Salvation Army Committee Has Annual Meeting Last Thursday

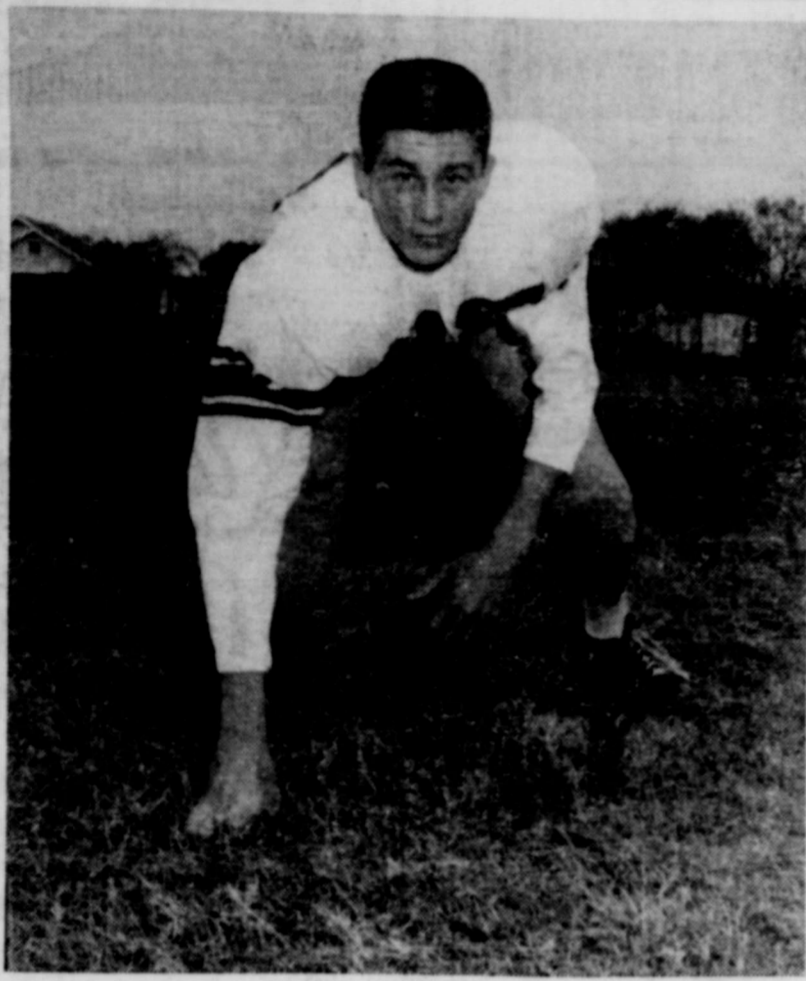
Members of the Salvation Army committee for Goldthwaite and Mills County held their annual meeting last Thursday in the community room of the bank.

Finest Beef in Texas -- Only 1383 People

(Editor's Note: The following story by staff writer, Mach Braly, appeared in the Houston Press last week.)

The city of Goldthwaite has a population of 1,383 people and it seems like nearly every one of them exhibited a grand champion steer at one of Texas' great stock shows.

The people of the little Mills County town have shown a remarkable ability to feed out fat

SET RECORD

The all time record money for a grand champion steer at Houston was paid to Johnny Wigley of Goldthwaite by restaurateur Bill Williams—\$18,800 in 1953.

Some of their less prestigious winnings include the heavy-weight champion steer, the top group of three, the first and second middle weight and the Breeders' special group of three at San Antonio this year.

COUNTY AGENT

How do they do it? Well, nobody will come right out and say it, but there is one coincidence: All but one of Goldthwaite's Houston winners came in since 1948 — the year George Reese went to work as Mills County agricultural agent.

But if you ask him how the Goldthwaite exhibitors do it, he says: "Just work, I guess."

And if you remind him all the other exhibitors work too he says quietly: "We just try to outwork 'em."

Council Grants New Franchise To Cable-Vision

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night granted a new 10 year franchise to Cable-Vision Ltd., starting from February 1, 1964.

Louis A. Bone, Gatesville, appeared before the council in behalf of his firm requesting a new franchise to provide Cable-Vision TV service to Goldthwaite.

The franchise calls for the company to pay to the City of Goldthwaite two per cent of gross receipts in addition to the regular advalorem taxes.

Before the franchise was granted announcement was made that plans are underway whereby the company will bring additional service to the community.

The new service will include Micro-Wave Video service to Goldthwaite and some additional channels. Stations included when the new program is completed will be Channels 8—Dallas, 11—Fort Worth, 10—Waco, 6—Temple, and 7—Austin. They will be on local TV sets on 2, 3, 4, 6 and 5, respectively. This will provide Goldthwaite with four network and one independent TV station service.

The new and additional service is expected to be ready for local viewers by late summer.

A mayor and three aldermen will be elected for a two year term.

Mayor Howard B. Campbell and aldermen V. A. Hudson, Lewis T. Hudson and Ray Duren, whose terms expire this year, have filed for re-election.

Spacemobile Will Be Here Next Thursday

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration Spacemobile will be in Goldthwaite next Thursday, March 12, for a Space Science Lecture-Demonstration, it was announced Tuesday by Hoyett Browning, high school principal.

Jack D. Shattuch and Robert McCurdy, space lecturers for the Educational Service Branch of the Space Administration, will appear to present the program.

The program which includes a Lecture-Demonstration will be presented in the high school auditorium at 9 a. m.

It will be open to the public and parents of school children are especially invited, Browning stated.

work for the water treatment plant has been completed and construction above ground is now getting underway.

Equipment was moved to the site Monday for construction of the pumping station at the river. Work on this phase of the project will be started shortly and will continue around the clock until the job is completed. This involves cutting channel from the river flow inland for pump house installation, with 14 inch flexible line underground.

Work on the off-channel storage reservoir is about two-thirds completed at this time. This job should be completed within the next two or three weeks.

ELECTRIC LINE

The electric power line from the city to the river has been completed by city crews, W. C. Barnett, city manager, announced.

Barnett told the council that the line is ready for power to be turned on at any time now. Only work remaining on this phase of the job is construction of transformer racks at two locations. One at the filter plant and the other at the off-channel storage reservoir. These will be constructed as soon as location is determined and other work is far enough along.

DUMP GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

The City and Mills County dump ground came in for the annual discussion with announcement that extensive cleaning up and improvements are being done at the place.

Barnett informed the council that dozing has been done at the grounds the past several days giving it a general cleaning up.

The council authorized Barnett to continue with the project and do some additional work while equipment is there.

Plans were discussed for hauling some caliche and provide some access roads to the back of the dump grounds to keep trash and debris and everything unsightly as far away from the roads and highways as possible.

Also discussed was a dead animal pit to be located in the far back portion of the grounds.

In addition to the cleaning up job and roads the council plans to install a number of signs, directing the public where to go to unload.

Plans were discussed for providing a fine for unlawful and illegal dumping after the roads are provided and signs are erected.

LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS

The council voted to transfer \$1,000.00 from the general fund to the library fund to take care of some needed improvements at the library.

This will provide for a new roof for the library building, construction of additional needed shelves and other repairs that are needed.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other matters the council approved approximately \$2,000.00 expenditure for providing bigger pumping facilities to take care of disposal water at the sewage treatment plant.

This project will include drainage pipe line from the disposal plant to some property owned by L. B. Burnham.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments of the city were presented to the council and approved.

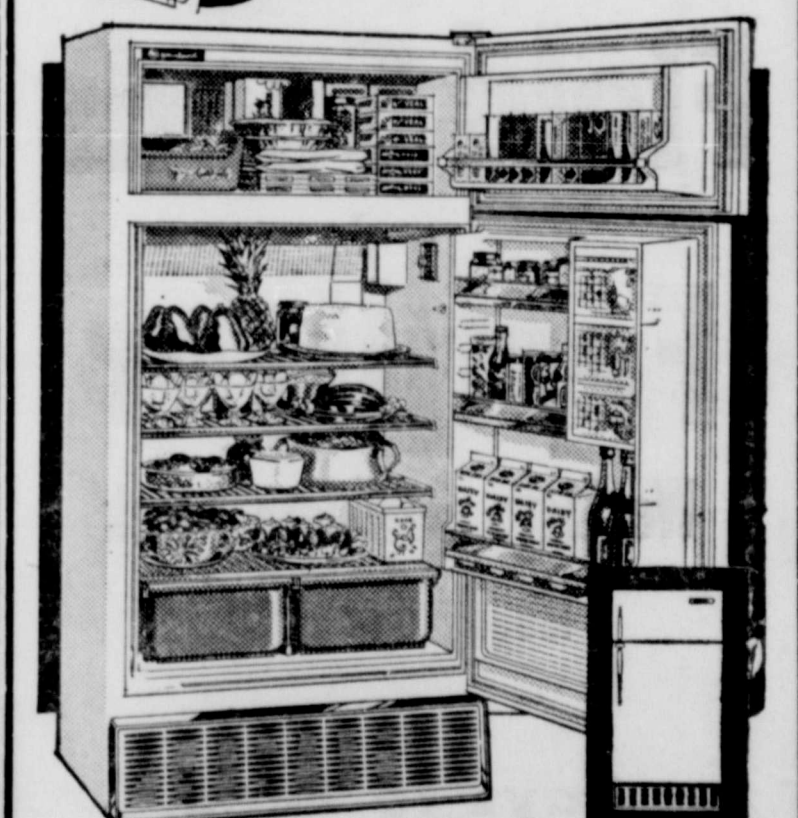

A statement by Pat O'Keefe, executive director of the State Democratic Committee, indicated that interest in voter registration seems lightest in rural areas. Republican party officials have not hazarded a guess on the score, but are hoping to get 300,000 Texans to cast ballots in their May 2 primary. Total of 1962 GOP primary participants was 135,000.

Population Picture
Although the State Health Department reported an "uninterrupted decline" in the Texas birth rate per 1,000 population between 1956 and 1962, the state's population continues to rise.

Births in 1962 totaled 244,069. New settlers moving in from other states accounted for a 200,000 increase helping to make the population pass the 10 million mark last year. But at the same time the number of deaths for one year reached an all-time high of 81,118.

Heart disease was the leading cause of death, accounting for 33 per cent; cancer was second with 15 per cent; apoplexy, third with 12 per cent of the deaths; and accidents of all kinds, fourth with seven per cent.

Appointment by Popular Vote
Governor Connally, who must make some 850 appointments during his current two-year term of office, decided to let local voters make the decision for him on appointment of a judge for the 100th judicial district.

This district, which embraces Carson, Hall, Donley, Childress and Collingsworth counties, lost its judge with the death of Judge Luther Gribble.

Connally said he will appoint the winner of the Democratic primary election to serve out the remainder of the late Judge Gribble's term. He said, "Since the election is reasonably close at hand, it is my view that the voters should have the opportunity to select a judge of their choosing."

Court Speaks
Supreme Court set arguments for March 18 on a Corpus Christi case testing whether the new Sabbath closing laws can be circumvented by "emergency" purchases.

Nueces County District Attorney Sam L. Jones Jr. pushed the appeal from a Fourth Court of Civil Appeals decision that Shoppers World, Inc. of Corpus Christi complied with the law banning sales of certain items on the Sabbath when it required purchasers to sign certificates of "emergency" before buying.

However, Jones maintains that the certificates amount to a subterfuge, when more than 200 so-called "emergencies" arise on an average Sunday.

10,640 Books Checked Out Of The Jennie Trent Dew Library In 1963

The Jennie Trent Dew Memorial Library Board met in the Courthouse Tuesday, February 25. Judge Cecil Egger presided over the meeting. Reports were made that a handrail and a stove in the kitchen had been installed and that other improvements and additions will soon be underway. Plans for a "Friends of the Library" club were discussed and also plans for the Silver Tea to be held soon.

The following report, covering December, January and February, was submitted by the librarian, Mrs. V. C. Bradford, and is a summing up for the year 1963.

One hundred and twenty-one memorial books were given in 1963 and 160 given that were not memorials. 70 books were purchased and 35 had to be discarded which makes a total on hand at the end of 1963 of 5,365 volumes, 3,444 adult books and 1,921 for children. 10,640 books were loaned during the year, 3,529 for adults and 7,111 for children.

Sidney Pass sent the library nine books and a number of pamphlets on world conditions at this time and anti-communism. These good reference books are already in use by the students at the school.

A 12 volume set of Rand, McNally World Atlas has recently been purchased.

Kenneth Thomas donated around 75 paperback books, mostly Westerns, which were appreciated. Also the Self Culture Club gave a \$5.00 cash donation to the library.

A total of 625 books were checked out with 313 adult and 312 children.

During February 33 memorial books have been received, two have been purchased and Mrs. Hoyt Cockrell gave two novels to the library. Radio and TV station KRLD sent a pamphlet on "Careers in Television." The Moral Re-Armament Organization sent a complimentary copy of "Frank Buchman's Secret," by Howard Abd. Also Mr. Carr P. Collins, Jr., sent a copy of his father's biography.

Seven hundred and fifty-eight books were checked out in February, 329 for adults and 429 for children.
