Twelve Eagles Are Named For All-District Honors

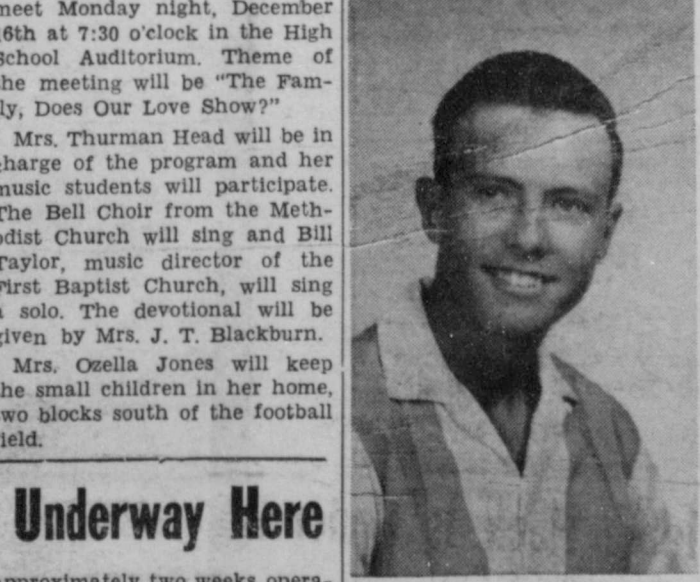
Stock Show Officials To Make Final Appeal For Prize Money

Officials of the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association will make a final appeal to all Mills County this week for financial support for the forthcoming 26th annual Mills County 4-H and FFA Stock Show scheduled here for January 10 and 11.
 Financial support to date has been keenly disappointing to those in charge of the show, according to the committee in charge of raising money for the annual event.
 The finance committee had hoped that interested citizens in the county would contribute to the show fund without having to send out letters of solicitation.
 It appears now that this support has not come in and the committee will mail out approximately 300 letters this week asking for financial help.
 As it stands at this point about \$750.00 is needed in order to carry on the show as it has been done in past years.
 In order to continue to have a good show it is necessary to have prize money. Amount of prize money is dependent on how much financial support that comes in, officials point out.
 The Mills County Stock Show is a county wide project and something that needs and deserves the support of all farmers and ranchers as well as the business and professional people.
 Those who receive a letter from the committee this week are urged to give their immediate financial support.
 Those who are not on the mailing list and fail to get a letter are also urged to make a contribution to the fund.
 Many Mills County boys and girls are a part of the show and receive invaluable training benefits from their show projects. How well this program will carry on into the future will depend on how well adults of the county support the annual stock show with their financial support.
 Checks should be made out to Mills County 4-H and FFA and mailed or turned in to Glynn Collier, treasurer, at Mills County State Bank.

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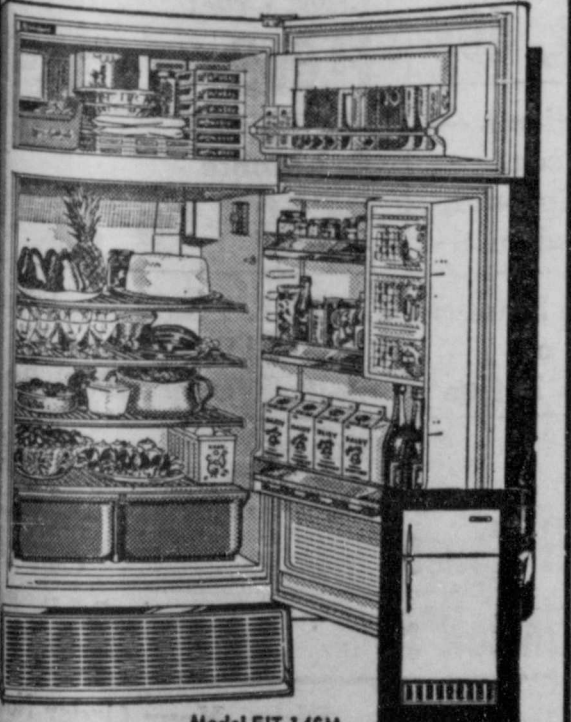

March of Dimes Aid Frees Joan To Devote Self to Helping Others

For 13 years, Joan Keeler has been jousting with a formidable antagonist.

Sometimes this attractive young woman, who lives and follows her profession of occupational therapy in Summit, N. J., makes some headway and seems to be winning. Then a counteroffensive, her old foe will deliver a succession of cruel blows.

The old foe, the formidable antagonist, is rheumatoid arthritis. Arthritis tortures, cripples and deforms more people in the United States than any other disorder.

Emphasizing that she neither wants nor needs anyone's sympathy, Joan agreed to tell something about her encounter with this excruciating disease since the March of Dimes-financed Arthritis Center at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, New York City.

At the age of 17, Joan could look forward to what should be a reasonably happy life. She was attractive, athletic and a good student.

Then without warning, Joan says, "the roof of my little dream house caved in."

First, there were unaccountable pains during the summer just before college, and that meant the end of athletics because pain wracked her body.

Next, fever and loss of weight. Diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis, never simple to make, was even more difficult 13 years ago. Specialists shook their heads in puzzlement over which disease had robbed this young woman of perfect health.

Despite the increasing severity of the pains, Joan was determined to start college. The first, almost insurmountable problem was getting from dormitory to classroom. The next difficulty was concentration.

How can a student apply herself closely to lectures and homework when she suffers incessant spasms of pain in her back, arms and hands, legs and even her toes?

"It became a fiasco," she says. "The pain factor was I couldn't keep up. I had to drop out."

Then, during the following summer, Joan's old foe seemed to relent. She improved and returned to school.

But the rheumatoid arthritis returned to the attack—more

savagely than it had before. The second homecoming from college was no less discouraging than the first. But it did result in her applying to the Arthritis Clinic of Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, which had been studying the problem of rheumatoid arthritis since 1928, and to which The National Foundation-March of Dimes has contributed \$105,106 since 1959.

After exhaustive tests, the upshot was a definite diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis. Now, at last, the enemy was identified.

The first urgent objective was to reduce Joan's pain so that she could be moved, and move herself, without unbearable suffering. This was accomplished in part through administration of cortisone (which she continues to take but in reduced dosages). A second goal was, by means of surgery, to "unclench" her hands so that she could regain the use of her fingers. A third aim was to minimize the weight-bearing pressure on her feet by designing special mocassins.

The fourth aim was to begin physical therapy as soon as cortisone had reduced the inflammation of joints and connective tissues to a point where

rehabilitative exercise was possible.

"The simple truth is that the March of Dimes put me on my feet," she explains. This feeling of thankfulness set her to thinking of doing something within her capabilities which would also be helpful to others.

She had had intimate experience, during her own ordeal, with many kinds of therapy. Armed with this familiarity, she began to study occupational therapy which is the teaching of arts and trades as a means of rehabilitation of patients handicapped physically or mentally.

"I was lucky to get a position as an occupational therapist at Fair Oaks Hospital in my home town," Joan relates. "I soon learned that I understood the attitudes of these patients toward life—their fears and hostilities—and that they understood my attitude, because all of us had experienced what it is to be handicapped. And I am better adjusted and happier than I was because I am helping others."

Perhaps the old foe, the formidable antagonist, has not been altogether vanquished. But by helping others, Joan Keeler has found that at least she now keeps her enemy on the defensive, most of the time.

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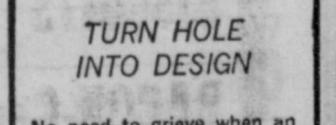

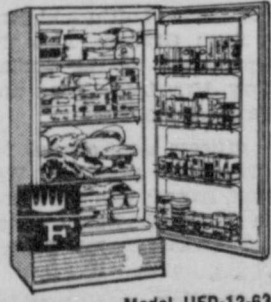

"Early mailing also gives us time to get gifts and cards in

the hands of addressees in good condition with less chance of damage or delay due to human error."

"Our employees need public help to run this race against time—and patrons of the Goldthwaite post office can assist us by shopping and mailing right now and by using ZIP Code in both return and destination addresses."

POST OFFICE TO HELP SANTA

By the way, the Post Office Department is getting together with Santa Claus this year to make sure that children who write to the North Pole get an answer from the best-known citizen up there, Postmaster Lucile Fairman said today.

"Part of the Post Office efforts to encourage a wider use of ZIP coded addresses assures children that they will receive a message from Santa Claus if they write to him by December 15 at 'North Pole 99701,' and use their own ZIP Codes in their return addresses," Mrs. Fairman explained.

Santa's reply to the children's note, to be delivered free of any additional charge through the courtesy of the Postal Service, will be a gaily-decorated card with an appropriate reply to please the children, the local postal head noted. All that is required is the child's note to Santa with regular 5¢ first class postage on the envelope, together with the ZIP-Coded address and return address.

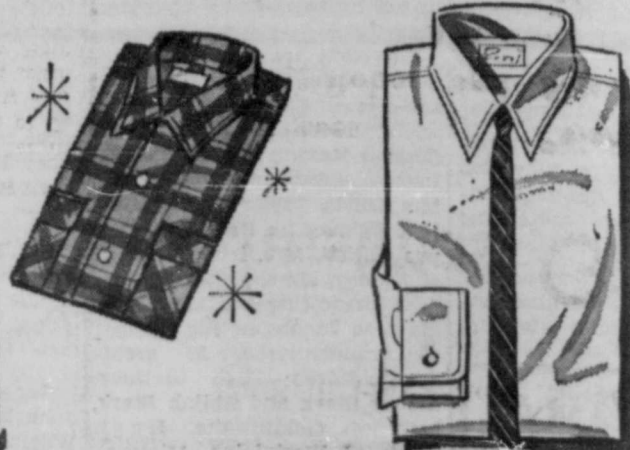
