Major Glendon L. Armstrong Named To Command Detachment 15, CARC

Goodfellow AFB, Texas—Major Glendon L. Armstrong of Goldthwaite recently named to command the newly-activated Detachment 15, Central Air Rescue Center here, was scheduled for a busy time this week.

Detachment 15 expected to host its two "other commanders," Brig. General Adriel N. Williams, Air Rescue Service commander at Orlando AFB, Fla., and Col. Arthur W. Beall, commander of the Central Air Rescue Center at Richards-Gebaur AFB, Mo.

The two officers were expected to visit the detachment to witness a weather balloon launch and recovery mission. The Air Weather Service (AWS) launches the balloons, while Air Rescue Service (ARS) crews recover the material when the balloons come down.

Major Armstrong said that the balloon recovery mission, which ARS recently acquired from AWS, is a logical project for Rescuemen, who are charged with "The safe and expedient recovery of aerospace hardware by ARS aircraft and crews."

Traditionally, Rescue has

been known for its search and rescue missions in behalf of downed U. S. airmen. During the Korean conflict, ARS saved nearly 10,000 men, including 1,000 pulled from behind enemy lines by sturdy Rescue aircraft. But its mission has broadened in the space age.

Major Armstrong is a veteran command pilot who flew with both the Military Air Transport Service and the Strategic Air Command in recent years. Both ARS and AWS are units of MATS. His last overseas tour was in Bermuda, where he flew KC-97 tanker planes on aerial refueling missions high over the Atlantic Ocean as aircraft commander and also served as flight commander in the award-winning 303rd Air Refueling Squadron.

General Williams is no stranger to Texas. He entered the "West Point of the Air," Randolph Field, in 1938 and received his pilot's wings at Kelly Field in May 1939. During World War II, he commanded the 436th Troop Carrier Group and participated in all major airborne assault operations in the European Theater. He has since held command and staff positions at all levels of command through Headquarters, U. S. Air Force. He took command of Air Rescue Service last year.

Major Armstrong revealed that something new in the way of aircraft is due for Detachment 15 in the near future. Their old HH-21 helicopters are soon to be phased out and replaced by the new Sikorsky CH-3C twin-turbine-powered "choppers." The CH-3C's will greatly enhance the detachment's recovery capability with their longer range, increased speed and greater lift and load capacity.

Armstrong is the son of Mrs. Annie Armstrong of Goldthwaite.

Commercial Lamb Feeding Program Closed Out With Sale Last Friday

The 1964 Mills County Commercial lamb feeding program came to an end Friday with the sale of 223 head at the auction barn here.

Of the 223 lambs, 107 graded blue, 67 red, and 49 white. Prices were strong, with the top price of \$20.70 going to the House Brothers, who also had the largest group of 45 head. The blue graded lambs ranged from \$19.30 to \$20.70. Red graded lambs, \$18.00 to \$19.70. White lambs, \$15.00 to \$19.20. All these prices varied according to quality and finish. No special treatment was given to the lambs, and they were marketed just like any sheep.

Although the number of lambs was down from last year, prices were good and the program was termed a success. The annual trip will be taken as soon as possible, and plans are to go to Six Flags Over Texas, according to the committee in charge.

The grade school portion of the program is sponsored by Mrs. Thresa Black, Mrs. Clessie Culp, and Mrs. Neppie Long. Characters of the program

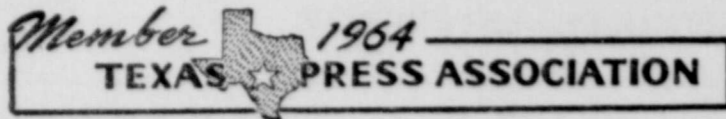

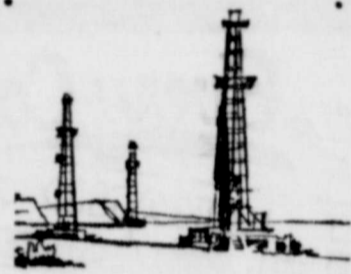

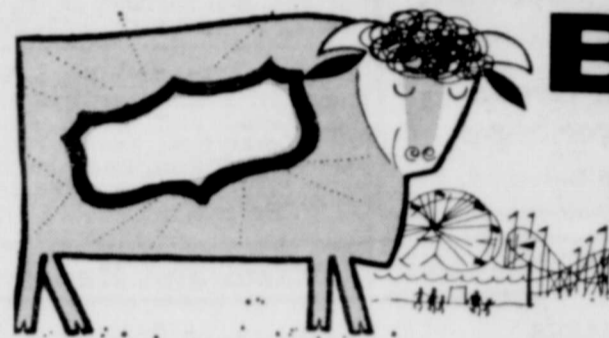
