## Scouts, Scouters In Pre-Jamboree Training Shake-Down This Weekend

The thirty-seven boys and three adult leaders of the Comanche Trail Council's contingent to the 6th National Jamboree of the Boy Scouts of America will gather for their pre-Jamboree training "shakedown" camp this weekend, May 29-31, at the Camp Bowie Rifle Ranges just south of Brownwood.

Purpose of the "shakedown" camp, as outlined by Council Jamboree Chairman, Dr. Allan J. Spence, is to physically and mentally prepare the boys and leaders to such a degree that they will derive the maximum benefit from their Jamboree experience. They will become familiar with the equipment they will be using, preview the Jamboree program activities and practice some of the competitive skills, practice the cooking and camping skills needed for Jamboree-style camping, strengthen their understanding and operation of the Patrol system, and emphasize the place of the Scout Oath and Law as the "law" of the Jamboree.

The "shakedown" camp will be conducted as closely to Jamboree conditions as are possible.

Each boy and leader will come packed as if to leave from the camp to the Jamboree without returning home; they will pitch their tents, cook six meals over charcoal fires, and live in a 90 ft. by 90 ft. area. At the close of the shakedown camp the Troop and patrol equipment will be packed for shipment to Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, site of the Jamboree, July 17-23.

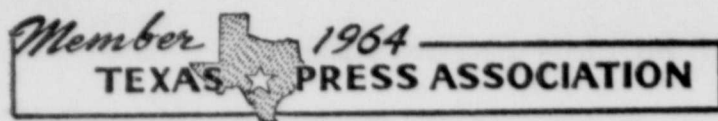

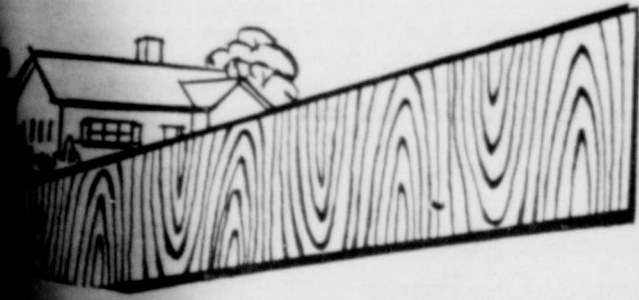

# Granddaughter Of Abney House Proprietor Writes Mrs. Dempsey

Editor's Note: The following letter was written to Mrs. T. R. Dempsey, owner and operator of the Depot Hotel, by Nora Abney Savage, granddaughter of the late J. B. Abney, who was proprietor of "The Abney

House" here before the turn of the century. A photostat copy of Mr. Abney's stationery dated February 27th, 1895, reads as follows: THE ABNEY HOUSE, J. B. Abney, proprietor, Good Meals, Comfortable Beds, Commodious Sample Rooms, Fine Cigars, Polite Attention. A Solid Rock Structure, Rates, \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day. Livery Stable in Connection.

The Hotel, just across from the Santa Fe Depot, operated under several owners and names during 70 year period.

April 24, 1964

"My Dear Mrs. Dempsey: My delay in writing you has certainly not been intentional but am sure you understand that many things absorbed your time upon returning from a trip.

I want to speak for my two cousins with whom I was traveling, Mrs. Lorene Abney Martin and Mrs. L. D. Abney, and express our appreciation for your kindnesses in showing us around your place. Both Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Abney had been there before, years ago, but it was my first trip to Goldthwaite, even my first trip to that part of Texas.

We did so appreciate you taking the time to show us around—it was most interesting—and I want to tell you the cactus you gave me was transplanted in my rock garden and several days

ago it bloomed many lovely cream colored flowers. Everyone who has seen it has exclaimed over it. I am so pleased to have it, and it was certainly thoughtful of you to give it to me. We went up to the Court House and viewed the Confederate Memorial, and saw grandfather's name on it, John B. Abney. He enlisted in the Confederate Army in Georgia, and moved into Mississippi about 1866 and on to Goldthwaite in 1894 and died in 1895 and was buried there in the beautiful well-kept cemetery there at Goldthwaite.

Lorene Abney Martin and I are first cousins, her father and mother, William Wylie Abney and Sallie Abney, are buried in same lot as Grandfather Abney. They died a month apart in 1896.

I want to tell you that the three of us were very impressed with the manner in which the cemetery is taken care of—it was a lovely time to go—late evening after we visited you.

My father was 16 years old when grandfather operated the hotel. Of the eleven children he had, only two were with him and my grandmother at Goldthwaite. The William Wylie Abneys lived at Mullin, Texas, but I suppose moved to Goldthwaite about a year before their death. They left five young children. Mrs. Martin was the youngest, and Mrs. Abney's husband, L. D., the next to youngest. Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Abney are sisters-in-law.

I have a file of letters passed on to me written by my grandfather, John Beck Abney in 1895 to his older children in Mississippi. They are most interesting. I know your newspaper would like to read them. I cannot part with them, for they were entrusted to my care, and I feel very honored in all this big family to have them. I would be most happy to have some of them copied if the newspaper there would care to have them. They are relative to weather conditions, prices of various foods, etc. I know that in one letter he wrote, (they were feeding people at hotel) that in one week he spent \$620 for beef alone. Wouldn't he be shocked at prices now—nearly 70 years later?

I am enclosing a photostat of the heading of one of his letters which I thought the newspaper there might like to see. Don't bother to return it, I have several copies, some there would like to see it.

While we parked near the Court House there, we went into a drug store, inquiring for post cards. We wanted a post card picture of the Memorial in Courtyard, and explained why, that our grandfather's name was on it. A man in drug store said his father was in bus-

Abney and myself, Mrs. Nora Abney Savage, all of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, enjoyed the courtesies shown us in your nice town and seeing places our families lived, and that some of them were buried in such a lovely, restful place as the cemetery at Goldthwaite.

We were on our way to Lampasas to visit other Abney cousins and to Austin to visit J. B. Abney (Mrs. Martin's brother). So you see we detoured off our route to come by there and even though the other two had been there once before, I never had the pleasure of seeing the place I had heard my father, James Oliver Abney, talk about so often. He passed away here in 1960 at the age of 82.
