Mrs. G. N. McDaniel of Borger, Mrs. Tobin Armstrong of Armstrong, Wilton Fair of Tyler, W. J. Klattenhoff of Slaton, and J. C. Man Jr. of Wichita Falls.

Hospital Policies Aired

A special committee to review hiring policies in State hospitals was named by the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools. Action followed disclosures that a convicted kidnapper and former mental patient had worked as doctors at some state institutions.

Dr. Raleigh R. White of Temple said he considered employment by the San Antonio State Hospital of a woman doctor who had served a prison sentence for kidnapping an "error in judgment."

Board Chairman Howard T. Tellepsen of Houston reacting to newspaper criticism of hiring a former mental patient as a doctor at Wichita Falls State Hospital, pointed to progress made throughout the hospital system.

"Out of a total of some 220 doctors, we have a wonderful, dedicated group of men," Tellepsen commented. "You will find a few sour apples even among personnel of private companies which pay the best salaries, and we don't have a high wage scale compared to private industry."

Tellepsen named Dr. White to the personnel study committee along with Dr. George A. Constant of Victoria and Ward R. Burke of Diboll.

Another committee was named by the Board to select the site for a new school for the mentally retarded, to be located west of the one-hundredth meridian. Members of this committee are C. E. Bentley of Abilene, chairman; Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe; and Walter F. Woodul of Austin.

Advertise Texas

Twenty-seven advertising agencies are interested in handling Texas' \$200,000 account to promote travel and tourist spending in the State.

The 27 firms told Texas Tourist Development Agency they want to compete for the privilege of ballyhooing the State's attractions to the world. They represent 20 per cent of all agencies contacted. At a November 15 meeting TTDA will determine which firms will be asked to make formal presentation of advertising plans at their next meeting, set for January 16-17.

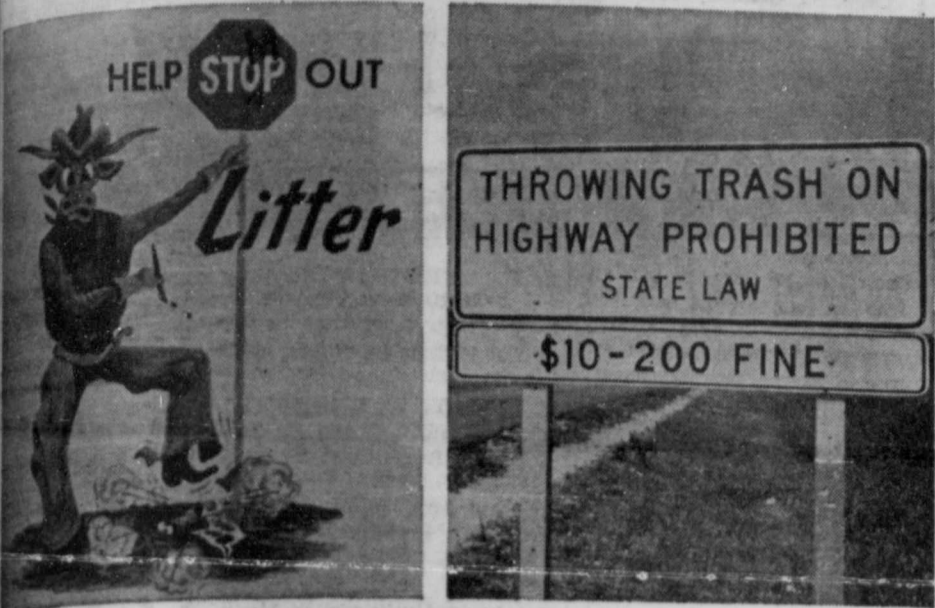

To Blaze A Trail

Catching Crawdads

Don't waste too much time trying to catch crawdad bait. They are mighty slippery little critters.

Instead, cut the top and bottom from a rather large tin can. When a crawdad is spotted, plop the can over the little booger, then leisurely pick him up.

By using this method the bait can be gathered quickly and neatly.

Mark Your Equipment

It is wise to plainly mark each piece of your property with name, address and phone number, using a ballpoint pen to keep markings waterproof.

A Bass Jigging Trick

When bumping the bottom for winter bass, there is no better bait than the popular plastic worm and jig . . . especially if the worm is blue.

However, if you wrap a tin-foil strip about an inch wide around the worm, nearest the hook, your luck probably will double.

Flashing of the foil attracts the reluctant lunker lurking nearby.

Best Line For Bass

Puzzled as to which weight line is best for bass fishing? The heavier line is hard to cast.

Consensus of opinion leans toward the 12-pound line as the heaviest to use for good casting. The lighter your line, the easier and farther you cast, all else being equal.

Family campers during 1962 increased so rapidly many of them gave up in disgust because they could find no place to pitch their tents.

This was true not only in Texas but across the nation. Also in Mexico and Canada.

According to figures recently released by the director of national parks, camp-use days in 1962 were recorded at 6,106,030. This is an increase of 14 per cent over the previous year.

This year the peak will go higher. To date, very few landowners have found a way to take advantage of this economy. Some don't even want to fool with campers.

Most of the state parks, national forest areas and other public lands have provided camp grounds and camp sites. These places usually provide adequate water, cook-out spots and sanitary facilities to make camping easier.

While there is a craze for primitive camping, most of the campers demand some degree of comfort and convenience. They want to get back to nature, but they want to do it the comfortable way.

They sleep in their station wagons, or on soft rubber mattresses on good quality cots. They want plenty of wood and water handy. Some even cook with electricity from outlets provided in the public camping areas.

More leisure hours and additional facilities, plus a desire to "rough it," are responsible for this camp-out craze. Summer vacation periods with camp-out trips by the Boy Scouts and other organizations also help the cause.

Most of the time it's just that mom and dad have a desire to give their youngsters some of the camping thrills they enjoyed as children before things got as crowded as they now are.

In Texas it would be a good project for some civic organization to try to develop camp sites. Landowners could be contacted and sold on the idea of adding such a program to their own economy. A landowner with a good water hole, accessible lake or stream and a wooded area might find it profitable to furnish camping facilities.

Garner State Park is a typical example of the manner in which people will use available facilities. It is practically impossible to get into this park now unless you've made your

reservation well in advance. Hundreds of persons pitch camp there every summer to enjoy the park facilities.

Landowners soon discover they can make more money than just the per day camping fee. With a concession they can

sell food and drinks—also at a profit. The concession business in most of the public areas is a paying proposition. It can be profitable to the landowner, too.

In many instances the campers themselves can be blamed for lack of interest on the part of landowners. Too many campers are willing to leave their litter for the landowner.

This is noticeable even in roadside parks, where tables, benches, fireplaces and trash cans are courteously provided. Too many users walk away from

their tables and leave all the old scraps, sacks and cans around to attract flies and varmints. And to mar the landscape!

Watermelon eaters especially are bad about this. They'll buy a cold melon along the way, then stop at the first roadside campsite and eat the melon. When through they'll leave the rind and seeds, and an extremely sticky table for the next fellow who comes along.

If you love the great outdoors, help preserve it in all its finery.

Rural Carriers Will Help With Livestock Survey

Rural mail carriers from the Goldthwaite Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 15.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Lucile Fairman explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mrs. Fairman said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: S. E. Thornton, Rt. 1; Julian Evans, Rt. 2; and Delmar Sears, Rt. 3.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service

releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

Seasons And Limits For South Central Regulatory District

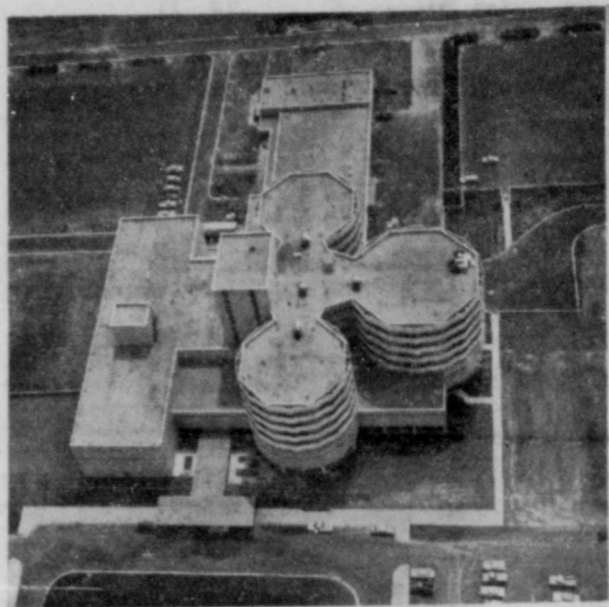
Reports coming in to the Austin offices of the Parks and Wildlife Department indicate that many hunters are not clear on the seasons and bag limits for the major game species in the South Central Texas Regulatory District. Included in this district are the counties of Ar-Frio, Hidalgo, Jim Wells, Kinney, Live Oak, Medina, San Patricio, Starr, Uvalde, Webb and Zavala. SO—if you are in doubt about the remaining seasons and bag limits here they are:

DEER: Bag limit, two (2) buck deer, antlerless deer in designated areas by permit only. No person may kill or possess more than three (3) deer in the aggregate. The open season is November 16 through December 31.

JAVELINA: Bexar, Cameron, Hidalgo, San Patricio, Aransas and Jim Wells counties, bag and possession limits, two (2) per season. Open season is from November 16 through December 31. In the remaining counties, there is no closed season or bag limits.

QUAIL: (This does not apply to San Patricio County) The bag limit is 12 quail per day and 36 in possession. Open season is November 16 through January 31.

TURKEY: Bag and possession limits are two (2) turkey gobblers per season, except in Frio, Cameron, Aransas, Starr, Hidalgo, Live Oak, Jim Wells and San Patricio counties where the bag and possession limits are three (3) turkey gobblers per season. (Not three per day as stated in an earlier release). The open season is November 16 through December 31.
