Goldthwaite Bank Deposits Show Record Rise During Past Year

Bank Deposits in Mills County State Bank here show a record rise during the past year, according to official bank call as of December 20, 1963.

Condensed statement of condition of the bank which appears in this issue of the Eagle shows deposits of \$5,944,444.32, reflecting an increase of more than one million dollars over bank call of December 28, 1962 when deposits were 4,802,062.28. This increase in deposits in Mills County State Bank during the past year appears to be a record in West Texas from a percentage standpoint.

National Infant Testing Program Helps Prevent Mental Retardation

A major advance in early detection of one of the hidden causes of severe mental retardation is fast proving its worth, thanks to the "help" of thousands of newborn babies.

These children are among the first to benefit from a new, nationwide screening program for early detection of PKU (phenylketonuria), an inherited error in body chemistry which causes severe mental retardation unless treated in time.

The screening program, started in recent months, will eventually include some 600,000 newborn babies in the United States. Already 137,000 newborns have undergone the simple test which was devised by Dr. Robert Guthrie of Children's Hospital, Buffalo, N. Y., with the help of a grant from The National Foundation-March of Dimes.

Without the blood test, no one might have realized until too late that an infant had PKU. Such babies seem normal at birth and for several months thereafter.

But they lack a liver enzyme which enables the system to process an essential nutrient found in all protein foods. Within a day or two after the PKU infant's first milk feeding, the nutrient, called phenylalanine, begins to build up in his system. If the accumulation is not checked by special diet, abnormal amounts of phenylalanine soon begin to damage the developing brain.

First outward signs of mental deficiency usually show up when the PKU victim is three to six months old. At that age, a low-phenylalanine diet can halt the deteriorating process but cannot repair the harm already done.

The problem is to detect PKU not only before damage is evident but before it has any chance to start. Until recently this has been extremely difficult.

A hereditary condition, PKU is transmitted through defective genes from both parents. Although the parents are "carriers," they themselves do not show any symptoms of the condition. Statistically, one in every four children of such a union may inherit PKU.

Before development of the Guthrie test, with the aid of a March of Dimes grant, it was common for the first defective child in such a family to go undiagnosed and untreated until he was beyond help. Alerted by the first tragedy, doctors would then test subsequent children of the same parents and in most cases could prevent brain damage in the younger ones.

The usual test for PKU was the well-known "diaper test" involving the reaction of an infant's urine to ferric chloride. But that test is not effective until several weeks after birth—after enough phenylalanine has built up to "spill over" into the urine, and long after most newborns have gone home from the hospital.

The new Guthrie test, however, requiring only a speck of blood from a prick on a baby's heel, can be done on the fourth or fifth day of life. This makes it possible to screen all babies

before they leave the hospital, thus detecting even the first-born of unknown PKU carriers before a deadly excess of phenylalanine starts its ravages.

The current field trials of the Guthrie test, sponsored by the Children's Bureau of the United States Public Health Service, are being conducted with the cooperation of 30 state health departments in this country. The PKU Central Laboratory in Buffalo is shipping 300 kits each week to hospitals throughout the United States. Each kit contains materials for 500 tests. Dramatic results are already becoming apparent.

Of a little girl in New York State, who was among the first 850 babies routinely tested after the field trial started in that area, Dr. Guthrie has said: "This is probably the first baby in medical history to be diagnosed within the first month of life without sacrificing the brain of an older brother or sister."

Many are helping to carry out the public education program against birth defects, today's greatest unsolved childhood medical problem. Others are assigned to help with the Mothers' March for the March of Dimes. A great many choose to think up their own projects in their schools or suburbs.

Whatever job, it is important, because the fight against birth defects is vital to every young person who plans to have his own family someday, after completing school and career preparations.

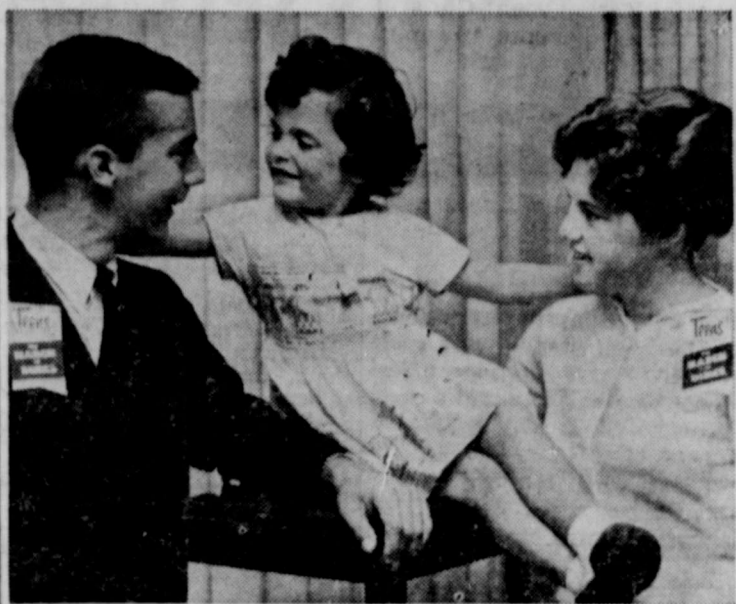
Heading the TAP program are Judy Meyers, 18, Aurora, Colo., and Philip Dawson, also 18, Jamestown, N. Y., who are the national TAP co-chairmen for the 1964 March of Dimes this January.

Judy, a freshman at the University of Colorado, was a vice president of Mu Alpha Theta, mathematics honor society at Aurora High School, and Philip, a freshman at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, was a member of the National Honor Society at Jamestown High School.

Both young people feel that a high scholastic rating is not only desirable but necessary in today's world. Both feel that good marks give a teen leader added prestige with his peers.

"It's terribly old-fashioned to think that the Big Man on Campus is a 'C' student," Judy and Philip said. "More often than not, he's an 'A' student who is also aware of the importance of community activities."

Judy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Meyers of Aurora. She became a March of Dimes volunteer several years ago because she wanted

"to do something useful." She decided to study languages at the University of Colorado for the same reason, because she thinks that linguists can be of service to their country in the coming years.

Philip, son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Dawson of Jamestown, comes from a family active in community service. His father is a deacon in the First Presbyterian Church of Jamestown, and a district commissioner for the Boy Scouts of America. Philip first heard of the March of Dimes through his mother, who was active in the Mothers' March for the March of Dimes during the years the Salk vaccine was being developed and tested.

Currently, Philip plans to go on to law school after college. He has tentative plans for a career in politics, "because I feel that this is an interesting part of our present-day life."

Both young people feel that if teens throughout the country

are told the importance of the March of Dimes programs against birth defects, arthritis and polio, they will volunteer in great numbers for January's March of Dimes.

They based their predictions on two things, (1) neither Philip nor Judy ever had any trouble in finding volunteers for their March of Dimes projects in their home states, and (2) both teens pointed to the fact that the Peace Corps never has any trouble in finding volunteers.

"Young people today want to do something useful, along with putting forth every effort to do justice to their scholastic programs," the two national March of Dimes volunteers said. "Just because a teen wears sloppy clothes sometimes and is a little loud other times doesn't mean that he doesn't want to do something worthwhile. The vast majority of teens want very much to be good, useful citizens."

There is increasing necessity for such a book among hunters. Bag limitations on certain species now make it a requirement to know your ducks. For the average hunter, who gets out after waterfowl only two or three times a year, this identification is no easy job. Especially where the duck supply is limited!

Most men know a mallard at a glance. They'll recognize a spoon bill or a teal. But they have difficulty in identifying a canvas back, sprig or other species.

Same is true of geese. If you see them every day, or if you hunt a good many times each year, it soon becomes easy to know the species. But when the laws say you can't kill but certain species and perhaps only one or two, at that, then it becomes very important to every hunter to know the difference.

I have been told many times about hunters in the rice fields of south Texas finding dead birds stashed away in straw stacks where hunters have hidden them. Such a bird doesn't do anyone any good.

Sometimes we wonder at the manner in which biologists reach their conclusions about bag limits.

Most of them will tell you that legal gun pressure will not deplete the birds. Then they will put a limit on them that is so impractical it results not only in violation, but worse still, in

when one is killed, it is a shame that its meat has to spoil. Perhaps a longer look at the system might improve this. Other states have.

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Shipping Your Oars

Often you must ship your oars in a hurry when landing a big fish. This makes an awful racket, splashes water everywhere, and frequently barks your shins.

You won't have to ship oars if you prepare a little beforehand.

Before going out next time, cover about 10 inches of heavy steel wire with rubber hose. Bend it to an "S" shape. Make a couple and hang one to each oarlock, or over the side of the gunwale.

They will support the weight of the oar blade without getting in the way of landing the fish, making shipping unnecessary.

Tip For Bass-Buggers

You don't have to stop fishing at sunset. You can get in 50 or 60 more casts with that fly rod if you will dab a little phosphorescent paint on the front of your bug or fly. The paint makes it easy to follow the path of your bait in the falling light.

Changing Fishing Lines

Changing the line on your reel can be quite a chore, for the reel arbor is hard to reach and awkward to work with.

However, if you will attach a foot-long piece of line, with a small loop on the free end, to the arbor, your job will be simplified when it comes time to change line on either casting or fly reel.

Care Of Your Feet

There are several precautions every fisherman should take in the care of his feet.

Wear only well-fitting, fairly-new socks, and socks with no rough seams or darned places.

If your feet are tender, dust them and your socks with foot powder, often.

Wash your feet each night after fishing—and change socks.

Wool socks are easily washed in luke warm water. Clean socks are very important.

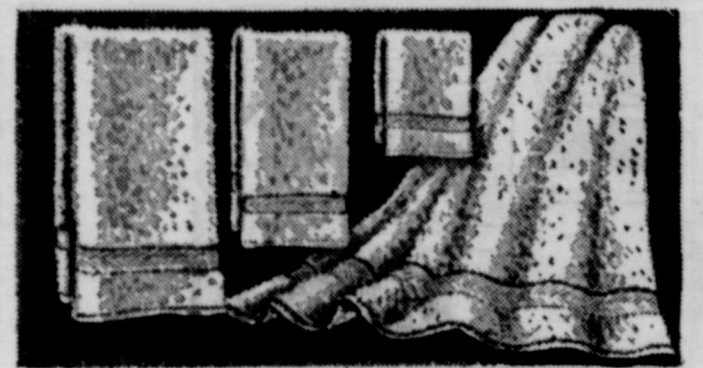

WANTED BY THE FBI



EDWARD HOWARD MAPS

Edward Howard Maps, "beatnik," firearms expert, college graduate, artist and sculptor, who is charged with brutally slaying his wife and four-month-old daughter, is one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

Firemen attempting to extinguish a blaze in Maps' Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, home on January 21, 1962, found the infant dead of smoke inhalation, and Maps' young wife dying of a fractured skull and cerebral hemorrhage. At least ten fires had been set in the home and the gas oven was turned on.

Maps was missing but allegedly telephoned two neighbors shortly after the crimes were discovered, threatening one with being "next." A Federal warrant charging Maps with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for murder and arson was issued on January 23, 1962, at Scranton, Pennsylvania.

Generally known as an artist and sculptor, he is a nonconformist who shuns ordinary footwear, going barefoot in the summer and wearing sandals without socks during the winter. A sloppy dresser of unkempt and untidy appearance, he was discharged from the Marine Corps as a schizophrenic.

A white American, born on June 29, 1922, at Passaic, New Jersey, Maps is 5' 8" tall, weighs 170 pounds, has a ruddy complexion, broad shoulders, a barrel-chested build and is unusually strong. His eyes are brown, he has bushy, curly graying-black hair and sometimes wears a full beard and mustache.

Consider Maps armed and extremely dangerous. Please immediately notify the nearest FBI office of any information concerning his whereabouts.
