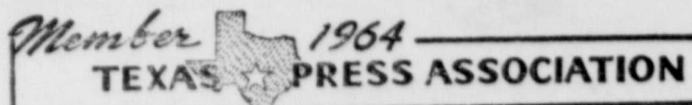

Enclosed is a copy of Bulletin 1005 entitled Farmer Adjustments To Drouth in a Texas County.

I hope you will be pleased to find out that we finally completed our study which had its focus in Mills County. You may recall that I visited in your office on two or three occasions. Your staff was very helpful in giving me some leads where I might obtain pictures for the publication.

I would be very pleased, indeed, if you would write a story in your paper concerning the fact that the Mills County study has now been published and that it is available free of charge to anyone requesting a copy of Bulletin 1005 from the Department of Agricultural Information, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

Incidentally, please feel free to quote some of the findings freely from the bulletin in any write-up that you give the publication.

The people whom we interviewed in Mills County were very courteous and helpful. Since a number have undoubtedly moved in the meantime, our mailing list will probably be considerably out of date. Therefore, I hope to come to Mills County personally within the next couple of weeks and leave at least 100 copies of the bulletin in the bank with Mr. Duren and in the store with Mr. Marwitz in Priddy. These will be free for distribution for anyone who comes by and cares to pick them up.

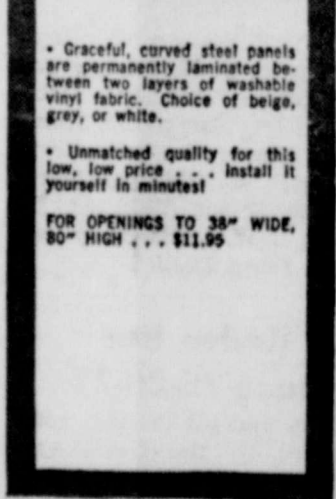

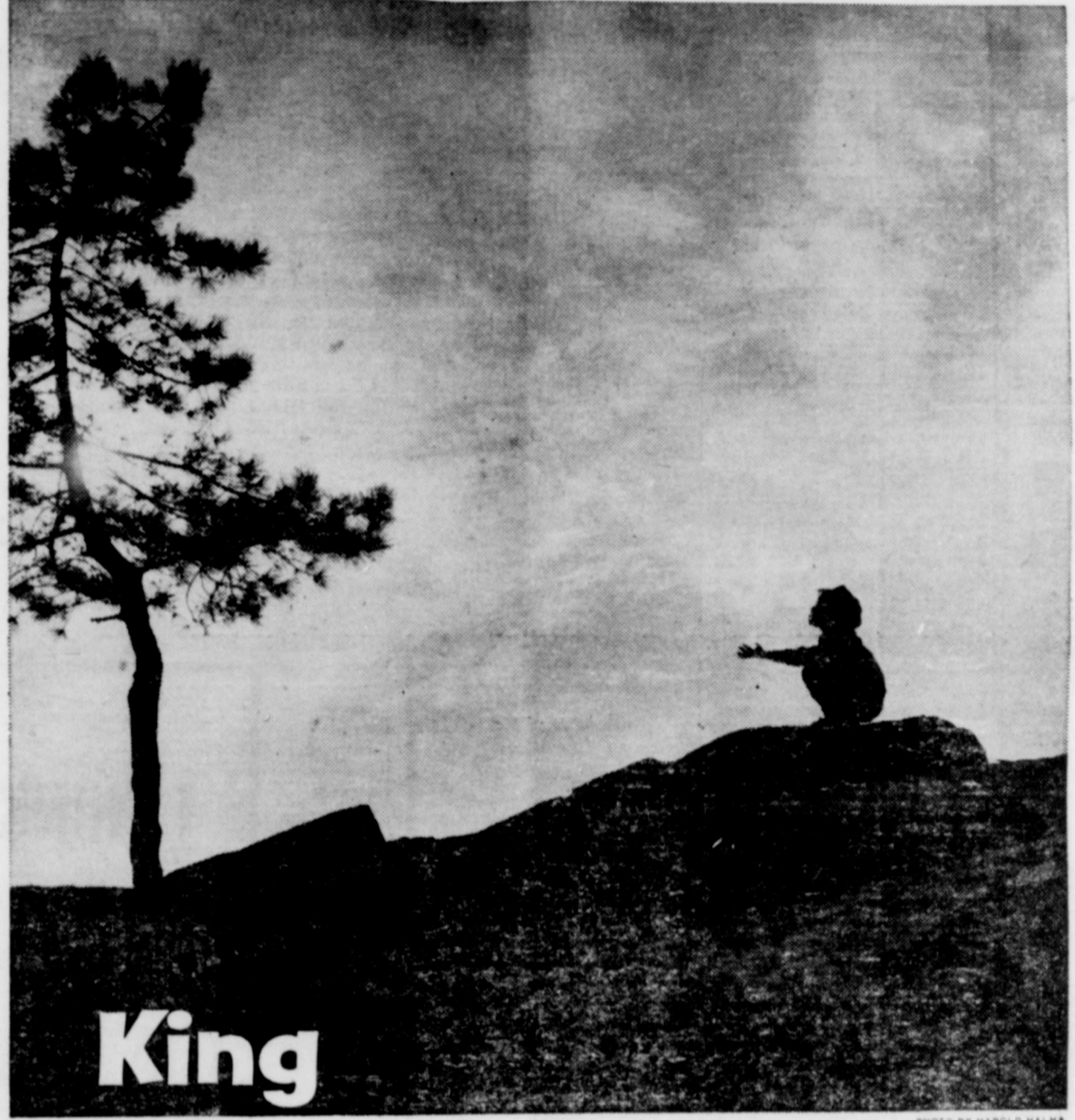

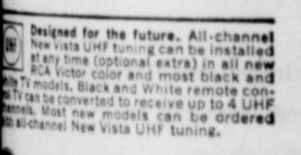

Indictments Are Returned By Grand Jury

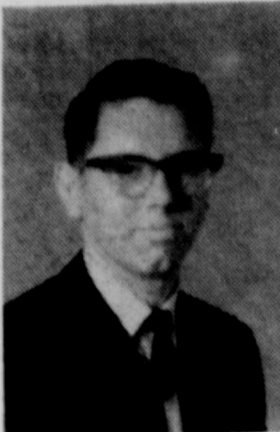
The regular May term of the Grand Jury was called into session last Monday while district court was held for the day.

Fishermen Are Cautioned About Purchase Of License

A warning to fishermen to buy the \$2.15 fishing license is being urged by State Game Warden Richard H. Pinckney, stationed in Lampasas. Spring weather has kindled the urge to fish and a fishing license is required in most instances. A fishing license is required to fish in salt or fresh water, UNLESS:
You are under 17 or over 65 years of age.
You fish on property which you own or upon which you reside.
You fish with a trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or other winding device attached, if you are fishing in the county in which you reside.
When fishing outside of your county of residence, you are required to have a fishing license regardless of how you fish.
When using a winding device, you are required to have a license, regardless of where you fish.

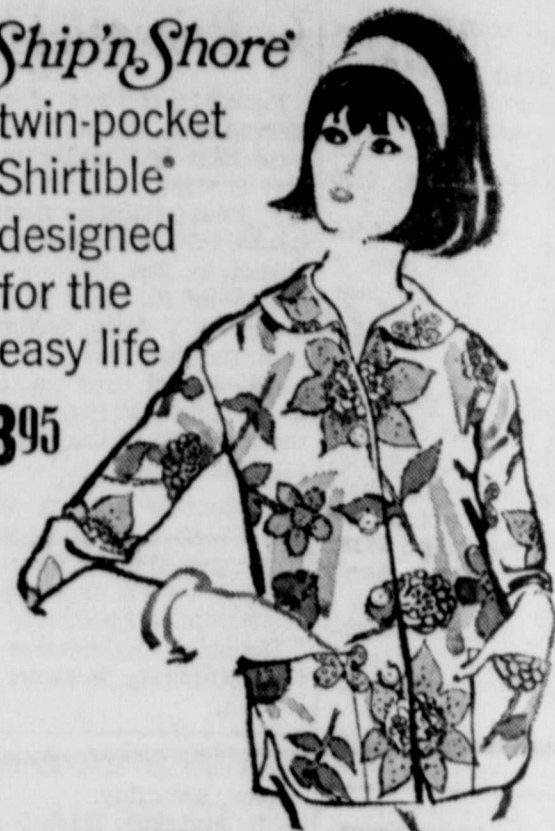
