Phone Companies In Central Texas Announce Expansion Plans For '64

Seven of the larger independent telephone companies in Central Texas, including Central Texas Telephone Co., Texas Telephone Co., Texas Telephone Co., Inc., of Goldthwaite, have announced expansion programs for 1964 costing more than \$1,000,000. Numerous other exchanges, operated by "system" companies in the same area, will be improved under company expansion programs.

A recent survey conducted by the Texas Telephone Association, in which 83 of Texas' 145 telephone companies are members, revealed that independent telephone organizations will spend in excess of \$37,000,000 for expansion this year.

TEX TELEPHONE COOPERATIVE PLANS

Central Texas Telephone Cooperative at Goldthwaite will spend about \$300,000 for various improvements in its 17 exchanges in five counties. The plan includes important expansion in the Evant exchange, installation of intercept equipment to advise callers of changes in called numbers in the exchanges, a new toll line between Evant and Gatesville, extended area service between Evant and additional trunks and extended area

Wool Program Marketing Year For 1963 Will End December 31

Producers are reminded again today that the 1963 marketing year under the National wool program ends December 31. According to E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, this means that payments for the current 1963 year will depend on completing all details of marketing either wool or lambs by that date. Marketings completed after December 31, 1963 will be eligible for payments for the 1964 marketing year.

The Chairman explained that the 1963 marketing year under the wool program has been shortened to 9 months in order

to shift the wool marketing year to a calendar-year basis, beginning in 1964. Because this is a change from previous programs, he declared, some producers may let the deadline slip by, thinking that they have several more months before the current program's end.

He urges, therefore, that producers make sure that all details of the 1963 sales are completed not later than December 31, 1963. This includes passing title to the buyer, delivering the wool to the buyer either physically or through documents transferring control to the buyer, and having available all the information needed to determine the buyer's total purchase price.

Applications for 1963 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act may be filed with the ASCS county offices up until January 31, 1964. The Chairman points out that, since the program year will end earlier than usual — on December 31, the 1963 payments will likely begin in April of next year instead of late-summer, as under previous programs.

New School Buildings Are Okayed By Board

The new school buildings that have been under construction since September were accepted by the board of education of Goldthwaite Independent School District meeting in special session last Friday.

K. A. Sparks of Hamilton was general contractor.

The school improvement program included a new vocational agriculture building, band hall, physical education building for the elementary school and new front and foyer for the gymnasium.

Voters of the district approved a bond issue earlier this year for the improvement program.

Equipment is now being installed and classes will be held in the new buildings when students return for regular schedule of work after the Christmas-New Year's holidays on January 2.

WEATHER REPORT

from the county agent and agriculture teachers of the county.

Entry cards have been distributed to the county agent and vocational agriculture teachers in Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy. All 4-H and FFA members are asked to get their entry cards filled out and turned in as early as possible.

Entry cards are also available through Mr. Steen at Steen Hardware for breeders and club members.

HORSE SHOW AGAIN THIS YEAR

The horse show, which was introduced last year, will again be held this year in connection with the annual Mills County Livestock show.

It will be a Junior Halter show with two classes, covering all breeds, Colts foaled in 1962 and Colts foaled in 1963. There will be ribbon awards for the first five places in each class.

Jesse Moreland, horse show superintendent, stated that there was a good response to the show last year and they are expecting a good number of entries again this year. He reminds all those who are interested that the deadline for entries is the same as for other divisions of the show, next Tuesday, December 31.

The horse show is open to all 4-H and FFA club members. Entries for the horse show may be made by contacting County Agent George Reese, Jesse Moreland, James Green or Bob Steen.

Horses will be judged when the show opens on Friday morning, January 10, at 9 o'clock.

nounced that approximately \$150 has been contributed in the personal solicitation in downtown Goldthwaite.

Total given to the fund drive in the last two weeks amounts to \$377.00, when actually \$750.00 was needed.

Interested citizens from over the county have two more weeks to give their financial support to the project to insure prize money to 4-H and FFA club members for their exhibits on the same basis as the show has paid in past years.

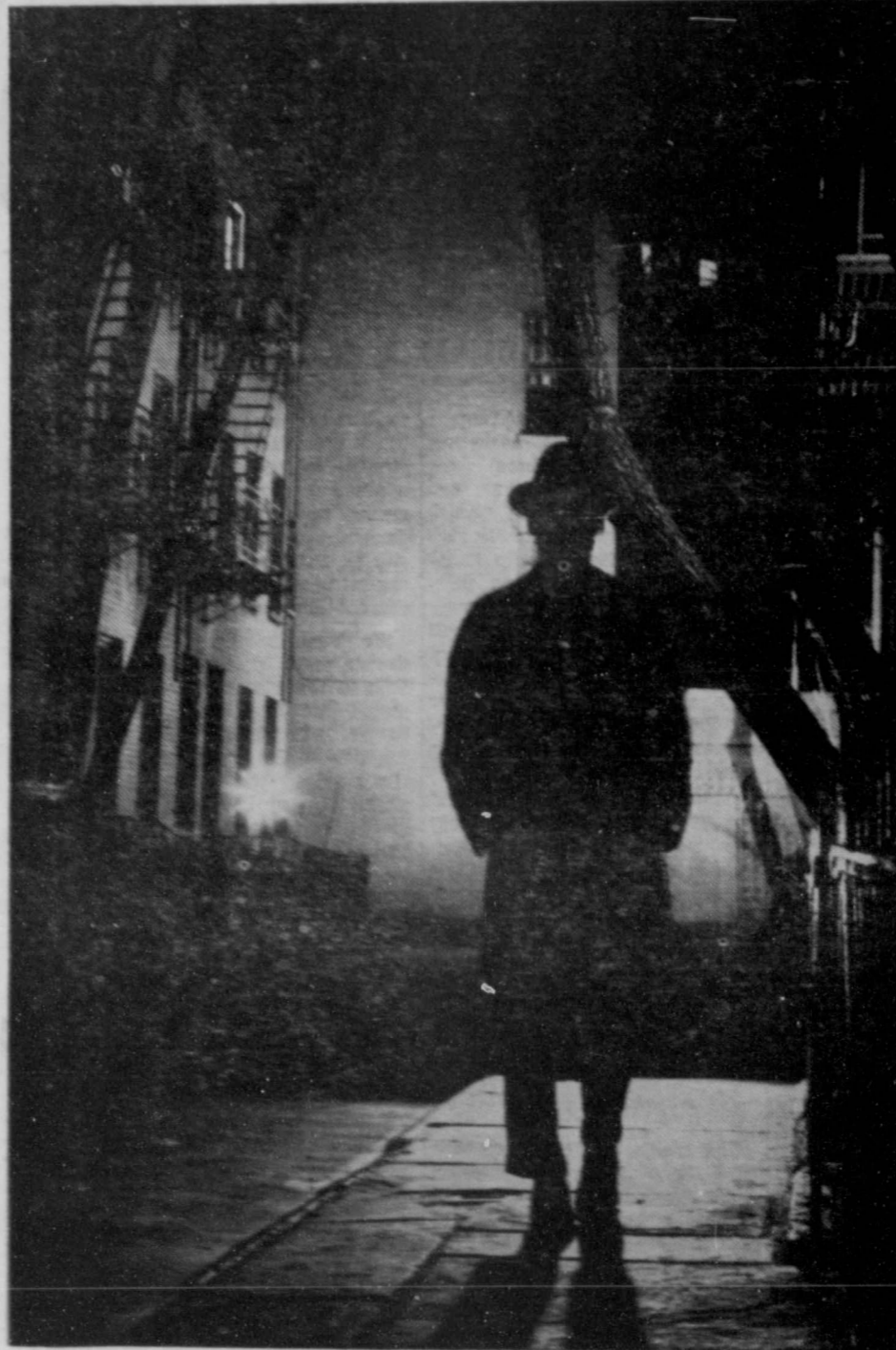

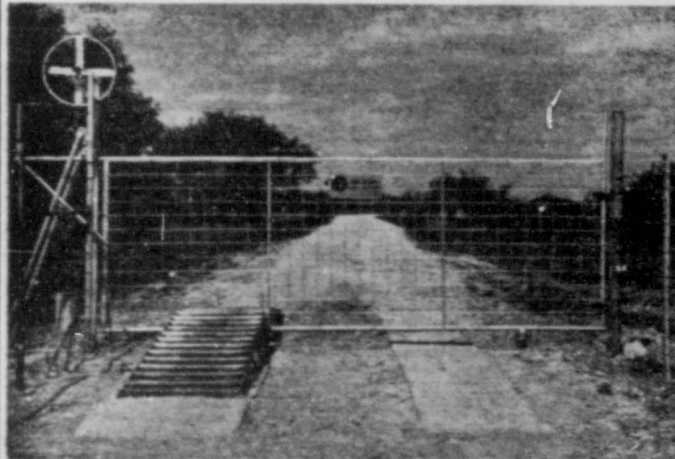

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Take Care Of Gunstock
You are lucky if you have a fine gunstock — one that has been carefully treated with linseed oil by the manufacturer. Take care of your fine stock by giving it the same loving care the gunsmith gave it. After each hunting trip carefully rub down with linseed oil. Rub oil in for at least a half hour, then wipe surplus oil off and briskly polish stock with soft, clean cloth.

Training Dog To Heel
The job of training your bird dog to heel—one of the first lessons—is not too difficult. You can make the job even easier if you will strap a belt around your leg just above the knee. Snap a short leash from the dog's collar to the belt. Every time the pooch tries to walk ahead slap his nose. He'll soon learn to walk beside you like a gentleman.

Protect Rigged Hooks
Many fishermen find it saves time to rig their worms and eels before leaving home. This also applies to many other special rigs. Trouble is, these lures are inclined to tangle with other tackle in your box and you lose more time untangling them than you saved in the first place. To overcome tangling, try wrapping these rigs in aluminum foil before packing in the box.

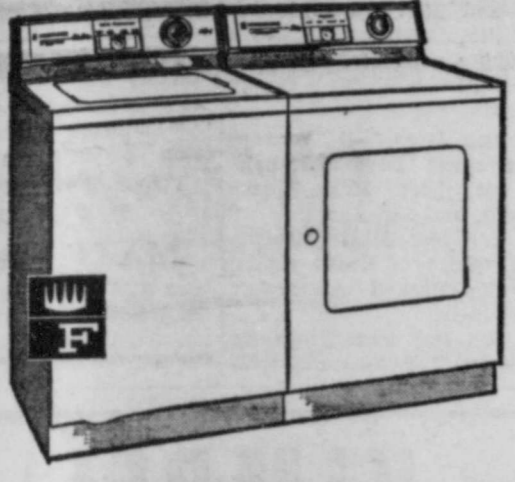
Campfire Cooking
Cooking over a campfire in the open is both a pleasure and a necessity if you are far from civilization. Some sportsmen prefer gas-oil stoves, but dyed-in-the-wool outdoorsmen find no substitute for the open campfire. There is one serious drawback to open fire cooking—the sooty, greasy pots and pans to be scrubbed bright after each meal. Prevent your pots and pans from getting sooty by using the aluminum plates that come with ready-to-serve frozen foods. Save such pans and take them with you on your trip. Put one under each pot or pan you use. Aluminum plates will take care of the soot, leaving pots sparkling clean.

Avoid Handling Small Fish
If you catch a fish too small to keep, don't handle the little critter when removing the hook, for you might injure him. Slide your hand down the leader as you bring the fish to the surface. Grasp the lure with your thumb and forefinger and shake gently.

Good Crappie Lure
A good lure for crappies may be made by cutting white rubber sheeting into 1 1/4-inch sections shaped like frogs or minnows. Fished with a spinner, they can be murder.

**McCulloch Electric Cooperative
Is Paying Capital Return Credits**

Members and former members of McCulloch Electric Cooperative, Brady, will receive a \$31,000 reminder that they are actual owners of the rural electric system which serves them.

For the first time since its organization in 1937, McCulloch Electric Cooperative directors have found it feasible to pay patronage refunds to member-owners. This return of capital credits, as individual Co-op equities are called, represents a long anticipated milestone in the history of the cooperative which was formed with 160 original members required to qualify for a loan from REA.

Members' equities represent their accumulated overpayments on their electric bills. After adequate reserves are built up to replace damaged or depreciated facilities, to meet emergencies and to repay principle on loans, a cooperative's board of directors may elect to rebate surplus reserve proportionate to members' usage of electricity.

The checks, ranging from less than one dollar to over two hundred dollars, will go to more than 4,200 members and former members for their equities accumulated between 1949 and 1952. Refund checks are now being processed and mailed out. Many of those receiving checks have moved off the co-op's lines, but their equities still are due them under the cooperative charter. Return of capital credits accumulated since 1952 will be considered subsequently by directors.

McCulloch Electric Cooperative has come a long way since the original construction of 104 miles of line.

Today more than 2,500 member-owners are served through some 1,800 miles of line in McCulloch, San Saba, Brown, Concho, Mills and Menard Counties.

The progress represented by the return of \$31,000 to consumers is a tribute to those originators who worked hard to build their own rural electric system.

Taylor Duncan of Rt. 3, Mullin, is a member of the board of directors. He represents the northern part of San Saba County and the western part of Mills County.
