John Fitzgerald Kennedy

35TH PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

The guests of honor did not arrive. A "Texas Welcome Dinner" in Austin, honoring President and Mrs. Kennedy and Vice President and Mrs. Johnson, was canceled.

President Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas during the noon-hour Friday, just a few hours before he was to be the guest of 3,000 Democrats of Texas at one of the largest honor banquets ever held in the Lone Star State.

He died of bullet wounds received while in a motorcade en route to a speaking engagement at the Dallas Mart.

Also shot by the sniper and seriously injured was Texas Governor, John Connally, who was riding with the President.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, in keeping with customary security measures, was in another car. He was unharmed.

It was a bright, sunny day, suddenly turned into darkness and gloom... not just in Dallas and Austin, but throughout the world. Unquestionably it was the blackest day in Texas history.

Thousands of persons, including Texas legislators, heard the news en route to Austin. Many continued their journeys to the capital... a city paralyzed by the shocking events. Hundreds

joined the legislators in memorial services in the House of Representatives.

It was a sad ending to an even sadder day.

CONNALLY RECOVERING

First encouraging news to reach the capital following the murderous attack on the president and governor was word that the operation on Connally was successful. However, he is expected to be hospitalized for at least 10 days.

JOHNSON ASSUMES PRESIDENCY

Within a few hours after President Kennedy's assassination, Lyndon B. Johnson was sworn in as President.

Swearing-in ceremonies were performed by Federal District Judge Sarah T. Hughes aboard the presidential plane just before the jet airliner bearing the deceased president's body left Love Field for Washington.

FINAL RITES FOR KENNEDY

Funeral services for John Fitzgerald Kennedy were conducted in Washington, Monday, after his body had been lying in state in the East Room of the White House and in the Capitol Rotunda from about 4:30 a. m. Saturday until 10:00 a. m. Monday. He was buried with full military honors in Arlington Cemetery.

Eagles Lose To Albany 28-8 In Bi-District Play-Off Friday

In the Bi-District playoff at Coleman last Friday night the Albany Lions battered the Goldthwaite Eagles to a 28-8 victory and have therefore advanced to the second round of playoff in Class A football.

The Lion attack was led by fullback Charles Brewster and quarterback Johnny Woodward. The Lions' first tally came in the first period when halfback Gary Hise intercepted a Goldthwaite pass on the Eagle 45, and five plays later skipped 19 yards for the night's first touchdown. Woodward added the extra points, and Albany led the Eagles 8-0.

Woodward set up the second Albany TD when he raced 56 yards down the east sideline

to set up a first down on the Eagle one. Brewster plunged over for the tally, but the PAT failed, leaving it 14-0 with 2:59 remaining in the period.

Before the Eagles could move Albany had scored again, this time ending a 53 yard drive. Brewster went over and a pass from Woodward to Gary Barte added the extra points.

The Eagles took the kickoff but on fourth down were forced to punt. Barte fumbled the ball, and Eagle end Clyde Cockrum covered it on the Lions' 16. From there, Gene Gray made seven, then lost six, and finally tossed to DeWayne McCasland for a first on the Albany four. Cecil Campbell hit paydirt on the first play to put Goldthwaite in the scoring. Gray then tossed to Jim Childress for the PAT and the score stood at 22-8 with 3:54 remaining in the half.

The final scoring came in the second half when Brewster again pushed his way over from the one. The extra point try failed.

Goldthwaite had moved from their own 37 to the Albany 20 before the clock finally ran out ending the Eagles' season.

Brewster was leading ground gainer for the Albany Lions, netting 138 yards in 23 carries.

Campbell led the Eagle attack picking up 49 yards while Childress added 18 and Jernigan 17.

This winds up the final chapter of the football season of the 1963 Eagles, who have won the school's first District Championship. The Eagles had a good year and did a fine job and the community is proud of their accomplishment.

Water Project Is Moving Ahead

The city water project is moving ahead on schedule, according to report from W. C. Barnett, city manager.

Details on securing proper easements for the water and electric lines are expected to be completed this week.

Plans and specifications for the entire project are expected to be completed by December 2, when the city council will have the next regular meeting.

The council and members of the board of supervisors are scheduled to have a joint meeting next Monday night, December 2, at the city hall when plans and specifications are to be presented by the Engineers to the two official groups.

If plans are approved at that time, construction bids will be called for. City officials hope to be ready to open bids and award construction contract by their first meeting in January.

The program will provide off-channel storage reservoir and pumping facilities at the Colorado River, water line to Goldthwaite, and water treatment plant near Goldthwaite to provide the city with an adequate water supply for years to come.

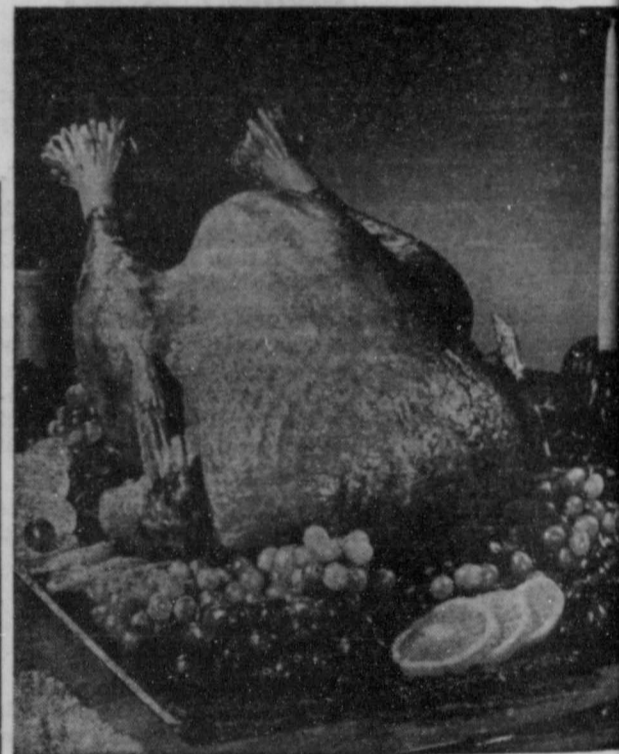

Personally I prefer boot-foot waders over the stocking-foot type.

with the stocking foot-type, you have to wear tennis shoes or wading shoes. To keep the waders from slipping inside the shoes, you must tie the laces rather tight. If you do a lot of walking in thick mud, the laces generally are tied around the ankle. This is to keep the mud from pulling the shoes off. Such a tight bind across the instep or around the ankles cuts blood circulation. Result—cold feet.

When your foot has room within the boot, you can warm your feet by wiggling your toes to stimulate circulation. But just try to wiggle your toes in a boot that fits snug tight. It's the same way with your dress shoes. Your feet get colder in tight dress shoes than they do in loose-fitting ones.

Exercise Warms Body
Then the work begins. You trudge out to the blind lugging a gun, shells and sacks of decoys. You're doing a lot of physical exercise so pretty soon you've worked up a good sweat.

Wear Caps With Flaps
What about cold ears? A cap with ear flaps is a must. But don't tie those flaps down snug when you're working or exercising vigorously. Heat generated by your body will make your head and ears wet with sweat. Let the flaps hang loose during periods of activity—then tie them down.

Wash Equipment

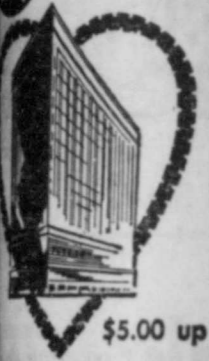

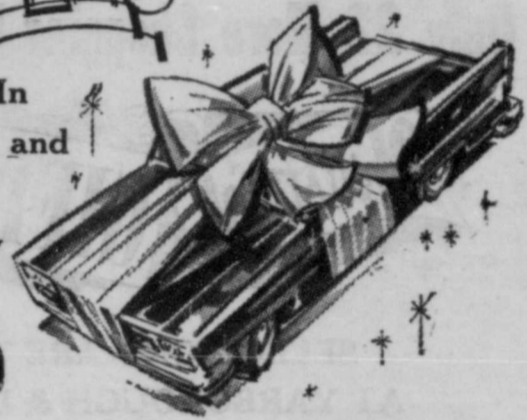

Lone Star Gas Company Announces Rate Reduction For Summer Cooling

A reduction in natural gas industrial summer cooling rates available to Lone Star Gas Company's industrial accounts in Texas has been announced by L. T. Potter, President. He said the reduced rates will make natural gas for cooling available to smaller industrial consumers at approximately the same price as large consumers have been paying.

Lone Star has adequate facilities to provide natural gas for cooling in summer, Mr. Potter said. He explained that, before the advent of gas cooling, the large pipeline capacity needed to meet the heavy demand for gas during the winter months was not fully used in summer. from leading manufacturers, the considerable and continuing improvement in such equipment, and this rate reduction for industrial air conditioning customers, increased sales volumes are anticipated."

Local Manager L. J. Ward said the new summer cooling rate will be effective in Goldthwaite on March 1, 1964 and was announced at this time by Lone Star so that customers planning to install gas air conditioning for use next summer can estimate future operating costs now.

He also said that "to assist Lone Star's larger industrial customers in their long range planning, a new long term contract is now available at firm prices for gas through June 30, 1968."
