Brooks Resigns As Commissioner Of Precinct Four

Horace G. Brooks, who last week announced his candidacy for the office of Mills County Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, has resigned as commissioner of precinct four, it was announced Tuesday by County Judge Cecil Egger.

Judge Egger said the resignation will be presented to the Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session next Monday, January 13.

Brooks' resignation is to become effective on January 31.

After the resignation is accepted by the Court the office will be open and subject to an appointment by the County Judge. The appointed commissioner will serve until December 31, 1964.

The resignation of Brooks also leaves the office of commissioner in precinct four open for candidates to file for election for un-expired term of two years covering 1965 and 1966.

Anyone interested in seeking the office for the un-expired term may enter the race and announce for it. Monday, February 3, is the final day for candidates to file for the Democratic primary election to be held on May 7.

City Council And Water Board Accept Bids For Construction

Members of the Goldthwaite City Council and board of supervisors of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, meeting in joint session Monday night, accepted bids and will award contracts for construction of the water improvement facilities.

The improvements will cover pipe line from the Colorado River to Goldthwaite, Water Treatment Plant and two pumping stations and off-channel storage reservoir.

Bids were accepted and contracts will be awarded in three parts.

F & S Construction Company, of Austin, was awarded the contract 1, for pipe line construction on a bid of \$125,935.25.

This job will include approximately 21,800 feet of cast iron pipe and approximately 22,310

feet of transit pipe to be installed on engineers' direction. Sixteen bids were submitted for the pipe line job with the highest bid at \$184,834.50.

Contract 2, for water treatment plant and two pumping stations was awarded to J. H. Strain & Son, Tye, Texas, on a low bid of \$144,490.00. There were six bids on this job with the highest bid \$240,850.00.

B&W Construction Company, Bryan, Texas, was awarded contract 3, covering the off-channel storage on a low bid of \$38,264.50. Six bids were presented on this contract with the high bid \$67,634.25.

Bids were opened by Bob King, of Joe J. Rady & Associates, engineers representing the city and water district, and officials of the city and water board, at the city hall Monday

starting at 10:00 a. m.

Engineers will now prepare necessary contracts to be presented to low bidders to sign and make performance bonds. After this is done the contracts will be signed by city and water district officials and then work orders will be issued by the engineers to contractors for construction with a 10 day starting time.

Time required before actual construction will get underway will take from two weeks to 30 days, according to engineers.

Contract one, pipe line construction calls for 180 calendar days; contract two, water treatment plant and two pumping stations calls for 200 calendar days and contract three, covering off-channel storage calls for 100 calendar days for completion.
