Mills County voters didn't turn out too well for the Democratic run-off primary election Saturday to cast their ballot for the nomination of a candidate for the office of Congressman-at-large.

There were only two candidates on the ballot with no run-off contest on the state, or county level.

Only 67 votes were cast in the one precinct where election was held for the entire county.

Mills County voters favored Joe Pool of Dallas County over Robert W. Baker from Harris County for congressman-at-large.

Only 67 votes were cast with Baker polling 30 and Pool 37.

Five Months Rainfall Here Is 12.98 Inches

Rainfall recorded in Goldthwaite for the first five months, January through May, 1964, measured 12.98 inches, according to official record kept by Harry Allen.

Of this amount 1.96 inches was measured during the month of May.

Total for the five month period is slightly more than double the amount recorded here for the same period in 1963 when the official record showed only 6.33 inches.

For the first nine days of June .77 inch was recorded officially in Goldthwaite. This fell on June 4th.

According to reports the rain last Thursday night covered all of Mills County ranging from less than one inch up to three and one-half inches in some sections.

Wildlife Public Hearings This Week

First steps toward shaping Texas' wildlife harvest are being taken in 152 counties this week, according to E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Under the law, hearings will be held this week in the counties where game and fish seasons, bag limits and other details are determined by the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Proposed changes in existing rules and regulations will be explained. Regulations for the taking of game and fish in the remaining 102 counties in the State are set by legislative action.

"We hope local hunters and fishermen, and all others interested in wildlife and fisheries conservation, will attend these hearings," said Walker. "Because of the limited number of hearing officers available and time requirements involved, it has been necessary to schedule the hearing at varying times of the day."

\$557,580. In Social Security Benefits Paid To 837 County Residents In '63

A total of 837 persons in Goldthwaite and Mills County representing 17.8 per cent of the population, were receiving \$46,465 every month in social security benefits as of January 1, 1964. This amounts to a yearly total of some \$557,580 for the year 1963. These figures were compiled and released today by

Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple social security office.

In the seven-county area served by the Temple district office, some 17,416 persons, representing 10.3 per cent of the population, were being paid \$922,061 in social security benefits the first of the year, Calvert added. This amounts to a total of \$11,064,732 paid to residents of these seven counties during 1963.

The Temple district office provides social security services to Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties. Traveling field representatives of the Temple district office regularly visit the towns in these counties to assist interested persons in claiming their rightful benefits, and to provide all social security services for these people, Calvert said.

"We know that there are many persons in our area who are 62 years of age or over who could be getting some social security benefits if they would just come in and see us. We

often find that these aged persons have misinformation about their social security benefit rights, or the law has changed since they last talked with us," Calvert remarked.

"If you are 62 years of age or over, and you are not now receiving social security benefits, and you have not contacted us in the last three years about getting benefits, you should come in and see us again now. Even though you may be earning more than \$1200 a year, you may be eligible to get some of your social security benefits. And, who couldn't use an increase in income?"

"A talk with us may be to your advantage. We want you to have all the facts in your case, then you can decide to claim benefits or not," he added. "The decision to claim benefits is up to you. But, be sure you have the correct information before deciding not to claim them. We do not want anyone to lose benefits to which they are entitled."

There are five very important times when a person should talk to the social security representative, Calvert says. These are:

1. If a worker in your family dies.
2. When a worker becomes totally and permanently disabled.
3. When a worker reaches age 62. Check with your social security representative about three months before age 62. Find out if you should file for reduced benefits.
4. At age 65, if you have not filed for reduced benefits before age 65.
5. When you reach age 72. Full social security benefits can be paid at age 72 regardless of earnings.

Your Temple social security district office is located at 909 First National Bank Building. The telephone number is PR 8-1861. If you cannot come to the office in Temple, write us and we will write and make an appointment for you to meet our representative when he is next in your town. A schedule of his visits is posted in every Post Office, City Hall, Courthouse, Texas Employment Commission Office, Department of Public Welfare office and other public offices.

Calvert concluded with this reminder—"If it's time for you to see your social security representative, don't delay—do it today!"

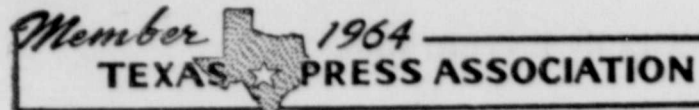

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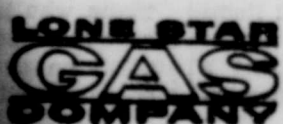

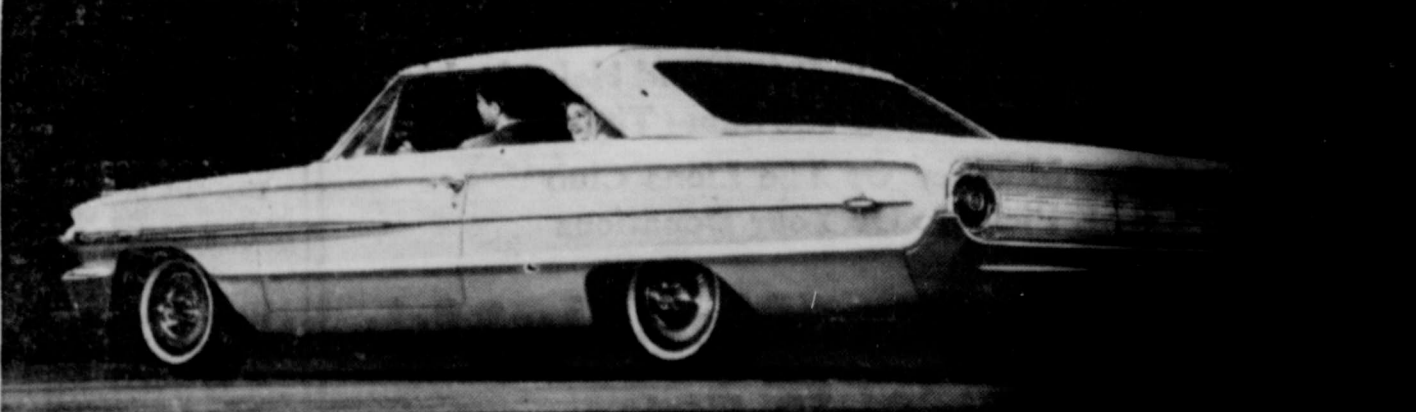

True Facts About Your Hearing

For the past several years doctors and research departments have been testing and developing ways to combat the alarming amount of people that are becoming hard of hearing. The same with her teeth—they were fitted to her, and to the most important part of her head, (the ears) she picked up the first aid she could find and then wondered why she could not hear. One of the factors of why people won't do anything about their hearing problem is vanity. They are afraid that someone will see them. Yet this same person will either ask over and over what someone said or put their hand behind their ear trying to understand what is being said or sit in a crowd and giggle when they should have said no, or they will go in a hall and stay away from people, church, etc., and yet they are afraid someone will notice that they wear a hearing aid.

Other facts: If people would get a hearing test made when they noticed the first sign that they were getting hard of hearing, they would not have so much trouble later on. Yet lots of people will put it off until they get in real trouble — then get to be corrected over and over, although they have been several years getting that way. They still want correction over and over. If this same person had time out to have their hearing tested at least every six months, they would not get in trouble. You do not wait until you are nearly blind to have your eyes tested, do you?

Maybe the above statements are a little blunt, and maybe they hit below the belt, but we in the hearing business have spent thousands of dollars on research to aid and help the hard of hearing. We feel you should know the facts and here are some of the facts from our side of the fence. Years ago if a person had to wear a hearing aid everyone knew it for they had big battery boxes and cords and buttons in the ear. It was like hooking up the harness on a buggy horse. Then came the news of the hearing glasses; they too were big and heavy, but got the boxes and buttons off most people. Then the news we had been waiting for and knew was coming: PRESCRIPTION HEARING. No more cords, tubes, etc. Now people that would not wear hearing aids before because of some of the reasons we have mentioned before can now be fitted to hear again with the whole unit in the ear. In fact, you can sleep in it if you cared to do so.

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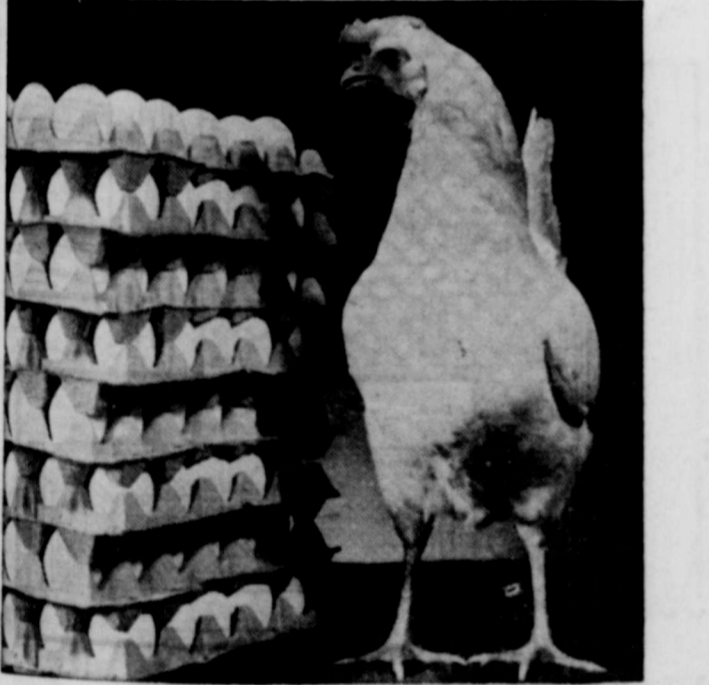

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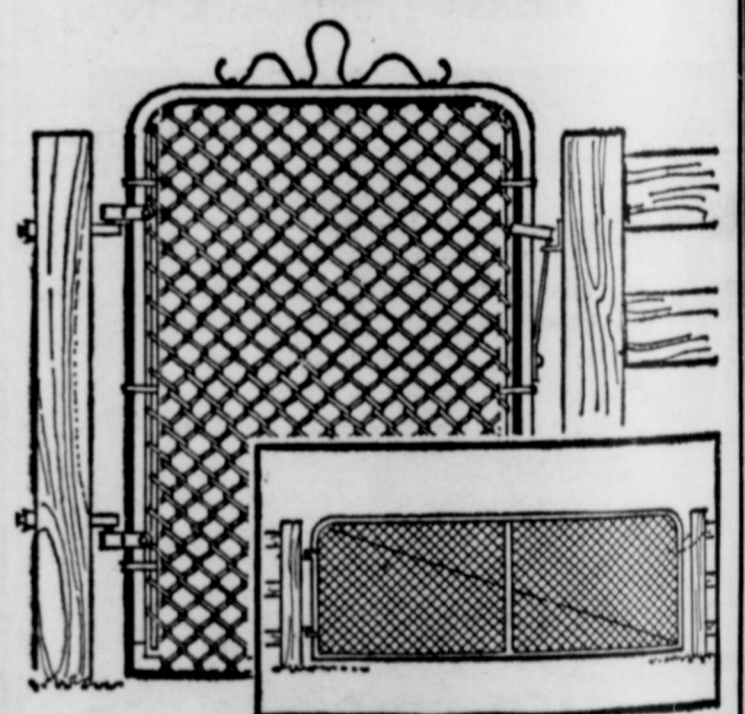
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
