**HERITAGE HOME TO OPEN SOON**—This picture is a pen and drawing of Heritage Home, a 42 bed nursing home, now under construction at the corner of Third and Reynolds streets in Goldthwaite. Construction is expected to be completed early in July, according to announcement by Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Arnold of Goldthwaite. Mrs. Arnold will be operating manager of the home. Related with the Arnolds in the project are Mr. and Mrs. Les Paulson of Evant.

The "L" shaped building is 155 feet long by 109 feet wide and covers 8,850 square feet of floor space. The building will feature a number of rooms with private baths.

There will be a recreation room and also an outside recreation area is being planned.

It will be equipped with nursing call system, nurses' station, medication room, business manager's office, dining room and kitchen facilities and wide halls with hand railings.

The entire building will have year around refrigerated air conditioning and central heating system.

Mrs. Arnold stated this week that they will start accepting applications for patients in the near future.

Plans are being made for open house as soon as the building is completed and will be announced at a later date.

### Telephone Merger Approval Voted

Common stockholders of The Southwestern States Telephone Company and California Water & Telephone Company today approved proposed mergers with General Telephone & Electronics Corporation. The balloting, which took place at special meetings in San Francisco, indicated that 90.4% and 90.3% of the respective companies' shares entitled to vote favored the proposals.

In New York, stockholders of General Telephone & Electronics Corporation also met today and approved the merger proposals.

On Friday, June 12, 1964, stockholders of two other companies, Western Utilities Corporation and West Coast Telephone Company, sanctioned the merger with General Telephone. Stockholders of the four affiliated San Francisco based companies will receive shares of General Telephone's common stock in exchange for their holdings.

It is expected that the mergers will become effective on June 30, 1964.

Goldthwaite Future Farmers Of America will stage their sixth annual invitational rodeo next week Thursday, through Saturday, June 25-27. It was announced this week by Layton Black, vocational agriculture teacher of Goldthwaite school and FFA Advisor.

The three day event will be at the Jernigan Arena, two miles East of Goldthwaite, starting at 8 p. m. each night.

Plans call for a big street parade on Thursday and Saturday evening at 5 p. m. All schools are invited to take part in the parade which will start at the high school.

All business firms and civic groups are invited to participate

in the parade with floats or other suitable entries. Black stated. Members of the FFA will appreciate the support of everyone taking part to help make the parade bigger than ever.

Events for the three nights of thrills and spills include: wild cow milking, calf roping, barrel races, ribbon roping, pole bending, calf riding, greased pig race and bull riding.

## Wheat-Feed Grain Substitution Announced For 1965 Farm Program

per permit greater flexibility in farm operations, substitution of wheat and feed grains will be authorized under the 1965 farm program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Mills County Committee, said today.

program determination is announced early so that summer fallow operations for next crop may take place early.

percentages—which will be announced later; or (2) the wheat acreage planted for harvest multiplied by the normal yield.

The total wheat production of producers who carry out wheat program provisions will be eligible for price-support loans even though the wheat acreage is in excess of the wheat allotment because of the substitution provisions.

When feed grains are grown in place of wheat, the feed grain production of program cooperators will be eligible for price-support loans. If price-support payments are authorized as a part of the 1965 feed grain program, substitution of feed grains for wheat will not increase the payments available; the price-support payments will be limited to the normal production of the feed grain base less the diverted acreage (at least the minimum diversion under the feed grain program).

If a producer requests it, an oats-rye base will be established on the basis of the farm's 1959-60 average oat-rye acreage as adjusted. Wheat may be substituted for such crops. However, corn, grain sorghum, or barley may not be planted as a substitute for the oat-rye base acreage. If an oat-rye base is established, the producer will need to meet the minimum diversion for it also.

agricultural legislation proposed for such a substitution in 1964 and 1965 wheat and grain programs, but it did not get into effect for because of the lack of time. The Chairman explained that substitution will apply on individual farms only if the farm has a feed grain base or rye base, and a wheat allotment. The substitution provisions may be used by producers who meet at least the minimum diversion for both wheat and grain.
