### Eagles Defeat Marble Falls 34-12 In Final District Game Friday

They've done it!! For the first time in the school's history the Goldthwaite Eagles have won the 9A district championship by defeating the Marble Falls Mustangs 34-12.

This boosts the Eagles' winning streak to 10 games for the season.

Friday's action was the first time the Eagles did not score on first possession of the ball. It was also the first time that the Eagles were scored on first this season.

But other records were broken that night also. Harlan Jernigan chalked up 1,017 yards rushing for the season and Cecil Campbell broke the old scoring record when he recorded his 106th point.

Things looked bad for the district champs in the first quarter. The Black and Gold took the kickoff but could only manage to gain four yards. When Campbell was finally dropped for a nine yard loss the Eagles were forced to punt. A bad snap sent Gene Gray chasing the ball to the end zone before he was able to kick it.

Marble Falls took possession on the Goldthwaite 28. On the first play from scrimmage, Mustang David Yuergen went the distance for the tally. The PAT failed but Marble Falls led 6-0.

Goldthwaite took the kickoff and 12 plays later with 59 yards farther down the field Campbell tied the score and Jernigan put the Eagles 2 points ahead!

The second Eagle drive began late in the second quarter and ended when Campbell again went over for the TD and a short pass from Gray to Cockrum gave the visitors a 16-6 lead.

The Mustangs rallied back, however, and with just 1:03 remaining in the half scored again from 27 yards out.

Just the same the Eagles had some surprises of their own in the form of a pass from Gray to Campbell and with 52 seconds left in the half increased their margin to 24-12.

The last play of the third period gave the Eagles a healthy lead when Gray went over and Jernigan added the points after.

The Eagles' last two points came on the last play of the game when Cockrum broke through to tackle Mustang Butch Forehand in the end zone for a safety. The final score was 34-12!

The Goldthwaite high school fighting Eagles, district 9A champions for 1963, will meet the Albany Lions, district 10A champions for 1963, in the bi-district play-off this Friday night, November 22, at Coleman.

Game time is 7:30 p. m. and according to letter received by the Eagle Editor from Mayor Foster Miller of Coleman, "The people of Coleman extend a hearty welcome to the good people of Goldthwaite to attend

the bi-district play-off between the Goldthwaite Eagles and the Albany Lions."

Pre-game reserve seat tickets for the game went on sale here Wednesday and will be on sale here at Production Credit Association office until 4:00 p. m. on Friday, according to announcement by LeRoy Beard, Superintendent of Schools.

The following weekend there will be eight contests with 16 teams in regional play-offs. Another week later there will be four games with eight teams and still another week later two games with four teams to determine the two teams who will battle it out for the state championship.

The Mullin Bulldogs won over the Star Tigers Thursday night to become the champions in six-man football in district 9-B.

The decision was not final until after the Thursday night game.

John Berry, Mills County foreman of the State Highway Department, has started a flower garden at the south end of Fisher Street. It is located in the Y between the Lampasas and San Saba Highways and has been artistically laid out and will be planted with flowers and shrubs that will make it a thing of beauty next spring and summer.

An old fashioned gold hunter with several pieces of new fangled electrical apparatus was here last week prospecting for gold or buried treasures. His machine indicated gold at a spot on the mountain east of town, but nothing was uncovered after a hole four feet deep had been dug.

Seven fine horses were selected here by the U. S. Army horse buyers last week. Although it was announced that the officer would be here next week, their schedule was changed and they arrived last Friday.

Although the quantity is less than half an average crop, pecans marketed in Goldthwaite this fall have proved to be of excellent quality. Prices range from 7¢ a pound and up. Fancy, budded thin shells are being offered for 20 to 25¢.

County Treasurer William L. Burks, affectionately known throughout this section as Bill Burks, died at his home here Wednesday night and was buried with Masonic honors at the Odd Fellows Cemetery at 4:00 p. m. Thursday.

Holland Frizzelle received a message Sunday that Tom Berry of Brookings, Oklahoma, died and was buried there. Mr. Berry will be remembered here as he was reared at Pleasant Grove, and lived there for a number of years.

50 YEARS AGO—

Mills County's elegant new courthouse has been completed and accepted by the commissioners' court and the officers are now comfortably located in the building. This is one of the finest courthouses in the state, and is a credit to this, the finest county in the state.

The building cost exactly \$67,776.68, while the contract price was \$68,000. The reduction was caused by the forfeit paid by the contractors for failing to complete the building in the time required by the contract.

Mills County's first courthouse was erected in 1889 at a cost of \$27,500 and it burned on the night of May 5, 1912. The court collected \$20,500 on the insurance policies of the old building and contents and with the money and the amount realized from the sale of the

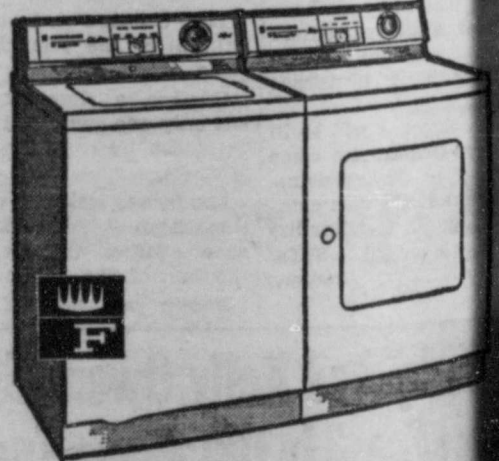

## More Markers Received For Graves Of Civil War Veterans

Mills County Historical Society received two more Civil War Memorial Markers last week for the graves of 1st Lt. Joseph L. Burkett and Capt. John Stewart.

Tennessee Infantry Division. He came to Williams Ranch in 1865, immediately after his discharge from the Confederate Army. He died in 1875 and is buried in the Mohlar Cemetery. The monument, made of white marble, is upright in design.

A marker for Cpl. J. W. "Tarheel" Smith was received several weeks ago. Mr. E. P. Smith of Brownwood set the stone at his grandfather's grave in the Oak View Cemetery at Mullin.

At the present time the Society is actively checking data on several other veterans whose Memorial Markers will be ordered as soon as the information is verified.

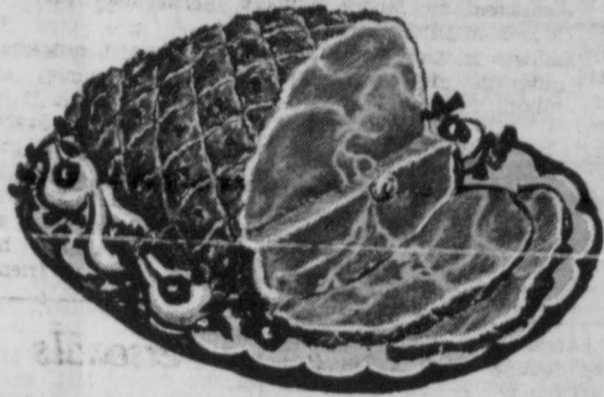

Austin, Texas—Now you can call him "Governor Crump!"

Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba has joined the list of "Governor for a Day" honorees. Friends of the popular senator poured into Austin until it practically was "San Saba Day" at the Capitol.

It is customary for Texas' top-ranking State Senator to take over the reins of government when both the governor and the lieutenant governor are out of the state. That happened Thursday.

Among the hundreds of people coming to call on "Governor" and Mrs. Crump in the Capitol, and during an evening reception in the Driskill Hotel, were some 200 who drove from San Saba in a caravan of cars.

More than 15 State Senators were on hand, together with a goodly number of other elected state officials, to congratulate the 47-year-old attorney. Crump, now in his fifth year of office, represents an 18,000-square-mile district containing 18 counties. That's an area bigger than many of our states.

Featured speakers at the testimonial dinner, during which the modest Crump was regaled with tributes and gifts, were Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo. Hardeman is from a neighboring district that is even larger than Crump's.

Crump issued one proclamation. It commended the screw-worm eradication program. He urged Texans to continue supporting it. He said the program reduced infestations from weekly totals exceeding 2,000 a year ago to an average of 300 per week this fall.

Total 1963 production is estimated at 918,000,000 barrels. That's the highest annual figure since the 944,400,000 barrels in 1959. Partial credit for the increase was given to success of the percentage factor adopted in place of the shut-in day method of Commission calculation on production last January.

At a Board meeting to be held here January 16-17 each agency will submit a detailed presentation showing how it proposes to advertise Texas' tourist attractions. State contract will go to the agency whose presentation is judged best by the Board.

**New Legislators**

Recent special elections sent three new members to the State House of Representatives.

Dallas picked two more Republicans, Jack Sampson and Hughes Brown, leaving Ben Atwell as the only Democratic House member from Big D.

Travis County voters selected

a young Democrat, Bob Armstrong. He came out first in a big field, by a narrow margin, over Republican Pete Hord. No runoffs are necessary in the legislative contests.

**Drought Puts Dairymen In Danger**

Agriculture Commissioner John White said denial by railroads of an urgent request for freight-rate reductions on hay to be shipped into drought disaster areas "squeezed out the last hope of our dairymen to stay in business during the present emergency."

"Without a freight rate reduction to ease their costs during the next three critical months," says White, "our dairymen apparently must look for an increase in raw-milk prices, or be forced out of business."

White said hay costs have increased from 75 to 100 per cent over normal and probably would go higher due to high freight charges on bringing in hay from other parts of the country.

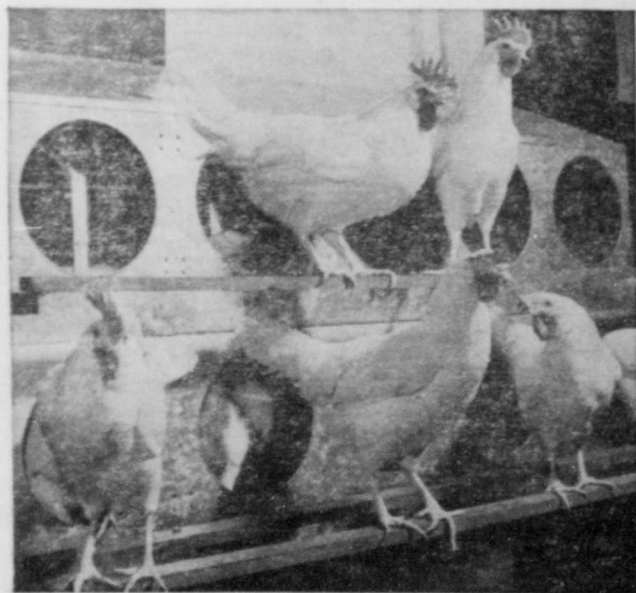

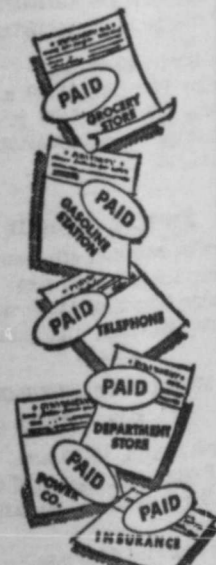
