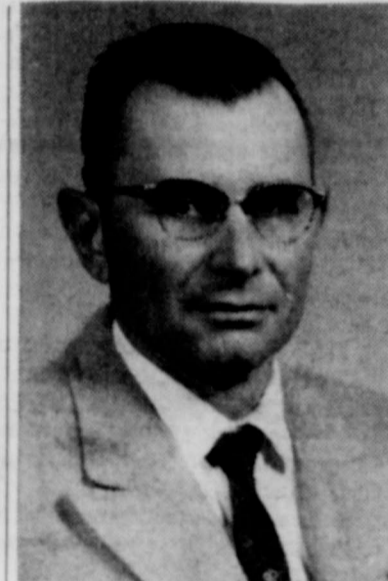
81 Contribute \$1,226.00 To Park Maintenance Fund

Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa this week announced plans for a new addition to Childress and Cruzcosa Clinic and Hospital.

The new wing which is to be constructed at the south of present hospital will be 73 feet by

66 feet in size and will provide 10 additional beds.

Present capacity of the hospital is 22 patients, with 25 or 26 in emergencies. With the addition the capacity will be 32 patients, and 35 or 36 in case of emergency.

NEW WING

The new wing, or addition, will consist of 6 private rooms and two double rooms. All new rooms will have private baths. One of the double rooms will be equipped with two doors and a special scrub sink so that it can be used for isolation patient.

In addition to the eight rooms there will be a new surgery room. The new surgery room will be larger than the present one and will be equipped with new lights. The present surgery will be used for a hospital records room. It will also have a new obstetrical room since the present one will be made into a new dining room for the staff.

There will also be a basement which will provide an area for heating and cooling units and allow extra space for storage.

CHOICE OF ROOMS

During the past year the hospital has been crowded most of the time, according to Drs. Childress and Cruzcosa.

This situation prevented some patients from having private room when it was needed or desired.

The new wing with additional rooms is expected to solve the problem and give patients a better choice of rooms.

CONSTRUCTION

It is hoped that final plans will be completed and approved some time in the early part of August, officials announced.

At that time bids for construction will be advertised for and it is anticipated that contract will be let and construction work be started during the month of September.

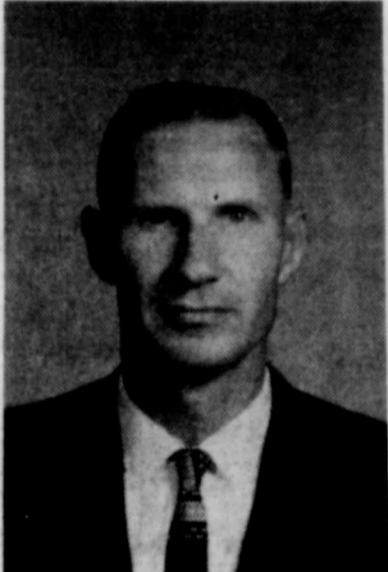
FINANCING

Financing of the original hospital and the first wing which was added about three years ago, was done through the Mills County State Bank and with the help of about 60 local citizens. The same procedure will be followed again for the new addition, hospital officials stated.

The bank will again hold the first lien and the loan by the group of citizens will be a second lien on the hospital. Citizens will be paid six per cent interest and will be paid 10 per cent of the principle each year. Cost of the new wing is expected to run about \$75,000 with \$25,000.00 for additional equipment for a total of \$100,000.

A few citizens have been contacted during the last three months, thus far \$33,500.00 has been raised. This is about one-third of the amount that will be needed from the citizens group.

LVN Training School Will Start At Local Clinic & Hospital Sept. 7

Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital has received its approval to set up an LVN School of nursing, it was announced this week by hospital officials.

Plans are now in progress to open the school on Monday, September 7.

Eight students will be the limit to provide a more than adequate nurse-patient ratio to insure good training, officials stated.

Most of the school's first graduates will automatically be incorporated in the nursing staff of the hospital.

The course will be 12 months with the first 16 weeks being spent primarily on didactic training. Capping ceremonies will take place at the end of the 16 week didactic period.

Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa and Mrs. Mary Anne Eklund will be co-directors of the school and will share in the teaching load.

Dr. Chris S. Cruzcosa, who founded the school, will be the staff medical advisor and chairman of the screening board for applicants.

Most of the first group of students will come from the hospital's present nurses' aides. In announcing the hospital's approval for the LVN training and plans for opening the first school in September, Dr. Chris stated: "Our community needs our nursing help to be augmented. With two rest homes and an enlarged hospital the need will be acute. The hospital is taking a positive step forward to help solve the problem by establishing the school."

Requirements of the board are listed as follows:

1. Must be between 17 and 50 years, preferably below 45 years of age.
2. Must have finished at least two years of high school.
3. Must really, without reservation, consider nursing as a vocation.
4. Must consider working as nurse after graduation, preferably fulltime.

The entrance fee is \$25.00. Students will receive \$10.00 per month for nine months and 45¢ per hour the last three months.

Students are required to pay for their own books and uniforms.

Those desiring further information should contact Dr. Cruzcosa Monday through Friday from 2 to 5 p.m.

Whitewings Increase In Valley Area

A recently completed census of nesting white-winged doves in the Rio Grande Valley caused biologists to report a 129 per cent increase over last year, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Biologists attributed this increase to (1) no hunting in 1963, (2) light mortality on the wintering grounds, and (3) improved nesting cover in citrus groves which is again available in the Rio Grande Valley.

Decrease of native brush nesting habitat over the years has driven birds to use citrus groves for their nesting. Hard freezes in 1962 killed so many citrus trees that many birds were unable to find Texas nesting sites. Lately unusually good growing seasons restored many groves and now trees are large enough for the birds to utilize.

Ted Clark, project leader, says that one possible explanation for the 1964 increase is the return of adult whitewings which were displaced by the freeze of January 1962.

"Whitewings are using 7,900 acres of citrus this year that was not usable in 1963 and average nesting density in citrus has increased by more than 60 per cent," Clark said. "Fifty-two per cent of the 633,000 whitewings nesting in the Valley are utilizing citrus groves."

Regulations Set For Coming Dove And White-Winged Dove Season

The regulations for the coming mourning dove and white-winged dove season as promulgated by the Parks and Wildlife Commission are:

Culberson, Dimmit, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, Kinney, La Salle, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata.

The North Zone mourning dove season opens at noon September 1 and runs through October 30. Shooting hours are from noon until sunset. Bag limits are 12 per day and 24 in possession.

The North Zone comprises Val Verde, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches and Shelby Counties and counties north and west thereof. All other counties are in the South Zone.

The South Zone mourning dove season opens September 26 and runs through November 24, except in counties having a special open season on white-winged doves where the season will close on November 20.

Mourning doves may be taken also during the special white-winged seasons. Bag limits will be 12 doves per day and 24 in possession, but only 10 per day may be whitewings and only 20 whitewings may be in possession at any time.

White-winged dove season will run two consecutive weekends, September 5 and 6 and September 12 and 13, opening at 2 p.m. and closing at sunset in the following counties: Brewster, Brooks, Cameron.

The Department also announced regulations for some of the other migratory game

birds. Rails and gallinules (except coots) may be taken from September 1 through October 20. Shooting hours will be from sunrise to sunset. The bag and possession limits will be 15 the aggregate.

Woodcock may be hunted from November 27 through January 15, from sunrise to sunset with a daily bag limit of five (5) and a possession limit of 10. The season on Wilson snipe or jacksnipe is from November 27 through January from sunrise to sunset. The limit is eight (8) and possession limit is 16.

**Local Gov-
ernments in Texas** may be the beneficiaries if state government winds up the current period with an \$80,000,000 surplus as Gov. John Connally reports.

Such a surplus would mean that the state could abolish the ad valorem tax on property for revenue purposes and that source exclusively for local governments.

Connally said \$20,000,000 of the expected surplus could be set aside in a special fund to pay college building bonds and ad valorem tax reductions.

Connally predicted that the surplus would be less than \$35,000,000 and probably will reach the \$50,000,000 figure, the Governor said.

Those who have contended that the general fund will be so far in the black by 1965 that new tax laws will be eased if not at all.

Connally also said he contemplates submitting to the legislature in stages the recommendations of his Committee on Education Beyond the School.

Connally plans to call a conference on morals and ethics but he has not picked a time.

He declined to say whether he would recommend employment and public accommodations legislation in order to maintain some state action over civil rights after the new federal law.

LEGISLATION FIGHT
A quiet campaign is under way to mobilize South Texas

community facilities to combat an illiteracy problem which results in wasted lives and a damaged economy.

Fausto Toscano, an assistant to Governor Connally, is in South Texas determining what can be done at the local level to help stamp out the blight of illiteracy.

Toscano has visited seven South Texas counties attempting to establish local literacy centers to teach adults to read and write. He reports that in most counties in Southwest Texas illiteracy is far above the national average, and runs over 20 per cent in some counties.

Texas Education Agency is engaged in the most intensive study of the problem ever undertaken in the state and the director of that study says the problem can be substantially solved in a few years by a concerted state-local effort.

CAPITOL HOSPITALITY

Texas Highway Department now has a team of travel information officers in the rotunda of the State Capitol. They are stationed in an illuminated tourist booth.

This information team has the task of acquainting the thousands of visitors to the Capitol with the State's other tourist attractions.

NEW MANSION ASKED

Should Texas build a brand new \$500,000 governor's mansion? That is a subject of debate in the capitol city.

Building Commission Director H. R. Nieman Jr. has recommended a new structure to replace the 108-year-old mansion. Budget Director Bill Cobb also has testified in favor of the proposal.

BUSINESS STRENGTH MAINTAINED
Texas' 40-month business upswing is the longest of the post-war era (except for the Korean War period), according to the UT Bureau of Business Research.

While the business activity index slipped two per cent in May, average for the first five months of 1964 is seven per cent above the same period in 1963.

"It now seems reasonable to expect that before any adjustment occurs, Texas business will surpass even the 45-month rise of business activity from October 1949 to July 1953," Bureau Director Dr. John R. Stockton predicted.

FISHERMAN'S HEAVEN
Parks and Wildlife Department spokesmen expect the out-sized Amistad Reservoir, now being fashioned from the Rio Grande, Pecos and Devils rivers, to be a heaven for fishermen.

Aquatic biologist Larry Campbell predicts that when the 6-million acre feet reservoir is completed in 1968 it will boast blue catfish from the Devil and Pecos; large-mouth bass from Lake Walk and Devils Lake, and flathead, blue and channel cat from the Rio Grande.

Underway are conversations leading toward a joint management program for the \$100,000,000 reservoir project with the Mexican government.

SHORT SNOOTS
Cigarette smokers are doing it again. Revenue from cigarette tax stamps increased \$568,048 in June over June 1963 and more than \$600,000 over May.

A gold-painted guard rail was installed along a \$90,000,000 freeway section near Winnie in Jefferson County. Freeway connects downtown Houston with Beaumont. Highway Commission Chairman Herbert C. Petry Jr. predicted it will save 21 lives a year.

Cotton still is big in Texas. Lt. Gov. Smith told the International Oil Mill Superintendents Association. During the last 10 years the state has produced an average of 3,900,000 bales a year and more than 1,600,000 tons of cottonseed, with an average value of \$715,000,000 a year.

State Hospital Board Executive Director Raymond Vowell has been appointed to two presidential advisory committees on mental retardation.

Governor Connally has named a planning committee of state officials to develop an administrative internship program in state government.

Republican candidates will attend a political school in Austin on August 20-22.

During the last week in June the State Securities Board okayed eight applications to sell \$2,055,300 in securities in Texas. A total of \$2,400,000 in additional applications were received the same week, but not processed.

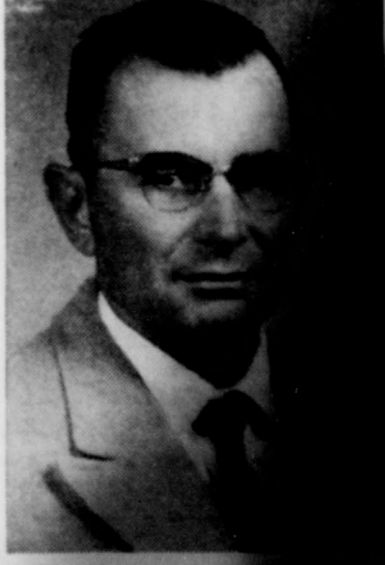

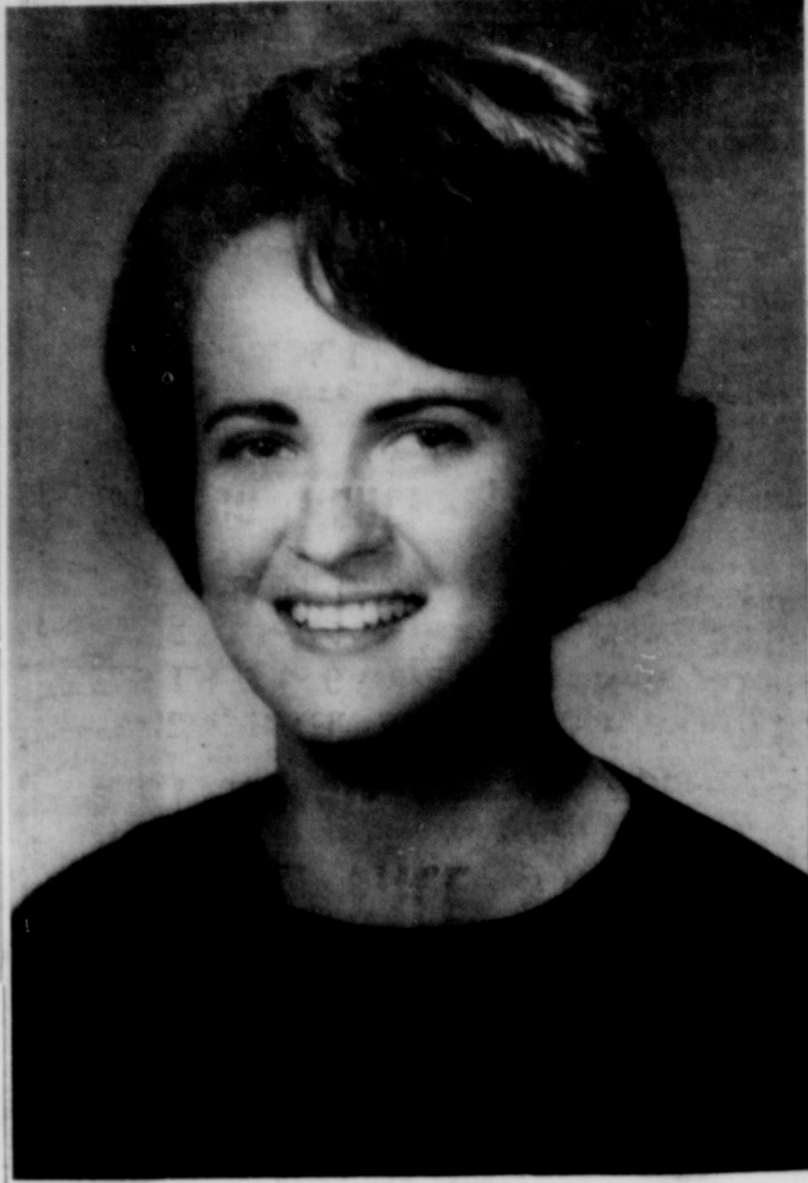
