Goldthwaite Post Office Building To Be Modernized Under Contract

Modernization of the post office building at Goldthwaite, Texas, was further advanced yesterday with the announcement by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that a contract has been awarded to Mr. and Mrs. Oscar T. Burns to remodel and lease the building to the Post Office Department under terms of a 10-year lease, with options to renew the lease for an additional 20 years.

double our efforts, not only in expanding our capacity but also in devising new postal techniques to meet the demands of our growing population."

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, while the building remains under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

"This formula," Mr. Gronouski said, "utilizes the resources and investment funds of private enterprise for needed postal buildings."

"Although we are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Mr. Gronouski said, "we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding volume of mail. In this instance it was determined that a modernization process would be more economical to the Government and still satisfy the needs of the Postal Service in this area."

The remodeling is expected to be completed early in the Fall of 1964. It will include air conditioning, fluorescent lighting, etc.

"The construction program is being concentrated in those areas where the need is urgent and suitable space cannot be obtained except through new construction."

The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Priddy High School.

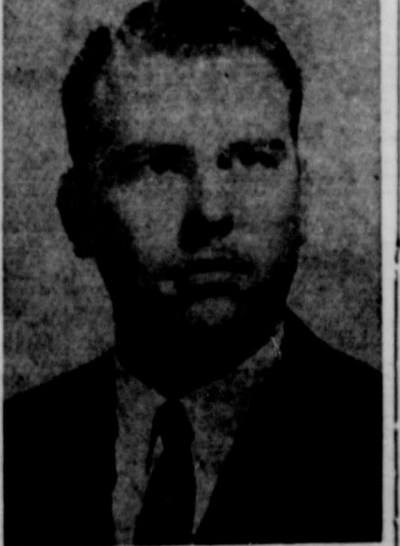

STATE CAPITAL

Highlights AND Sidelights

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas—U. S. Supreme Court says the present line-up of congressional districts is unconstitutional. But the day for redistricting still is far away, according to Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

Texas' 22 Congressional districts have the greatest variance in size of any state, ranging from 214,000 to 980,000 population. This, the high court said, is not fair and it must be corrected.

Because the 1964 elections already are under way the Supreme Court allowed Texas 30 days in which to ask a three-judge Federal court in Houston to delay the effectiveness of the order.

Governor Connally is sure the court will recognize the fact that absentee voting will begin on April 12 and that filing deadlines already have passed.

He insists that the major legislative surgery required cannot be done in a 30-day special session of the Legislature and should be left to the regular 140-day session which starts January 12. He felt the Court would agree that it now is too late to redistrict for 1964 elections.

SALT WATER

Texas Water Pollution Control Board agreed, after three public hearings, to outlaw the use of unlined surface pits for disposal of oilfield salt water in eight South Plains Counties.

Oil and gas operators were given until September 1, to make other arrangements for disposal of their brine. Water users in the area, which contains the greatest irrigation section in Texas, had complained that the oilfield salt water was seeping into the fresh water strata known as the Ogallala formation.

Covered by the no-pit order are Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Hale, Hockley, Lynn, Swisher and Terry Counties.

COURT SPEAKS

Texas Supreme Court, in a decision with far-reaching consequences, has ruled that holders of paid political office are ineligible to run for the Legislature during their present terms.

Specifically, the Court ordered the Taylor County Democratic Committee to remove the name of 104th Dist. Atty. Tom Todd from the ballot as a legislative candidate.

State Democratic Committee Secretary Frank Erwin Jr. said copies of the opinion will be sent to all county chairmen for their guidance. Erwin earlier had advised of the ineligibility of paid officials to run for the Legislature.

Supreme Court also ordered a new trial in a case hinging on the question of whether newspaper carriers are independent merchants or employees of the publishing company.

Suit was brought by Gerald Witt Love against Newspapers, Inc., and C. E. Cargile, contract carrier for the newspapers, following an auto collision. Lower courts found for Love. However, the new decision held the independent contractor issue had been improperly submitted to the jury. Earlier decisions have supported the position that a newspaperboy or carrier is an independent agent and not an employee of the publication.

In other action the Supreme Court

... Held a legislative act cannot be nullified by a state agency's regulations. Case involved coastal fishermen absolved of violating an agency order outlawing net fishing in the Chambers County part of Galveston Bay.

... For the second time refused to accept a mandamus petition aimed at keeping all who

saw telecasts of the slaying of Lee Harvey Oswald off the Jack Ruby murder trial jury.

... Reversed lower courts and ruled that a physician hired part-time as a company doctor is not an employee of the company.

SUPER-AGENCY BACKED

Governor Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School will recommend that the Legislature set up an 18-member state coordinating agency with jurisdiction over both junior and senior colleges and universities, says Chairman H. B. Zachry.

Committee has been under fire from state capitol newsmen for holding closed-door sessions. Zachry defended the policy but hinted that reporters will be allowed in on at least part of future meetings.

1964 Feed Grain Program Offers Advance Pay

Growers who take part in the 1964 feed grain program may receive a part of the diversion payment in advance, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. As last year, the program will be available for corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

Up to one-half of the estimated total diversion payment may be made in advance, at the participant's request, at the time of signing up or as soon as possible after that time, the Chairman explained. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price support payment offered by the program will be made next fall.

The advance payment provision should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra ready cash during the spring planting season.

As in 1963, the 1964 feed grain program offers participants a payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses, and a price support payment on the normal production of the 1964 feed grain acreage. Participating growers will also qualify for price support loans or purchase agreements on their entire production from the feed grain acreage.

The acreage of corn, grain sorghum, and barley has been combined into one total feed grain base for each farm, and a producer may divert one or more of the feed grains in the total base. His diversion payment will be made at the per-acre rate applying to the grain diverted. The minimum diversion under the program will be 20 per cent of the farm's feed grain base acreage.

While participating in the 1964 feed grain program is voluntary, the price support payment and loans—as well as the diversion payments—will be available only to growers who carry out the program's provisions.

Signup for the program will continue at Mills ASCS County office through March 27.
